From Light Night to Green Hustle, the Festival of Science & Curiosity to Child Friendly City initiatives, Nottingham's providers are working collaboratively with schools to give children and young people creative ways to shape the cultural life of the city.

ChalleNGe promotes regular CPD opportunities for teachers, detailed on our website, wall planner and at termly Culturemeets.

For example, Nottingham Contemporary run twilight CPD sessions (usually 4-6pm) at the beginning of each new exhibition to help you get the most out of planning a visit, often with a chance to get creative yourself!

Arts providers are continually developing new projects and programmes. The ChalleNGe website, bi-monthly digital newsletters and termly Culturemeets help you to stay informed and connected.

ChalleNGe has a range of useful resources on the website including:

Did you know?

Nottingham is taking part in the national Creativity Collaboratives programme, testing innovative approaches in teaching for creativity. 12 schools are researching: "How do we nurture our children's innate creative capacity and sustain their curiosity about the world" with a series of creative practitioner residencies, community of practice meetings and wider school involvement.

Anansi Theatre Company

Story-Telling Performance and Workshops centred on African and Caribbean Folklore

Anansi Theatre Company is a brilliant team of creative women of colour. They offer workshops incorporating a storytelling performance of a section of the Anansi story alongside breakout groups focusing on physical theatre and story-telling skills, improvisation and characterisation. By focusing on African and Caribbean folklore rather than the more familiar western fairy tales, pupils explore a different culture while learning new skills and developing their confidence.

Children and young people reflect, share discoveries and create small scenes. The older the group, the more complex the skills. Primary-age children use the characters in the story to develop physical theatre and improvisation skills; secondary-

age pupils go further into devising, writing and performance.

Anansi Theatre Company also offers Arts & Craft sessions encouraging creativity, collaboration and the development of practical skills. Children make

and create, experimenting with shapes and textures, learning new creative techniques and how to use new tools by exploring expressions and descriptive words to build the Anansi spider character and bring it to life.

Drumming, Dance and Wellbeing Workshops

Beatfeet provides creative and cultural workshops for schools and communities within Nottingham and Nottinghamshire. Workshop experiences are tailored for all age groups and include West African percussion and dance, Brazilian Samba percussion and dance, and Indian Bhangra dance and dhol percussion. Beatfeet facilitators are experienced in working with students in special education schools and have safeguarding in place for vulnerable young people, for example, Looked After Children.

They work with schools to ensure their fun-filled and engaging workshops link to key teaching and learning points in curriculum themes such as Africa, animals, citizenship and travel. BeatFeet offers one-off workshops or a

programme of curated sessions. Their staff team-building workshops promote a sense of community and belonging across school. BeatFeet deliver regular Arts Council England projects which may enable schools to access workshops free of charge.

The CFC programme employs a badge framework which allows Nottingham to focus on defined areas of work during our partnership with UNICEF UK. Achieving the badges shows how the City Council, schools and organisations, young and older citizens can make Nottingham truly child friendly. There are three 'core' badges that are mandatory for all cities, these are;

Over 9000 children and young people collaborated to choose three more badges. These are;

A city-wide ambition Child rights-based approach

Nottingham has started a journey working with the UK Committee for UNICEF (UNICEF UK) towards international recognition as a Child Friendly City. Nottingham is committed to improving the lives of children and young people by realising their rights as articulated in the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child.

This is a city-wide partnership programme to put children's rights into practice. An ambitious 3 to 5 year programme will support children and young people to have a meaningful say in local decisions, services and spaces. Nottingham will become a city in which the voices, needs, priorities and rights of children and young people are an integral part of public policies, programmes and decisions - making the city more child friendly.

UNICEF UK's child rights-based approach is a practical tool made up of seven principles. It is for anyone making decisions that directly or indirectly impact children and young people.

Using the principles will help ensure that decisions are firmly embedded in children's rights.

Training and resources for schools will be available to support your own Child Friendly City projects.

