Shoals Council approves logging bid, various contracts

The Shoals Town Council met Monday December 14. Those in attendance were Council Members Cecil Ragsdale, Cary D. Albright, and Clint Hoffman; Clerk-Treasurer Sierra Rutledge, Town Marshal Todd Eckert, Town Attorney Dave Lett, SVFD Chief Jim Hamby, Center Township Trustee Ann Stewart, Center Township Board Member Norma Baker, Steve Deckard, with the Shoals News; and Darron Tanksley with Indiana Timber & Veneer.

Councilman Hoffman made a motion to accept the bid from Indiana Timber & Veneer in the amount of \$45,000 for 300 choice cut trees on the town-owned property on Sherfick School Road. Councilman Hoffman made the motion for this bid as he felt the bid was more responsive to the town's long-term vision, preservation and goals for the property. Councilman Albright seconded the motion, and all were in favor. Attorney Lett advised Darron Tanksley, with Indiana Timber & Veneer, to prepare a contract for him to review in order to move forward.

Shoals Chief Jim Hamby presented the 2021 fire protection contracts for Center and Halbert townships. After discussion, the 2021 amount for the contracts were set for \$10,600 for each township and Hamby stated the amount for 2022 will be \$16,000 each. Hamby noted it had been several years since an increase had been made. Center Township Trustee Ann Stewart thanked the chief for all that the department does and stated she is still trying to get a CCI Fund going from her township for them and if passed would bring in around \$12,000 annually. Stewart stated she submitted everything, but it had been denied, however, she was working on getting everything re-submitted.

Clerk-Treasurer Sierra Rutledge presented a proposal received from the Martin County Sheriff's Department for IDACS (Indiana Data and Communications System) and dispatching services. The proposal was for a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the sheriff's department and the Town of Shoals for the purpose of compensating a portion of the IDACS and dispatching services endured by the sheriff's department to serve the Town of Shoals. The proposal was in the amount of \$3,127 on an annual basis. Councilman Albright made a motion to move forward with an MOU between the sheriff's department and the Town of Shoals for the services provided. Councilman Hoffman made the second and all were in favor. Rutledge provided the annual renewal and license agreement for the utility billing and payroll software in the amount of \$4,080 with Keystone software. Councilman Hoffman made a motion to approve the renewal with Councilman Albright

making the second and all were in favor. Rutledge then presented a quote to purchase Keystone Accounting Software which would interface with the utility billing program and the payroll program. Currently, the accounting is handled by paper and pencil. Councilman Albright made a motion to accept the quote and purchase the software with Councilman Hoffman making the second and all were in favor.

Rutledge presented the 2021 Salary & Wage Ordinance for approval. She stated the changes were as listed: a fifty cents per hour raise for the general laborer, town marshal and deputy clerk, a \$1,040 annual salary increase for the municipal utilities manager, and no raises for elected officials. Rutledge stated that it was noted that no employee health insurance deduction would be taken out of employee paychecks in January as AIM Medical Trust, the health insurance provider, was giving clients a "premium holiday" for the health coverage portion only in January 2021. Councilman Albright made a motion to approve the 2021 Salary & Wage Ordinance with Councilman Hoffman making



Martin County unemployment rate at 3.4 percent for November

Martin County's unemployment rate moved from 3.6 percent in October to 3.4 percent in November. The county had the seventh lowest jobless rate in the state for November, tied with Tipton, Warren and Warrick counties.

In November, the county had 5,360 residents in the workforce and 180 of them were unemployed. In October, there were 5,447 residents able to work and 194 of them without jobs.

In November of last year, Martin County's jobless rate was 2.3 percent, with 5,347 residents in the workforce and 124 of them unemployed.

Daviess County's jobless rate in November edged down to 2.8 percent, from 2.9 percent the month before. The county had the lowest unemployment rate of all 92 Indiana counties for November.

In November, the county had 16,328 residents in the workforce and 461 of them were unemployed. In October, there were 16,525 residents able to work and 487 of them without jobs. In November of 2019, Daviess County's jobless rate was 2.4 percent with 16,661 residents able to work and 407 of them without jobs.

