DAR Constitution Week Program!



The Friends of the Library and the Gila Valley Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution will co-host this year's program, not only on the U.S. Constitution and

revolutionary patriots, but will also look ahead to America's 250th celebration.

This special event of historical interest will take place during DAR's Constitution Week on Thursday, September 18th from 5:30 – 7:00 PM at the Safford Library Annex on 814 South Central Ave. All are invited to attend; admission is free. Refreshments will be provided by a chapter of great cooks and The Rustic Barn Bakery.

DAR is gearing up for the 250th celebration of our country's birthday in 2026. Cindy Clonts, DAR chapter vice regent, will highlight DAR plans for this event and help create an awareness of this patriotic milestone.

Paula Price, a DAR member with a passion for history, will share well-known events that led up to the writing of the Declaration of Independence and heart-rendering stories of the sacrifices of the signers. This will be followed by an awareness of the numerous ups and downs of that document after it was signed in 1776.

Following this presentation, twenty books about the journey of the Declaration of Independence will be distributed for young people as well as adults in the audience. Families are encouraged to attend in order to receive a copy.

Talana Hooper, DAR chapter historian and well-known local historian, will share stories of two of the thirty revolutionary patriots who are in her family line. Those stories will demonstrate the sacrifices made by those who fought for the freedoms that have been passed down through the generations.

Ruth Hernandez, DAR chapter librarian and another passionate historian, will show that two or more cultures within a family line can have those who supported America's move toward independence. Seventeen of her patriots are in her mother's English line. Ruth will share one of those patriots who survived many tragedies in his lifetime.

Observing Constitution Week, which was initiated by DAR in 1955, is a way to remember the importance of the US Constitution. During this program, local high school students, who are winners of the DAR Chapter Patriotic Essay Contest, will be recognized by DAR scholarship chair, Helen Masten, as portions of their essays are read about how the Constitution protects their personal freedoms.

Discover Exoplanets Exhibit September 8th to November 20th



Join us in exploring Discover Exoplanets! This exhibit brings the excitement of exoplanets (planets outside our solar system) and NASA's Universe of Learning to rural and underserved communities by providing local organizations with physical resources and an ongoing relationship with NASA. The national traveling exhibition explores space and astronomy, covering topics such as the search for habitable worlds, how NASA scientists are searching for these worlds, and how they may be like our own. It features hands-on, multimedia activities where visitors can build their own solar systems, see the most recent NASA discoveries, and learn whether popular TV and movies are fact or fiction.

GED Community Graduation



The library hosted a GED Community Graduation on Wednesday, June 25th. Sixteen GED graduates

and their families, totaling 167, celebrated their accomplishment. To attain a GED in Arizona, participants must take and pass five tests:
Civics, Math, Science, Social Studies and Language Arts. Tests cover a wide range of concepts, including writing an essay, geometry, chemistry and other topics. Several speakers shared their own GED journey and how difficult it could be at times to juggle family, work, and

school responsibilities. The library would like to thank the City of Safford, United Way of Graham and Greenlee Counties and Safeway for contributing to the program. The library hopes to have a GED graduation each year.

Summer Reading Program

The library celebrated summer reading this year with the theme Color Our World. There were many ways to participate during the seven-week program. Activities included StoryTimes, a Family Art Night, Yarn Art, Elementary and Teen Progams, a Puzzle Race, Mini-Golf, Cooking classes, an Escape Room, A Duckoration Art Show and Reading!



School Field Trips

For the Spring semester, the library had 12 school visits from **Pima**, **Thatcher**, **Fort Thomas and Safford** school districts, with a total of 600 attending. School visits will resume in the fall with the Exoplanets Exhibit.

Most visits in the months of March and April were engineering field trips. Roller Coaster Engineering class. The 36 participants learned about the physics behind roller coaster design

and worked in teams to build their own coasters using pipe insulation and marbles.

All of Jack Daley's 1st grade classrooms came over two days in April for engineering, as well as Lafe Nelson's 2nd and 3rd grade classrooms. For the visit, all students rotated between 5 stations, with one including creating



a blueprint of their dream home.

Early Childhood Concert Series

The fourth annual Library of Congress Emerging Strategy Honoree Early Childhood Concert



Series was held April 1-3rd. Jazzy Ash was the artist chosen for this year's residency, with two additional outreaches to

local preschools added to the itinerary. The residency also included three performances at the Center for the Arts, one performance each at Metcalf Elementary (Morenci) and Duncan Elementary, as well as a teacher workshop. Classrooms and families attending a performance each received a free companion title, *I Got the Rhythm* by Connie Schofield-Morrison to add to their classroom and home libraries. In total, 2590 children and their families, and educators were able to participate in events between Graham and Greenlee Counties.

The library would like to thank the City of Safford, Library of Congress, Friends of the Safford Library, First Things First, Gila Valley Arts Council, United Way of Graham and Greenlee Counties, Graham County Superintendent's Office, and the Greenlee County Superintendent's Office for their support, as well as the Safford Unified School District for hosting Jazzy Ash at the Center for the Arts for three concerts.

Reading Under the Stars



Library staff attended Reading Under the Stars at Jack Daley Elementary School on May 5th. The library was one of six organizations invited to the annual activity. Staff alternated reading stories to students and their families.

After students listened to all organizations, they were able to take a book home to add to their home library. The library saw 281 individuals during the event.

GED Preparation Classes and Testing

The library continues to have in-person GED Preparation Classes are available for Graham



and Greenlee Counties thanks to a grant from the United Way and generous funding through the Friends of the Library! Whether you are

brushing up on your skills to prepare for the test or taking the first steps toward your future, this program is designed for you to succeed! Assistance is available Tuesdays through Thursdays. Additionally, the library is an official GED testing site, with in-person testing available Mondays and Wednesdays from 3-7 pm. Testing can be scheduled through myGED.com with tests costing \$41 (Math, Language Arts, Science, and Social Studies) and \$9 (Civics). Please contact the library with any questions at 928-432-4165.

Extension and Friends Night Out events hosted by the Friends of the Library. Check the library website, Facebook or Instagram for more information.


