Loogootee Summerfest starts tomorrow night

The Loogootee Summerfest will kick off tomorrow night, Thursday, June 23 in downtown Loogootee, and end Saturday, June 25. The craft booths and food stands, along with carnival rides, will be open all three days from 5-10 p.m.

On Thursday night, the annual queen contest will be held on the main stage at 6:30 p.m. The Redemption Praise Band will follow the queen contest at 7:30 p.m.

On Friday, the Loogootee Fire Department will have a smoke house open from 5-10 p.m. A pickleball tournament will start at the high school tennis courts at 6 p.m. Hotel California, an Eagles tribute band, will perform on the main stage at 8 p.m.

Saturday morning, a fun run and walk will be held at West Boggs Park at 7:30 a.m. A volleyball tourney will start at the

city park at 9 a.m. and a pickleball tournament at the high school tennis courts also at 9 a.m.

A farmer's market will be set up north of Butcher Boulevard on Highway 231 from 8 a.m. to noon. Compassionate Hands will be offering tastings, for \$5, for their BBQ contest, on North Line Street, at noon. A Texas Hold'em tournament will start at the KofC at 1 p.m. and a car show will be held on Wood Street from 3:30-6 p.m.

Also on Saturday, a corn hole tourney will be held at the VFW at 3:30 p.m. along with a kids sidewalk chalk contest in front of Larkin Apartments at 4 p.m.

The Trey Knepp Band will take over the main stage at 5:45 p.m. followed by the annual parade at 7 p.m. Police Officer Kelly Rayhill will serve as grand marshal. At 8 p.m., Valley Wine and Spirit Band will perform on the main stage and fireworks will end Summerfest at 10 p.m.

Loogootee City Council holds special meeting to discuss salaries

The Loogootee City Council held a special open meeting last Thursday, June 16, after a lengthy closed-door meeting to discuss salaries for city employees.

Council Member Teresa Nolley started the open meeting by saying that the council has heard all the requests and will do the best they can to increase salaries at budget time next month.

Council Member Rick Norris agreed saying, "We can't just pull something out of thin air." He said he does think the employees deserve more, however.

Utilities Superintendent Bo Wilson said they appreciate that and it's understandable. "I'd like to see it happen sooner than later to be able to retain people," he said. He said he has received many phone calls from individuals who were interested in working for the city until they find out how much the pay is. He said they quickly lose interest.

"It's got to happen, and I realize it can't happen overnight," said Wilson. He added that they already have two people quitting and asked that they replace those two and also add another person. He said they need help, and he has other employees who are ready to quit now. He said he is talking them out of it to wait to see if they can get an increase in salaries and additional help.

Discussion then ensued about whether Wilson can hire another person. Clerk-Treasurer Roger Downey said state statute says the city can't hire a person who is not listed in the salary ordinance. Wilson replied that there is a spot in the salary ordinance for a meter reader so he would be fine hiring someone specifically for that. Downey agreed that position is in the salary ordinance how-

ever they also have to have the funding in place to pay another position.

Wilson said he knows there are conversations regarding raises before meetings and amounts are pretty much decided before that meeting is held. He said he wasn't upset about the questioning in the last meeting, he was upset about the comments made. "That's hashed out, okay," he said to Nolley referring to the closed-door meeting prior. He told the council they are welcome to come at any time and talk to him.

Wilson said he is not in the office enough to keep up with compliance paperwork and he must make time to start doing that. He said he understands that he has the knowledge that no one else has so everyone comes to him, but he has to find a way to get paperwork done.

Council Member Tim Lawrence said he was going to have to leave the meeting and asked Wilson if the council was able to solve the issues Wilson has currently.

Wilson replied that they have except for approving hiring a third employee. The clerk-treasurer said he will look into whether it can be done and let Wilson know. City Attorney Isha Wright-Ryan said another meeting will have to be held so the council could approve if it is not in the salary ordinance. The council voted to allow Wilson to go ahead and hire the third person if it indeed is in the salary ordinance.

Attorney Wright-Ryan requested Wilson and other department heads bring all their requests to the budget hearing so they can be addressed. She said it's the perfect time and they should take advantage of it.

The first budget hearing will be held Wednesday, July 13 at 1 p.m. The meeting is open to the public.

