And Then It is Winter

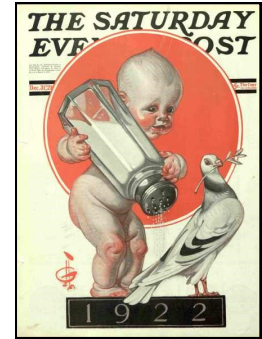

This being Easter Sunday, we will ask Mrs Lewis to come forward and lay an egg on the altar.

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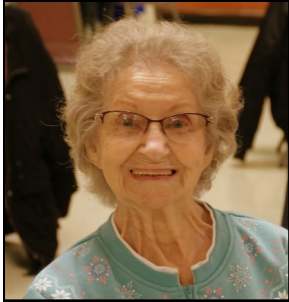

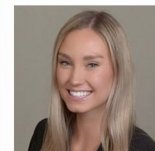
- When everyone's Mom was home when you got home from school?

I'm a wreck waiting for a tow.



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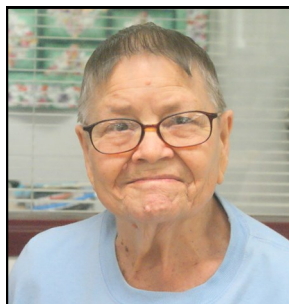
