Born in New York on April 4th, 1953, Kvitka had an amazing career until her premature death on March 29th, 1998, when she succumbed to cancer after a long and courageous battle. She was only 45. But what an incredible and successful life she lived.

To this day, both her birth day and death day are celebrated in tributes all over the world. In June 2013, the Ukrainian Parliament named a "Kvitka Cisyk Day" as being a cultural icon and one of the most popular singing artists across Ukraine.

In November, UAC is planning to invite prominent artist Ola Rondiak to Los Angeles to exhibit her work, which is currently on display in New York at the Ukrainian Institute.

Ola Rondiak, a graduate of Hunter College, grew up in Ohio in a Ukrainian family. She studied art in both Ukraine and Hungary. Her paintings stem from her family's experiences living in Ukraine, the events of WWII, Stalin's Iron



Curtain, the Orange Revolution, and the Revolution of Dignity. The Orange Revolution in the fall of 2004, signaled the emergence of a new civic movement--a political resistance group, people from all walks of life, that banded together to forge a red light on the ruling class' fraudulent election processes. The artistic execution of the program of such high caliber was well received and definitely to be included in future programming.

Our outreach to the community and beyond through various forms of media has resulted in a swelling



of interest in membership of UAC, INC. With this growth we will be able to expand our activities. We welcome your ideas, contributions and support.

UAC Featured Artist: Asya Gorska


Asya Gorska is an artistic director, choreographer and dance teacher of a dance group Chervona Kalyna. She is also a professional singer, presenter, UCC artistic director and a social worker.

She was born in Ukraine in a beautiful city of Mykolayiv, where she grew up. Her grandmother Vira Aleksiyina was the one who influenced Asya's formative years and her career choice. Grandmother Vira was Asya's first teacher and mentor and was always there to support Asya through crucial moments of her life.

Straight after getting married, at the age of 22 Asya and her husband Euvgene Gorsky moved to the capital city of Kyiv. And so starts the next period of her life – Kyiv. The first years were not easy, but Asya's hard work and resistance paid off. Together with her husband she founded a band Foxtrot that was extremely popular with blues and rock n roll admirers. At the same time, Asya became an artistic director of a dance group Hratsiya (Grace), leading it until her move to the United States. Under Asya's helm, Hratsiya has won many prizes at various competitions in Ukraine and abroad. She spent 10 unforgettable years in Kyiv, leaving behind dear friends, students and colleagues. This period of her life is very special for Asya and her family.

In December of 2011 Asya moves to Los Angeles with her family. She has been working and enriching the Ukrainian

community in Los Angeles for almost 7 years **Apart** now. from Chervona Kalyna, Asya sings in a band, performing weddings, birthday parties American and other audiences. The Band performs riety of genres from Jazz to rock in different languages. Asya used to sing in NBVM Ukrainian



Catholic Church, which was the experience she values to this day. She was a music teacher at Ridna Shkola of Los Angeles for 4 years and an actress in a puppet theater. Asya has been a choreographer in Happy Notes preschool for 6 years. It is a little-known fact that Asya also has a degree in Social Work and works in Sunny Days retirement home. These were very busy 7 years and there is more to come.

Personal Note:

I never regretted our move to the United States. It was my husband's dream. He won the Green Card lottery the first time he applied. I treated this as the sign from God and supported my husband. It was extremely hard to leave behind family, friends, careers that took so much love and effort to build. Looking back at those 7 years here, it is hard to believe that so much has been accomplished. We found new friends and made this country our new home.

Breaking Point - The War for Democracy in Ukraine

On March 9th and 10th, the Los Angeles community was treated to "Breaking Point - The War For Democracy In Ukraine", a movie written by Paul Wolansky and directed by Mark Jonathan Harris and Oles Sanin.

This was one of the many films being released about events taking place in Ukraine at Maidan and in eastern Ukraine, and in my opinion one of the best. What made it interesting and unique was the ability to tell the story about Ukraine and put it in a broader historical perspective, explaining why Ukraine has been and continues to be such an attractive target for takeover.

Character development was done very well by tracking the stories of people compelled to participate - both Ukrainian citizens and people travelling from all over the

world, and being touched by the frightening plight of the latest episode in Ukrainian history.

After the film showing, the audience was invited to ask questions and speak with the Directors. I was enlightened and impressed by how the Directors got together to work on this project and how passionate and committed they were about putting out such an excellent documentary.



This is a must-see/must-own movie for all - especially those unfamiliar with current events in Ukraine. It has won several awards, and got 100% on Rotten Tomatoes. For more info, check out their website breakingpointfilm.com.

staged nationwide nonviolent protests now known as the Orange Revolution, as well as the Revolution of Dignity in 2013. These events shaped Rondiak's worldview; emotional experiences began to surface in her paintings, family history intertwines with Ukrainian history and tradition.

Ola lives and paints between Kyiv, Ukraine and New York City. Some of her recent exhibits include the Tauver's Gallery International, in Kyiv, The Delaware Contemporary in Wilmington, DE, the US Embassy in Kyiv, Ukrainian Embassies in Berlin and Munich, Odessa Opera House in Ukraine, Nymphenberg Castle in Munich, and Ukrainian National Museums in Cleveland, Ohio and Chicago, Illinois. Her paintings can also be found in private collections throughout the world. Ola's artwork is currently on display at Zorya Fine Art Gallery in Greenwich, CT. Upcoming exhibits include Ukrainian Institute of America, in New York on May 4th and Rome, Italy in July.

Rondiak's iconographic portraiture of Ukrainian women depicts their "determined and indomitable spirit." Often referred to as "Pop art" or "folklore," her work recalls the icons of the Byzantine period, where Imperial and Ecclesiastical-sponsored proliferation of busts of saints and figures of the Virgin Mary lined basilica walls, retables, iconostases, and altarpieces.

Ola's portfolio consists of oil paintings, acrylic paintings, acrylic on cardboard, plaster of paris sculptures and mannequins, video installation, and acrylic and paper collages incorporating a number of mediums including pencil, oil pastels, and markers. Her "Motanka" sculptures were on exhibit at the Mystetskiy Arsenal in June 2017 in Kyiv and can be viewed again at the Ukrainian Institute of America, in New York in May, 2018.

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THE HISTORY OF THE UKRAINIAN ART CENTER

Based in Los Angeles, California. UAC, Ukrainian Art Center is a non-profit community organization. It was initiated by Daria Chaikovsky together with a group of like minded people in 1986 to preserve, promote and develop the Ukrainian arts in Los Angeles and California. Its initial goals reflect its present plan to create a new Ukrainian Museum in Los Angeles and to develop cultural and educational programs, alongside festivals and exhibitions. Mrs. Chaikovsky worked tirelessly with the UAC Board alongside her own business, presenting folk festivals, lectures, workshops and community projects on a small

scale, consistently providing a much needed resource for the local area. Over the years UAC was the main focal point for Ukrainian arts and culture on the West coast and involved people from all ages and backgrounds including non-Ukrainians. During these fruitful years, the local city council and private patrons funded its activities including regular Annual Easter Pysanka and Holiday Yalynka events, exhibitions, concerts and more, encouraging many diverse groups and individuals to explore the richness of Ukrainian Culture.
