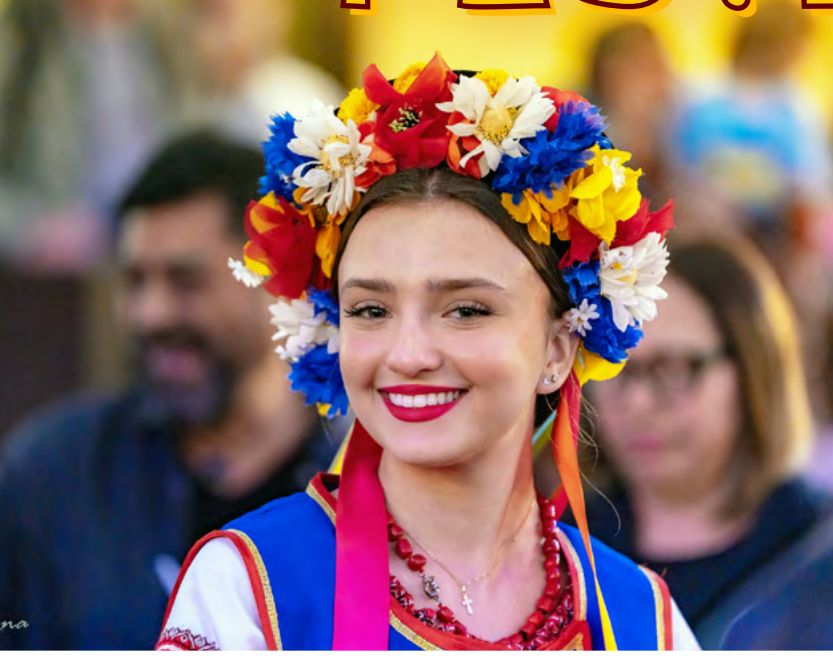

MAGIC OF PYSANKA



UKRAINIAN PYSANKA IN THE CLASSROOM

Letter to the UAC president Daria Chaikovsky

Dearest Daria, I am not of Ukranian descent; however, I do have a bit of history with you and the Ukranian Art Center. I recently received your latest newsletter where you, your work, vision and dedication to sharing the Ukranian arts was praised and the creation of the Ukranian Art Center was born in 1986.

My story; however, began before this date so there must have been some kind of a shop where materials were available for sale for some years prior to the founding of the center. My mother, Marian Schroeder, became interested and intrigued by the beautiful art of the Pysanka eggs. She went into L.A. to purchase the dyes, wax, kitskas, even eggs and so on from you Daria. I still have your card from this adventure. My mother passed in 1986. This is how I have concluded that there must have been a shop prior to the initiation of the UAC. In the process of going through all of her things I came across her box of all of the Pysanka supplies. Now I was intrigued.

I was an art teacher at Bonita High School in La Verne, CA for 30 years and was doing a lot of curriculum writing in order to get approval for my various art classes to qualify as academic electives through the State of California educational code. Well, here was this wonderful gift! I wanted to incorporate the historical background and techniques of Pysanka into my Fiber Art classes. It fit perfectly into my unit covering batik and the use of wax resist in dyeing in various cultures. This met the California requirement for historical and cultural instruction in an academic elective for this class. So, in my mother's things was some of the information but I wanted more. I looked at that card with your name on it and thought "What are the chances?" So I called. To my greatest surprise and pleasure you, Daria, answered. I was beside myself with delight! It was a two-fold joy, a connection to expand my understanding of the art of Pysanka and also a wonderful connection to my mom.

