OVID-19 information update

As of today, Wednesday, May 27, Martin County has had nine positive cases of COVID-19 and zero deaths. As of today, 165 Martin County residents have been tested. Dubois County has had 185 positive cases and two deaths and had 1,303 residents tested. Daviess County has had 84 positive cases, 16 deaths and 737 residents tested. Lawrence County has had 146 positive cases, 23 deaths and 1,231 residents tested. Greene County has had 168 positive cases, 24 deaths and 893 residents tested. Orange County has had 124 positive cases, 22 deaths and 633

In-office absentee voting started Monday, May 26. There will be absentee voting in the clerk's office from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m. until Friday, May 29 and then on Saturday, May 30 from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. The last chance to vote absentee in the clerk's office will be Monday, June 1 from 8 a.m. until noon. You must have a photo ID to match your registration address in order to vote in person.

Indiana Governor Eric Halcomb laid out a plan to get Indiana back open from COVID-19, in phases. This past Sunday, retail stores and malls were allowed to move to 75 percent capacity but community areas, such as food courts, are still limited to 50 percent capacity.

Gyms, playgrounds, basketball courts, public pools, and campgrounds were allowed to open, still practicing social distancing guidelines. Movie theaters also re-opened at 50 percent capacity. Bars, nightclubs, sports venues, and all school facilities will remain closed. Also, nursing homes will remain closed to visitors and groups up to 100 people are allowed to gather.

On June 14, state government building access restrictions will be lifted, professional office buildings can resume work at full capacity, retail stores and malls can open at full capacity, restaurant dining rooms can move to 75 percent capacity and bars may open at 50 percent capacity. Also, cultural, entertainment and tourism businesses can open at 50 percent capacity, along with amusement parks. Large events, such as conventions, sporting events, fairs, festivals and parades will remain closed. Nursing homes will still not be allowed to have visitors and will continue to be evaluated.

After July 4, social gatherings with more than 250 people can resume, nursing homes will be evaluated to potentially open back up to visitors, and school operations will be evaluated. All businesses may operate at full capacity.

The timeline on the state's reopen plan is contingent to COVID-19 outbreaks and is subject to change. High-risk residents, such as those over 65 years of age

Census takers began dropping off packets at front doors last week

The U.S. Census Bureau, in coordination with federal, state and local health officials, began dropping off 2020 Census questionnaire packets at front doors of 39,205 households in Indiana last week, including those in Martin County. This is done in areas where the majority of households do not receive mail at their physical address.

As of May 24, 60.4 percent of Martin County households had returned their 2020 Census questionnaire. This is four percent less than the state response rate.

Martin County ranks 71 of the 92 Indiana counties in response rate. Dubois County has the highest response rate in the state at 77.6 percent. Crawford County has the lowest response rate in the state at 51.2 percent.

Updates on the operations resuming by location at 2020census.gov. This webpage will be updated weekly as 2020 Census operations resume across the United States.

The health and safety of Census Bureau staff and the public is of the utmost importance. All returning staff will receive safety training to observe social distancing protocols in the COVID-19 environment. For their safety and the safety of the public, the Census Bureau has ordered Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for all field staff, including those that work in a field office. These materials will be secured and provided to staff prior to restarting operations.

As part of the phased restart of operations, the Census Bureau will resume dropping off 2020 Census invitation packets at front doors of households in areas where the majority of households do not receive mail at their home. This w.2020census.gov.



operation is also known as Update Leave. About 5 percent of households are counted in the Update Leave operation, where census workers will confirm or update a household's physical location address and then leave a census questionnaire

The Census Bureau began delivering census materials to these households on March 15; however, this operation was suspended on March 18 because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Update Leave operation does not require interaction between households and a Census Bureau employee and follows the most current federal health and safety guidelines. In states where we have resumed the Update Leave operation, we are also resuming fingerprinting for new hires to keep applicants moving through the hiring process. ACO staff will begin returning to the office as necessary to support the Update Leave operation, as well.

