Wanna Hang Out? Follow These Guidelines

When you frame your work, measure from the top of the frame to the bottom and divide by three to determine the distance 1/3 of the way from the top. Install your D-rings at this point, thread the free end of your wire through the right hand D-ring, then through the left hand ring and secure it by wrapping. Holding the other end of the wire on the right, pull at the center of the wire until it is 3" below the top of your frame, then fold the wire over the ring to hold in place. Cut the wire leaving enough length to wrap securely around the existing wire. Using blue painter's tape or, better yet, artist tape, wrap around the cut ends to prevent getting fingers cut.

Help Our Hanging Crew

Our wonderful hanging crew works hard to get all works up quickly and present them in the best possible way. It's a big job. You can help by following the wire guidlines in a previous article and for work requiring glass, if your work is 24" x 30" or larger, use plexiglass. Works should weigh no more than 15 lbs. Some of the pieces we have been getting in are quite heavy and although our hanging crew is as careful as they can be, accidents do happen, and it's very upsetting. That is why we have a waiver to protect our take in and hanging volunteers who do an amazing job every month!

Thoughts on Composition

This excerpt from an article written by a gentleman named Christopher Volpe may be of interest to you:

Here's an old but sound definition: "Composition is the orderly and harmonious grouping and arranging of lines and masses so that they will present a pleasing relation to one another. Unless the various parts of a design or picture are so arranged, they are simply isolated parts and have nothing of interest or value."

A good composition establishes dynamic relationships between the elements of a picture. Of the many compositional strategies artists have discovered, these are three of the simplest and most widely useful:

- * Steelyard
- * Pyramid
- * Circular

THE STEELYARD

The steelyard composition sounds like it emerged from the gritty early modern-art scene of the 1910s-1930s. However, as I understand it, it's not named after a horrible place to work, but after a balance-type weighing device invented by the ancient Romans. I'd been led to believe at one point that is was named for an artist by that name who often used the composition, but I think someone just didn't know about the Roman-style scale.

The steelyard composition creates balance between two or more elements that are very different from each other. Usually, it's one large mass counter-balanced on a theoretical fulcrum by a smaller mass, often further away from the center. This composition creates balance while avoiding monotony, generates a mild but lively tension between forms and is one of the most common & effective compositional strategies

The steelyard is a great way to create interest in your designs through asymmetry, which brings with it a healthy degree of tension between the related yet "mismatched" elements. Asymmetry, the opposite of mirror-image similarity, keeps things from getting boring and repetitive while still preserving a "harmonious grouping. It's a big part of creating variety, the lifeblood of composition.

For example, Rothko put the principles of composition to work in ways that Western art never had before. His compositions consist of two or three distinctly varied rectangular color fields, and within each one you see varied edges, shapes, proportions, paint density, color shading and lights and darks.
