AKC has some suggestions on how to help your pups cope with a new routine:


- Keep departures and returns relaxed and low-key.


New Arrivals looking for a Forever Home

If Your Bully Needs Surgery - A Discussion Guide for You and Your Vet

There may come a time when your Bully needs surgery. There are some things you need to plan for and discuss with your vet in advance. But before we get started – full disclosure – I AM NOT A VET. My intent is not to give you medical advice for your dog but to help you have a meaningful discussion with your vet before surgery.

First of all, your Bully should have no food or water 12 hours before surgery. Vomiting and aspiration can have devastating effects. If it is an emergency and the surgery must be done no matter what, make sure to tell your vet when your Bully last ate.

Ask your vet if they will be doing a full blood chemistry, measure clotting time and do a complete blood count. Will an intravenous (IV) catheter be placed prior to surgery and will IV fluids be administered during surgery? For anything other than a very short minor procedure, anesthesia will be administered. You and your vet need to discuss what they will use. Another full disclosure – AT ONE POINT IN MY CAREER, I WORKED FOR AN ANESTHESIA COMPANY, SO I KNOW ENOUGH TO BE DANGEROUS.

That said, the anesthesiologists I've worked with and all the vets I've had for the past 30-plus years have recommended propofol for induction and then intubation so that an inhalation anesthetic can be administered for maintenance. That anesthesia gas should be isoflurane or sevoflurane ONLY. If your vet disagrees, find out why. I would also recommend a second opinion. Some vets also administer post-op medication to help with nausea and throat swelling.

Just a word on intubation. That is putting a breathing tube down the trachea. The tube is attached to an anesthesia machine. This allows for precise control of the amount of anesthesia delivered and maximizes oxygen supply. The tube should be left in place until the Bully is sufficiently awake to exhibit a gag reflex. Bulldogs should never be masked down to administer inhaled anesthesia. This involves restraining the dog and placing a mask over the muzzle.

When your beloved bulldog goes into surgery, it can be a very stressful time, but if you have a good discussion with your vet before the procedure, it can help put your mind at ease.

She found a warm spot and a soft bed in their kitchen where she could watch their comings and goings and give them Love Licks when they passed by her. She was only with us about six weeks before she crossed over early in the morning of July 15 \cdot But in those six weeks she had food and shelter and knew Love —perhaps for the first time in her life. Tim and Trish lovingly buried her under a pine tree in their yard.
