Library Programs

Dallas Public Library provides GED classes, preschool storytimes, English Language Learning classes, promoted adult literacy, offers small business support, free internet access and assists with resumes, job searches and job applications FOR FREE to all Dallas residents. Several facts suggest more services are needed:

- Dallas has the third-highest poverty rate among U.S. cities with populations larger than 1 million people.*
- Dallas has the highest child poverty rate among those cities.*
- Dallas has the lowest percentage of adults who have a high school diploma among 22 peer cities nationally.*

Libraries are an important resource for children. Through private funding the Dallas Public Library offers FREE preschool programs, hosts the SMART Summer Reading Program, provides computer and Wi-Fi access. Do you support the library providing programs for our youngest citizens?

Libraries are also critical resources to Dallas's senior population; however, funding for senior programs is limited to private sources. Do you agree that it is important to increase public funding for senior programs at the Dallas Public Library?

Program funding is paid for by private funding obtained by the nonprofit Friends of the Dallas Public Library, not by tax dollars. The city does not pay for these library programs and services. Do you agree that some public funding should be allocated to programming at the Dallas Public Library?

Compared to peer cities like Phoenix, San Diego, Denver and Detroit, the Dallas Public Library is one of the poorest funded library systems per capita. Do you feel that Dallas deserves a better funded library system?

Following the 2008-2009 financial crisis, the Dallas Public Library's budget was cut by 40%, which led to Dallas library hours being cut dramatically and the loss of 50% of the staff. Budget cuts continued through 2011-2012. Finally, in 2014, the City of Dallas committed to restore the library's budget.

With its current operating budget, in 2019, the Dallas Public Library did some amazing things including:

- Over 11 million people visited a Dallas Public Library location or accessed the library online
- Nearly 500,000 attended a program or event at one of the 29 branch locations
- More than 11 million items circulated with an additional 3.5 million digital items checked out
- 85,000 children and caregivers attended a literacy program at a library
- Library staff connected over 1,000 people to social services and provided over 3,200 programs for library customers experiencing homelessness
- Over 25,000 adults attended English Language Learning, Basic Reading, GED and citizenship classes
- 213 people received their GED through Dallas Public Library
- Launched Applied English classes at 8 branches which help participants practice their English language skills while doing practical activities such as filling out standard forms, grocery shopping and banking.

- Library visitors logged nearly 450,000 hours of computer time
