FROM the PASTOR

The pursuit of history is more important now than ever before. I say that with confidence because the pace of history-making events is more rapid than ever. Likewise, the pace of cultural and technological change. Neil Postman, (of whom I am a big fan of, by the way), writes of this. Currently, this pace seems to be frantic, putting us at risk of focusing so much on the constant changes we face, to the extent that we forget from where we've come. 


Tie Blankets: Service Night
