




New Arrivals looking for a home

Healthy and Happy Bulldogs—tips and advice from Judee

Protecting Your Bullie from Infectious Diseases

This month's column is about immunizations. I've had vaccinations on my mind – for two reasons. First, I just got my second COVID shot. Yeah!!!! Also, our puppies just got their second set of shots.

If you're hesitant about getting immunizations for yourself or your Bullies, please, please speak with your doctor or your vet, whichever the case may be. Full disclosure – in more than 30 years of breeding bulldogs, we have had only one case of side effects. If you've ever seen a dog with parvo, distemper or rabies, I think you'll agree that the benefits outweigh the risks. You can check the health section of the AKC.org website for more information on the various diseases that you can help your Bullie to avoid.

There are two kinds of vaccines – those your Bullie needs to get and those that are important but optional. Schedules vary by location, so consult with your vet on what is best in your area for your Bullie. Following is a general guideline that can serve as a starting point for a with your vet:

6-8 weeks old – Distemper, parvovirus
10-12 weeks old – DHPP (vaccines for distemper, adenovirus, parainfluenza and parvovirus)
16-18 weeks old – DHPP, rabies
12-16 months old – DHPP, rabies
Every 1-2 years – DHPP
Every 1-3 years – Rabies (as required by law)

We show our Bullies and take them to training classes, so they are exposed to many other dogs. Consequently, they also get Bordetella vaccine – which is available as an injectable and a nasal spray. Because of the prevalence of ticks in our area and the possibility that they may transmit Lyme disease, our Bullies also get a Lyme vaccine. And, of course, they all receive medication to prevent against heartworm, which are transmitted by mosquitoes.

There is a lot of debate over how often to give adult dogs booster shots. For your adult Bullies, you may want to opt for a titer test, which measures immunity levels, before deciding on whether or not you want to have them vaccinated annually. Your Bullies may be exposed to many dangerous, potentially deadly, but mostly preventable diseases during their lifetime. I urge you to consult with your vet about how best to protect them.

Moses is doing well, the vet in Murfreesboro wants to remove his spleen because of a tumor. I discussed all of this with the foster mom. I am going to get an estimate from the vet and see about submitting a request for a grant form BCARN. No new Florida dogs so far. I sent around a revised MOU to the board. Mari will send the MOU to jennifer for signature and notary. Mari will continue to look at the list that Denise sent for grants for which we could be eligible. The Bissell grant has a lot of paperwork, it takes six months to be registered and then we can only apply for a specific item when they open the process. The December match (from Network for Good) with Nikki and Tony's donation came. I deposited \$1040.00 and about \$48.00 from Amazon Smile. Rescue has been very slow not sure why.

<u>Programs</u> Still waiting on pandemic relief to sponsor in person events.

<u>Fundraising</u> Nikki has been contacted by Pie It Forward to be their April recipient. Joleen is making the signs and Nikki will take sign and brochures to the store.
