Commissioners ask residents to watch out for highway employees, call in controlled burns

The Martin County Commissioners discussed at their meeting Tuesday, March 22, the need for residents to call into the sheriff's department when they are doing a controlled burn on their property. According to Emergency Management Director Monty Wolf, passersby are calling in fires and fire personnel are leaving their paid jobs to respond only to find out that the fire is in fact a controlled burn. The commissioners discussed possibly creating an ordinance requiring controlled burns to be called in. They also suggested calling around to other counties to see how they handle the issue. In the meantime, they are asking residents who plan to burn on their property to report it to the sheriff's department so dispatch will know if someone calls in the fire.

Highway Superintendent Scott Seals posed to go. told the commissioners that one of his employees was almost hit doing work on West River Road. He said the driver knocked out a cone and narrowly missed the worker. He asked that drivers please be on the lookout for highway employees so that one does not get injured or worse.

Seals said they are currently doing patching work, filling potholes around the county. He said there are a whole lot of potholes, and they are working to get them filled in as soon as they can.

Auditor Bobbie Abel told the commissioners that the Lost River Fire Department has requested changing one section of Simmons Creek Road's name to West Simmons Creek Road. Due to the lack of 9-1-1 addresses, emergency personnel are struggling to find properties on that section of road. Adding the West would help clarify where emergency staff are sup-

Highway Secretary Terri Alcorn said her only issue with the name change is that the road is listed differently on the INDOT map which may jeopardize any Community Crossings funding if they ever decide to do work on that road.

Commissioner George said he believes the road's name should be changed completely instead of adding "West". He said that section of roadway isn't connected to the rest of Simmons Creek Road so it would be easier to just make a new name. He recommended that Alcorn and Seals contact INDOT to see what they suggest.

The commissioners approved a resolution created by the county attorney for spending the ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funds of \$1.9 million. The list of 17 projects is tentative based on urgency and funding available. The projects (See 'COMMISSIONERS' on page 3)

Shoals Town Council approves fund usage request, wastewater contracts

Council Members Cary D. Yevonne Plocher came before the council to request approval for Ordinance 2019-1 for a property located on Stephens Street. She was asked if state regulations would be met and Plocher stated they would. Councilman Ragsdale made a motion to approve with Councilman Hoffman making a second and all were in favor.

Amber Hoffman, President of the Town of Shoals Beautification Board, stated she wanted to thank the town council, clerk-treasurer and all of the town staff, along with members of the community, for their continued support of the board.

Albright stated he had been asked to make a presentation about WRMCA (White River Military Coalition Alliance) which is a board he serves on as the vice president to represent the Town of Shoals. Albright said the board acts as a communication and information resource connection from communities to the Crane base. The main topic discussed was IGSA's (Intra Governmental Service Agreements) that may be beneficial to the Town of Shoals. Albright also discussed the importance of the board to Martin County and the projects that they are working on.

Albright reported the renewal for the Property & Casualty Insurance with De-Witt Insurance Agency was completed and still at a lower renewal rate since 2019.

Clerk-Treasurer Rutledge stated she had provided monthly reconciliation reports with current fund balances as of 2/28/22. She requested a fund transfer from sewer operating to sewer bond & interest in the amount of \$10,000 in preparation for the upcoming bond payment. Councilman Ragsdale made a motion to approve the transfer with Councilman Hoffman making the second and all were in favor.

Rutledge presented a quote for \$2,715 from Keystone for Device Utility Interface Module. This device is for the current utility billing system to interface with the new e-read meters that will be installed. Councilman Ragsdale made a motion to approve the quote with Councilman Hoffman making the second and all were in favor. Rutledge noted the device would be paid for out of the ARPA funds. Rutledge stated she wanted to take the time to talk about the ARPA funds and give an update for public record. Rutledge reported the council had voted to do the e-read meter system switch over with ARPA funds which was approximately \$123,000, an annual maintenance fee for the system which was \$3,500 and now the \$2,715 interface module. She said the other set plans for funds currently are upgrades desperately needed to the water booster station on Lynwood Street and the quote for the parts is \$17,600. Rutledge stated she received a letter from the State of Indiana Friday that the town received a supplemental distribution of ARPA Funds. Rutledge said this is the result of some NEU's (cities and towns with a population below 50,000) that did not claim their funds. The state was required to reallocate unclaimed funds to those NEU's that were eligible and that did not receive 75 percent of their top line budget amount in the first distribution of funds. Rutledge stated the town received \$337.13 for their supplemental and it had been put into the ARPA fund account. Rutledge said that state requires the supplemental funds to be handled with the same guidelines and rules of the initial distributions. Rutledge noted the second half of the ARPA distribution is expected to be received in July per the state.