Households that receive the 2020 Census invitation packets are strongly encouraged to respond promptly to the 2020 Census using the census ID included in the questionnaire packet. People can respond online, by phone or by completing and returning the paper form by mail. Responding with the census ID or by completing and returning the paper questionnaire helps ensure the best count of their community.

Radius Indiana facilitates Duke Energy grants for small business relief

Radius Indiana received \$20,000 in tablished, small businesses, and we will Duke Energy Foundation grants last week, which are designated for small business assistance in four of the economic development group's eight counties. The award is part of \$200,000 in Duke Energy Foundation grants given to Indiana economic development organizations across the state offering crisis relief to small businesses.

Recipients include Crawford, Greene, Martin and Orange, which will each receive \$5,000. Each county's local economic development organization will then determine which local small businesses will receive assistance through an application process and needs assessment.

In April, Radius worked with Crawford and Greene counties to set up local, Rapid Relief Funds to aid small businesses. The dollar-for-dollar match program provided small, low-interest loans ranging from \$2,500 to \$5,000 to help businesses address immediate needs and help offset

or those with underlying health conditions are encouraged to avoid social contact as must as possible throughout the re-open plan.

Anyone with symptoms of COVID-19 can register for a test by appointment only at https://lhi.care/covidtesting or by calling 888-634-1123.

Individuals must be symptomatic, be a close contact of a positive case, or a symptomatic resident of congregate living settings to be eligible for testing. You will go to the portal and self-report your symptoms using the online screening tool. If you qualify, an option will appear to register for an appointment date and time.

There is no charge for testing, however, if you do have private health care insurance, you are asked to bring that to the testing site.

People can expect to get the results within 48 hours. Optum will send a text or email to the patient if the test is negative. A phone call will be given if there is a positive test result. The county health departments in each county will continue to be notified if a resident tests positive and they will continue to work with the ISDH and local officials to ensure that contacts of the patients are identified and monitored.

USI Spring 2020 Dean's List



be back in session before we know it. Now is the time to think about the shots your student may need before they go back to school in the fall. Kindergarten, 6th grade students, high school seniors and college students need immunizations before they can begin classes this fall. Students in grades 9-11 need to get the Hepatitis A vaccine if they have not already received it.

The Martin County Health Department Summer immunization clinic will be by appointment only due to Coronavirus precautions.

Please call 812-247-3303 to schedule an appointment. Clinic hours are June 3, 10, 17 and 24 and July 1, 8, 15, 22 and 29 from 8:30 a.m. to noon and from 12:30 p.m. to 6 p.m.

Please note that Wednesday is the only day a nurse is available for immunizations.

The Martin County Health Department is contracted with VaxCare and can bill most insurance companies that pay for vaccines. The patient must bring their insurance card, or no vaccines can be given on that day.

The health department can vaccinate children on Medicaid, the uninsured and those who have insurance that does not pay for vaccines through the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program. They also provide Tetanus vaccine and Hepatitis A and B vaccine to those ages 19 and older without insurance for a fee.

Adults with insurance that will pay for vaccines may be able to receive certain vaccines and have VaxCare bill their insurance.

to insurance. Kindergarten students: 5 doses of 812-247-3303.

Summer break is here but school will DTaP, 4 doses Polio, 2 doses of MMR, 2 doses of Hepatitis A, 3 doses of hepatitis B vaccine, and 2 doses of Varicella (Chicken Pox) or record of disease. (Physician documentation of disease history, including month and year, is needed for proof of immunity)

Sixth grade students: in addition to the kindergarten required vaccines, they must receive a Tdap (Tetanus, Diphtheria & Pertussis) vaccine, a Meningococcal vaccine and 2 doses of Hepatitis A (for anyone who has not already received it). HPV (Human Papillomavirus) vaccine is also recommended.

9th-11th grade students: 2 doses of Hepatitis A vaccine (for anyone who has not already received it).

