Loogootee to graduate 63, Shoals 49

Loogootee High School will hold their graduation on Friday, May 28, at 7 p.m. in Jack Butcher Arena. 63 students will receive diplomas. The graduation can be watched live at www.youtube.com/watch?v=aewZ0vZBBDo.

The evening will begin with a welcome by Austin Brittain, Senior Class President. The high school choir will then sing The National Anthem followed by "The Prayer" arranged by Teena Chinn and "Thank You" arranged by Misty Mosby.

Asia Crim, Senior Class Secretary, will then introduce the class speakers. Two co-valedictorians have been named this year for Loogootee – Sara Street and Jaelyn Walker. The salutatorian is Shealyn Arthur.

Macy McAtee, Class Treasurer, will introduce the slide presentation, created by Madolyn Cage, and the LHS Band who will perform "Battle Hymn of the Republic". High School Principal Chris Walker will offer remarks and then the presentation of diplomas will then be done by Loogootee Superintendent Chip Mehaffey and Principal Walker.

The superintendent will then present the class of 2021. Makenzie VanHoy, Senior Class Vice President, will give closing remarks and the LHS Band will close out the commencement with the recessional.

Shoals Council discusses raising water, sewer rates

The Shoals Town Council met Monday, May 10. Those in attendance were Council Members Cary D. Albright, Clint Hoffman, and Cecil Ragsdale; Clerk-Treasurer Sierra Rutledge, Shoals Fire Chief Jim Hamby; Angie Risacher, with Martin County Alliance for Economic Development; Troy Swan, with HWC Engineering and Steven Brock, with Therber & Brock. Attending via telephone was Matt Sward with SIDC

Council Member Cary Albright stated that he had approved and signed off on a grant to be submitted by the park board to the United Way Foundation in the amount of \$500. If awarded, the money will be used for base sets for both baseball fields and boundary markers for the volleyball courts. Council Member Albright gave kudos to the board for their efforts.

Council Member Albright stated the INDOT road inventory update has been signed off on and submitted through the engineering from HWC for approval. This provides INDOT with the most current roads and road mileage within the corporate town limits.

Council Member Albright requested a motion on the floor for approval for a "Park Infrastructure Fund". He would like to see a fund created for future capital investments and development pertaining to parks in the town. Council Member Cecil Ragsdale made a motion to create the fund with Council Member Clint Hoffman making the second and all were in favor. Clerk-Treasurer Rutledge will work with Attorney Lett on the ordinance for approval.

Council Member Albright stated that he had been in contact with DEQ Electric concerning the work that was approved to be done at the water wells and he stated they would be onsite next week to start the work.

Council Member Hoffman stated that he had updates from the Beautification Board. He reported President Amber Hoffman said three new flowerpots have been ordered to be placed on Main Street. The planting of summer flowers is to begin this week. Also, paperwork is being

completed with DNR to adopt the boat ramp. Council Member Albright stated this is for future project work that is being planned and discussed with the DNR.

Steven Brock, with Therber & Brock, came before the council to discuss the completed rate study documents for the three utilities - water, wastewater and stormwater. Brock stated information listed has numbers with projects and without projects. He explained the information in the documents and also explained part of

Martin County's unemployment rate at 2.9 percent for April

Martin County's unemployment rate dipped down to 2.9 percent in April, from 3.3 percent the month before. The county had the 10th lowest jobless rate in the state for April, tied with five other counties.

In April, the county had 5,282 residents in the workforce and 155 of them were unemployed. In March, there were 5,392 residents able to work and 180 of them were without jobs. In April of 2020, Martin County's jobless rate was 7.7 percent with 5,184 residents in the workforce and 401 of them unemployed.

Daviess County's unemployment rate moved from 3 percent in March to 2.5 percent in April. The county had the fourth lowest jobless rate in the state for April, tied with Boone County. In April, the county had 16,565 residents in the workforce and 420 of them were unemployed. In March, there were 16,469 residents able to work and 492 of them were without jobs. In April of last year, Daviess County's jobless rate was 7.5 percent with 15,683 residents in the workforce and 1,172 of them without work.

