10. If you're riding' ahead of the herd, take a look back every now and then to make sure it's still there.



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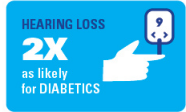
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### HE ASKED HIS WIFE TO BURY HIM WITH ALL HIS MONEY; THIS IS WHAT SHE DID

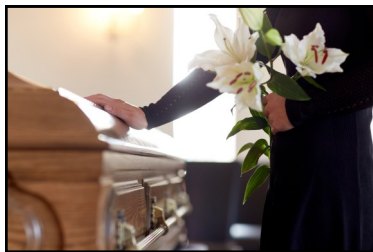

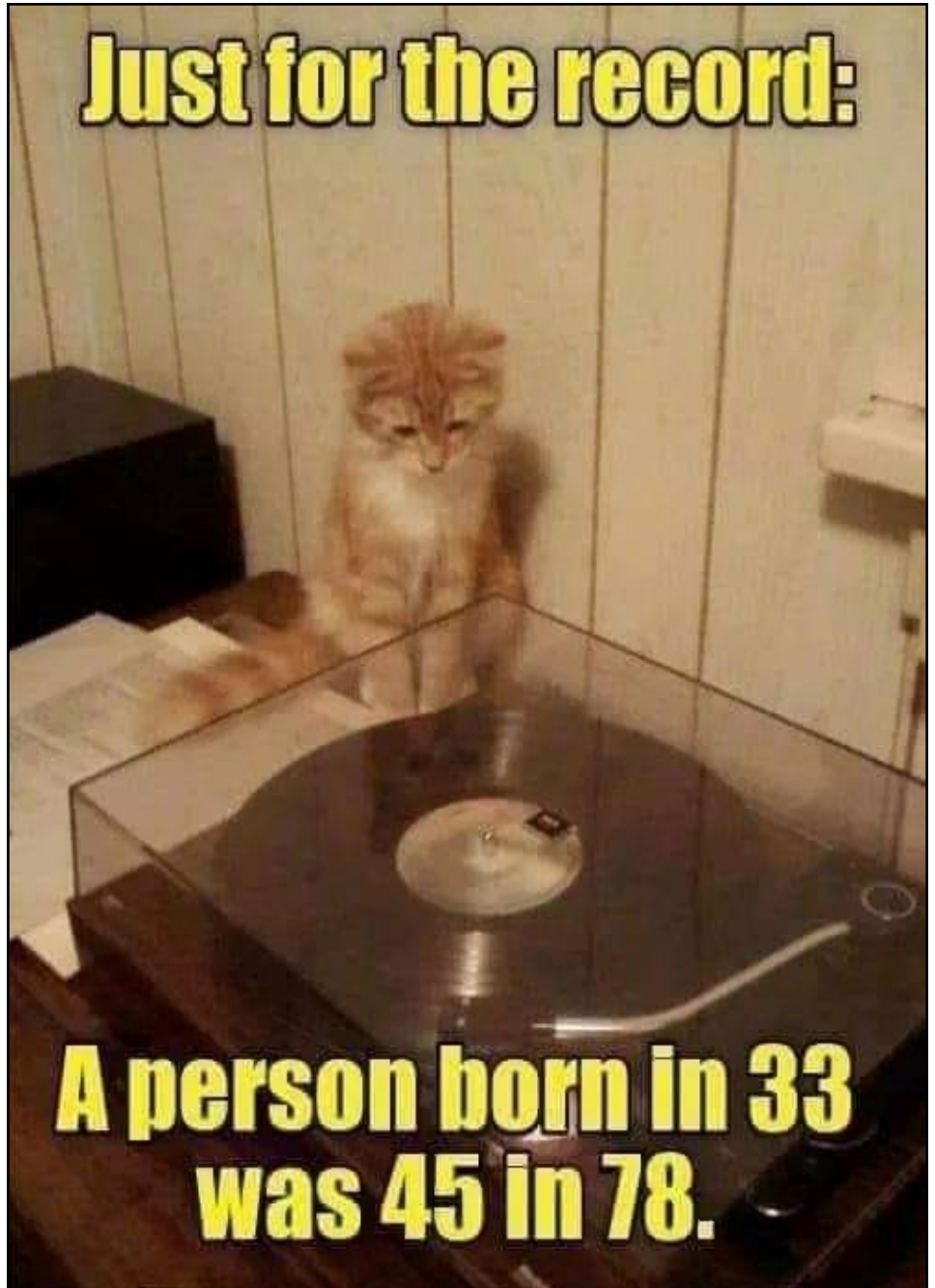

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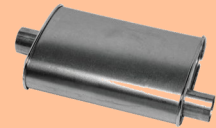

I don't have OCD; I'm just hoping they'll take one look at that mess and start cleaning!

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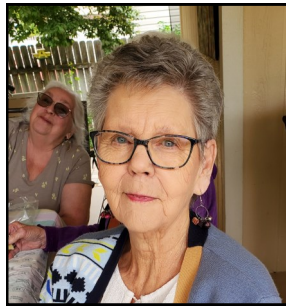
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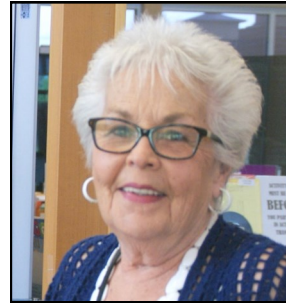

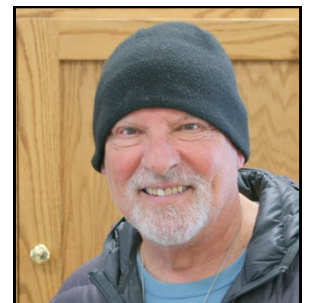