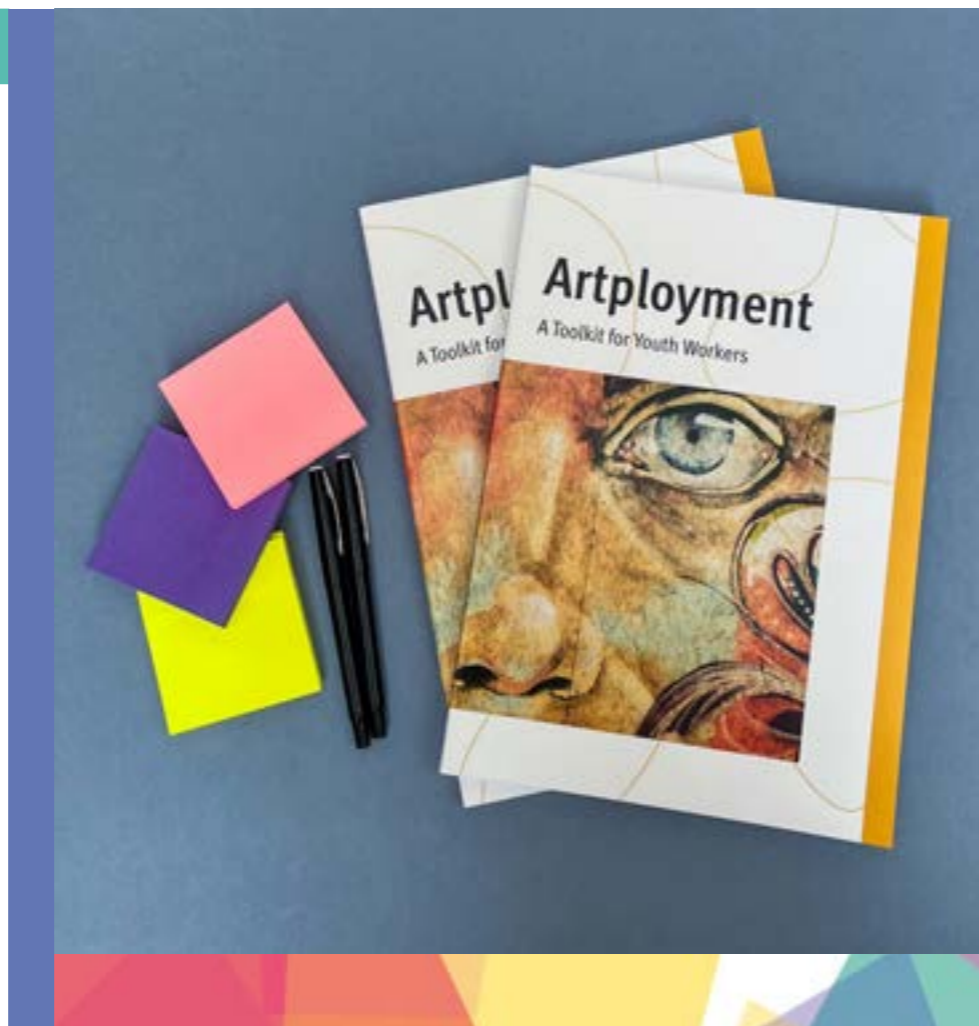

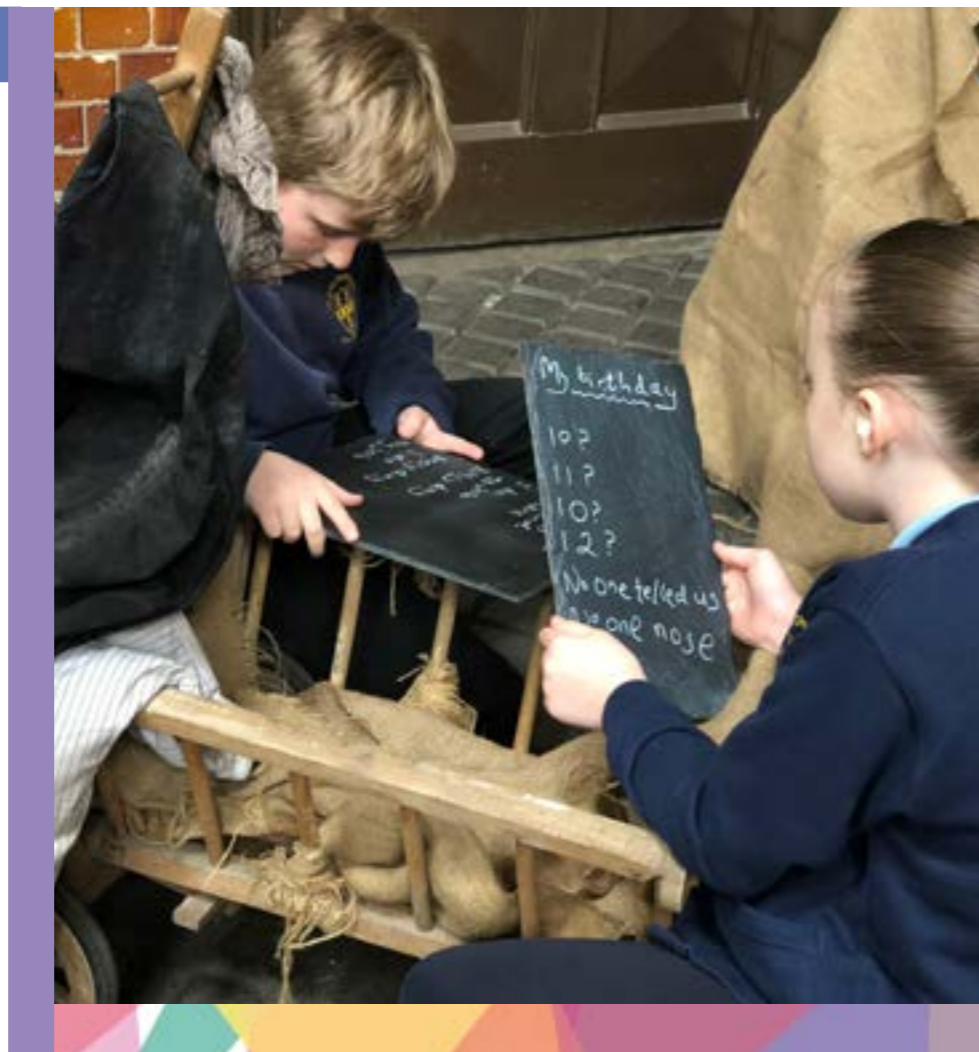

The Emotions Toolkit ‘train to share’ Resilience Leader Programme is a blend of training materials, support and multi-sensory resources to support young minds to self-regulate their feelings, using simple in-the-moment strategies to navigate difficult emotions.

The programme trains groups of up to 12 KS2 children to become resilience leaders; children grow in confidence to teach others how to take responsibility for their emotions and thoughts, learning how to navigate them more easily. Developed using coaching and action ‘train to share’ methods to enhance collaborative learning, the Resilience Leader Programme guides children to discover their own

inner resources and abilities, so that they can develop resilient minds, and teach their peers how to do the same.

Emotions Toolkit also offer resilience, mindset, self-esteem and exam workshops for KS2 - KS4, as well as the ‘Spread the Smile’ book series, designed for EYFS - KS1. Staff & Parent workshops are also available.

