Martin County jobless rate bumps up to 3.1 percent for November

work.

Martin County's jobless rate bumped with Bartholomew County. from 2.9 percent in October to 3.1 percent in November. The county had the 17th lowest unemployment rate in the state for October, tied with nine other counties.

In November, the county had 5,174 residents in the workforce with 159 of them unemployed. In October, there were 5,184 residents able to work and 148 of them without jobs. In November of 2017, Martin County's unemployment rate was 2.6 percent with 5,074 residents in the workforce and 131 of them without work. Daviess County's unemployment rate went unchanged from October to November, standing at 2.9 percent. The county had the 8th lowest jobless rate in the state for November, tied with Hamilton, Steuben and Kosciusko counties. In November, the county had 16,373 residents in the workforce with 479 of them unemployed. In October, there were 16,429 residents able to work and 469 of them without jobs. In November of 2017, Daviess County's unemployment rate was 2.6 percent with 15,706 residents in the workforce and 413 of them unemployed. Dubois County's jobless rate edged up just slightly in November to 2.7 percent, up from 2.6 percent the month before. The county held on to the top spot in the state for lowest jobless rate, tied

In November, the county had 23,027 residents in the workforce with 622 of them unemployed. In October, there were 23,108 residents able to work and 609 of them without jobs. In November of 2017, Dubois County's jobless rate was 2.3 percent with 23,026 residents in the workforce and 532 of them without

Greene County's unemployment rate bumped from 4.5 percent in October to 4.9 percent in November. The county had the fifth highest jobless rate in the state for November, tied with Fayette County. In November, the county had 13,481 residents in the workforce with 654 of them unemployed. In October, there were 13,511 residents able to work and 607 of them without jobs. In November of 2017, Greene County's jobless rate was 4.1 percent with 13,346 residents in the workforce and 545 of them without work. The top ten spots in the state for the lowest jobless rate for November were Dubois and Bartholomew counties at 2.7 percent, Wells, LaGrange, Gibson, Boone and Adams counties at 2.8 percent; and Steuben, Kosciusko, Hamilton and Daviess counties at 2.9 percent. Traffic stop leads to search warrant and arrest of three

On Wednesday, December 26, at 3:14 p.m., Martin County Sheriff's Deputy Tyler Reed was on patrol in Loogootee and observed a vehicle equipment violation. Loogootee Police Department Chief Kelly Rayhill was in the area and initiated a traffic stop on the vehicle. The driver was identified as William R. Bradley, 31, of Loogootee and a passenger was identified as Joy M. Grace, 37, of Loogootee. Bradley was found to have an expired driver's license. Bradley gave officers verbal consent to search the vehicle. 