12th Grade students: a Meningitis booster and 2 doses of Hepatitis A (for anyone who has not already received it). Meningitis B vaccines and HPV (Human Papillomavirus) vaccines are recommended.

College students should receive information from their school concerning the required vaccines for incoming students. Some require a TB test within 6 months of the start of classes, Meningitis B vaccine and a Tetanus booster (if the child has not received within the last 10 years). Also, proof of childhood vaccines for MMR, Varicella and polio are often needed. The Hepatitis B series is recommended for students in health care fields or similar studies.

Watch for nesting turtles on roadways

It's nesting season for Indiana's native turtles, which means Hoosiers may find them crossing roads this time of year.

All native turtles are regulated in Indiana. Endangered species and Eastern box turtles are protected and cannot be collected from the wild or kept as pets. If you encounter a turtle, it's best to simply observe and enjoy the shelled reptile in its natural habitat. Wild turtles do not make good pets – they live a long time (some species are able to outlive their owners), can be messy, and have special husbandry needs.

Indiana's turtles face a number of conservation challenges. Habitat loss and illegal collection for the pet trade remain imminent threats, and the destruction of turtle nests by predators continues to impact populations. Seven of the state's 16 turtle species are listed as state endangered or special concern.

Turtles found crossing roads may be moved off the roadway as long as conditions are safe to do so and the turtle is moved in the direction it was traveling. The turtle should not be moved to a new area, which would displace it from its home range and remove it from the population. Relocating turtles to new areas can leave turtles disoriented and spread new diseases to that area. Some species, like Eastern box turtle, have a strong homing instinct and if moved,



may spend most of the rest of its life trying to find its original home.

Turtle nests in backyards should be left undisturbed. A mesh cage may be placed over the nest to protect the eggs from predators, as long as it is checked daily for hatchling turtles.

Common snapping turtles and softshell turtles may be harvested with a valid Indiana hunting or fishing license, but bag limits, season dates and other regulations apply, see eregulations.com/ indiana/fishing/reptiles-amphibians/. The hunting season for these species is closed during the April-June nesting

NRC creates new nature preserve

The Natural Resources Commission (NRC), during its bi-monthly meeting last Tuesday, approved creation of Dilcher-Turner Canyon Forest Nature Preserve in Greene County.

The new nature preserve protects 68 acres that contain 1.6 miles of moderate trails, as well as upland forests, scenic ravines with large sandstone outcrops, intermittent creeks, and several waterfalls.

In action regarding the Division of Fish & Wildlife, the NRC approved the DNR's response to a citizen petition to allow the 28-gauge and .410 shotguns for hunting wild turkeys, as well as No. 9 tungsten super shot.

The DNR will now move forward with creating rule language that will be brought to the NRC at a future date for consideration for preliminary adoption.

The NRC approved a request from another citizen petition to amend the rule governing muzzleloaders that can be used for deer hunting by removing the sentence that limits the definition of a muzzleloading gun to one capable of being loaded only from the muzzle, including the powder and the bullet.

The DNR will now move forward with creating rule language that will be brought to the NRC at a future date for consideration for preliminary adoption.

Also, regarding hunting with muzzleloaders, the NRC did not approve a citizen petition request to add a primitive muzzleloader deer hunting season.

In other action, the NRC:

Approved two nonrule policy documents that respectively refine in-lieu fee mitigation and amend habitat mitigation guidelines, as recommended by the Division of Fish & Wildlife.

Granted preliminary adoption to restrictions on boat operations on Lake Manitou in Fulton County and the establishment of a special boating zone on Simonton Lake in Elkhart County, as recommended by the Division of Fish & Wildlife.

Granted preliminary adoption to amendments to boating restrictions on Prairie Creek Reservoir, as recommended by the DNR Division of Law Enforcement.

Regarding the Division of Hearings, readopted rules governing standards and operating procedures for the commission, public hearings, the management of ground water and surface water within the Great Lakes in Indiana, the withdrawal or release of water supply storage from reservoirs, and cemetery preserva-

Granting preliminary adoption starts a long and deliberative process, including a public comment period that includes the ability to participate in public hearings conducted by the NRC's Division of Hearings.

