## SIGMA CHI'S IMPROVED PLEDGE TRAINING PROGRAM LAUNCHED AT ALPHA EPSILON

*Reporting on Preparation for Brotherhood*

Fall 2016 was a big semester for the Alpha Epsilon Chapter, as it was our first semester operating under the new international pledge training program known as Preparation for Brotherhood, or P4B.

P4B puts more emphasis on individual learning. The new program is shorter in length, only eight weeks long, and is structured so that pledges learn everything about Sigma Chi that was included in the old pledge program at a faster pace and in a more concentrated fashion. P4B requires pledges to learn from video presentations about Sigma Chi's history and our Founders. Then, each week each pledge must successfully pass a quiz on the information they learned. Unlike our previous program, the P4B requires that the quizzes are taken online.

This new path to brotherhood has naturally been met with some apprehension by actives and alumni alike, as are many things that require change. "Breaking tradition is always hard," Ty Khubchandani '19, new magister for the spring semester said, "but I think our Alpha Epsilon Chapter has done a fantastic job so far of making that transition."

"With the new P4B, we're now fully aligned with the best practices of the International Fraternity," Carter Deras '18, the fall magister, said. He continued, "Grand Praetor Art Cox, Iowa '75, was instrumental in helping us with this transition."

Along with a focus on individual learning, P4B provides more opportunities for the active Chapter to get involved with pledgship. For example, the new pledge program provides the opportunity, via ConnΣXtions, for pledges to meet with actives to discuss the material pledges are learning about in a particular week. In fact, pledges are required to have five ConnΣXtions meetings with different actives in the house each week, providing them a broader spectrum of different relational and informational experiences relative to that week's curriculum. Under P4B, pledges have readings every week, as opposed to only during Introspection Week as they have in past years.

The feedback from our first pledge class to go through this new protocol has been quite positive. "Through the readings, reflections, and talking to actives, I definitely think I was ready for initiation," said Jon Camenzind '20, a fall 2016 initiate. "I think most pledges would say that the readings and talking with the actives about it were very beneficial. I love how we had those weekly, not daily, readings, because we could re-read the weekly readings each day and reflect on them."

All in all, P4B has the Chapter's full support and we know that this is the future for young men learning about the values of Sigma Chi prior to initiation.

*In July*, we will repeat our successful Summer Rush Showcase at the Lincoln Country Club. The exact time and date will be determined as summer rush begins and we get an indication of the availability of potential pledges and their parents. Be alert for an announcement of time and date in June!

*In October*, we'll plan another Homecoming reception at the Chapter House. The University has not announced which game will be designated for Homecoming, but chances are it will be the Wisconsin game on October 7 or the Ohio State game on October 14. As soon as we have confirmation on the date, detailed Sigma Chi Homecoming plans will be published.

*In December*, we will have our annual Sigma Chi Holiday Party. Date, time, and location are all still to be determined. Look for our announcement

# FROM THE DESK OF THE CHAPTER ADVISOR

**G**reetings, Brothers! I'm excited to provide an overview of the highlights for our undergraduate Chapter as we head into a new year and the spring semester at 1510 Vine Street. My overarching observation is quite positive.

Our Alumni Advisory Committee is deliberately—and with confidence—slightly loosening our management grip on the affairs of the undergraduate Chapter. The reason why is simple. Our undergraduates have consistently proven themselves to be ready to own who they are, what they are called to do in the best of Sigma Chi values, and what they want their reputation to be on campus and in the community. We have our culture “right” and it is gratifying to witness and to give these guys the well-earned opportunity to move to more self-governance. Here are a few key points that I wanted to share.

**We are up to 76 members.** We are vetting possible new members quite rigorously and selecting quality young men with the right values—and the results are showing. One fine example of this is that 28 out of 31 members of our last pledge class were recently initiated.

**We have strong team continuity.** While we are losing Chapter Advisory Member **Brad Staskiewicz '10** as he relocates to Minneapolis, I am continuing my role in leading the Advisory Committee. Al Cooper, our house dad, has proven to be a valuable asset—admired and respected by the undergraduates. Al is moving into his second year with us and, given his path to earning his Ph.D., will likely be with us for several more. Stacey, our all-purpose cook/house mom/relational glue is now in her fourth year (a modern record for us!) and revered by all, not just for her great cooking, but her care as well. I want to personally thank Brad for his tireless, insightful, and valuable work with our undergraduates over the years. He has been nothing short of superb and we wish him well as he embarks on this next chapter of his life.