Rutledge stated she met with the school last week concerning the 3rd Annual "Jug Rox Make A Difference Day" which is scheduled for Thursday, April 14. Rutledge said several plans had been made for various areas around town but if the council had any specifics to let her know. Rutledge noted Town Marshal Eckert would have a crew at the Overlook Park this year completing several tasks and the Town of Shoals Intern would have a crew of his own this year as well. Rutledge requested approval to have the "Spring Clean Up" again with the dumpster for residents and proposed the date of May 13-15. Rutledge also would like approval to have the 3rd annual "Town Wide Yard Sale & Main Street Market" for May 20 and 21. Rutledge noted this is the same weekend as the US Highway 50 yard sales. Councilman Ragsale made a motion to approve the events with Councilman Hoffman making the second and all were in favor.

Rutledge stated she would like approval to have the "Garden Dig" for residents again this year from April 11- May 16 as several used the service last year. Councilman Ragsdale made a motion to approve the event with Councilman Hoffman making the second and all were in favor. Rutledge told the council spring hydrant flushing would begin this Sunday, March 20 and should be completed by Tuesday, March 22. It was noted the scheduled flushing had been previously advertised for awareness.

Rutledge stated she had received a speed bump request in the alley located between Lynwood Street and Chestnut Street. After discussion, it was decided Attorney Lett would look into the legal ownership of the alley and then the town could address the request depending on the ownership. Marshal Eckert said he would speak to those using the alleyway about their speed when driving it.

Council Member Albright stated he wanted to discuss the installation of the e-read meter system that is planned to be installed. He said he had spoken with a few different vendors and towns and the new meters would have antennas and parts attached to the lids. Albright said he felt a tampering fee should be put in place once installed. This fee would be enforced if an individual, other than a town employee, would open the meter pit causing any damage to the functionality of the meter. Albright also noted he felt that shut off valves that are located on the customer side of the meter should be addressed. Currently, there are some homeowners and

landlords that do not have shut off valves on their side of the meter. In the future, the water would not be shut off at the meter due to tampering with the electronic read system. Attorney Lett said he would research adding the verbiage and fee to the ordinance. Councilman Ragsdale stated he felt the town needed to look into the installation of the new system to get it quickly

installed. Albright stated he had started conversations concerning this and he has also already had a conversion with the Shoals Shop Class to complete the drilling of the antenna holes in the meter lids for the new system.

The next regular meeting will be Monday, April 11 at 5:59 p.m. at the Shoals Town Hall.



include replacing the cell lock system in the jail \$150,000 and creating an IT clean room in the jail \$150,000, adding electric signage (\$39,860.53) along with upgrading wi-fi at the community building (\$5,000) on the fairgrounds, replacing central air units at the jail \$100,000, updating roads and getting new equipment at the highway department \$100,000, doing stormwater drainage repairs \$100,000, offering retention bonuses for county employees for \$74,200, rehab of the courthouse sidewalks including adding ADA requirements along with new windows, landscaping and an open area for employees for \$117,000; updates to downtown buildings in Shoals and Loogootee through Radius or the housing program through ROI for \$60,000; expansion of office space for the county for \$500,000, broadband expansion for the Shoals and Loogootee libraries for \$12,720 each;

match money for county projects for \$63,000, air purification, boiler and A/C systems for the courthouse for \$350,000 and the Town of Shoals wastewater project for \$152,000. The list will now go on to the county council for approval.

Cary Albright, representing the White River Military Coordination Alliance, talked to the commissioners about the mission of the alliance. He said that the goal is to connect cities and towns surrounding Crane to help save money by purchasing through communities instead of through federal contracts. He said Crane has a \$2 billion budget with 5,000 employees and through federal contracts, they spend much more money than is necessary. He said by working with neighbors, they can go in to purchase things like salt, transformers, etc. at a much cheaper cost. "It's a win-win with a partnership like this," he said. Albright currently serves as the vice president of the alliance.



Spring is finally here, and with it a flurry of activities in the garden. It is a time for removing the remains of last year's garden and a time to plan and plant the best garden ever. It is a time for tearing out and a time for starting new projects. It is also a time to enjoy the garden. Do not get so busy with the work to be done that you do not take time to sit in a swing and admire your garden.

A major take-out project was completed at Sandhill Gardens last week. An ornamental pear tree that I had been trying to get removed was taken down. I know that I will have to keep cutting back suckers, but the invasive tree is finally gone. It was not always such a pest. When I planted the small Cleveland Select pear tree many years ago, it was being touted as an answer to a major landscaping problem. The world of ornamental pear trees had begun years ago with the introduction of the Bradford pear. It grew into a medium-sized tree with a nice shape and had eye-catching blooms in the spring. Many estate drives were planted with rows of Bradford pears. The tree became the darling of the landscaping world. Cities planted the beautiful pear trees in tree plots and on medians. They were looking for the look of the Japanese cherry blossoms of Washington D.C., but with a tree that was more affordable and required less maintenance.