Commissioners approve bids, hire new human resources director

The Martin County Commissioners met Tuesday, June 14. Commissioner Aaron Summers was absent. Also present were Attorney Dave Lett and Teresa Wininger, Deputy Auditor; Missy Cooper; Deputy Auditor. In attendance were Rhonda Sanders, Recorder; Andy Ringwald, EMA; Monty Wolf, Director of EMA; Carolyn McGuire, Assessor; Matt Stechly, Core Facilities; Brian Fleck, HWC; Scott Seals, County Highway Superintendent; David Welch, GAB Insurance; Misty Hightower and Sherri Tredway, Four Rivers Resource Services; Dena Held, CED/Educator; Danielle Murphy, Director Community Corrections; Barb Hager; Mary Smith; Kim Showalter; DeAndra Magdaleno; Amanda Magdaleno.

Matt Stechly, Core Facilities, gave an update on the current jail renovations. The project is expected to be wrapped up within the next two weeks. Stechly stated the doors and intercom project that were approved last year, will begin between August-September. He said the courthouse mechanicals project will be publicly advertised for bids next week. "The Courthouse should be good to go for the next 25-30 years mechanically speaking with the renovations being completed," stated Stehly.

Stechly applauded the commissioners for their wise, fiscal approach in using the ARPA funds. He presented a project replacement bundle that included jail roof top units, courthouse windows and jail flush valves at a cost of \$34,350. Commissioner George noted this will be paid for with APRA funds, project #6 has been assigned to this ARPA fund project. The motion to approve the project replacement bundle from CORE Facilities was made by Commissioner Roush and seconded by Commissioner George.

Sherri Tredway, with Four Rivers Resource Services, gave a brief update regarding the services they provide for Martin County. Tredway presented a 2023 budget request in the amount of \$5,220 to the commissioners. Commissioner George stated they will take her request under advisement.

County Attorney Dave Lett spoke regarding the renovations requested to begin in the recorder and assessor's offices. Lett stated he has contacted the previous contractors that had submitted quotes for the renovations and received only one quote back. Wagler and Sons submitted a quote in the amount of \$28,627.16 for painting both the offices. Commissioner Roush made a motion to approve Wagler and Sons, seconded by Commissioner George.

Dena Held, Extension Coordinator, presented an invoice in the amount of \$37,408.21 on behalf of the 4-H Council from Johnny Signs requesting electronic signage at the Martin County 4-H Fairgrounds. Commissioner George noted this will be paid for with APRA funds, project #7 has been assigned to this ARPA fund project. A motion was made by Commissioner Roush to approve \$37,408.21 for APRA project #7, seconded by Commissioner George. Commissioner George stated a check will need to be issued for half of the invoice. Held also requested to be added to the agenda for the next commissioners' meeting as Dr. Casey Mull will be in the county with her attending a variety of meetings. Held also invited the public to attend a Meet and Greet event for Dr. Mull at the Martin County 4-H Fairgrounds on June 28 at 7:30 p.m.

Highway Superintendent Scott Seals, along with Brian Fleck, with HWC Engineering, presented to the commissioners the bid received from E&B Paving, LLC as well as the forms to sign to start the process with INDOT. Commissioner Roush made a motion to approve E&B Paving, LLC for the Community Crossing Grant in the amount of \$263,075, seconded by Commissioner George.

Seals stated his department has continued filling potholes and mowing along the roadways. Seals has received paperwork regarding the repair on bridge #44. Attorney Lett stated the county is working with CLR, bridge inspectors and bridge constructors, that gave the bid regarding this repair.

Lett presented a letter he prepared indicating both the Martin County Board of Commissioners and Martin County Council unanimously protest the Mid-States Corridor Project. Lett stated this letter was emailed as well as mailed by USPS to the state.

Discussion ensued regarding access to Green Cemetery. Attorney Lett will follow up.

Commissioner George stated he received two quotes to replace an existing water cooler in the courthouse in need of repair. He said this will be paid for with ARPA funds, project #8 was assigned to this ARPA fund project.

George stated the bids were from SR Mechanical in the amount of \$2,766 and from M&M Electric in the amount of \$2,335.54.

Commissioner Roush made a motion to approve M&M Electric in the amount of \$2,335.54, seconded by Commissioner George.

Commissioner Roush made a motion to approve Thompson Insurance Agency as the workers compensation agent of record, seconded by Commissioner George.

Commissioner George announced Kristie Skees will begin her new role in human resources on June 27, 2022.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:08 p.m. with a motion made by Commissioner Roush and seconded by Commissioner George.

The next commissioners' meeting will be held Tuesday, June 28 at 6 p.m.

The majority of injuries occurring at amusement parks are due to persons not following the rules set by the park to ensure their safety. So, let's keep ourselves and our kids safe and enjoy a day or weekend of

tors. Read the rules set for each ride which include not riding if you do not meet height and weight restrictions, or if you have certain medical conditions.

If your child does not meet the height and weight limits set, do not let them ride; explain to them why they cannot ride and don't make it out to be a negative.