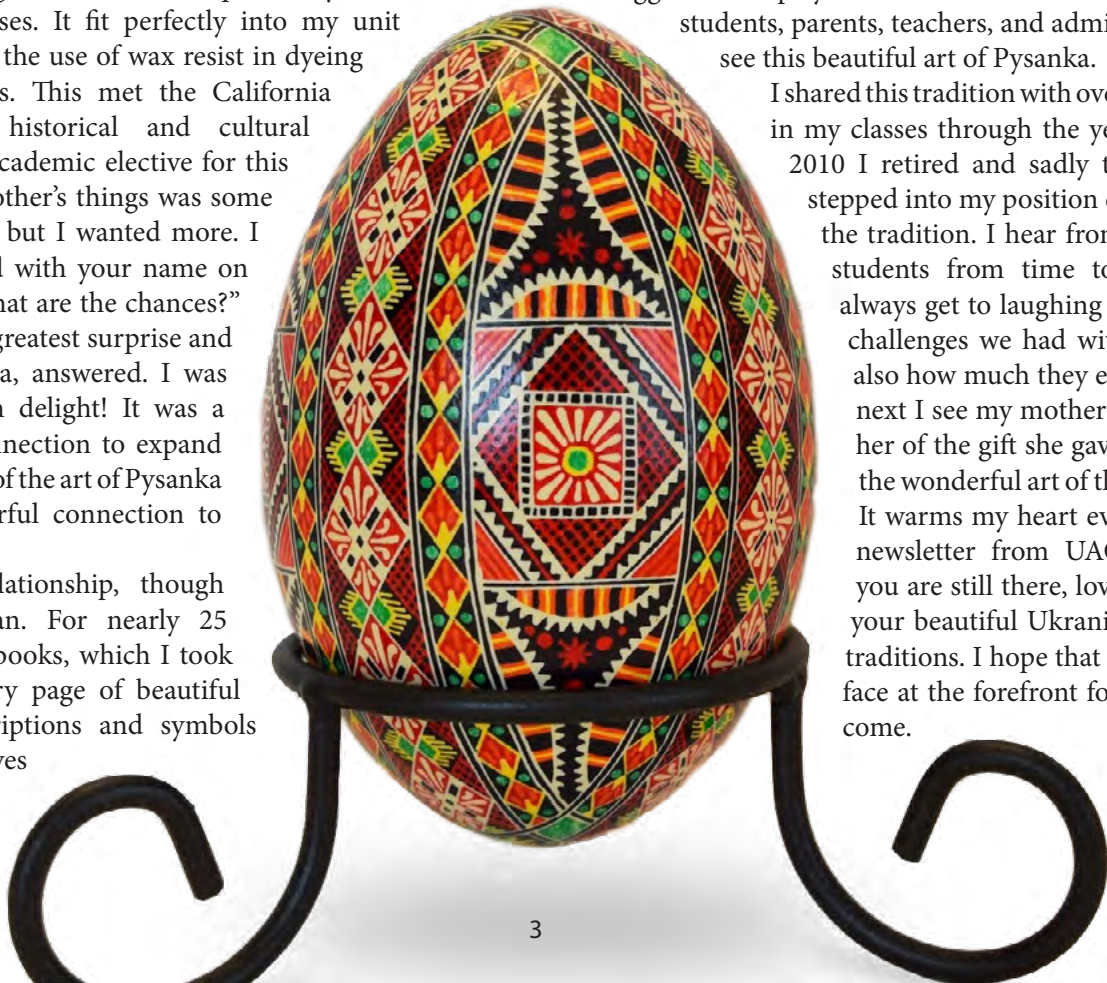
And so the relationship, though quite casual, began. For nearly 25 years I purchased books, which I took apart, putting every page of beautiful photographs descriptions and symbols into plastic sleeves so that my students could reference them

without damage, dyes, wax, kitskas, display egg holders, lathes, everything Pysanka, was purchased every year. In order for you to understand how I used the Pysanka history in my class... my students, for the first couple of years, followed the tradition of dying raw, fertile, eggs. A friend of mine supplied the eggs from her little "farm." I also had the students using candles to melt the wax in the kitskas. After a few years of odiferous mishaps we began to blow out the eggs. This day was celebrated with a big egg feast! Also, by this time the candles were wisely replaced with alcohol lamps. The eggs were also not finalized with a flame to remove the wax but, rather, a low temperature oven where frequent wipings were required until all the wax was removed. This proved to be much more advantageous over mini explosions and burned eggs. I discussed some of the history and legends with the classes then required each student to design one egg inspired by using traditional motifs found in the books. A second egg was to be designed by using motifs they found through researching their own family cultural backgrounds. Each student then presented their eggs to the class by explaining the significance of the design elements and colors they chose.

