There are many tasks done by volunteers that keep the FAA running. Two of these come up every month. The first is assisting with take-in. Some of us volunteer every month for this, but occasionally something comes up so we can't be there on that 1st Monday of the month. There are five basic jobs.

She believes that the arts have a major role to play as a tool for raising awareness of the effects of global warming and the consequences of human activity on our planet. I hope my finished paintings capture the essence of the place and share that story with the viewer."

Coming in April - Five Day Art Extravaganza

One of several missions with which FAA is tasked is to engage with and provide art experiences for the public. By doing this, our goals are to let people know the organization exists and to encourage folks to participate with us in our art journeys by joining FAA.

This event will take place from Wednesday, April 16 through Sunday, April 20. Each day will feature different art demos in a variety of mediums and handson activities for both adults and children. Each day will be divided into two sessions, 10:00AM- 12 noon and 1:00PM - 3:00 PM.

At present the line-up includes painting demos in all mediums, creating small items in air dry clay and polymer clay, the opportunity to sit for a quick-draw portrait, how to cartoon, create an abstract watercolor with just paint and a straw, make a shark pop-up card, print with a Gelli plate, marbling with acrylic paint, spin sheep's wool into yarn, sidewalk chalk art, and origami animals.

Members are volunteering to carry out these various demos/hands-on activities. I still have slots to fill. Even if you do not wish to do a demo (basically you will just be there doing your own thing while people watch) or be the lead facilitator for hands-on activities, we need "sidekicks", i.e. helpers to assist the lead if the numbers of participants overwhelm, help keep supplies organized, help keep space cleaned up after an activity and so on.

Stop Waiting For Your Art To Be "Good Enough"

Jason Horejs from Xanadu Gallery in Scotsdale offers these thoughts:

"Many artists believe that only the very best, most technically proficient artists will get gallery representation and sell their art. If you're waiting for your work to reach some imagined level of perfection before you begin putting it out there, you could be holding yourself back in a big way.

There's a natural tendency for artists to strive for perfection in their work. It's part of what makes you an artist—the desire to create something exceptional. But if you're waiting to achieve perfection before you're willing to share, show, or sell your work, you might be waiting a long time.

When a gallery considers representing an artist, they're not expecting absolute technical perfection. What they're really looking for falls into three categories: marketability, consistency, and professionalism.

Marketability: Galleries need to show work that will appeal to their buyers. Art buyers are an incredibly diverse group of people, and often, a piece of artwork that you or I might have doubts about will be the exact piece a buyer falls in love with. If your work interests you, it's likely going to resonate with others, too. You need to give galleries the opportunity to see your work and share it with their collectors.

Consistency: If a gallery sees marketability in your work, they'll want to know that you can consistently create more pieces in the same style or theme. Consistency is important because collectors often want to follow an artist's body of work over time. If a gallery can count on you to produce cohesive and consistent work, it builds trust and creates opportunities for future sales.

Professionalism: When a gallery represents you, they're entering into a partnership with you. They want to work with artists who communicate well, deliver on promises, and are reliable and easy to work with. Being a professional in the art world is just as important as the work you create. A gallery wants to know that you'll be a good partner over the long term.

If you're waiting to reach some level of artistic perfection before you start putting your work out there, you're missing out on valuable feedback and growth opportunities. Getting your work in front of buyers and gallery owners will help you gain perspective on how your art is received."
