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County receives \$240,000 for Crane timber sales

The Martin County Commissioners met Tuesday night, September 25. Auditor Bobbie Abel reported that \$240,211.66 was received from Crane timber sales for 2017. The county didn't receive any Crane timber money last year and in 2016, received 2016 \$264,922.43. Other payments received have been \$82,515.66 in 2015, \$113,469 in 2014, \$224,850 in 2013, and \$67,691 in 2012.

The commissioners approved Richard Burch to fill Ruth Smith's seat on the Martin County Community Corrections Advisory Board. Community Corrections Director Kathy Collins thanked Smith for the many years she served on the board.

The commissioners also approved Jon Criss as a volunteer driver for the Martin County Veterans' Van.

Highway Superintendent Leo Padgett reported that one of his spare trucks needs to be sent out for repairs. He said it shuts itself down while driving and the department's mechanic cannot figure out what is wrong with it. The commissioners gave him the okay to take it

to Bob's Auto.

Padgett also talked to the commissioners about purchasing a new bush hog. He gave the commissioners quotes and said the one he would recommend is located in Ohio. The commissioners discussed the haul bill involved with taking the equipment to Ohio to have the bush hog installed. It was noted that the highway department has \$22,000 currently in their equipment fund. Padgett said he didn't expect the commissioners to make a decision on the purchase right now, so they decided to get more information and decide at a later meeting. It was also noted that with winter coming, the equipment would not be needed until next year.

Padgett told the commissioners that the closing date for the Community Crossings grant is Friday. He was told there are an estimated 3,500 applicants. Martin County is requesting \$1 million.

Padgett told the commissioners that his department will switch to working winter hours on October 15.

The sheriff's department submitted a report stating there are currently 71 inmates in the jail, 23 of them from Vigo County. Auditor Abel also showed the (See 'COMMISSIONERS' on page 2)

Martin County's jobless rate bumps up to 3 percent for August

Martin County's unemployment rate rose just slightly in August to 3 percent, up from 2.8 percent the month before. The county had the sixth lowest jobless rate in the state for August, tied with six other counties.

In August, the county had 5,262 residents in the workforce with 156 of them without jobs. In July, there were 5,427 residents able to work and 154 of them were unemployed. In August of last year, Martin County's jobless rate was 3.2 percent with 5,166 residents in the workforce and 167 of them without jobs.

Daviess County's unemployment rate also went up in August to 3.2 percent, from 2.8 percent in July. The county had the 18th lowest jobless rate in the state for August, tied with six other counties.

In August, the county had 16,264 residents in the workforce and 514 of them unemployed. In July, there were 16,632 residents able to work and 471 of them without jobs. In August of 2017, Daviess County's unemployment rate was 3.3 percent with 15,849 residents in the workforce and 516 of them without jobs.

Dubois County's unemployment rate bumped from 2.6 percent in July to 2.8 percent in August. The county had the lowest jobless rate in the state for August, tied with LaGrange and Bartholomew counties.

In August, the county had 23,755 residents in the workforce and 677 of them were unemployed. In July, there were

24,374 residents able to work and 630 of them were without jobs. In August of last year, Dubois County's jobless rate stood at 3 percent with 23,369 residents in the workforce and 695 of them unemployed.

Greene County's jobless rate went up slightly in August to 4.9 percent, up from 4.7 percent in July. The county had the fifth highest jobless rate in the state for August, tied with Owen County.

In August, the county had 13,517 residents in the workforce with 656 of them were unemployed. In July, there were 13,362 residents able to work and 622 of them were without jobs. In August of 2017, Greene County's unemployment rate was 5 percent with 13,366 residents in the workforce and 666 of them were unemployed.

The top ten spots in the state for the lowest jobless rate for August went to LaGrange, Dubois and Bartholomew counties at 2.8 percent; Tipton and Elkhart counties at 2.9 percent; and Wells, Steuben, Rush, Martin, Hamilton, Boone and Adams counties at 3 percent.

The top ten spots in the state for the highest jobless rate for August went to Vermillion County at 5.9 percent, Fayette and Sullivan counties at 5.2 percent, Lake County at 5.1 percent, Greene and Owen counties at 4.9 percent, Vigo County at 4.8 percent, Newton County at 4.6 percent, and Grant, LaPorte, Monroe and Starke counties at 4.4 percent.

