### Good turnout at museum's remembrance service

A special remembrance service was held at Rougham Tower Museum at the weekend to mark the anniversary of when the United States Army Air Forces left RAF Bury St Edmunds at the end of World War Two in 1945.

About 40 people, including the Mayor of St Edmundsbury Cllr Margaret Marks, gathered in memory of those who sacrificed their lives during the conflict as well as in World War One. Andrew Caldecott, trustee of the museum, said: "It's one of those days when you really do appreciate the value of what was done for us by those American GIs and all the rest. It was a solemn but happy day, as remembrance events are." The day also saw chairman Graham Sage lay wreaths on behalf of all at the museum, while presentations were given by Cliff Hall and Linda Scoles.

#### An Email from Frank Crosby - 07 01 2019

We met regarding the Bury Guildhall project but I'm writing to about about a different matter now. Lester Frank Stanford served at Rougham (he called it Bury St Edmunds) flying B-26s as part of the 9AF and then operated from France post- D-Day. He died last year in Toronto and his wife Mary has asked me to find a suitable home for his uniform which I now have here in the UK. He remained in the USAF reserve into the 1950s and this is his post 1947 Major's air force blue dress uniform. He was highly decorated (69 WW2 missions) and the uniform has the medal ribbons, some earned while flying from Rougham, still in place. He visited your museum with a group a few years back, I'm told. Is his uniform something that your museum might like, given his Rougham link? Kind regards Frank



#### Lester F Stanford, born Feb 15 1920, died May 26 2018.

Les, as he was known, joined up in 1942 following Pearl Harbor and got his wings, and a commission, in the United States Army Air Force in January 1943. He trained on B-26 Marauders and was assigned to the 451st Squadron, 322nd Group (Medium Bombardment) which was based at RAF Bury St Edmunds (Rougham). He arrived in Britain in May 1943 and was in his second week of Combat Crew Training when fellow Rougham squadrons lost 10 Marauders on one mission. After some months of combat experience Les was transferred from the 322nd to the 391st and racked up a total of 40 missions before going back to the US on leave. He returned to the UK just before the 391st moved, post D-Day, to Roye Ami in France. He flew a further 29 missions. He was discharged in December 1945 but was soon active again in the Air Force reserves in which he served with distinction until finally retiring with the rank of Major in 1964. Post-war Les became involved in television, first in New York and then in Toronto. He maintained his interest in and support for aviation heritage until his death.

After his 69th and final mission, Les' crew chief gave him the parachute release handle he'd never had to use in combat and that unique artefact is part of the collection presented to the museum.

## Front Cover Story

We received an email from Mrs Joanne Carbonella Lledaras from Massachusetts USA, asking for a wreath to be laid on the Memorial on Saturday, March 23<sup>rd</sup> in memory of her Uncle, Joe Carbonella, a waist gunner of the 410<sup>th</sup> Squadron.

Joanne has spent many years tracing the crew members families and has found and contacted them all.

His aircraft crashed on that day in 1944 in the North Sea after a mission to Brunswick, Germany.

On the return journey they were badly damaged by enemy fire and unable

to make England, belly landed into the sea.

An escorting P47Thunderbolt fighter reported the crash and observed 3 crew evacuate the aircraft, and 2 more in a dingy; the fighter pilot dropped another life raft but had to leave the scene owing to a lack of fuel.

An Air Sea Rescue boat was dispatched to the area but on the way caught fire, exploded and sank. Another launch was assigned and picked up 3 members of the first boat, proceeding to the area of the B17 crash but after a considerable search failed to find the wreck or any of the crew, the boat then searched for an another B17 crash, but as before no wreckage or crew members were found.

To mark this poignant occasion the committee invited staff and pupils from the nearby Sybil Andrews Academy, the academy standing on what was the airfield area for the 410<sup>th</sup> Squadron. With the assistance of two history teachers and four pupils, each child read out two names of the crew, the teachers reading out the Pilots and Tail Gunners name. A

A wreath, on behalf of the families of the crew, and crosses, one for each crew member, were then laid at the Memorial.



## Friday 1st March

A group of 14 serving personnel from RAF Mildenhall, including 2 LT/COLS, a couple of Majors, and pilots from both KC135 a/c and Ospreys, utilized our site for the morning.

Whilst on the tour of the control tower, on the roof, Mike and I were invited to attend an impromptu meeting with the group! It was an honour being requested to stay, and interesting to say the least. This group photo, in all the years of the memorials existence, within its curtelege is the first!

### Tower Manager's Report

The Signal and Control room walls have been painted; the Signals Room now displays the donated uniforms from the States. Improvements to the display area and updated security have transformed this room.

As the airfield, then known as RAF Bury St Edmunds, was initially built as a night bomber station for the RAF, a decision was made to highlight this part of its history. We hope the items donated in the above article will aid with this.

In the Control Room, three long wooden cases were created to sit alongside the interior wall to protect their contents from the possible ingress of damp and moisture.

The four display cases that originated from Index (a jeweller's shop in Bury that closed) are now positioned alongside the northern wall and containing displays that are not so susceptible to moisture, together with the airplane propeller.
