


Feedback Opportunity Distribution Methods

- **City of Dallas:** City communications (including City Manager newsletter) and social media
- **Dallas Public Library:** Email distribution, in-person signage in library locations, social media, and paper copies available
- **Friends of the Dallas Public Library:** Press release/media advisory, email distribution (including City Council members), Friends groups, neighborhood associations/online forums, social media, board member email/text campaigns, and social media ads

Sample

An online open link to the feedback opportunity was distributed by the Friends of the Dallas Public Library, the Dallas Public Library, and the City of Dallas.

A print version was also available at library locations.

Respondents chose their preferred language, English (99%) and Spanish (1%).

Note:

As this open-link resident input feedback opportunity was not a formal statistically valid survey, the insights and opinions collected from the 4,000+ respondents are not a representative sample of all Dallas residents.




Probolsky Research is a Latina- and woman-owned market and opinion research firm with corporate, election, government, and non-profit clients.

Nearly all respondents say the Dallas Public Library is important


Question 1: How important are Dallas Public Libraries to you?





Question 1: How important are Dallas Public Libraries to you?







Question 1: How important are Dallas Public Libraries to you?





94% of respondents feel informed about the services offered by the Dallas Public Library


Question 2: How informed do you feel about what the Dallas Public Library offers?





Question 2: How informed do you feel about what the Dallas Public Library offers?







Question 2: How informed do you feel about what the Dallas Public Library offers?






85% of respondents use Dallas Public Library services at least once a month

Borrowing books, DVDs, and other materials is the most widely used service by respondents



Question 4: Which library services do you or your household use? Select all that apply.



Most respondents say they face no barriers to using the library more often, 26% cite lack of time



Question 5: What, if anything, prevents you from using the library more often? Select all that apply.



Access to books, information, and learning is seen as the library's most important role by respondents


Respondents use all libraries - Renner Frankford is cited as the most frequently visited by respondents

97% of respondents say public library funding should be maintained or increased with 87% saying funding should be increased


Question 8: Funding for the Dallas Public Library system comes from the City government. Thinking about City funding for the public library, do you think funding should be:

























Question 9: Do you support or oppose this proposed model which would close four branch libraries while expanding hours and programs at five branch libraries in the City?




53% of respondents would still oppose closing some libraries even to avoid reductions in hours, staffing, and services at every remaining library

Question 10: If closing some libraries allowed the Dallas Public Library to avoid reductions in hours, staffing, and services at every remaining library, would that change your view?







Many respondents shared how they would be affected by the proposed branch closures and additional concerns



92% of respondents agree the City of Dallas should prioritize additional funding to maintain neighborhood libraries


Question 12: Agree or disagree: The City of Dallas should prioritize additional funding to maintain neighborhood libraries and avoid closures.














78% of respondents rank increasing City funding to avoid closures and major service reductions as their 1st choice

Question 13: If you had to prioritize, please rank the following options in terms of your preferences?




39% of respondents rank number of library locations as their 1st choice to protect

Willingness of respondents to travel to a library if their neighborhood libraries close is mixed


Question 15: If your nearest neighborhood library were no longer open, how willing would you be to travel to a library that is open seven days a week?











Question 15: If your nearest neighborhood library were no longer open, how willing would you be to travel to a library that is open seven days a week?






82% of respondents are likely to drive to a regional or flagship library rather than using some other form of transportation

Question 16: How would you most likely travel to a regional or flagship library that is open seven days a week? Select all that apply.




72% of respondents are willing to travel 15 minutes or less to reach a library they use regularly

Question 17: Approximately how long would you be willing to travel to reach a library you use regularly?




90% of respondents have reliable access to a car for personal transportation

Question 18: Do you have reliable access to a car for personal transportation?




25% of respondents would consider using public transportation to visit a library if travel time is 30 minutes or less

66% of respondents say extended library hours are important


Question 20: How important are extended evening hours at libraries?











Question 20: How important are extended evening hours at libraries?





62% of respondents say being open seven days a week is important


Question 21: How important is having libraries open seven days a week?





Question 21: How important is having libraries open seven days a week?










Most respondents are likely to visit the library during weekends

Question 22: When are you most likely to visit the library? Select all that apply.




41% of respondents prefer traditional library locations, and there is broad interest in library services at alternative locations

Top considerations for City leaders include: Libraries are vital to the community, keep libraries open, and increase library funding