You know your child better than anyone; so, if you feel the ride may be too scary for your child, keep them off the ride.

If something seems off with the ride Rules are there for the safety of the visi- report this; and do not get on the ride. If

you are already seated; let the ride attendant know that you would like to get off before the ride begins. This could include things such as a lap bar that does not latch properly.

Once you have decided to ride make sure and follow any verbal instructions given which include keeping hand and feet inside the ride, hang onto the handles, slide down feet first, do not have candy or gum in your mouth, ensure your seatbelt or other safety device is fully latched and secure all items carried onto the ride.

Stay hydrated in the park and wear sunscreen.

Designate a meeting spot in the event you are separated from your group. Small children may not remember the meet up point. Teach them to identify a park employee who can assist them.

Attorney General reminds Hoosiers to use caution to avoid scams while on summer vacation

Attorney General Todd Rokita encourages Hoosiers to avoid scams by being mindful as they prepare for out-of-town summer vacations. To ensure your time away is as safe as possible, use caution to avoid crafty scammers.

"When planning your vacation this summer, remember anyone can be the target of a scam," Attorney General Rokita said. "Often, when a deal seems too good to be true, it is. Be on the lookout for heavily discounted amusement park tickets, condos, and hotel rentals."

Attorney General Rokita shared the following list of tips to avoid common vacation scams:

-Avoid high-pressure sales pitches before you book a trip.

-Be extra cautious when booking through an unfamiliar company. Check the Better Business Bureau ratings and research the name online to see if there are any allegations of scams.

-Read the fine print in the contract before you sign it. It will tell you about the conditions under which the operator can change or cancel the trip and the rules and penalties for cancellation.

-Pay by credit card. It gives you more protection than cash or checks.

-Use good judgment when sharing about your trip on social media. Consider changing your online privacy settings while on your trip.

-Lock your valuables, including personal information, in your trunk or hotel



Prosecutor Vincz announces jury conviction on reckless driving

Martin County Prosecutor Aureola Vincz announced on Monday, June 20, a successful conviction of a reckless driving charge.

Steven Truelove led Martin County Sheriff Department's Jonathan Wells on a high-speed chase on State Road 550 for a several minutes before eventually coming to a stop, allowing Officer Wells to make an arrest. The incident occurred in 2020.

Truelove was found guilty by a jury after a one-day trial on June 7, 2022. After a suspension of jury trials due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Prosecutor Vincz is pleased to announce the successful prosecution and conviction of Truelove.

"I would like to thank the jury for their service in this important matter and their attention during the trial," Prosecutor Vincz said. "I would also like to thank law enforcement, especially Jonathan Wells, for support during this trial. This was an excellent example of law enforcement and the prosecutor working together in order to keep our community safe."

Prosecutor Vincz announced that this will be the first of many potential jury trials over the remainder of 2022 and into 2023 as Indiana Supreme Court has lifted the suspension of jury trials.

"Despite Indiana Supreme Court orders causing some delays in trials, my office will continue to work for justice in Martin County, those who break the law in Martin County will be held accountable," Prosecutor Vincz said.

Shoals Town Council approves purchasing equipment, several ordinances

The Shoals Town Council met Monday, June 13. Those in attendance were Council Members Cary D. Albright, Clint Hoffman, and Cecil Ragsdale; Town Attorney Dave Lett, Clerk-Treasurer Sierra Rutledge, Beautification Board Member Tania Brown and Kenneth Lannan and August Bauer, with the Martin County Council on Aging.

Kenneth Lannan and August Bauer came before the board to request to purchase the Shoals Senior Citizen Center Building. Currently, the Martin County Council on Aging has a long-term lease for the building with the town. Council Member Albright stated the town is willing to sell the building to the Council on Aging with the restriction that the town would have first option to purchase the building back for the same amount as the sale price if they ever decided to. Councilman Ragsdale made a motion to allow the Council on Aging to purchase the building from the town for one dollar with Councilman Hoffman making the second and all were in favor. Attorney Lett will prepare the deed and doc-

Tania Brown, with the Beautification Board, came before the council to request approval of quotes received for a boundary survey to be done at the boat ramp area. The board is working with DNR currently on revamping the area and a survey is required to move forward. Clerk-Treasurer Sierra Rutledge stated that of the survey quotes requested, two were received. Councilman Albright requested to temporarily suspend the meeting at 6:07 p.m. The council reconvened at 6:10 p.m. The quotes received were discussed and reviewed. Councilman Hoffman made a motion to approve the survey quote from AS&D., Inc. in the amount of \$3,200 which was the lowest quote with Councilman Ragsdale making the second and all were in favor.

