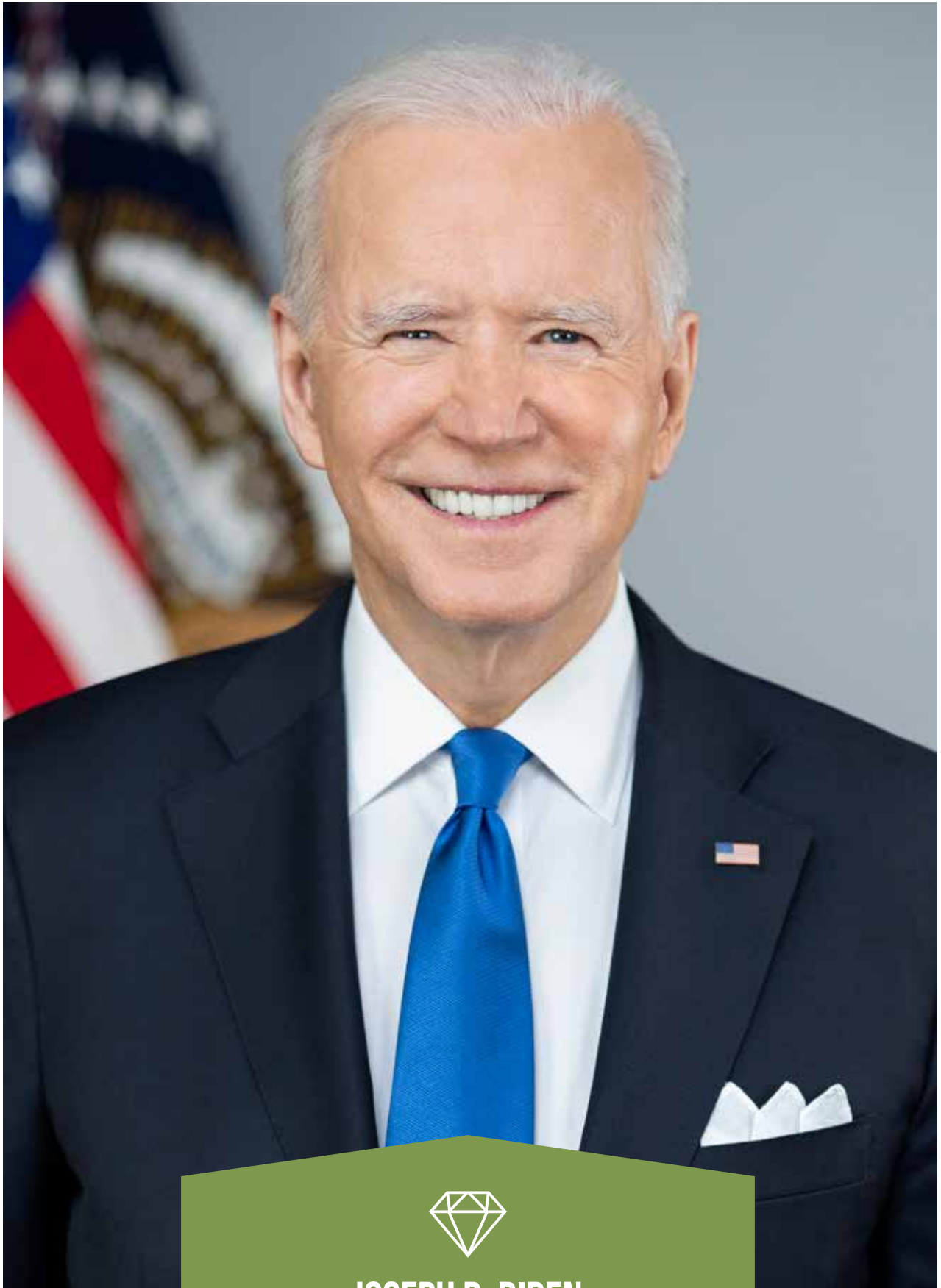

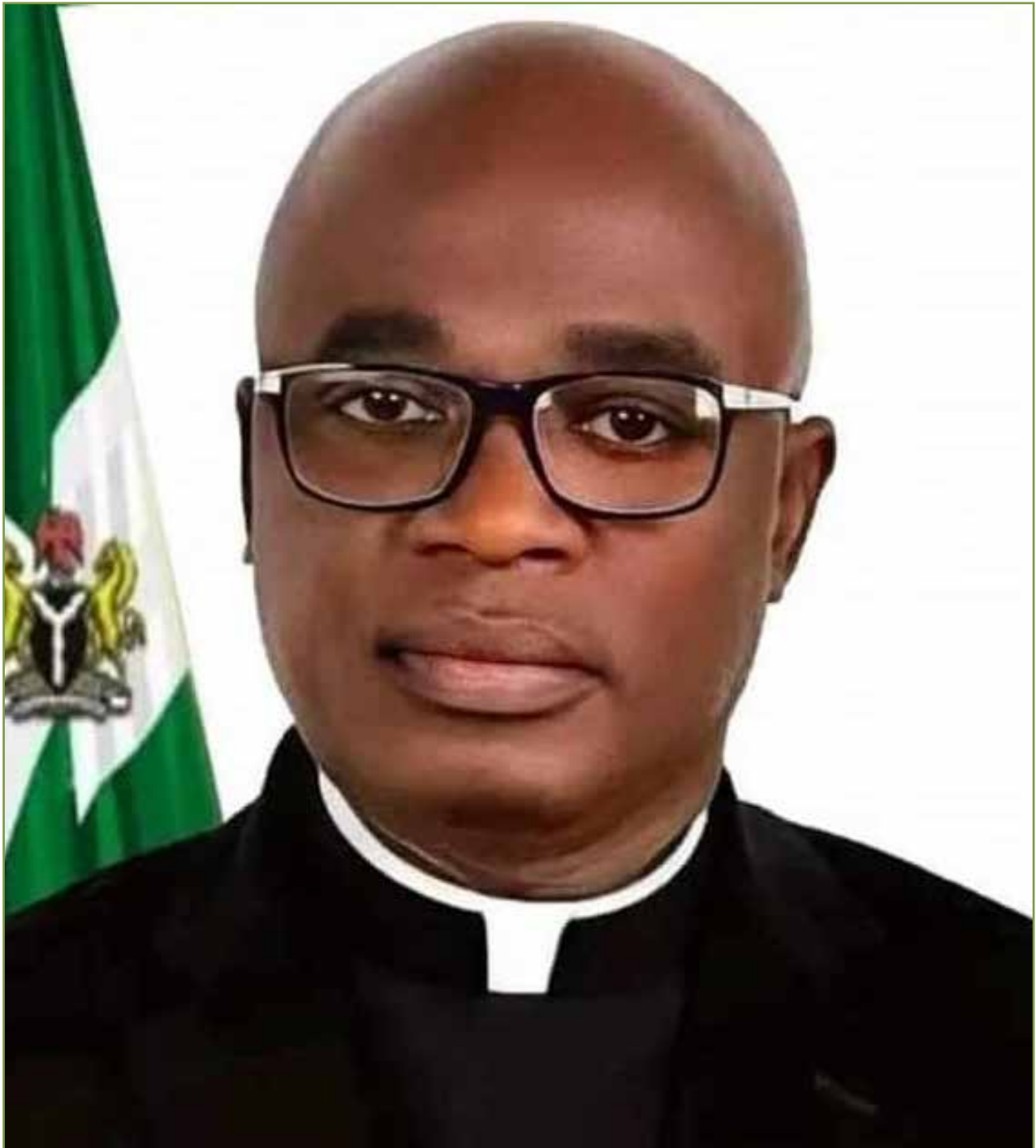

THE TIV PEOPLE OF NIGERIA

The Tiv people are the fourth largest ethnic group in the Federal Republic of Nigeria, trailing the Hausa/Fulani, Ibo, and Yoruba. Conservative estimates place the Tiv population at over 5 million. Nigeria boasts of a population of over 140 million spread among 350 ethnic groups. The Tiv people are indigenous to Benue, Nasarawa, and Taraba states. They occupy a land mass of over 100,000 square miles, and are spread globally.