This couldn't have been better to comply with the State mandated requirements of an academic elective. The students loved doing this project and learning so many new things about this tradition of dyed (batiked) eggs. Many of these beautiful eggs were displayed in our annual art shows where other students, parents, teachers, and administrators could see this beautiful art of Pysanka.

I shared this tradition with over 1,700 students in my classes through the years I taught. In 2010 I retired and sadly the person who stepped into my position did not carry on the tradition. I hear from my graduated students from time to time and we always get to laughing about the many challenges we had with the eggs, but also how much they enjoyed it. When next I see my mother I will surely tell her of the gift she gave us all through the wonderful art of the Pysanka eggs. It warms my heart every time I get a newsletter from UAC and see that you are still there, loving and sharing your beautiful Ukranian heritage and traditions. I hope that I may I see your face at the forefront for many years to come.

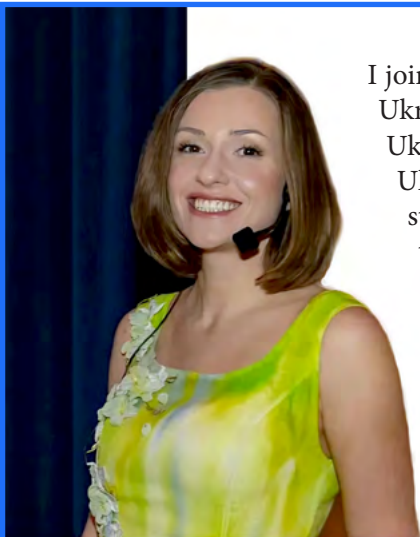


I joined the Ukrainian Art Center in March 2022 with the purpose to support and empower Ukrainians who are going through probably the hardest times in the history of independent Ukraine. Approximately at the same time, I started working as an interpreter for the wave of Ukrainian refugees running from the impact of war. Every day I was listening to the real-life stories of real people, half of them had nothing left from their previous lives, and nowhere to return. I was constantly determined and professional in my working duties but every single day I was breaking one of the main laws of the International Interpreters Code of Ethics – “interpreters must stay impartial at all times”.

The interpreter’s job allowed me to see immigration through the eyes of refugees. After having that working experience, I know exactly what they are looking for when they come to the new country. They seek everything that reminds them of home: language, people, that typically Ukrainian warm welcoming family environment... I sincerely hope that in the Ukrainian Art Centre, we can create this environment that our people need so much.

Our Pysanka Festival is the most waived and cheerful Ukrainian holiday. It is a symbol of a new beginning. Significantly, we had approximately 40 kids involved in our concert at the festival where 70% of them arrived from Ukraine recently. The same trend we can see with our freshly joined volunteers. I want to believe that art has the power to heal and our volunteering effort in the Art Center gives both kids and adults hope for a brighter future and inspiration to revive, rebuild, and raise.

