Loogootee girl receives award for inspiring others

Whitney Fleagle, of Loogootee, recently received an award from Developmental Services, Inc (DSI) for her outstanding commitment and achievement in reaching personal goals while providing inspiration to others. She is the youngest to ever received the award. She is five.

For the Fleagle family, the day five years ago that Whitney was born into their lives, they knew there would be significant challenges to face for their beautiful blue-eyed infant daughter. But they also knew that her very existence was a miracle. Whitney was born with Cerebral Palsy.

According to Whitney's mother, Emily, the pregnancy was perfect but a traumatic birth due to complications resulted in some damage to parts of her daughter's brain. Noting that she was not breathing for several minutes after her birth, Emily believes that Whitney's survival was a miracle.

"She was definitely a fighter," says Emily about those scary moments in the delivery room. "Whitney spent a little time in the NICU (Natal Intensive Care Unit), but she was able to come home with her family in few days.

According to the Mayo Clinic website, Cerebral Palsy is caused by abnormal development or damage to parts of the brain that control movement, balance, and posture. Most often, the

problems occur during pregnancy however, they may also occur during childbirth or shortly thereafter.

Hailing from Pennsylvania, Emily and her husband moved with their daughters - four-year-old Whitney and one-year-old Cambrie to Loogoo-

tee in 2018. Whitney was enrolled in DSI's KidStuff preschool in Loogootee where she received physical, cognitive and speech therapies as well as having the opportunity to interact and with other children through play and learn-

ing activities.

Much of what was learned by the Fleagles is further enhanced in their home.

The Fleagles converted their one-car garage into a therapy room and stocked it with adaptive games, toys and learning equipment so that Whitney could work on skills she would need for future independence in school and in day-to-day life. Two-year-old Cambrie enjoys playing and learning alongside her big sister.

One of the most sophisticated adaptive devices used by Whitney is "Bella". This computer communication device has a large screen in which Whitney can manipulate by making eye contact with selected boxes displaying symbols and words. Once Whitney has selected her message, Bella speaks for her.

With Bella, Whitney is able to tell what color crayon she wants to draw with, what she wants to eat and even express her feelings.

Other adaptive equipment that will be more and more important to Whitney's future independence is her gait trainer which helps her take steps, a manual wheelchair, a stander, and a new power wheelchair she controls with head movements.

To further ensure Whitney's successful transition to kindergarten and beyond, the Fleagles are very involved in social media.

Martin County unemployment edges up to 2.4 percent in October

rose slightly from September to October, edging up from 2.2 percent to 2.4 percent. The county had the eighth lowest jobless rate in the state for October, tied with Decatur, Gibson, Rush and White counties.

In October, the county had 5,347 residents in the workforce and 127 of them were without work. In September, there were 5,293 residents able to work and 118 of them were unemployed. In October of last year, Martin County's jobless rate was 2.6 percent with 5,156 residents in the workforce and 136 of them without jobs.

Daviess County's unemployment rate also edged up just slightly in October to 2.2 percent, up from 2.1 percent the month before. The county had the third lowest jobless rate in the state for October, tied with Bartholomew and Boone counties.

In October, the county had 16,826 residents in the workforce and 375 of them were unemployed. In September, there were 16,699 residents able to work and 351 of them were without jobs. In October of 2018, Daviess County's jobless rate was 2.7 percent with 16,508 residents in the workforce and 439 of them unemployed.

Dubois County's unemployment rate moved from 1.9 percent in September to 2.1 percent in October. The county had the lowest jobless rate in the state for October, tied with Tipton County.

In October, the county had 22,897 residents in the workforce with 481 of them unemployed. In September, there were 22,742 residents able to work and 442 of them were without work. In October of last year, Dubois County's unemployment rate was 2.5 percent with 22,999 residents in the workforce and 566 of them without jobs.

Greene County's unemployment rate bumped up to 3.5 percent in October, up from 3.3 percent the month before. The county had the fifth highest jobless rate in the state for October, tied with six other counties.

In October, the county had 13,810 residents in the workforce and 485 of them were unemployed. In September, there were 13,686 residents able to work and 447 of them were unemployed. In October of last year, Greene

> The top ten spots in the state for lowest jobless rate for October were Tipton and Dubois counties at 2.1 percent, Daviess, Boone, and Bartholomew counties at 2.2 percent; Jackson and Hamilton counties at 2.3 percent, and White, Rush, Martin, Gibson, and Decatur counties at 2.4 percent.

The top ten spots in the state for highest jobless rate for October were Fayette County at 4.4 percent, Lake County at 4.2 percent, Vermillion County at 4.1 percent, Vigo County at 3.7 percent, and Delaware, Greene, LaPorte, Miami, Starke and Sullivan counties at 3.5 percent.


Indiana's unemployment rate stands at 3.2 percent for October and remains lower than the national rate of 3.6 percent. The monthly unemployment rate is a U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) indicator that reflects the number of unemployed people seeking employment within the prior four weeks as a percentage of the labor force.

Indiana's labor force had a net increase of 567 over the previous month. This was a result of a decrease of 1,397 unemployed residents and an increase of 1,964 employed residents. Indiana's total labor force, which includes both Hoosiers employed and those seeking employment, stands at 3.38 million, and the state's 64.4 percent labor force participation rate remains above the national rate of 63.3 percent.