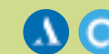

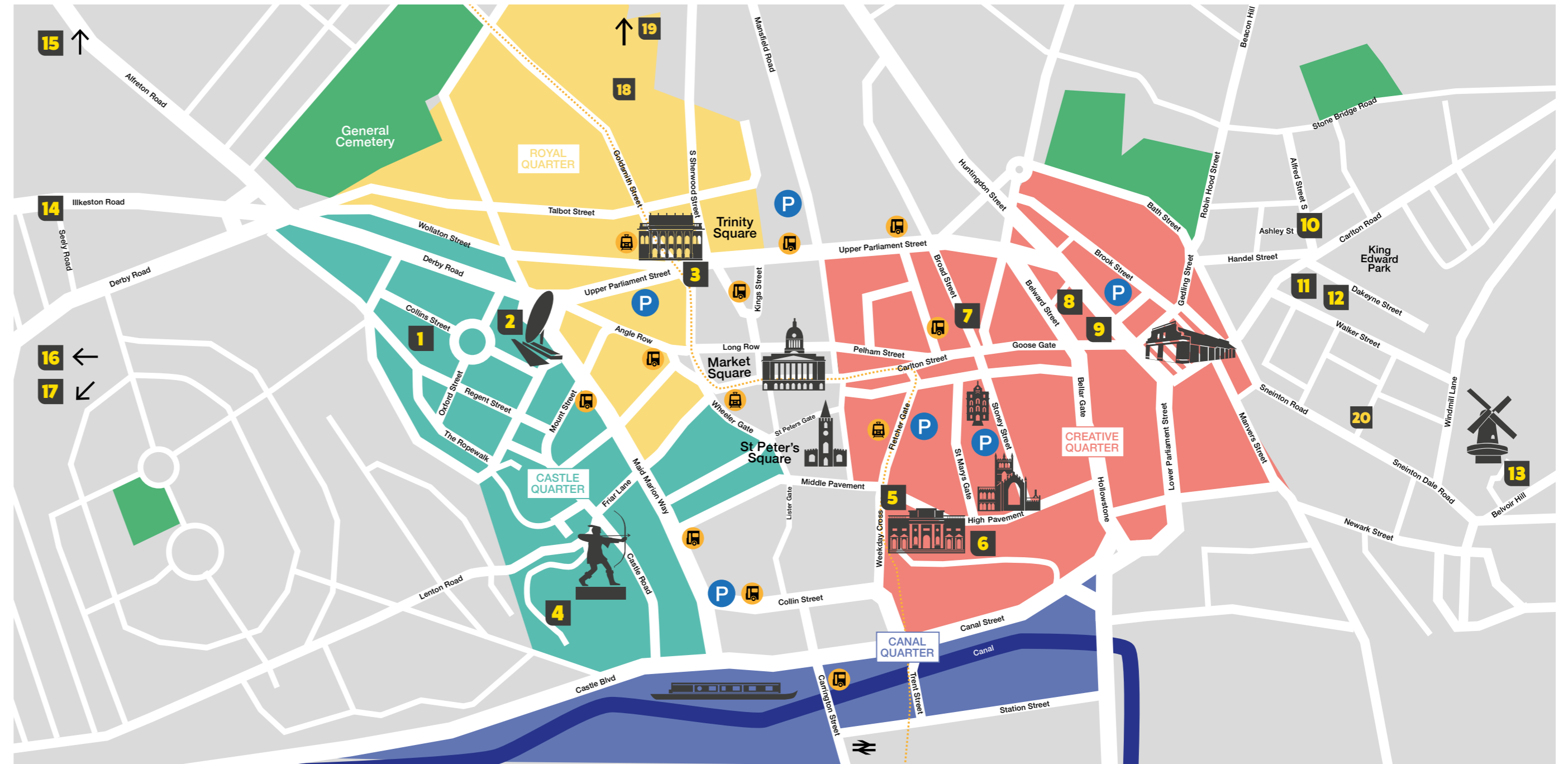

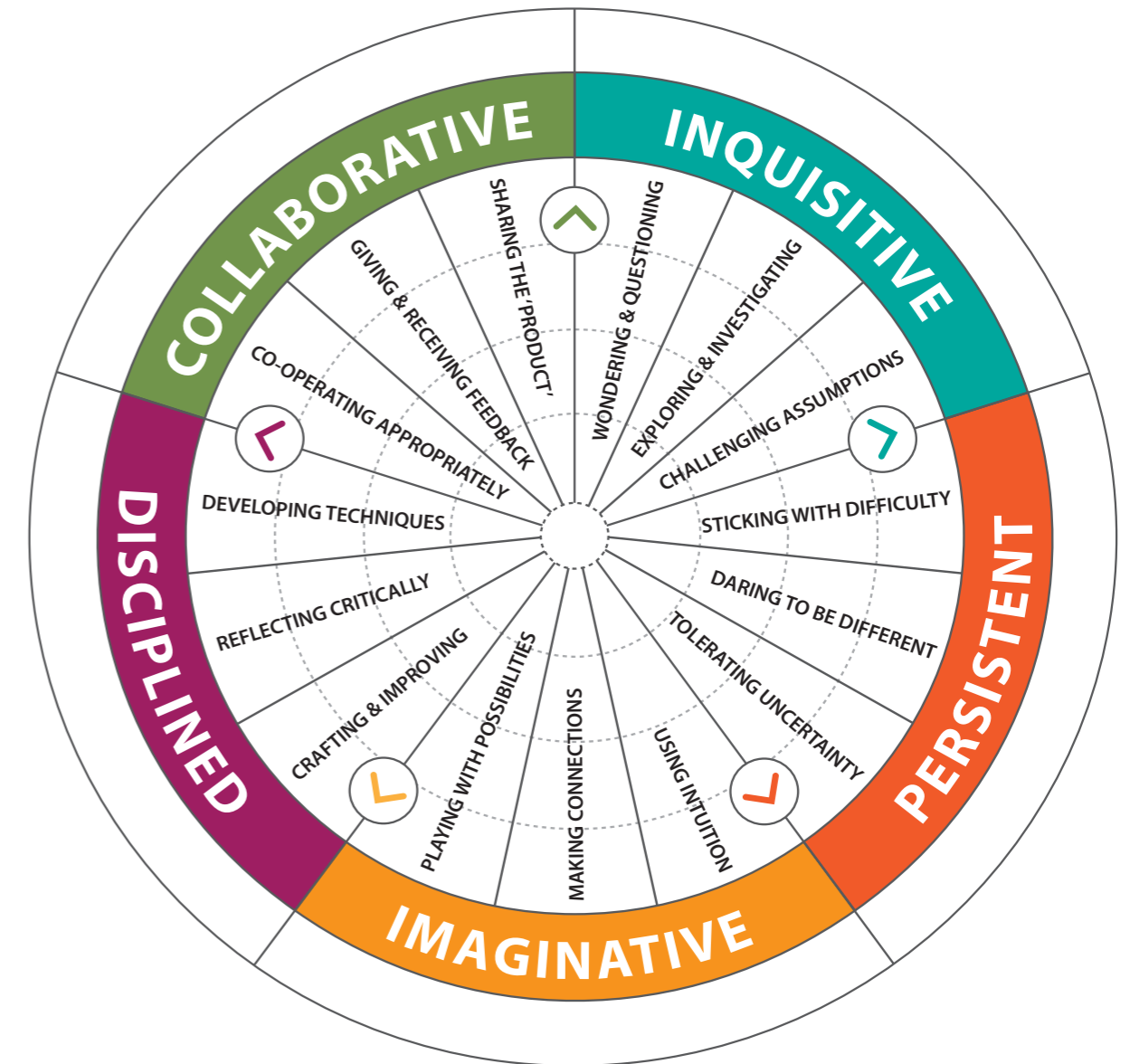
