#### What is an Endowment Fund?

We have made reference to the Friends' Endowment Fund at various locations throughout this newsletter. You may be asking yourself, "What is the Endowment Fund"? Simply put, it is our investment account. In our case, it is with the Arizona Community Foundation. The purpose of the endowment account is to help to secure the future of our library.

Our fund has an interesting history. In 2016, it started with a \$5000 legacy gift from Janet Krupp, a former Safford resident and business owner. To establish the fund, we needed \$25,000. How did that happen? It was through donations from our charter members; all 30 of them! Since then, the account has grown to \$125,000+. How does it continue to grow? Through continued donations! You can do that when you renew your membership. You can write a check anytime and earmark it for the Friends' Endowment Fund. Larger donations have been received through legacy gifts and life insurance policies, noting the Safford Friends of the Library as a beneficiary.

Please keep the Friends' Endowment Fund in mind when you are considering any level of donation. We are all in this together.



#### **GED Preparation Classes and Testing**

The library is happy to announce that in-person GED Preparation Classes are available for Graham and Greenlee Counties thanks to a grant from the

United Way! Whether you are brushing up on your skills to prepare for the test or taking the first steps toward



your future, this program is designed for you to succeed! Currently, hours are **Tuesday and Wednesday from 10 am – 6 pm**. Please expect a response within a week.

Additionally, the library is an official GED testing site, with *in-person testing available* **Mondays and Wednesdays from 3-7 pm.** Testing can be scheduled through **myGED.com** with tests costing \$41 (Math, Language Arts, Science, and Social Studies) and \$9 (Civics). # **Past Programs/Events**

#### **Winter Reading Challenge**

The library offered a Bundle Up with Books Reading Challenge for the month of January. The



program was intended to help children get back into the habit of reading 20 minutes per day after the holiday season. The goal of the program was to read 600 minutes throughout the month. At 200 point intervals, participants could earn small prizes. Of the 58 that participated in the program, 36 completed the challenge.

#### **Light Parade**

The library participated in the annual Light Parade on December 14<sup>th</sup>. Staff and volunteers were part of the



Library Precision Drill Cart team. The Light Parade allows the library to advertise its programs and services to a larger audience each year.

#### **Holiday Open House**

The library hosted its annual Holiday Open House on December 5<sup>th</sup>. Those that attended could participate in two crafts, the Exploration Space, and take a photo with Santa. The Friends of the

Library also hosted their annual bake sale with all proceeds going towards future library programs and services. Throughout the event, 150 came to take photos with Santa and participate in activities. Library staff



greatly appreciate the Friends of the Library and local bakers for their assistance in making the Holiday Open House a success!

#### **Library Weekly Programming**

The library completed its weekly fall programming session for elementary and teen audiences in



November. The K-3 grade program had four weeks of programming, including celebrating Dinovember with a fossil class day. They learned how different

types of fossils are formed, sorted the fossils, and made their own trace fossils to take home. The 4-6<sup>th</sup> grade program toured Italy through an art project, learning about volcanoes, and making pizza. In one of the teen programs, participants learned how to bake mini pumpkin pies in preparation for Thanksgiving.

The library is currently in its Spring Session of programs. Weekly Storytimes for ages 0-5 and their caregivers, elementary, and teen programs will continue until the end of April. #### **Yuyi Morales Exhibit**

The library hosted 10 classrooms totaling 468 students for the Yuyi Morales Art Exhibit in



November and December 2024. Classroom grade levels ranged from 2<sup>nd</sup>-6<sup>th</sup> grade, with six schools in the county sending at least one classroom to attend. Students learned art etiquette,

alliteration, and how to look for patterns within the work of one artist. Additionally, the library had programs for K-3, 4-6<sup>th</sup> grade as well as Storytimes, that visited the exhibits and learned more about Yuyi Morales and how her artwork reflects her life

experiences. The library also hosted an adult age program that delved deeper into the artists' use of color, iconography and symbolism.

Library staff would like to thank all of our docents that volunteered their time throughout the exhibits' stay. The library hopes to bring another exhibit from the National Center for Children's Illustrated Literature in the future.

## **Cooking Classes**

The library has hosted several classes on behalf of



the Cooperative
Extentension. Classes are
the first Wednesday of the
month at 10 am and 5 pm
with the same class
presented during each
session. Previous classes
have included Green Chili

Tamales, buttercream and cream cheese frosting recipes, shepards pie, candy and Meat 101. All programs consist of a demonstration and tasting of what was prepared, as well as a spice of the month sample that can be taken home, along with recipes using the spice.
