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an Gregory resigning as commissioner

Dan Gregory will resign as Martin County Commissioner effective December 31, 2019. Gregory said last Friday that while he could finish out his final year, because he didn't plan

to seek reelection, he decided that it wasn't fair to his constituents because he and his wife spend three months in Florida. He said he will be gone January through March of 2020 and would miss too many meetings. Gregory has been a commissioner for 11 years.

Along with ending his tenure as commissioner, Gregory will also be giving up his commissioner-appointed positions on the Martin County Solid Waste Board, the Martin County Alliance for Economic Growth board, and the Southern Indiana Development Commission board.

Gregory said that at 67-years old, he realized he was spending too much time going to meetings and serving on too many boards since he retired from Farbest Foods five years ago. He decided it was time to spend more time with his wife and their annual trips to Florida have gotten longer and longer over the years. Gregory said they used to go for a few weeks and that has now turned into three months. He said he would like to focus his attention, when in the county, on a few organizations as opposed to many. His main passion lies in St. Vincent de Paul and the Martin County Community Foundation, where he serves as president. Due to term limits however, Gregory will be leaving the community foundation board soon. Gregory said he would like to get more involved with veterans' organizations and groups that help disabled children. Gregory was instrumental in the county purchasing a new veterans' van a decade

When asked what he will miss most about serving as a commissioner, Gregory said it would have to be the county employees. Over the years he has developed relationships with all the courthouse staff and said it will be strange not speaking to them often. What he won't miss is the red tape that goes along with government bodies. Gregory said he has run a business and he never got used to the slow pace of doing anything government-related. He said he always felt that he was micromanaging department heads when he felt they should have more free-

County's jobless rate unchanged for August

Martin County's unemployment rate went unchanged from July to August, standing at 2.7 percent. The county had the 14th lowest jobless rate in the state for August, tied with nine other Indiana

In August, the county had 5,416 residents in the workforce and 145 of them were unemployed. In July, there were 5,527 residents able to work and 149 of them were without jobs. In August of last year, Martin County's jobless rate was 2.8 percent with 5,243 residents in the workforce and 149 of them unemployed.

Daviess County's jobless rate edged down slightly in August to 2.5 percent, down from 2.8 percent the month before. The county had the fourth lowest jobless rate in the state, tied with five other counties.

Loogootee Municipal Election information

In August, the county had 17,086 residents in the workforce and 429 of them were unemployed. In July, there were 17,249 residents able to work and 478 of them were without jobs. In August of 2018, Daviess County's unemployment rate was 3 percent with 16,750 residents in the workforce and 496 of them unemployed.

Dubois County's jobless rate also went down slightly in August to 2.4 percent, down from 2.6 percent in July. The county had the second lowest jobless rate in the state, tied with Gibson

In August, the county had 23,444 residents in the workforce and 551 of them were unemployed. In July, there were 23,908 residents able to work and 627 of them without jobs. In August of last year, Dubois County's unemployment rate was 2.8 percent with 23,398 residents in the workforce and 647 of them without work.

Greene County also saw a decrease rate was 4.7 percent with 13,537 resiin jobless rate for August to 3.8 percent, down from 4.1 percent in July. The county had the ninth highest jobless rate in the state for August, tied with Sullivan, Parke, Newton and Clay

In August, the county had 13,689 residents in the workforce and 521 of them were unemployed. In July, there were 13,556 residents able to work and 555 of them were without jobs. In August of 2018, Greene County's jobless dents in the workforce and 631 of them without work.

The top ten spots in the state for lowest unemployment rate for August were Bartholomew County at 2.3 percent, Dubois and Gibson counties at 2.4 percent, White, Wells, Tipton, Hamilton, Daviess, and Boone counties at 2.5 percent; and Steuben, Rush, Jackson and Clinton counties at 2.6 percent.

highest unemployment rate for August were Fayette and Vermillion counties at 4.7 percent, Lake County at 4.4 percent, Vigo County at 4.1 percent, Owen and Starke counties at 4 percent, Delaware and LaPorte counties at 3.9 percent, and Clay, Greene, Newton, Parke and Sullivan counties at 3.8 percent.

