
Welcome New Rescue Families

Healthy and Happy Bulldogs—tips and advice from Judee

Don't 'Toy' with your Bulldog's Health

I haven't met a Bulldog yet that doesn't love to chew. And if you don't give them a toy to chew on, they'll commandeer the nearest shoe or piece of furniture. So it's important to always provide your bully with plenty of suitable options.

Some things that are advertised as chew toys should never be offered to a dog of any breed. Chief among these are rawhide items and, in my opinion, bones. Both can get caught in the throat or digestive tract and bones splinter – raw or cooked.

Hard rubber toys, like Kong toys, should not be offered to dogs without supervision. Chunks of rubber can get lodged in the digestive tract and require surgery.

The size of toys is also important to consider. In other words, don't give dogs a small toy they can attempt to swallow whole.

Rope chews are tricky with Bullies. Most of them can untie the knots surprisingly fast – they even quickly unweave the woven rope balls. It's like a Rubik's cube for Bullies. Moreover, those unraveled fibers are dangerous because they can get stuck in the throat or digestive tract.

Bulldogs have exceptionally powerful jaws and can easily become mesmerized by the act of chewing, so you need to choose toys that can withstand their abuse and not become wedged in their throat. Shape, size and toughness all need to be taken into consideration. We prefer the Nylabone rings. They are hard, large enough and shaped so that they cannot be lodged in the throat.

Under no circumstances should Bullies be given stuffed toys or anything they can destroy that contains squeakies.

Choose the right toys for your Bullies and they will have hours of safe enjoyment.

Minutes of the Regular Board Meeting September 21,2020 via Zoom

Call to Order: 8:05

Members present: Nikki, Tanya, Suzan, Mari ,Jolene. Lisa Report of the Secretary: No club correspondence this month. I did post notices on Facebook about our shows being cancelled.

Report of the Treasurer. Treasurer's report was distributer via email. Suzan noted that she paid the Insurance and took half of the premium from the Rescue account. Our Insurance does cover all of our events and programs.

Report of Committees

<u>Show</u> Mari has the trophies for the ORKC supported entries for the Lebanon shows. She will get them labeled and delivered to Ken.

Rescue (see Excel file). We have only Heethcliff, Casper and Princess currently in foster homes. Adopted since the last meeting: Harley Knox, Hobo, Monty, Sydney, Ruger, Jax Maryville, Avett and Foxy. Polly was adopted but we lost her to cancer soon after the adoption. Harley Newport was in hospice care and crossed over in July.

Our rescue account has been holding steady but the bills for September will be over \$2500.00. We really need to brain storm about some kind of fund raising. There was a question about Heethcliff's foster status. Mari will check with the family and see if they are ready to adopt.

<u>Programs</u> Mari checked with UT and there will be no HowlOween this year and she has not heard anything about CV Bark and BBQ. Mari has sent a list of possible program leaders to Tanya to try to get an alternative meds program going. Dr. Pittman told Tanya that she would not be available this fall to do a program. Mari also floated the idea of some kind of face to face (safely) program for those grieving the loss of a Bullie. Lisa has offered her deck if we can put together a group. Mari will check with Dr. Strand at UT to see about maybe getting a grad student facilitator for the program. Also it may be time to ask Dr. Hnilica to do a program.

<u>Fundraising</u> Ideas floated for online fund raising:

- best Christmas scene with your Bullie; Holly Jolly Bullie Christmas;
- online auction of some Wagner items;

Mari will put together a list of possible participants, Lisa will investigate making some videos. We will meet either on Suzan's deck or via Zoom on Saturday Oct 10 at 2 pm to plan the 30 days.


Suzan has sent around the zoom invitation for that day.