**Our renovation has proved truly worthy.** We have a great physical plant and have learned how to improve some things during this “shakedown” period. For example, we converted, at the request of the undergraduates, the old study room into a “brotherhood” room with more seating, television, and sound system. We then converted the quieter downstairs area to be the primary study area complete with improved Wi-Fi capacity.

**We are building Sigs for Life.** I am highly optimistic that the clear shift in culture has created the kind of “stickiness” in terms of lifetime commitment to Sigma Chi. Our culture has shifted in a positive, values-driven way, that stresses personal accountability and care for one another. It is great to witness! This bodes well not only for the undergraduate Chapter today, but for the future leadership of the Advisory Group as I am confident we will transition a number of our graduates to serving in advisory capacities following graduation.

**We are growing stronger financially.** We are in the process of converting our current line of credit into a long-term amortized loan, which will systematically reduce our debt obligations and free up cash flow. We are getting close to full occupancy status as well and our plan is to sustain those levels year in and year out, which also bodes well for debt reduction.

All in all, I think Alpha Epsilon has come a long way in the last five years, and we will continue on a path of success.

## ALFONZO "AL" COOPER SETTLES IN AS HOUSE DAD

For decades, many fraternities on campus, including ours, have engaged a "house mom" to fill a supervisory need and a gentle touch in the Chapter House. But over the past several years, the Alpha Epsilon Chapter has taken a different approach, employing a "house dad." Since being reinstated on campus in 2013, Sigma Chi has hired young men in this role who have had recent and exemplary undergraduate Fraternity experiences, successfully graduated, and are at work on graduate degrees.

**Jack Erhke, FarmHouse '12**, a member of FarmHouse Fraternity and a UNL graduate, was first to serve in this role. He was succeeded by **Isaac Moore, FarmHouse '13**, also a member of FarmHouse and a UNL graduate. Both left an indelible impression on Sigma Chi and both have moved on in their careers. Our third official house dad, **Alfonzo Cooper Jr.**, is now in his second year.

Al is a 27-year-old doctoral candidate in music from Waynesboro, Georgia, and a graduate of Georgia Southern University. He is an opera singer and remains deeply involved with his two fraternities: Phi Mu Alpha, which is the music fraternity, and his social fraternity, Kappa Alpha Psi.

When asked about his interest in the position, Al said, "Honestly, I was optimistic and enthusiastic because I have had a really good experience in being in a fraternity chapter as an undergrad. I have a pretty good understanding of how fraternity life works. That understanding is why I applied and interviewed for this position."

Al's busy schedule outside the Chapter House includes volunteering with Greek Affairs. "I see a connection between the two. I can be an effective liaison, sharing my experiences with the men of Sigma Chi, which benefits Greek Affairs, while making Sigma Chi aware of the positions and policies adopted by Greek Affairs," Al said.

On Friday, September 30, the Greater Nebraska Area Alumni Chapter hosted a reception at the N Club for about 60 Sigs from far and near. The views, the food, and the hospitality set the tone for the weekend.

On Saturday morning, October 1, the undergraduate Chapter hosted a very special pre-game reception at the Sig House. About 80 alumni, wives, and family members were in attendance to witness a fine Homecoming display created by the undergraduates (they took second in the campus-wide judging and were miffed that they didn’t get first!).

Each new pledge had the opportunity to stand up before this august crowd to introduce themselves and suffer the requisite ribbings by their classmates. Also on the agenda was the presentation and pinning for the Half-Century Sig pins by the undergraduates to their alumni brothers who have been members of Sigma Chi for over 50 years. Believe it or not, some 25 brothers from around the country were also there to receive their pins in a very touching ceremony.

Another poignant presentation took place at the house as Mary Drago, the widow of Brother **Mick Drago '64**, gifted a large, beautiful, handmade

The presentation was made all the more meaningful as a number of Mick’s contemporaries were in attendance. This gift to the Chapter House comes on top of the generous lead gift of \$250,000 the Dragoos made to the Chapter during the capital campaign drive.

Capping off a perfect day, the Huskers came back from a first-half deficit and ripped Illinois on the last quarter heroics of Tommy Armstrong and Terrell Newby, 31-16.

A footnote: the Sigs of the Sixties got together that evening for their every-other-year dinner at Wilderness Ridge. These old chaps, of whom I am one, continue to amaze as they celebrated another Homecoming with some 50 Sigs and their wives in attendance.