Indiana's unemployment rate continues to drop to 3.3 percent for August and remains lower than the national rate of 3.7 percent. The last time Indiana's unemployment rate was at 3.3 percent was February 2018. The monthly unemployment rate is a U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) indicator that reflects the number of unemployed people seeking employment within the prior four weeks as a percentage of the labor force.

Indiana's labor force had a net decrease of 2,135 over the previous month. This was a result of a decrease of 4,260 unemployed residents and an increase of 2,125 employed residents. Indiana's total labor force, which includes both Hoosiers employed and those seeking employment, stands at 3.38 million, and the state's 64.6 percent labor force participation rate remains above the national rate of 63.2 percent.

Additionally, this month had the lowest unemployment insurance claims in the reference week (12th of the month) in 2019.

Employment by Sector

Private sector employment has grown by 23,000 over the year and has decreased by 2,100 over the previous month. The monthly decrease is primarily due to losses in the Leisure and Hospitality (-1,600) and the Manufacturing (-1,500) sectors. Losses were partially offset by gains in the Professional and Business Services (900) and the Financial Activities (600) sectors. Total private employment stands at 2,739,000, which is 6,900 above the December 2018 peak.

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
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



Spices add a lot of flavor to our lives. It was largely the search for spices that led Christopher Columbus to set sail, resulting the accidental discovery of the Western Hemisphere. It would be hard to imagine dining without having spices to enhance the flavor of our meals. While some spices are from exotic plants that will not grow in our climate, there are some that we can grow for ourselves and it is time right now to plant some of those flavorful plants.

It is said that an apple a day will keep the doctor away, but a clove of garlic a day will keep everybody away. We have a love for the flavor of garlic, but it is sometimes unpleasant to be around someone else who has consumed this aromatic plant. From pizza sauce to pickles, garlic adds a distinct flavor.

Garlic is easy to grow, and fall is the time to plant it. Choose an area in full sun with rich soil and good drainage. A raised bed is an excellent option. Do not plant garlic where any other onion relative has grown in the past couple of years. Purchase some seed bulbs and separate them into the individual cloves. For best results, use a hard-necked variety, which is hardier for winter growth. Plant each clove with the pointed end up, spacing them about four inches apart and two inches deep. The cloves begin to form roots this autumn and once we have had a couple of hard frosts, mulch the bed with straw or shredded leaves. Keep the bed free of weeds and the garlic will be ready for harvest next summer.

Another crop which may be planted now is the potato onion or multiplier onion. The site and soil requirements are the same as for garlic. Planted now, one should have green onions for eating early in the spring. A special variety of winter onions is known as walking onions. Bulblets form on the ends of the onion stems. As they get heavier, the stems bend down and take root, making the onions to appear to walk around the garden. You probably will not find these onion sets in stores, but you may find them in mail-order catalogues and websites. There are different varieties of winter onions. Try several to see what works best in your garden.

Another fall-planted herb that will tickle your taste buds is horseradish. Horseradish is a perennial plant but is usually grown as an annual. Second-year roots may become woody and lack the pungent flavor associated with horseradish, so most people dig out the whole plant when harvesting, saving the crowns for re-planting. Horseradish prefers full sun but will tolerate light shade. The soil is the most important factor. Horseradish roots may grow two feet long, so to keep the roots as straight as possible, the soil must be loose. Copious compost and some coarse sand will help to keep the soil loose. Horseradish also prefers a soil Ph of 5.5 to 6.8. Horseradish spreads easily and some people have regretted planting in at the edge of a vegetable patch. For that reason, many people find it best to grow this plant in large pots, where the soil may be controlled more easily and where the feeder roots will not wander and start new plants.

I think growing from crowns is the easier option, but one may also use those fibrous roots that are too small for peeling and grating. Place crowns right at soil level and water them in. The roots will soon grow down into the soil. When using the roots to start new plants, lay a root on its side in a trench about four inches deep. Raise the wider end to the surface level and fill in the trench. To get a large, straight taproot, many people use a spade to slice down around the plant several times during the year, cutting off the side roots and encouraging the taproot to grow. I find the large leaves of the horseradish quite ornamental, and a pot of horseradish makes a great backdrop for smaller ornamental plants.