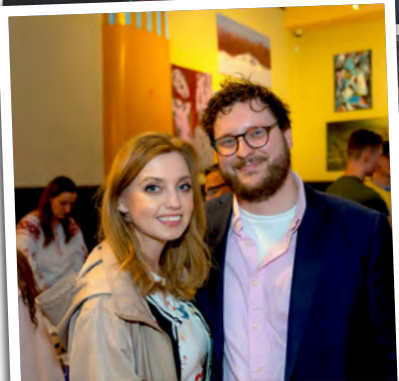

My passion for pysanka is in my blood. My mother – Annette Hricko Czupyllo – was one of the most prolific pysanka artists in her day. In fact, she embodied the mission of the Ukrainian Art Center “to present, preserve and promote” this traditional craft before our non-profit was even founded. In the 1970s, her artistry caught the attention of Hallmark – which featured (and credited) her pysanka on Easter greeting cards and even a puzzle. Throughout that decade and into the 1980s, she also demonstrated how our eggs are made at malls and events throughout Southern California. When I was only a child, I not only accompanied her to these events – but demonstrated the craft alongside her. My pysanky were never close to her level – but her sharing the craft with me is emblematic of the importance of generation-to-generation storytelling and passing on of Ukrainian traditions. Fast forward a few decades, and I am now able to combine my personal love of pysanka with my professional skills as a public relations specialist. For the past two years’ Pysanka Festivals, I’m proud to have elevated the “promotion” part of our mission by securing publicity across mainstream outlets including CBS, ABC, NBC, FOX, KCAL, Spectrum News, Time Out Los Angeles, AARP and AAA’s Westways Magazine.

A special highlight of the festival is the participation of many talented Ukrainian artists from various corners of Southern

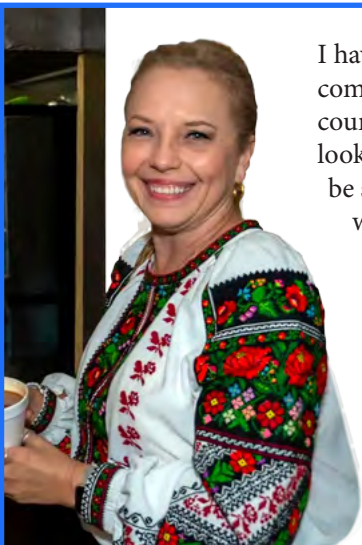
California. Every year, the festival discovers new talents who have the opportunity to showcase their skills and creativity to art enthusiasts.

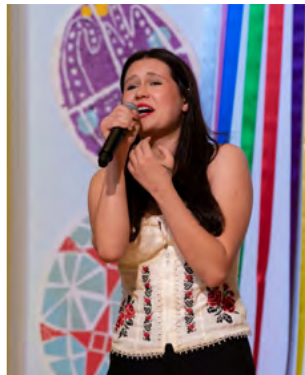

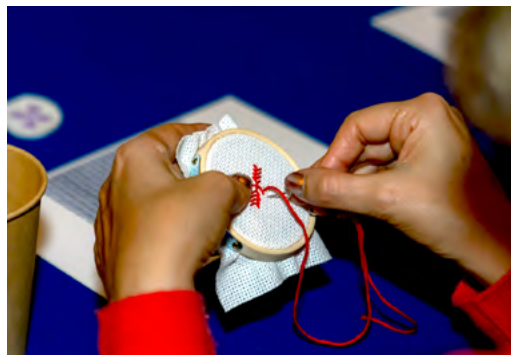

Based in Los Angeles, California, UAC, Ukrainian Art Center is a non-profit community organization. It was initiated by Daria Chaikovsky together with a group of like minded people in 1986 to preserve, promote and develop the Ukrainian arts in Los Angeles and California. Its initial goals reflect its present plan to create a new Ukrainian Museum in Los Angeles and to develop cultural and educational programs, alongside festivals and exhibitions. Mrs. Chaikovsky worked tirelessly with the UAC Board alongside her own business, presenting folk festivals, lectures, workshops and community projects on a small scale, consistently providing a much needed resource for the local area. Over the years UAC was the main focal point for Ukrainian arts and culture on the West coast and involved people from all ages and backgrounds including non-Ukrainians. During these fruitful years, the local city council and private patrons funded its activities including regular Annual Easter Pysanka and Holiday Yalynka events, exhibitions, concerts and more, encouraging many diverse groups and individuals to explore the richness of Ukrainian Culture.
