

OUR RECENT PoD*'s

Our most recent PROBUS excursion took us to the Atlantic Cancer Research Institute located within the Dr. Georges L. Dumont University Hospital Centre in Moncton. This tour was certainly a unique and enlightening experience. Who knew that we have such a renowned cancer research facility right here in Moncton!





Remi Richard, Director of Operations and a knowledgeable and most enthusiastic guide, led us through a few areas of the five-story building where we viewed the offices and labs of some of the 120 or so dedicated researchers, support staff, and students who work there. We also saw and marveled at some of the six figure (and more!) equipment which facilitate all this cutting-edge research.



Since its inception in 1998 the institute has grown in personnel and in scope. Huge strides have been made in cancer detection and disease monitoring, which is now accomplished mainly through liquid biopsy; and great improvements in patient care have been implemented through discoveries in precision medicine (targeted treatment).

As we learned that day, all this research benefits immensely by the acquisition of blood donations from those who have not been diagnosed with cancer.

These samples allow them to compare the blood components of a person with a certain type of cancer to a similar (age/gender/etc.) person without. Anyone may contribute. You will be part of the quest for a cure.

*NOTE: PoD stands for *Probus on Discovery*, a term derived to indicate extracurricular activities for small groups, organized by club members (non-Management) for members at little or no cost to the participants. Quite often they add to an earlier club presentation to augment the topic addressed. Some are in such demand that a second group may be made available.

For over 100 years the YWCA has served as a multi-service agency offering programs and services, employment readiness, supportive housing to youth, activities, and more. They foster growth and development for women, children, and to spirit and gender-diverse individuals. The



programs include education and employment, supportive housing, early learning and childcare, community outreach, and youth. The YWCA is a home for all, but the focus is on women and families. Michelle Nadeau guided us through a few areas where we viewed the daycare and learning center, apartments, common room, and kitchen, where plant-based meals and snacks are prepared. The new **Probus Waterfront** club is thriving and now has just shy of 250 members.



Oh, What A Knight!

Kitchener war veteran who fought the Nazis is Now a Knight at 101

A Probus centenarian from Cambridge ON recently received the Legion of Honour from a grateful French nation for doing his job well in a war that still has him thinking. (By Jeff Outhit, Waterloo Region Record)

John Neu, 101, has concluded that living well is not about following faith or flags or fancy words.

"I've reduced my beliefs to a smaller thing," he said. "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

While it's not new advice, that doesn't make it any less sound. Plus, it comes from a knight.

France made John a *chevalier de la Légion d'honneur* this past July for helping to liberate that country from Nazi occupation in the Second World War. Chevalier means knight.

The Legion of Honour is France's highest order of merit, established by Napoleon Bonaparte in 1802. The French government has named more than 1,400 Canadian war veterans to the order since 2014 when a past French president pledged to honour surviving liberators. A medal comes with the award. Essentially, it means that John has become a Knight of the French Legion of Honour.

John has mixed emotions. He served in France in 1944, ordered to do his part from behind the front lines. He helped facilitate mail and communications to help keep army units supplied in the field. He always carried a sidearm as the war put him at risk while it raged around him, but others closer to battle faced greater dangers. More than 5,000 Canadians were killed liberating France.

"What did I ever do to get this medal? Nothing. I was there and I lived to this time," he said. Eighty years later, he's still trying to reconcile what he did with what he might have had to do.

Born into a German-speaking family in Romania in 1923, he immigrated to Kitchener as a child in 1930 — just in time to watch the Great Depression impoverish his family. He enlisted in

1942 at the age of 19, knowing nothing about politics and unconcerned about the fate of the free world. Rather, he and a buddy figured it would be an adventure to join the war and fly an airplane.

"I was a very innocent, stupid young man," he recalls.



The pair went to Hamilton intending to join the Royal Canadian Air Force. The air force took his friend but rejected John, citing medical reasons. He travelled to London to join the army instead, rising to the rank of staff sergeant and was sent to Antwerp, Belgium.

So many rockets hit Antwerp it became known as the city of sudden death. He remembers a V2 rocket killing a Canadian servicewoman across the street from where he was posted there.

John encountered starving Dutch civilians in the winter of 1944-45. Food was scarce in the last winter of the war. Little could be grown or bought after the enemy blew up dykes to flood fields and slow the Allied advance into the Netherlands.

He moved into enemy territory where he saw and smelled the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp operated by the Nazis. "I couldn't believe what those people did to their prisoners," he said, adding it sickened him, rattled his faith and shredded whatever was left of his innocence.

After the Nazis were defeated, John moved to Cambridge ON where he built a career in insurance.

These days, John ambles around the Kitchener apartment he shares with Sibylle, 77, his wife for the last ten years. Sibylle was born in occupied Germany in 1947 and immigrated to Canada in 1967. John was earlier widowed by the death of Mardi, his first wife.

He reads a lot, aiming to figure out life. Sibylle playfully goes back and forth with him. They kid each other, occasionally in German, which they share as their first language. Sibylle visited her German hometown with John after they married. She discovered a lovely historic building she admired from her childhood had been demolished. It turns out the Nazis used the building to experiment on children and to shuttle prisoners to concentration camps. No one told her this while she was growing up.