Dubois County's unemployment rate also slightly moved down last month. Moving from 3.6 percent in October to 3.5 percent in November. The county had the 11th lowest jobless rate in the state last month, tied with Jay, LaGrange and Whitley counties. In November, the county had 22,003 residents in the workforce and 775 of them were unemployed. In October, there were 22,335 residents able to work and 807 of them without jobs. In November of last year, Dubois County's jobless rate was 2.3 percent with 22,852 residents in the workforce and 516 of them without work.

workforce and 501 of them without work.

The top ten spots in the state for the lowest jobless rate for November were Daviess County at 2.8 percent, Boone and Adams counties at 3.1 percent, Union and Posey counties at 3.2 percent, Hamilton County at 3.3 percent, and Martin, Warrick, Warren and Tipton counties at 3.4 percent.

The top ten spots in the state for highest jobless rate for November were Lake County at 7.4 percent, Orange County at 7.1 percent, LaPorte County at 6.9 percent, Fayette County at 6.8 percent, Marion County at 6.3 percent, St. Joseph County at 6.1 percent, Starke County at 5.9 percent, Howard County at 5.6 percent, Vigo County at 5.5 percent, and Switzerland County at 5.4 percent.

Indiana's unemployment rate stands at 5.0 percent for November, and the national rate is 6.7 percent. The monthly unemployment rate is a U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) indicator that reflects the number of unemployed people seeking employment within the prior four weeks as a percentage of the labor force.

Indiana's labor force had a net decrease of 40,274 over the previous month. This was a result of a decrease of 17,345 unemployed residents and a decrease of 22,929 employed residents. Indiana's total labor force, which includes both Hoosiers employed and those seeking employment, stands at 3.33 million, and the state's 62.9 percent labor force participation rate remains above the national rate of 61.5 percent. Greene County's unemployment rate edged down from 4.5 percent in October to 4.4 percent in November. The county ranked 31 for jobless rate in November, tied with five other counties.

In November, the county had 13,176 residents in the workforce and 577 of them were unemployed. In October, there were 13,353 residents able to work and 607 of them without jobs. In November of 2019, Greene County's jobless rate was 3.6 percent with 13,757 residents in the

Employment by Sector

Private sector employment has decreased by 87,600 over the year and decreased by 200 over the previous month. The monthly decrease is primarily due to losses in the Professional and Business Services (-3,800) and the Leisure and Hospitality (-3,000) sectors. Losses were offset by gains in the Construction (3,700) and the Other (2,300), which includes Mining and Logging, IT and Other Services, sectors. Total private employment stands at 2,643,400, which is 105,900 below the January 2019 peak.

The council approved meter deposit and applies as listed: transfer of S. McShane to C. Land, transfer of M. Wence to J. Hill, a transfer of address for R. Rush, and a full return for D. Bauernfiend.

The clerk-treasurer told the council that the year-end meeting needed to be set and the council set it for Thursday, December 31 at 9 a.m. at the town hall.

Council Member Ragsdale presented Town Marshal Todd Eckert with a letter of appreciation on behalf of the town for his exceptional work during the COVID pandemic. Ragsdale commended Eckert for all of his extra efforts in many aspects of the town to include work in the water, wastewater, cemetery, street and other departments. Ragsdale stated Marshal Eckert had gone above and beyond during this time.



"Holiday celebrations may look different this year due to the pandemic, but precautions still need to be taken on the road," said Lieutenant Jason Allen, Commander of the Jasper Post. "Officers will be out in greater numbers, but it's going to take everyone working together to keep our roads safe. Drive sober and buckle up this holiday season."

The holiday season is one of the deadliest times of the year for impaired-driving fatalities. According to NHTSA, during the Christmas and New Year's Day holiday periods in 2018 alone, there were more drunk-driving-related fatalities (285) than during any other holiday period that year in the U.S. Last December in Indiana, there were 415 alcohol-related crashes, resulting in 105 injuries and 11 fatalities.

In every state, it is illegal to drive with a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of .08 or higher. In Indiana, drivers under 21 with a BAC of .02 or higher are subject to fines and a license suspension for up to 1 year.

more reason to make good decisions before getting behind the wheel."

To further save lives and prevent traffic fatalities, officers will also be watching for seat belt violations.

