

### **DAR Presents Constitution Week Program!**

The Friends of the Library and the Gila Valley Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution will co-host this year's program entitled **"Honoring Our Constitution and Revolutionary Patriots**.



This lively event of historical interest will take place during Constitution Week on **Thursday, September 19th from 5:30 – 7:00 PM at the Safford Library Annex on 814 South Central Ave**, directly behind the train depot. All are invited to attend; admission is free. Refreshments will be provided by a chapter of great cooks and The Rustic Barn Bakery.

DAR's major mission is to remember the patriots who supported the cause for independence and gave us the freedom we experience today. DAR chapter librarian, **Ruth Hernandez**, with a passion for researching the truth behind our history, will present an overview about the very risky business in being a spy during the American Revolutionary War.

She will share stories about members of the notorious Culper Spy Ring, who were patriotic at times and not so much other times; smugglers, bandits, and privateers of Long Island Sound; and the horrific battles of New York and Long Island that almost caused total destruction of General George Washington's little army over a seven-year period. However, General Washington will be noted as a tough guy and an exceptional master at using spy strategies to help win the war.

Following this presentation, 20 children's books about spies during the revolution will be distributed to young people in the audience. Families are encouraged to attend in order to receive a copy. **Talana Hooper**, DAR chapter historian and well-known local historian, will **demonstrate clever ways spies used invisible ink and hidden messages in communicating topsecret messages to fellow spies.** 

Constitution Week observance was initiated by DAR in 1955 as a way to recognize the importance of the Constitution. In this chapter's Constitution Week program, local high school students, who are winners of the DAR Patriotic Essay Contest, will be recognized as portions of their essays are read about how their community or school has contributed to promoting a more perfect union.

This will be followed by the audience having an opportunity to answer questions about the US Constitution. Local Constitution historian, **Gary Burnett**, will be there to discuss and hand out Constitution booklets.

picture book art. Morales is a sixtime recipient of the prestigious Pura Belpre award and the first Latina to earn a Caldecott



honor for her book *Viva Frida*. This exhibit, featuring sixty-one pieces of Morales' original art from sixteen of her books, is set to be on display in the main area of the library and the program room from late-September through early December. During that time, the library will offer gallery hours to view the art, programming opportunities for all ages, and school tours. The library will make more announcements as programming draws closer. # **Cooperative Extension Camps**

The library hosted two camps for the Cooperative Extension at the Library Annex in June: Money

Masters and Food, Fun, and Fitness. Money Masters was for 4<sup>th</sup>-6<sup>th</sup>



graders for a 90 min block for a week. During the week they learned basic money concepts while participating in games and activities. Fun, Food, and Fitness was for two grade levels: 4<sup>th</sup>-6<sup>th</sup> grade, and teen audiences. The program was weekly for three weeks with attendees learning about nutrition and recipes while participating in physical activities. For all programs, 66 attended.

# **Oregon Trail Live**

The library had an Oregon Trail Live Program for those in grades 4th-12th, based on the popular



computer game. All 34 participants in teams of four or more had to complete several tasks to make it to

Oregon. Tasks included hunting, building shelter, creating a boat that could float, and roping. Along the way the groups also had to avoid a "snakebite," cholera, and typhoid.

# **Dolly Parton Celebration**

The library celebrated the 15th year of the Dolly Parton Imagination Program in Graham and Greenlee Counties the week of July 8th. Activities included Dolly themed StoryTimes and the



opportunity to write letters to Dolly, thanking her

for the impact she has made in creating home libraries. From July 2009 to June 2024, 11,376 children in Graham and Greenlee Counties have received a total of 358,973 books.

### **Trivia Night**



The library hosted its third trivia night, based on the Harry Potter novels, on July 11th. The 28 adults who attended participated individually or in teams through the Kahoot app. After answering 65 questions, the top three scorers selected Harry Potter themed items from the library's Makerspace. The next trivia night will be in Fall 2024 or Spring 2025.

#### Before the summer program: Reading Under the Stars



The library attended Jack Daley School's "Reading Under the Stars" event on May 6<sup>th</sup>. The event is held yearly to encourage families to read together. The library

was one of 6 local organizations selected to participate.

Once participants heard one story from each organization, they were able to receive a free book. For the event, the library saw 394 participants.

### **Teen Lock-In**

The library's Teen Advisory Group organized and hosted their first program on May 24<sup>th</sup>, the Teen Lock-In. The 20 that attended were able to play laser tag, board games, cards, watch Anime and go on a ghost tour of the library The Teen Advisory Group was started in February to help the library with creating programs and services for teen audiences. The group meets monthly through the



school year, with library staff attending meetings to provide guidance. Meetings will resume in August with the new school year.

Makerspace Open Hours are Tuesdays and Thursdays 5 – 7 pm. The Makerspace includes 3D printing, a Cricut machine, recording equipment and a Glowforge. Training is

## **Act One Culture Passes**

# **Library Podcast**



The library records a monthly podcast, titled Safford Library Book Jockeys. The podcast features information about library programs and services, book recommendations, and the

- C. To create public awareness of the role of the library in the community.
- D. To provide financial support to complement the library's budget.
- E. To encourage gifts and endowments for the library.
- F. To promote and direct individual talent into projects benefiting the library.
- G. To participate in activities which support library programming.

Many wonder what our relationship is to the library. This is spelled out in our constitution.

The Friends of the Safford City - Graham County Library

- A. Is an independent organization working with the library.
- B. Does not exist to operate the library.
- C. Will consult with the library on the use of space, equipment and services.
- Does its fundraising independently of the Safford City - Graham County Library.

Members support events, serve on the board, volunteer for special activities and advocate in the community for our library.