3rd Annual Safe Community Event this Saturday at Boggs

The 3rd Annual Martin County Safe Community Campaign Event will be held this Saturday, September 29 at West Boggs Lake Beach.

The event will begin with opening ceremonies at 11 a.m. This will include a flag presentation by the Shoals American Legion, the Pledge of Allegiance, opening prayer and opening remarks.  lower than the national rate of 3.9 percent. With the exception of one month when it was equal (October 2014), Indiana's unemployment rate now has been below the U.S. rate for more than four years. The monthly unemployment rate is a U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) indicator that reflects the number of unemployed people seeking employment within the prior four weeks as a percentage of the labor force.

Indiana's labor force had a net increase of 11,085 over the previous month. This was a result of a 2,594 increase in unemployed residents and an increase of 8,491 employed residents. Indiana's total labor force, which includes both Hoosiers employed and those seeking employment, stands at 3.39 million, and the state's 65.0 percent labor force participation rate remains above the national rate of 62.7 percent.

In addition, Indiana's initial unemployment insurance claims continue to be at historical lows.

Employment by Sector

Private sector employment has grown by more than 27,600 over the year, and

has increased by 3,600 over the previous month, primarily due to gains in the Financial Activities (2,300) and the Construction (1,600) sectors. Gains were partially offset by losses in the Manufacturing (-2,000) and the Other (-1,600), which includes Mining and Logging, IT and Other Services, sectors. Total private employment stands at 2,706,600 and is 17,700 above the December 2017 peak.

NSWC Crane and Indiana University's CACR advance partnership to advance trusted AI and software assurance

Naval Surface Warfare Center, Crane Division (NSWC Crane) and Indiana University's Center for Applied Cybersecurity Research (CACR) have re-signed a cooperative research and development agreement (CRADA) on September 13 in a signing event held at Indiana University (IU). The goal is to strive for state-of-the-art technology advancements and grow the collaboration to improve capabilities in the areas of software assurance and trusted artificial intelligence. This CRADA is a follow-on collaboration between NSWC Crane and CACR, which was originally executed two years ago.

"CACR is proud to partner with Crane as we advance cybersecurity in the state of Indiana," said Von Welch, director, IU Center for Applied Cybersecurity Research. "This new CRADA represents a collaboration to advance CACR and Crane's expertise in software assurance and trusted artificial intelligence. These are critical areas

for our respective institutions as well as Indiana."

NSWC Crane and CACR recognized mutual interests in cybersecurity efforts in 2015 and began discussions around the identification of aligned technology goals and future collaborations. The 2016 CRADA was responsible for what is now the PACT (Principles-based Assessment Cybersecurity Toolkit) project which has led to multiple publications, a Navy Technical R&D project, IU participation in Crane's Temporary Faculty Program, and most recently a Congressionally-supported project overseen by Office of the Secretary of Defense that will execute in FY19 and FY20.

"The partnership between both parties is a natural fit considering IU and NSWC Crane are leaders in the cyber domain and have demonstrated great recent success in working together," said Dr. Rob Templeman, Distinguished Engineer for Cybersecurity at NSWC Crane. "This coupled with the close geographical location makes this partnership a natural fit."

CACR is notable for their advancement of multidisciplinary applied cybersecurity research and engagement in many business verticals to include critical infrastructure, healthcare, finance, education.

By leveraging NSWC Crane's Technology Transfer (T2) program, the two organizations have seen exponential growth in the partnership that include collaborations in various technical areas. Throughout 2018 there have been 17 active T2 agreements between the Indiana University and NSWC Crane that are instrumental in driving innovation within the region.

About the IU Center for Applied Cybersecurity Research

CACR is a research center affiliated with the Indiana University Pervasive Technology Institute and a member of the Indiana University cybersecurity community, which includes the Maurer School of Law, the Kelley School of Business, the School of Informatics and Computing, NSF Cybersecurity Center of Excellence, OmniSOC, ResearchSOC, REN-ISAC, the University Information Policy Office, and the University Information Security Office.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a.m. Friday, September 28 at Loogootee United Methodist Church.