Council Member Albright presented Ordinance 2022-01 "An Ordinance to Ensure Compliance with Indiana's Access to Public Records Law for the Town of Shoals". Councilman Ragsdale made a motion to pass the ordinance with Councilman Hoffman making the second and all were in favor. Next presented was Ordinance 2022-02 "An Or-

"No Build" option: Best choice for Hoosiers and the environment To the editor of the Martin County Journal,

At this moment of uncertainty during climate change, any project that disturbs the ecology of our state should be heavily vetted - especially a project of such enormous scope as the proposed Mid-States Corridor, which will disturb forest, wetlands, and the fragile ecology of both public and private lands. Southern Indiana is beautiful, and the intact forestland, wetlands and diverse ecology found there should be seen as a resource in today's rapidly changing climate.

As the Executive Committee Chair of the Sierra Club Hoosier Chapter, I attended the Orleans Town Hall Meeting to support the "Coalition Against Mid-States Corridor". Since then, I have helped to organize and to speak out against this new terrain highway project at the Mitchell Town Hall meeting and both Town Hall meetings in Loogootee. I called Governor Holcomb's office and invited him to attend the last Town Hall meeting in Loogootee and listen to the concerns of the people.

As Hoosiers from across Indiana, the Hoosier Chapter supports the "Coalition Against the Mid-States Corridor" and appreciate the facts they have brought to light of an imbalance of power regarding this project due to the enactment of Senate Bill 128 in 2017. We support the hundreds of people that have written to or called Governor Holcomb and have attended Town Hall meetings to oppose this proposed highway.

My hometown is Mitchell, Indiana where "Route O" is positioned on the Lochmueller Group DEIS maps. At this moment, the Mid-States Corridor is simply an idea. It is understandable that this might have been thought of as a great idea that would benefit many people when first imagined, providing jobs and easier transportation options for not just those in the area, but even for those across the state. However, since January the people of Indiana who will lose their homes, businesses and multi-generational farms have demonstrated at every town hall meeting that the imagined benefits of this project do not outweigh the risks and harm. The citizens of Indiana have loudly and publicly proclaimed that this highway is not needed and not wanted.

Most of the funding for the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for the Mid-States Corridor was given anonymously and those sources have not been shared with the public. These anonymous donors are from businesses and compa-

nies that stand to gain from this project while many more stand to lose. The DEIS was poorly prepared, and "Need" has not been established, while the "No Build" option has not been explored. There are no reasons listed within the DEIS for the "No Build" option and the stated "Need" is - at best - under-supported. The DEIS does not include "studies of need" and does not include sufficient facts to support the purported need for this highway. Additionally, the DEIS lacks inclusivity because the landowners were not heard and not included in decisions that were made by the regional development authority (RDA), which is emblematic of the imbalance of power and lack of communication between the Indiana Legislature and the People.

Even though Senate Bill 128 was enacted, that does not give the supporters of this project the right to force it upon landowners. This is still just an idea, and it can be stopped. When hundreds of Hoosiers stand up and say that this new terrain highway is "NOT NEEDED, NOT WANTED" I would hope as the leader of our state, that Governor Holcomb would listen and act in the best interest of most Hoosiers.

In my research to support my statements, I found an article written by Alan Rosenthal in 1999, (https://www.ncsl. org/research/about-state-legislatures/ the-good-legislature.aspx). In my opinion, this article offers a very useful guide and measure of the effectiveness of our legislature and should be used as a resource for Governors and State Legislators. "The challenge is to remain true to the fundamental purposes of representative democracy and the legislative system. For legislatures to be good they must carry out the functions we expect of them in our system of representative democracy. The principal ones are balancing power, representing constituencies, and making laws. The constitutional system and the legislature ought to provide for substantial political equality, that is, 'one person, one vote'."

By enacting SB128, an inequality of the balance of powers has been allowed to slip by. In the long term, "We the People" intend to work to repeal SB128. If this project is allowed to come to fruition, then it will be true that the People have been intentionally excluded from the democratic process by legislators and by the Governor. In the short term and in order to rectify this imbalance, the Governor can and should consider enforcing the "No Build" option for the Mid-States Corridor new terrain highway.

Julie Lowe Sierra Club Hoosier Chapter Chair dinance Amending the Rates & Charges for the Waterworks Utility". Rutledge stated this ordinance reflects the new reduction to the water rates with the state mandated repeal of the URT Tax which takes effect July 1, 2022. Councilman Ragsdale made a motion to pass the ordinance with Councilman Hoffman making the second and all were in favor. Next presented was Ordinance 2022-04 "An Ordinance of the Town of Shoals Amending the Rates & Charges Relating to the Waterworks of the Town". This ordinance sets a tampering fee of \$500 for the water meters.