Historically, the Tiv people originated from the south-central Africa with over 20 generations recorded from Tiv himself to the present. Although time has obscured the exact dates of the landmarks that make Tiv history, colonial historians made efforts to tally times with significant events that make the history of a nation factual. For example, evangelical historians have revealed that the migration of Tiv from the southern part of Central Africa began around 1800. By 1850 Tiv descendants were seen in large numbers in the south of what we now know as River Benue. Although a number of historians have given conflicting accounts of the migration of Tiv, two schools

of thought are always presented. One account is that about 200 years ago, the Tiv people commenced the migration from the Sonkwalla Hills. It would appear through historical records that these hills can be located some kilometers south-east of Udam from Gboko, the seat of the Tiv kingdom. Another account locates Swem Hill, also said to be migration point of the Tiv, about seventy kilometers further south-east from Sonkwalla Hills and goes further to assert that Tiv moved from there to Binda Hill. This conflict now stands as a challenge to the present generation of Tiv historians who are now saddled with the task of authenticating for future generations of Tiv.

From their modest beginnings, the Tiv people of Nigeria have made significant strides, and have entrenched themselves into the mainstream of Nigeria life. Tiv sons and daughters dot all parts of the world, and have made significant strides in all fields of human endeavor. The Tiv people now boast of producing the greatest concentration of well-educated Nigerians of any other ethnic groups.



TIV MUSIC AND DANCE



There are many types of dances in Tivland with fewer or several found in some clans. Popular Tiv dances include: Swange, Ijov-mbakugh, Ingyough, Kpingi, Takeri, Dasenda, Hinga, Tsuwe-tsele, Ibyumev, Anger, Girinya, Haagedege, as well as the Kwagh-hir art form.

ABOUT NIGERIA

The Federal Republic of Nigeria, situated in Western Africa, is bordered by Niger to the north, Chad and Cameroon to the east, the Gulf of Guinea to the south, and Benin to the west. With an estimated population of approximately 229.3 million people as of July 2024, Nigeria is the most populous country in Africa and accounts for about 2.8% of the world's total population. The country spans a land-mass of about 923,768 square kilometers (356,669 square miles), making it one of the largest nations on the continent by area. The name "Nigeria" is derived from its major river, the Niger. Abuja serves as the capital, while Lagos, the largest city, is a major economic hub.

Historically, the region now known as Nigeria was composed of various ethnically-based kingdoms and states. By 1906, it was brought under British colonial rule. Nigeria gained its independence on October 1, 1960. Post-independence, the country faced significant ethnic tensions, notably among the Yoruba in the southwest, the Ibo in the southeast, and the Hausa and Fulani in the north. These tensions culminated in a military rule period from 1966 to 1979. Notably, from 1967 to 1970, the southeastern region attempted to secede by forming the Republic of Biafra, but this secession effort was ultimately unsuccessful.

A brief return to civilian rule occurred between 1979 and 1983, ending with a military coup. In 1999, Nigeria transitioned to a new era of civilian governance with the election of President Olusegun Obasanjo. Currently, Bola Tinubu serves as the president of Nigeria, having assumed office on May 29, 2023. The governor of Benue State is Rev. Fr. Dr. Hyacinth Iormem Alia, who also assumed office on May 29, 2023, bringing a wealth of experience and commitment to progressive governance. This extensive historical and demographic overview highlights Nigeria's complex journey from colonial rule to its current status as a leading African nation, rich in cultural diversity and economic potential.

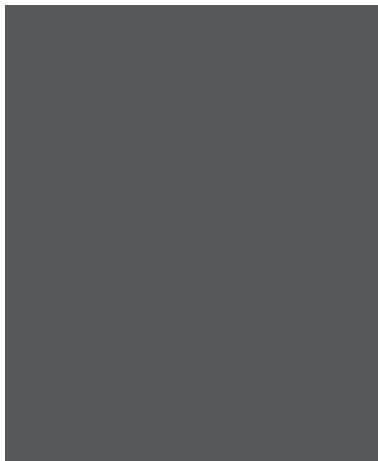
