The momentum gained from the past semester makes us super excited for the next school year to begin. Here are a few highlights from the past year:

It all starts with the initiation of 39 new brothers. This is by far and away one of our largest pledge classes in recent memory. The different temperaments, talents, and convictions these gentlemen possess have been at the forefront of building a significant culture change within the house. Helping set up a future Sigs from the past and present can all be proud of. This all wouldn't have been possible without our amazing rush team from the past year that included Brothers Brandon Zohlen '23, Chris Karmazin '23, and Connor Loftus **'24**. In order to prepare these gentlemen into our brotherhood, Brother Jeremy Webb, our magister, taught them our foundations, but more on that later.

One of the other large successes we had this year was with our philanthropic events. In the spring semester alone, the chapter was able to raise over twenty thousand dollars for Huntsman cancer institute. A large majority of this money raised came from our event Derby Days, which I am sure many of you may remember. Brother Bobby Martin '22 was our Derby Days Chair for this past year and we owe much of our success in the event to him. Due to this achievement, I will be flying out to join other Sigs from around the country in Salt Lake, Utah, where Huntsman is based. In Salt Lake, I and the other Sigs will be touring Huntsman's facility along with learning a variety of techniques and strategies for the upcoming school year.

Academically, the house is continuing to grow in the direction that we set out around two years ago. This past semester, we were able to obtain a house GPA of 3.45. This puts us within the top 5 of all fraternities on campus, on top of being our highest GPA in recent memory. Another academic achievement we have experienced recently has been the initiation of nine of our brothers into Order of Omega. A Greek honor society containing members with the top 3% of GPAs in the Greek community. As we move forward, I along with the entire house want to continue to push the needle, raising our standards, to be the best house academically on campus.

Overall, the chapter is moving in a direction many of us are proud to be a part of, and were continuing to gain momentum. I find it to be a privilege and an honor to lead the men within this chapter on a day-to-day basis. We are incredibly ambitious about this next school year. We plan to have at a minimum have 3,000 service hours, 50,000 in donation money to Huntsman, and fix up the place that brings us all together, the chapter house. ### DERBY DAYS RETURNS TO LINCOLN

In the past two years, we were unable to hold one of the most iconic events that every Sigma Chi chapter hosts around the world — Derby Days. The COVID-19 pandemic hindered our ability to host in-person events. Still, this year, with COVID restrictions easing, we held the largest Derby Days in the history of our Chapter, raising over \$16,000 for the Huntsman Cancer Institute.

Derby Days this year included 176 participants from not only the Greek community but from different on-campus organizations. We had 38 brothers volunteer to coach 17 teams throughout the week. These brothers lead their teams in four events during the week. The first event was a simple barbecue at the Chapter House, giving everyone the opportunity to meet each other and socialize, and for me to go over all the events for the week in detail so everyone knew what to expect.

The first event of Derby Days kicked off on Tuesday, March 29th, and was a reverse beauty pageant. The coaches of Derby Days were dressed up to the theme, Spring Break 2.0, by the participants on their teams, and walked a red-carpet runway to a song of their choice. This event brought in a crowd of over 400 people and was a fun yet creative way to fundraise money for Cancer Research. The Army ROTC commandos took home first place at this event, coached by brothers Chris Karmazin '23, Chase Allen '23, and Cory Grieb '25.

The second event of Derby Days was a sand volleyball tournament that we held on campus for all teams to compete. The bracket was double elimination, and the tournament lasted around 3 hours. Congratulations to the team of Isaac Alvarado '24, and Jake Brase '25, with the sorority Delta Gamma for taking home first place in the sand volleyball tournament!

Last but not least, we had our Derby Day, something we do every year. We reserved the City Campus Recreational Center indoor turf field and had each team compete in a dance that they had prepared during the week, along with a painted banner. Congratulations to the team of **Preston Kotik '24**, and **Blake Welker '24**, with the sorority Alpha Chi Omega for winning the banner and dance competition! We then held over 10 smaller athletic competitions for each team to compete in, including relay

Derby Days this year was an absolute success, raising the most money we ever have from hosting Derby Days. Next

year's Derby Days is expected to be even larger, aiming to raise over \$20,000 for cancer research. Together, we will be the generation to end cancer.



















## A BROTHER'S UNCONVENTIONAL ROUTE TO 1510 VINE

He was involved when the Alpha Epsilon alumni group decided to become a formal Alumni Chapter in 2007. Ron and his wife Chris shared their home with Sigma Chi Fraternity members

and alumni in December of 2010, 2011 and 2012 providing a Christmas Holiday reception during the beginning of the Alpha Epsilon Chapter reorganization. He also served in an advisory capacity between Sigma Chi and the University of Nebraska during the reinstatement of Sigma Chi back to the University of Nebraska campus. He graciously provided his limited personal guarantee along with nine other brothers that allowed the Sigma Chi Building Corporation to proceed with the successful renovation project for the students at 1510 Vine Street and was a campaign donor. Ron leaves behind a strong legacy of family members who decided to join Alpha Epsilon.