However, the starlette had a fatal flaw. As the trees matured, the branch crotches exhibited weak unions and ice and wind often resulted in falling limbs. It did not take long for the beautiful-rounded canopies to look more like snags. Still, those estate owners had been charmed by the flowering-tree-lined drives. Plant breeders got busy trying to develop a solution. In a few years, new ornamental pears were introduced, the most promising being the Cleveland Select and Chanticleer pears. They had more conical shapes but did have the beautiful spring blooms that

Bradford's weak branch joints.

All these trees had been bred for their flowers and not for fruit. The Bradford was considered to be sterile. However, like many other fruit trees, cross-pollination is necessary for the production of fruit. Up to this point, there had been no pollinator for the Bradford Pear. The introduction of the new varieties changed that. Suddenly, small berry-sized fruits were produced on the ornamental pears. That still did not seem to be a problem. After all, the birds seemed to love eating the fruit. That is about the time I splurged to purchase a fairly large Cleveland Select pear tree.

The digestive tracts of birds do not always digest everything eaten. As the birds ate the fruit, the seeds were not digested and were deposited with the bird droppings. Soon, little ornamental pear trees were coming up everywhere. They grow pretty rapidly, and soon, these non-native trees were crowding out the native trees on which the wildlife depend. That is the very definition of an invasive species.

Eradicating an invasive species is not an easy task. I have done only a small part by having the offending tree cut. I have already cut down several saplings that I have found growing and will probably have to continue doing so for many years. I also am using this column to urge others to refrain from planting ornamental pear trees and to remove any that they presently have.

That brings us full circle. What can be planted to produce the desired rows of flowering trees along driveways? Choose something native. My favorite recommendation is the native serviceberry tree. I think the flowers are actually more beautiful than those of the pear trees. The bonus is tart fruits in mid-June, which are enjoyed by people and wildlife. Once difficult to find in nurseries, they have become more readily available. If you are looking for a good tree for the landscape,



Emilee Bauernfiend, For Raven's Sake "I named my business, 'For Raven's Sake,' because I was a single mother, completely alone, I took care of her by myself. Everything that I did was for her. I didn't want to work a normal nine to five, where she was stuck in a daycare all day. So, I put her in a playpen and she sat alongside me. I worked hard to provide for her, and people knew that, and that's why I think people were more willing to give me a chance in the beginning. They knew I was taking care of my daughter.

I was always into art. I always had a sketchbook with me, and I was always drawing. People knew that about me. I went to college for two years at Vincennes University to study art, that definitely helped with everything. Early on Kat Von D. was my inspiration, she really showed me that a woman could be more than successful in a male-dominated industry. I care a lot about what other people think, so I do each job like my life depends on it. I believe I have one shot and that I better make it count. I've not always made things easy for myself in life. That's part of why I pushed myself to be a good artist. It was the one thing that was easy for me. At any time, we have the ability to change things, a plot twist at any moment. Art speaks for itself.

I would really like to get Raven to start tattooing. I would love to start teaching her because she is an amazing artist, and I would love for her to follow in my footsteps. She's only 12 but she is better than I was at that age, so I know she's got what it takes if she'll do it. I've started to show her TikToks of close-up tattooing. She doesn't really like coming into the shop when I'm tattooing anymore, but I think she'll come around.

My parents were really supportive, and they saw my potential and my drive, and they gave me my own space to work in for the first five years. I don't know many parents that would just let random people come in; that they didn't know, and they were really supportive about that. I don't know that I could do that with Raven. My parents have probably helped me the most, whether it be them putting me through college, or them



giving me my own space. I wouldn't be where I'm at without their help and support. Also, my fiancé, Andrew, is a huge help. Just him being here with me, because before it was just me. He also picks up a lot of things that I don't necessarily have time for.

Having my parlor where it's at right now has made it better. People love the privacy and there are no distractions. If someone is doing a body piece that is revealing or feels open to them, they don't have to worry about other strangers walking in on them and seeing them. There is no phone ringing or people walking around talking, they really like how quiet it is and it can really calm anxiety for them. I also don't have to worry about other distractions such as getting up to talk to other clients. Whatever money I make or get back through tax returns, I put back into my business. I believe you have to spend money to make money. I've always bought better machines or better needles or just better equipment. Covid has made it a lot more of a day to day, I do get some cancellations. I am totally okay with them. If they're sick, I don't want them to come in. We make adjustments and reschedules. Overall, I believe I have more business now than I did before Covid. The shutdown was the first major obstacle because I've never been told that I couldn't work, so that was a huge thing to me. It was really hard for me to just sit there so I switched mediums and I started to tie dye. Just so I had something to do. I tried piercing early on, it's just not my thing. Beside the smaller-side mediums, I want to just focus on tattooing rather than doing so many things, it has helped me to get better over time. 'For Raven's Sake,' it's kind of clever."