Council Member Albright stated he brought to the board's attention at the last meeting a change of date for the October session. After discussion, Councilman Hoffman made a motion to change the meeting date to October 5 at 5:59 p.m. with Councilman Ragsdale making the second and all were in favor.

Albright presented quotes from Hopf Equipment that he had received. He said he spoke with other area dealers as well. Albright stated after meeting and researching, he is suggesting the town do a three-year lease for the equipment which includes all maintenance and the quote reflects a reduced interest rate and a municipal discount. Albright went over all the figures and the new tractor would be a Kubota with a loader and came in at \$29,895.69 after the reductions and trade in of \$9,500 for the current Kubota tractor the payment would be \$3,731 per year for the lease payment. The next quote was for a zero-turn radius mower, again with the reduced interest rate and municipal discount and trade in value of \$5,500 of the old Ford tractor for a final price of \$13,858.98. Councilman Ragsdale made a motion to accept the quotes and move forward with purchasing the zero-turn mower outright and the Kubota tractor with a three-year lease. Councilman Hoffman made the second and all were in favor.

Albright stated he had been doing research to upgrade the office copy machine. The current copy machine is outdated and very aged. Albright went over figures he had received from Bedford Office Supply. After discussion, it was decided to try and get more quotes from area office supply companies for price comparison before a decision is made.

A contract was presented for the installation of the new electronic read water meters. Council Member Albright requested a motion to approve the contract between the Town and Ben Kent contingent upon final price per meter with a completion date of September 1, 2022. Councilman Ragsdale made the motion with Councilman Hoffman making the second and the motion passed.

Clerk Treasurer Rutledge presented all fund balances and bank statements to the council for review with a balance date as of May 31, 2022. Rutledge stated she had several items to discuss for the upcoming Catfish Festival. She requested approval for the fireworks donation. Councilman Ragsdale made a motion to make a \$500 donation with Councilman Hoffman making the second. Rutledge stated she had the mosquito spraying scheduled for the evening of June 30. She said the scheduled street sweeping is tentative at this time due to the machine

being repaired. Rutledge stated Marshal Eckert would start moving cars off Main Street on June 30 by noon and plans to have the road completely closed between 2-4 p.m. for setup to begin. Rutledge said restrooms had been ordered and will be delivered June 30, CSX was notified, the large dumpster was ordered, and she said she had entered the town trucks into the

Rutledge requested approval to create some new funds for internal control purposes. First was the "OCRA Wastewater Grant Fund". Councilman Ragsdale made the motion with Councilman Ragsdale making the second. Next was the "Wastewater Matching Grant Fund" with Councilman Hoffman making the motion and Councilman Ragsdale making the second. Next was the "Beautification Board USG Grant Fund" with Councilman Hoffman making the motion and Councilman Ragsdale making the

Rutledge presented Resolution 2022-03 for AIM Medical Trust. The resolution is a formality from AIM stating they hold the policy for the town's health insurance. Councilman Ragsdale made the motion with Councilman Hoffman making the second. Rutledge stated the annual ERC certification with INDOT had been completed for the annual renewal. She said one person is required to keep certification on file with INDOT at all times in order for the town to be eligible to receive the funding. She wanted to note that she had her deputy also take the course and get certified this year so there is a back-up and no risk of non-eligibility if something were to happen.

Rutledge stated she had some grant project updates she wanted to go over. First was the "SVFD SCBA Bottle Upgrade" grant. Rutledge said all bottles and mouth pieces had been received and she would be submitting the final grant report next week. Next was the "Lets Light Up Shoals" grant and Rutledge stated Johnny Signs is planning to do the install on the sign sometime the week of June 20-25. She said she is in contact with Fischer Electric in hopes of getting them on site the same day for job completion so that the sign will be in working order by the time of Catfish Festival. Next Rutledge said was the "Wayfinding Signs" grant. Rutledge said INDOT's legal department had finally sent the legal agreement and now the pre-construction meeting can be set, and the project can move forward. Rutledge said two other grant projects of "East Shoals Tornado Siren" and "West Shoals Tornado Siren" had both been completed and final grant reports had been submitted and that both sirens are in working order.

Rutledge presented meter deposit and applies for P. Tolbert and J. Foerester. Councilman Ragsdale made a motion to approve with Councilman Hoffman making the second and all were in favor.

With no other business to discuss, Councilman Ragsdale made a motion to adjourn with Councilman Hoffman making the second at 7:10 p.m.

The next regular meeting will be Monday, July 11 at 5:59 p.m. at the Shoals