Employment by Sector

Private sector employment has grown by 16,500 over the year and has decreased by 2,000 over the previous month. The monthly decrease is primarily due to losses in the Manufacturing (-4,000) and the Trade, Transportation and Utilities (-2,100) sectors. Losses were partially offset by gains in the Leisure and Hospitality (2,100) and the Professional and Business Services (1,500) sectors. Total private employment stands at 2,734,500, which is 2,400 above the December 2018 peak.


"Tater" was preceded in death by his wife and three brothers, Ambrose, Lenise and Frank Thimling.



In the Garden

At this time of the year, we can pause and look back at the growing season to assess what did well and what did not. At Sandhill Gardens, I have a lot for which I am thankful this year. The year certainly had its challenges—too much rain in the spring and drought in the autumn, but all in all, it was a pretty good year for my gardens.

Due to the rainy spring, the vegetable garden was largely delayed. I was able to plant lettuce and peas before the rains started but was late getting out the bedding plants. However, when the tomatoes started producing, I had a good crop from a few plants. The best producer was an heirloom variety known as "goat's bag". The fruits were solid and elongated and had very few seeds. This variety proved to be good for eating and was especially good for sandwiches, since the tomatoes did not make the bread soggy. This would probably also be a good tomato for sauce. I saved seeds to grow this one again next year, but the fruits did not have many seeds. I also grew some old favorites, including purple Cherokee, mortgage lifter and golden jubilee.

As I have done for several years, I grew potatoes in a bin on top of the ground, adding a mixture of shredded leaves, shredded paper and compost to cover the plants as they grew. Using this method makes harvesting easy and I was able to pull out some very nice tubers. I actually got a second crop in that did even better than the first, since growing on top of the ground was not dependent on getting the soil dry enough to work before planting.

I also grew sweet potatoes in a raised bed. I had a fair harvest, but the tubers were not large. However, they are the perfect size for baking whole and eating a sweet potato for a meal. The fact that birds kept eating at the foliage may have been the reason that I did not get big tubers. Next year, I will plant sweet potatoes in a different bed and will cover the bed with bird netting.

Another crop that produced a bumper crop was the Malabar spinach. This leafy green is not a true spinach at all but is a vining plant from New Zealand that produces dark green leaves and pink flowers. The leaves do actually taste a lot like spinach, but the texture is a little different. The great thing about Malabar spinach is that it loves the hot summer weather, which causes true spinach to bolt.

The ornamental garden got off to a shaky start. Warm weather followed by freezing temperatures nipped some of the early flowers. It was a marginal year for daffodils, but by lilac time, temperatures had warmed just enough to support good bloom, yet stayed cool enough that the blooms lasted longer than usual. It was also a banner year for the dogwoods, both the native dogwoods and the Korean dogwoods. Like the lilacs, the bloom period was lengthy.

The summer growing period was generally good. I really did not have to water anything planted in the ground until August. Of course, potted plants required some watering, but even they did not require attention every day. Good growing conditions also meant that weeds grew rapidly, and I admit that they got ahead of me in some beds. Next year, maybe I will do a better job of getting mulch in place early to help suppress the weeds.

A gift pack is a gift the recipient can use the whole year. Whether that person enjoys camping or sleeping in the comfort of one of seven Indiana State Park Inns, the gift pack is sure to please.

The \$99 gift pack includes a 2020 resident annual entrance permit, a one-year subscription to Outdoor Indiana magazine, and one of two \$65 gift card options. There's a \$65 gift card that can be used at the campgrounds — or for those who like to enjoy nature from the comfort of the indoors, a \$65 State Park Inns gift card. There's also an option to upgrade the gift card to \$100 by paying \$35 more.

Orders ship within three to five business days. Orders received by December 8 will ship by December 16. The offer is available through December 31, and packs can be purchased online at innsgifts.com.

Indiana has 32 state parks and reservoirs throughout the state. The entrance permit grants gate entrance for all of 2020 for all state park properties beginning January 1.

The inns gift card can be used at any of seven state park lodging facilities, as well as at the award-winning Pete Dye-designed golf course at Fort Harrison State Park in Indianapolis. The card can also be used for lodging, meals in the dining rooms, or gift purchases.

The camping gift card can be used toward the rental of cabins (excluding inns-operated cabins), campsites, cottages, group camps, recreation buildings, rent-a-camp cabins, shelters, youth and rally camps at all state park and reservoir properties. It can also be used at a handful of DNR Division of Forestry properties, including Deam Lake State Recreation Area (SRA), Greene-Sullivan State Forest, and Starve Hollow SRA.

The camping gift card may also be used to purchase daily entrance, lake permits, horse tags, and any other items sold by park-operated gates, stores and gift shops. The camping gift card cannot be used at any privately-operated concessions, camp stores, marinas or saddle barns.

New deer harvest website available for hunters

Indiana DNR has launched a new website allowing deer hunters to access white-tailed deer harvest data as it is accumulated by the state.

During the check-in process, hunters report the county of harvest, sex of deer harvested, type of land the deer was harvested on, and type of equipment used to harvest deer. This data can now be accessed and viewed by individuals using an interactive website. Visitors to the website can compare individual or multiple counties across the past five years. Results can even be limited to specific types of equipment or deer seasons.

Hunters have asked for more detailed harvest data and comparisons between years, and this new website is a direct result of that feedback to DNR. Harvest data is updated daily.
