

Mishmash Productions and Nottingham City Libraries



Mishmash are working with Nottingham City libraries, Nottinghamshire libraries through Inspire and Leicestershire Libraries on a new Commission which is a lovely production called Ruby's Worry. Empathy Lab – Reading, Empathy & Wellbeing Online CPD training for up to 7 teachers Wednesday 12 June, 4 – 6pm

A free 2-hour online training session delivered by Empathy Lab co-founder Sarah Mears.

This engaging session is informal and interactive utilising multi media, case study films from teachers and practitioners along with opportunities for discussion in breakout sessions.

The session will incorporate some background learning and key research into the importance of empathy in society:

- What is empathy?
- Why reading is crucial to building empathy skills and understanding
- How reading for empathy can support social and emotional skills and children's wellbeing

We will then look at how we can put the learning into practice to embed empathy within schools and libraries: - Practical ideas on how teachers and library staff can creatively use books and reading to build empathy

Lakeside Arts

Lakeside Arts is the University of Nottingham's public art centre. Schools can book visits and have storytelling and visual arts workshops at the venue. Lakeside can also come to your school. The current exhibition, opening soon, is about Boots – and how the shopping experience has changed over the years.

Lots of free activities for families over the summer too – including <u>Monster Fun</u> – Inflatable Monsters will appear across Lakeside this Summer.

From September to January, there's going to be a Paula Rego and Grayson Perry exhibition in the Djanogly Gallery. Paula's work is all about fairy tales, nursery rhymes and characters – so we'll be looking at prints and have lots of fun creating workshops and activities around that.

The Storm Whale, by Benj Davis, will be the Christmas children's production this year and Rachel is looking for teachers who would like to be part of Lakeside's school installation for Christmas. She's hoping to work with at least 14 schools to help create an installation for the Warner Gallery and take part in workshops too.

National Justice Museum and City of Caves

The National Justice Museum (formerly Galleries of Justice) is the one stop shop for all things crime and punishment. Their education programme is from KS1 up to postgraduate studies. Schools can book visits, take part in courtroom trails, meet the Georgian and Victorian characters and learn about crime and punishment through time. NJM also run the City of Caves (a 5 min walk) – where there are archaeological activities.

Particularly wanted to share the opportunity for year 5 upwards to come and see the **Choices and Consequences exhibition**, developed in partnership with the Ben Kinsella Trust following the murder of Ben at age 16. **This is free for schools** and there's also £100 contribution towards travel. Ideal for ages 9 – 14, specifically aimed at young people who are unlikely to have considered carrying a knife. It's educating and empowering young people about positive friendships and making positive choices. The latest knife crime guidance for schools and education providers was launched at NJM in October. Choices and Consequences is named as one of the universal and approved offers within that guidance. There is plenty of availability for the summer term – possibly following SATs – it would be great to see lots of Yr 6 classes coming. Jo also invited teachers to book a pre-visit if they'd like to see it first before bringing a group.

Ignite Futures and Nottingham City Museums and Galleries – Urban Nature Project

Catriona Kelly is the programmes officer at Ignite, an education charity in Nottingham. They are currently working with Nottingham City Museum's to promote the Urban Nature Project. The Urban Nature project is a national programme led by the National History Musuem and it's being delivered locally by Nottingham City Museums at Wollaton Hall, Nottingham Castle and Newstead Abbey from now until the end of July (this academic year). You can choose from any of those 3 venues.

The programme is designed for children aged 9-14 to engage with nature and is specifically targeting young people in areas of low connectedness to nature. It's very flexible, and the sessions can be planned around what's suitable for your schools and pupils. Another option is that the team can come to your school and deliver hands on activities within the school grounds (six weeks with smaller groups such as an eco club or STEM club).

CPD is also available for your staff focusing on environmental field work. You can also borrow equipment. Within the project, students can also be put forward for CREST awards – and it's all free until the end of this academic year (if you're in an area of multiple deprivation, levelling up area or from a SEND school). There are also contributions for travel.

The team are now taking bookings for Mondays, Tuesday and Wednesdays throughout the term until the end of July, and they are very flexible on the length of sessions, so get in touch to agree a plan that will work best for your school. Please contact Sue.Mallender@nottinghamcity.gov.uk to book.

Julian Abraham 'Togar': REXONCILIATION

Togar will create a participatory environment centred around a chorus of automated instruments, re-imagined synthesisers, keyboards, ocean drums and live percussive interventions with the aim of offering audiences the chance to 'co-experiment, co-explore, co-imagine, co-produce'.

<u>Claudia Martínez Garay: WAKCHAKUNA / We who share everything and nothing</u> Encompassing painting, sculpture, printmaking, video and site-specific installation. Sculptural works most often reference pre-Columbian aesthetics, particularly artefacts from the Incan civilisation. Artefacts, cultural relics and propaganda communicate the history and social political memory of cultures.

Hamid Zénati: Two steps at a time

Algerian- German artist Hamid Zénati works across textiles, fashion and ceramics to wearable sculpture and photography. He creates an abstract visual language through his wealth of forms, patterns and combinations of colour, material and technique.

Suitable for all educators, including Early Years and SEN/D practitioners, teachers of all Key Stages, tutors at FE and HE and early career teachers.

Cultural Guarantee Pilot - ChalleNGe

ChalleNGe is working with ten primary schools to better understand the potential for Nottingham schools to embrace a 'Cultural Guarantee' for pupils through a pilot programme that is enabling schools to go on additional visits to arts and cultural venues in Nottingham this year and next.

We heard from Jo Hale, Deputy Head at Southwark Primary, about their experience so far.

Southwark Primary is a big school, 700 pupils, 50% Pupil premium. 'We try and do as many things as we can to widen their cultural capital and give them as many opportunities as possible. But as always, funding is always a bit of a sticky point and trying to get money in and do all these lovely things is sometimes difficult. So this has been really, really brilliant."

"We wanted to get the children out and we wanted them to be inspired by art and then come back into school and do something based on what they've found and what they've seen."

Southwark are having an art week, and Year 1s are working with an artist in school – looking at JW Turner and linking to emotions and painting. And they've created some lovely landscapes from that. Year two are linking their artwork to their topic based on Seasides.

Year 3s and 4s are going to Wollaton Hall and having a look around the exhibitions there – and will be creating work based on animals, camouflage and colours. Years 5 and 6 are going to be going to the New Art Exchange.

"So there's lots going on, we're really, really busy but this is a really great opportunity for them to get out and see art, not just seeing art as a picture on a wall, but also experiencing different art. They'll be doing lots of printing as well, also some videography."

ChalleNGe is working with Dee Kalakoti, a Freelance Video Producer to capture school trips, document and advocate for the Cultural Guarantee Pilot. www.deekalakotivideoproduction.co.uk

Sally Cooke has been working on the <u>Fashion Fictions</u> Project, a speculative design project, which has been running since 2000. It invites people to write, explore and enact fictional worlds in which we live very differently with our clothes. It takes a novel approach to fashion sustainability issues, using playfulness and creativity to generate ideas.