The NRC also approved July 21, September 15 and November 17 as the dates for the rest of the meetings this year. All meetings are tentatively set for The Garrison at Fort Harrison State Park in Indi-

More details on all actions taken by the NRC and supporting documents can be found at nrc.IN.gov/2354.htm.

The NRC is an autonomous board that addresses topics pertaining to the DNR and the NRC Division of Hearings.

NRC members include the DNR director, heads of three other state agencies (Indiana Department of Environmental Management, Indiana Office of Tourism Development, and the Indiana Department of Transportation), six citizens appointed by the governor on a bipartisan basis, the chair of the DNR's advisory council, and the president of the Indiana Academy of Science.

The Academy of Science president and the agency heads, other than the DNR director, may appoint proxies to serve the commission in their absences.

While many consider Memorial Day the beginning of summer, the calendar says we still have a little spring left. However, temperatures have warmed to summer-like levels and humidity levels have definitely been on the rise. Just a couple of weeks ago, we were covering plants to protect them from a late frost. We are definitely in the growing season

With plenty of rain, we are seeing lush growth on plants. A bare spot in the garden one day is covered with a two-foot high plant the next. Grass grows at a very fast rate and by the time one finishes mowing the lawn, the place where one started mowing needs to be mowed

Grass is not the only thing that needs to be cut. Many perennial plants have grown very tall and need to be cut back. Mums need to be cut back to about 4 inches tall. This will make the plant grow thicker stems and will keep the plant from splaying. This does delay the bloom time, but that is also desirable for mums. Another pinch back around the first of July will also help keep mums from growing too tall. At this early time, all of the material you cut from the mums can be used to increase your plant numbers. Simply stick those cuttings into a tray of moist peat moss and most, if not all, will take root and become new plants. While it will take several cuttings to look like a full plant this year, by fall, a group of these cuttings will fill the space of mum you would have purchased.

Other plants will also benefit from cutting back at this time. Tall sedums and tall phlox will also make new plants from cuttings. Be aware that patented plants should not be asexually reproduced.

Other tall plants can also benefit from a cut this time of the year. It will delay the bloom time, but selective cutting may actually give you blooms over a longer period. I sometimes will cut back some of the black-eyed Susans, coneflowers and ironweed. The ones that are not cut will new to try in the garden.

bloom earlier and the cut ones will bloom a few weeks later. The result is flowers over several weeks, and by deadheading at bloom time, the flowers will keep coming until frost. Sometimes it pays to trick Mother Nature.

I want to thank everyone who came out to the Sandhill Gardens plant exchange last Saturday. Many people left their plants, so if anyone wishes to stop by, there are still plenty of plants for trading. I thoroughly enjoyed the day. People came at different times, so I had the opportunity to give each person a tour of the gardens. I even had time to record a church service from the gardens for my congregations at Pilot Knob and Crawford Consolidated United Methodist Churches. (Thanks to Brad Reed for coming to the gardens to record that program.) I managed to get some plants re-potted and some other plants planted in the garden. I took some cuttings from spring-blooming shrubs and put them into a propagation bed.

I also tried something completely new for me last weekend. I was working on some bonsai specimens and decided to try another Japanese horticultural artkokedama. This is the art of growing a plant in a ball covered in moss. I dug up a lady fern that was encroaching on a walkway. I dug some clay from under a compost pile and I cut a section of moss from a spot in the woods. I molded the clay around the roots of the fern, forming a ball. I lay the moss on a tray, upside down, and placed the ball with the plant in the middle of the tray. I enlisted some help to do the next step, which involves pulling the moss up to cover the ball and taking string to wrap around the moss to hold it in place. I put the whole thing in a shallow pan of water to soak up the roots. The final result was far from perfect, but I was pleased with the effort. My hope is that the moss will continue to grow around the clay ball and that the plant will survive. There is always something