According to NHTSA, from 1975 to 2017, seat belts have saved an estimated 374,196 lives. While Indiana's seat belt usage rate is above the national average of 90.7 percent, more than half of the people who were killed in motor vehicle crashes last year were not buckled up.

"With inclement weather and busier roads this time of year, it's especially important to buckle up," said Robert Duckworth, ICJI Traffic Safety Director. "We want everyone to have a safe holiday season and wearing a seat belt is the best way to protect yourself on the road."

Indiana has a primary seat-belt law, meaning that police officers may ticket unrestrained drivers or passengers, even if no other traffic violation has taken place. Children under eight must be properly restrained in a federally approved child or booster seat.

For the past couple of columns, I have written about plants associated with Christmas. However, one native plant whose common name actually contains the word "Christmas" is often overlooked as a landscape plant. That plant is the Christmas fern.

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The Christmas fern is native to much of Eastern North America. With the exception of an area in east-central Indiana, it can be found growing in wooded areas of the Hoosier state. It is easy to spot this time of the year, as it is one of the few green plants on the forest floor. Actually, it is only the large, leathery, sterile fronds of the fern that remain green through the winter. The smaller fertile ferns die down. As I walked through Sandhill Gardens recently, the Christmas ferns were still standing, but they usually lie flat on the ground after the first real accumulation of snow. The Christmas ferns in the garden were rescued many years ago from a construction site, but the wooded area below the cliff sports several clumps of the native fern.

Ferns are normally associated with moist, shady landscapes. Christmas ferns do, indeed, grow best in shady locations, although they will tolerate some morning sun. However, this fern will survive where soils are well-drained and will take some drought.

The Christmas ferns are not the only Merry Christmas.

green ferns at Sandhill Gardens right now. The autumn ferns are also still green and remain more upright that the Christmas fern. Autumn ferns will eventually die down and return as bronze fronds in the spring. They morph to the present graygreen color in autumn. Autumn ferns are larger and more upright than Christmas ferns, so it is easy to tell them apart.

The ferns are the perfect winter foil for the evergreen foliage of the hellebores. Helleborus niger is commonly known as the Christmas rose and I am happy to report that at least one clump of hellebores at Sandhill Gardens has blooms for the Christmas season. (Helleborus orientalis is commonly called the Lenten rose and those blooms will be coming along in February.) The Christmas rose is not the only thing in bloom at Sandhill Gardens. Some late autumn daffodils are still holding on to some blooms and the winter witch hazel will soon be blooming also.

I love lights in the garden and Christmas time is a great time to light up the landscape. An antique red pickup truck carrying a Christmas tree has become a popular Christmas decoration, so I have put my 1952 Ford pickup into the Christmas scenery, complete with a native red cedar in the bed. If you are out and about this season, drive by and take a look. It is yet another way to enjoy the gardens.

Welcome 2021 with an Indiana DNR tradition — a First Day Hike on January 1. First Day Hikes are a healthy way to start the new year and provide a chance to get outside, exercise, and enjoy nature.

In past years, Indiana state parks, reservoirs and state forests have offered organized hikes led by park staff and volunteers. These hikes have become a tradition for thousands of Hoosiers.

This year, in response to the need to practice social distancing and keep group sizes to those within your personal "bubble", the DNR has created hiking opportunities that allow you to be your own tour guide.

After you decide which state park, reservoir, or state forest you plan to visit for a hike, stop by your site of choice to pick up your Indiana First Day Hike sticker. Stickers will be available at the entrance gates at Pokagon, Chain O'Lakes, Turkey Run, and Shades state parks, and at Cataract Falls State Recreation Area (SRA); at the nature center at Indiana Dunes State Park; and outside all other state park and reservoir property offices.

The state forest properties — Salamonie River, Clark, Greene-Sullivan, Yellowwood, Morgan-Monroe, Owen-Putnam, Ferdinand, Pike, Jackson-Washington, Martin, and Harrison-Crawford state forests, and Deam Lake and Starve Hollow SRAs will also participate. All will have stickers available outside their office.

Wear your sticker proudly during your hike and be ready to say Happy New Year to your fellow hikers on the trail.

Choose your favorite trail and look for a "resolution sign" at each trailhead. These signs will propose different new year's resolutions you might consider.

Snap a photo of yourself with the sign, then take a hike.