Just when you thought the gardening season was winding down, there are some new chores to do. Next summer, when you need a little spice in your life, you will be glad that you planted these flavorful plants this fall.

How hunters can help monitor for chronic wasting disease

Hunters can help monitor deer populations in northwest and northeast Indiana for chronic wasting disease (CWD) by voluntarily submitting harvested deer to the DNR for testing during the 2019-20 deer hunting season.

For doing so, participants will receive a commemorative 2019 Deer Management Partner magnet and a metal tag reminiscent of historical confirmation tags as tokens of appreciation.

Surveillance involves collecting lymph nodes from the neck of hunter-harvested deer and submitting those samples for diagnostic testing.

During opening weekend of firearms season (Nov. 16 and 17), biologists will operate sampling stations to collect lymph nodes from deer harvested within the CWD surveillance area. The surveillance area includes Jasper, Lake, LaPorte, Newton, Porter, Pulaski, and Starke counties in northwest Indiana, and Dekalb, LaGrange, Noble, and Steuben counties in northeast Indiana.

Sampling stations will be located at DNR fish & wildlife areas (FWAs) and cooperating businesses in the 11-county surveillance area. The locations of these sampling stations will be posted on the DFW website at on.IN.gov/ CWD. No fee will be charged for voluntarily submitting harvested deer for CWD testing at these locations.

Hunters may also have their harvested deer sampled for CWD throughout sampling location information, see the entire 2019-20 season at FWAs on.IN.gov/CWD.

statewide. DNR staff will collect samples by appointment during normal business hours. Hunters who wish to have their deer sampled at a FWA should contact that FWA to make an appointment. Select FWAs will offer an after-business-hours option through which hunters can place the head of their harvested deer in a designated freezer for CWD sampling. Contact information for participating FWAs is at on.IN.gov/CWD.

Successful hunters who would like to have their deer sampled for CWD but do not wish to visit a FWA may submit samples directly to the Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory (ADDL) at Purdue University for a fee. More information and submission forms are available by clicking on the link at the top of the DNR CWD website at on.IN. gov/CWD.

CWD is a neurologic disease that affects white-tailed deer, mule deer, elk, and moose. The fatal disease is transmitted directly through bodily fluids such as feces, saliva, blood, or urine, or indirectly through environmental contamination of soil, plants, food, or water. CWD is found in free-ranging white-tailed deer in several Midwestern states close to Indiana, including Michigan, Illinois, and Wisconsin. CWD has not been detected in Indiana.

With the official deer archery season starting yesterday, Indiana Conservation Officers are offering safety tips to help keep Hoosier deer hunters

The various deer hunting seasons run through January 31, 2020. It is estimated that more than 300,000 people will participate in some form of deer hunting in Indiana during that span. Such a large number makes safety more even more important.

The most common injuries during deer seasons are accidents involving tree stands and elevated platforms. Follow the safety tips listed below when hunting from an elevated position:

Before the nunt:

-Read and understand the tree stand manufacturer's instructions.

-Check tree stands and equipment for wear, fatigue, and cracks or loose nuts/bolts, paying particularly close attention to parts made of material other than metal.

-Practice at ground level.

-Learn how to properly wear your full body safety harness.

During the hunt:

- -Wear your full body safety harness.
- -Use a tree stand safety rope.
- -Make certain to attach your harness to the tree before leaving the ground, and that it remains attached to the tree until you return to the ground.

-Maintain three points of contact during ascent and descent.

- -Use boots with non-slip soles to avoid slipping.
- -Use a haul line to raise and lower firearms, bows and other hunting gear.

-Make certain firearms are unloaded before attaching the haul line.

Additional safety tips:

- -Carry emergency equipment, such as a cell phone and flashlight.
 - -Make a plan before you hunt.
- -Tell someone your plan, including where you will be hunting and when you plan to return.

Stick to your plan.