The Probus Club of Cambridge team swung into action last year to make the recent January event a reality. It's difficult to recall who did what to arrange for the marvelous presentation at the Portuguese Club during their monthly General Meeting. The meeting's Welcoming Committee, and many others, leant a hand in putting it all together. Attendees included the Consulate General of France, Bertrand Pous, plus representatives of Cambridge Council, Link to recording of Award Ceremony for John Neu

Waterloo Region Council, the Kitchener Legion, the Cambridge Armoury, and many of John and Sibylle's families and friends.

It was an impressive and important milestone for John, who remained his calm, appreciative and humble self throughout the adulations. The hundred and thirty people in attendance gave John multiple standing ovations during the presentations.


LIGHTHOUSE PROBUS CLUB - COLLINGWOOD, ONTARIO







The 1% of the Greatest and Silent Generations

99% of those born between 1930 and 1946 (worldwide) have now passed on. If you were born in this time span, you are one of the rare surviving one percenters of this special group. Their age range is between 77 and 93 years old, a 16-year age span.

- You can remember milk being delivered to your house early in the morning and placed in the "milk box" on the porch.
- Discipline was enforced by parents and teachers.
- You are the last generation who spent childhood without television; instead, you "imagined" what you heard on the radio.
- With no TV, you spent your childhood "playing outside".
- There was no Little League.
- There was no city playground for kids.
- The lack of television in your early years meant that you had little real understanding of what the world was like.
- We got "black-and-white" TV in the late 40s that had 3 stations and no remote.
- Telephones were one to a house, often shared (party lines), and hung on the wall in the kitchen (no cares about privacy).
- Computers were called calculators; they were hand-cranked.
- Typewriters were driven by pounding fingers, throwing the carriage, and changing the ribbon.
- 'INTERNET' and 'GOOGLE' were words that did not exist.
- Newspapers and magazines were written for adults and the news was broadcast on your radio in the evening (your dad would give

- you the comic pages when he read the news).
- New highways would bring jobs and mobility. Most highways were 2 lanes (no interstates).
- You went downtown to shop. You walked to school.
- The radio network expanded from 3 stations to thousands.
- Your parents were suddenly free from the confines of the depression and the war, and they threw themselves into working hard to make a living for their families.
- You weren't neglected, but you weren't today's all-consuming family focus.
- They were glad you played by yourselves while they were busy discovering the postwar world.
- You entered a world of overflowing plenty and opportunity; a world where you were welcomed, enjoyed yourselves.
- You felt secure in your future, although the depression and poverty were deeply remembered.
- Polio was still a crippler. Everyone knew someone who had it.
- You came of age in the '50s and '60s.
- You are the last generation to experience an interlude when there were no threats to our homeland.
- World War 2 was over and the cold war, terrorism, global warming, and perpetual economic insecurity had yet to haunt life.
- Only your generation can remember a time after WW2 when our world was secure and full of bright promise and plenty.
- You grew up at the best possible time, a time when the world was getting better.
- More than 99% of you are retired now, and you should feel privileged to have "lived in the best of times!"

Clubs Helping Clubs

One Probus Club's solution to the perennial President-recruitment problem, born out of necessity during unusual times.

(Tara Seon: Past Co-president; Social Chair; Speaker Chair; Secretary (several concurrently))

At the start of the pandemic, the incoming president and vice-president of our Probus Club were faced with having to do "business" in a totally unfamiliar way. If we were going to have them, Members' and Management meetings would have to be on-line to continue to engage members and address the specter of isolation. Fortunately, our abilities to engage members continued to change and evolve as the lockdown persisted.

We were not familiar with Zoom technology. Given the newness of managing during a pandemic and the typically nebulous duties of the vice president role, we both agreed that sharing the president's workload made sense. In this co-role, we would learn together. To do this fairly, the three main roles - facilitating (1) the monthly members' meetings, (2) the management meetings and (3) preparing the monthly newsletters – would alternate between the two of us for the months (we never thought it would turn out to be years!) of the pandemic.

A schedule was drawn up. The two co-presidents indicated which months (mostly alternating) they would commit to take responsibility for each of the 3 areas mentioned above. We took into account each other's commitments and situations (e.g. spending the lockdown at the cottage) which could impinge on availability. In these instances, we agreed we would skip the month if the other person could not pick up the slack – something we (happily) never had to do.

This article is not about Zoom technology, so I will provide few details of how meeting online evolved beyond saying: both co-presidents came from a place of commitment to provide members with some means of staying connected. As completely non-tech co-presidents, sharing the workload was an absolute boon for taking the pressure off. We stumbled with the technology at the start; likely other Clubs did as well. However, one member stepped up, learned the technology and provided us – and the members of our club - with excellent support. We held our monthly members' meetings on-line to share updates and information. Members could meet each other in break-out rooms to chat, play games etc.

Our management meetings and newsletters were also online. We followed the agreed-to schedule with each co-president, again alternating responsibility where possible. Where a commitment became impossible to fulfill, the other person stepped in.

Once the pandemic was over, our Club could find no-one who would step up to the 2-year president commitment. But there was little trouble finding two individuals who would be copresidents. And this is exactly what our Club has continued to do. Of course, and as expected, each duo of new co-presidents changes the schedule to match their availability.

The usual Probus process is for a 2-year commitment from a vice-president to 'learn the job' (redundant, perhaps, in clubs of retired, mainly professional adults?) and assist the president. Then that VP becomes president – again for 2 years. Perhaps this 4-year commitment is prohibitive for some? We suggest 2 individuals sharing 2 years in a role in which they support each other as they contribute to the Club, could be a possible solution for some Clubs.