Dubois County's jobless rate edged down to 2.8 percent in April, down from 3.4 percent in March. The county had the eighth lowest jobless rate in the state for April, tied with Wells County. In April, the county had 23,184 residents in the workforce and 649 of them were unemployed. In March, there were 22,187 residents able to work and 745 of them were without work. In April of last year, Dubois County's unemployment rate was 9.7 percent with 21,763 residents in the

the OCRA grant process and SRF Funding information. SRF is the State Revolving Fund Program which is a low-interest, government-subsidized loan for environmental projects. Brock stated the parent company to SRF is the IFA, Indiana Finance Authority, and there will be money available from them as well. He said this was an interesting year with the ARPA money coming and the IFA as it could potentially be possible to be able to afford more than one project since there is a possibility of more "free" money to apply for. Brock went on to explain the other part is not only high but also raising costs of construction/ project materials and that bids coming in could be interesting.

Matt Sward, with SIDC, went over deadlines and due dates for the OCRA grant funding. Proposals will be due September 23, 2021 with applications being due November 12, 2021 for round II. December 16, 2021 is the date set for awards. Council Member Albright stated that he had an opportunity to go through the information thoroughly. He said one of his main concerns was the past history used for the study and Brock said that he felt the information used was from the prior two years and he also felt it was accountable compared to other water systems comparable in size. After discussion, Brock stated the information is preliminary to start the rate discussion and that

workforce and 2,108 residents without jobs.

Greene County also saw a drop in their jobless rate, moving from 4.8 percent in March to 4.2 percent in April. The county had the 22nd highest jobless rate in the state for April, tied with Jasper and Allen counties. The county had 13,347 residents in the workforce in April with 559 of them unemployed. In March, there were 13,203 residents able to work and 640 of them without jobs. In April of 2020, Greene County's unemployment rate was 11.9 percent with 12,570 residents able to work and 1,514 of them were unemployed.

The top ten spots in the state for lowest unemployment rate for April were Adams County at 2.1 percent, LaGrange County at 2.3 percent, Union County at 2.4 percent, Daviess and Boone counties at 2.5 percent, Hamilton County at 2.6 percent, Jay County at 2.7 percent, Wells and Dubois counties at 2.8 percent; and Whitley, White, Steuben, Montgomery, Martin and Kosciusko counties at 2.9 percent.

The top ten spots in the state for highest jobless rate for April were Lake County at 7.6 percent, Howard County at 6.1 percent, LaPorte County at 6 percent, Marion County at 5.3 percent, Vigo County at 5.2 percent, Fayette County at 5 percent, and Madison, St. Joseph, Starke and Vermillion counties at 4.9 percent.

Indiana's unemployment rate stands at 3.9 percent for April, and the national rate is 6.1 percent. The monthly unemployment rate is a U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) indicator that reflects the number of unemployed people seeking employment within the prior four weeks as a percentage of the labor force.

Indiana's labor force had a net increase of 145 over the previous month. This was a result of an increase of 955 unemployed residents and a decrease of 810 employed residents.

Indiana's total labor force, which includes both Hoosiers employed and those seeking employment, stands at 3.34 million, and the state's 63.1 percent labor force participation rate remains above the national rate of 61.7 percent.

an increase could happen in one phase or two - phase one to bring the rates where they need to be based on cash flow, and phase two based on what is needed for the project chosen. Brock also expressed the importance of future asset replacement. Council Member Albright said he felt like the top priority would be wastewater at this time but all need attention. Council Member Ragsdale asked when the last time a wastewater rate increase had been done and Rutledge said it was in 2012. Brock went into more detail on the numbers and information.

