



I think the \$15 million for renovations to library buildings in the 2024 bond should be a starting point for library funding. I would like to see additional money go to programming and paying competitive salaries to staff with a living wage and proper benefits.

At its core, the Dallas Public Library system provides a space for City of Dallas residents to exist in a safe and welcoming environment. It is something we all pay into and benefit from, and it is available to all for no additional fees beyond the taxes we all pay. It provides educational materials and events to residents from toddlers to seniors. I take my own children to the North Oak Cliff Branch Library for events and books.

Additional Comments

I am a "Close Friend" member of the Friends of the North Oak Cliff Branch Library. Supporting the programming they do for my community is important to me, and I intend to make sure the potential renovation at this branch goes well. The North Oak Cliff Branch Library is the only public library in District 1, but it is important for any District 1 Council Member to support funding for the entire system, especially Hampton-Illinois and Arcadia Park as many of my constituents are closer to those branches even though they are in District 3.
