One critical aspect of our Library system is that people are not using it simply to check out books, but are using the facilities as a resource for upskilling and job search activities, as well as an outlet for educational programming for children. As a council member, I'll focus my efforts on increasing these parts of the operating budget, as I believe people will need these options as we come out of the pandemic. When it comes to funding at libraries, dollar amounts that may seem small - compared to the overall budget - can have big impacts for our city.

The cost to provide these materials continues to increase. Will you commit to support a budget that provides the library the resources it needs to meet our community's needs?