Engineer Troy Swan, with HWC, went over items concerning equipment and maintenance updates needed. It was asked about ARP funds being used as the local match and Sward stated at this time, according to the information that is being put out, that would not be allowed. After much discussion, it was decided that the preliminary draft would be brought to the table for a 34 percent increase on wastewater rates and an 18 percent increase on water rates and none at this time for stormwater. Phase II will be looked at in detail and Brock will prepare the documents to be presented at the next regular board meeting to move forward.

Clerk-Treasurer Sierra Rutledge stated she needed approval for an appropriation transfer for general fund computer services for \$500 moved to mowing and \$100 to Keystone Maintenance. Council Member Hoffman made a motion to approve with Council Member Ragsdale making the second and all were in favor. Rutledge stated that with the new software, the FICA and Medicare shares on employee payroll needed to be broken down into their own appropriation as they are currently built into the salary appropriation. Rutledge stated she needed approval for new line items for the share in general fund, MVH fund and LOIT fund. Council Member Ragsdale made a motion to approve with Council Member Hoffman making the second and all were in favor.

The clerk-treasurer stated she was working on a downtown mural project with a local artist and a local business. Once the sketches are ready she would be meeting with the town council, beautification board president, the artist and the business owner to finalize details of the art and hopefully begin the work. Rutledge stated she has spoken with the school art teacher and is working on a design to have the town logo painted on the road at the four-way intersection located at Main and 2nd streets. Rutledge requested approval from the council to place the logo on the road once designed. Council Member Ragsdale made a motion to approve with Council Member Hoffman stating he wanted to make sure it was okay with the historic district. Rutledge said she would confirm with the district.

Rutledge stated the office is now live with the new accounting software.

Fire Chief Jim Hamby presented an invoice for \$682 for fitting the new fire engine purchased to be able to use the current hose. Council Member Ragsdale made a motion to approve with Council Member Hoffman making the second. Hamby stated the new tornado siren would hopefully arrive later this week. He also told the council that the Town of Oolitic was looking at engine 383 this evening for possible purchase. Hamby stated 221, the new engine, had been on several runs now with no issues.

Angie Risacher, with Martin County Alliance for Economic Development, provided information on how business owners in Martin County can apply for the OCRA Covid Relief Grant that was awarded. Businesses will be eligible to apply for \$5,000 each. Risacher stated application forms should hit the media soon.

With no further business the meeting adjourned at 7:24 p.m.

Attorney General Rokita, **DWD** Commissioner Payne warn of phishing scam

Attorney General Todd Rokita is partnering with the Indiana Department of Workforce Development to warn Hoosiers about a phishing scam involving unemployment benefits. Scammers are sending text messages asking Hoosiers to verify their identity by clicking on a link. Clicking the link may give scammers access to your personal data.

"We appreciate the opportunity to partner with state agencies to encourage Hoosiers to be vigilant in protecting their personal information," Attorney General Todd Rokita said. "Scammers are always coming up with new ways to try to steal your identity and your money. If you receive a text message asking to verify your eligibility for unemployment benefits, I urge you to delete the message and file a report both with my office and the Indiana Department of Workforce Devel-

The Indiana Department of Workforce Development will never send a text message to verify your eligibility for unemployment benefits.

"The fact that scammers are now contacting Hoosiers directly via text message shows just how far they will go in their attempts to steal personal information, Department of Workforce Development Commissioner Fred Payne said. "DWD has many prevention and detection tools in place to thwart as much fraudulent activity as possible, but individuals still should take the necessary steps to protect their personal information."







LHS Softball get win on senior night

The 2nd inning saw no runs from the Jeeps, despite a double from Landyn Rasche. Waggner led off the inning with a single pop fly to short center. An error from the Lady Jeeps defense would score both of these runs and put the Lady Lions up; a couple of flyouts and a strikeout ended

Tecumseh would have a quick answer, with the first batter, Karcyn Flowers putting one well over the fence for a solo shot. Bre Marx then got on base with an error and eventually scored after tagging up on a fly ball to right field. The inning ended knotted at 2-2 as the Lady Lions failed to put any more runs on the board. 