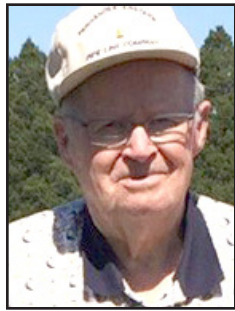

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In the Garden

Fall has officially arrived. Scientifically speaking, the beginning of autumn is the moment when the plane of the earth's equator passes through the center point of the sun. In other words, the sun will be directly over the equator and the daylight and dark hours will be nearly equal, hence the name equinox. This occurred at 9:54 p.m. on Saturday, September 22. As it were, the weather also became more autumn-like on Saturday, with cooler weather arriving with rain. Do not for a minute believe that the weather will pay attention to the calendar or the almanac. We will likely still have some very warm days in southern Indiana. However, it is time to begin shifting gears in the garden.

As the cooler weather arrives, many of summer's flowers begin to fade. Still, the meadows shine with goldenrod and asters. Goldenrods are among the most maligned flowers in the world. I know that I have written about this in the past, but I still hear people claiming that goldenrod is causing their hay fever. Actually, the pollen of goldenrod is heavy and sticky and must be carried from flower to flower by insect pollinators. The beautiful yellow flowers are very efficient at attracting the pollinators and one may observe many bees and butterflies fluttering through patches of goldenrod. Goldenrod just happens to bloom at the same time as ragweed, which is the true culprit causing the allergy symptoms. We have both common ragweed and giant ragweed in southern Indiana, and the pollen count has been high lately.

Still, goldenrod has had difficulty being accepted by many gardeners. It is true that the plant is aggressive and may crowd out more timid plants. In recent years, there have been some clumping forms developed that do not spread as rapidly as the native plants. Some of the new goldenrods are shorter and fit into garden beds more easily.

My meadow is aglow with goldenrod right now, but asters are providing the accent. The name aster is derived from the Greek word for star, and they bear hundreds of such stars. Although the name is not used much today, many people used to call asters Michaelmas daisies. The flowers have yellow centers surrounded by colorful petals. The petal colors differ according to the variety of aster.

Aster is the genus name of some 150 species of plants, all of which are native to Europe and Asia. Just a few years

ago, there were more than 800 species in the genus, but with modern DNA techniques, the taxonomists have re-classified many into new genera. That means that none of the North American natives is truly an aster now, but they will probably always be commonly known as asters. My meadow includes both New York asters and heath asters. The heath asters grow into a small shrub-like groundcover and the plants are covered with small daisies ranging from white to pale pink. The New York asters get more attention. They stand about three feet tall and the ones in my garden include deep purple, lavender and bright pink. New York asters may also be red or white, but those colors are definitely rare. New England asters may also be found in southern Indiana. They tend to be a little taller than the New York asters, have fewer flowers and hairy leaves. They are usually in shades of purple.

In the cultivated beds, I also have some hybrid asters, including one variety that stands more than six feet tall and bears mauve flowers. I also have some annual asters that have self-sown in beds for several years.

You will likely be able to find some beautiful asters for sale in local garden centers, usually sitting beside the mums. If you buy some, think of them as annuals. They may be labeled as perennial, but many of the plants have been brought in from southern nurseries and may not be hardy here. It is also possible that the plants will not send out enough roots before frost to ensure that the plant will survive the winter. If you do get some to come back in the spring, think of them as a bonus.

Live raptors highlight Patoka River NWR Appreciation Day

The Patoka River National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) will celebrate the "Year of the Bird" in recognition of the 100th anniversary of the Migratory Bird Act at the annual Refuge Appreciation Day. The event, hosted by the Friends of the Patoka River NWR and the Patoka River NWR, will be on Saturday, October 13 from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. CT at Wirth Park in Oakland City.

Featured morning programs are all about birds. At 9:15 a.m., the Indiana Falconers Association will present a program on falconry and do a hunting demonstration with a live goshawk. In addition to the morning programs, at 1 p.m., attendees will have the opportunity to take a bus tour of the Refuge or take a car caravan for a guided 1.5-mile hike to the new Buck's Marsh boardwalk. Throughout the day visitors will be able to explore over 20 booths that showcase nature, the environment, and conservation. Children's crafts will take place in the shelter house and food will be provided by the Eagles and Duck's Unlimited for purchase.

The event and parking are free and open to the public. In case of inclement weather, the event will be held indoors at the park.
