* Income: Dues payments to date reflect up to date payment on 185 lots and payments on 62 previous year dues. Three lost keys also were paid.

** Expenditures: In addition to the regular yearly expenses, this year has had \$950 in tree removal work for the canal and Lakeside Park #2, \$1627.59 for materials and labor for the brick edging and landscaping in the park, and \$5,379.80 for the materials and labor installing the pavilion ceiling in the park with electrical expenses still to come.

*** Improvements: Contract proposals are expected at the Spring General Meeting for coating, sealing and restriping the tennis court to accommodate pickle-ball on the same court. If one is approved, contributions held in this fund may be applicable to these expenses.

Peninsula Improvements

Projects Under Way

1) Park Path: The path was paved last fall. As part of the finishing work after the initial re-grading, Duane Lueck and his associates have completed the retaining wall south of the tennis court, as pictured below:



(The new path is hardly peeking through the colorful foliage, so go take a look in person.) Additionally, there was work to improve court drainage and to re-deploy excess soil associated with the path.

Remaining work includes plantings to hold the soil behind the wall, which we hope will be completed by volunteers.

Our maintenance crew offers thanks to Scott Hocking, who generously donated the use of his tractor, which drastically reduced the burden of their heavy work on this project.

2) Pavilion Ceiling: We have been looking for way to improve the Pavilion aesthetically, and at the same time reduce maintenance costs. We finally have work under way for this, with a new Pavilion ceiling, constructed with an attractive waterproof PVC material.



All that remains, within our approved budget of \$6000, are the four fluorescent light fixtures for which the wiring has already been completed. Duane Lueck is heading up this work.

3) Horseshoe Pits: Fencing is done; additional restoration may be needed.

Planned Projects

Signs: We still need to install numbers on the signposts, just under the signs, at Lakeside Parks 1 through 4, formerly known as "accesses".

Tennis Court and Environs: Repairs are planned for next spring immediately after approval at the Spring General Meeting. We will resurface the court with both tennis and pickle ball boundary lines, re-grade the slope as needed outside the Northwest corner, install dry-wells as needed for run-off control, and fill sinkholes as they develop from the rotting or corroding of underground construction debris left by developers. At least part of the re-striping expense will qualify as a genuine improvement, in that it adds functionality to the court. We understand that the addition of Pickle Ball lines to the court does not interfere with its use for tennis.

Survey Monuments: To deal with owner issues such as responsibility for dead trees, we need to complete surveys for the DLPSA Park and all Lakeside Parks. We must follow this up with placement of permanent monuments at all boundaries if we want to avoid recurring survey expenses.

Possible Future Projects

1) Install a "soccer goal" in the Park, situated to perhaps use the north fence of the tennis court as a backstop. This is fascinating! There was a baseball/softball backstop near there until 2009, by which time it had fallen into disuse by residents. Now we have a generation that is turning more toward soccer, but it is not yet clear that we have sufficient interest in this reincarnation.

2) Re-grade Ivan Drive (again!). Potholes have reappeared quickly since the re-grading in early summer 2014. The reason is unclear. We're sure you'd like to see a more durable solution! This has been elusive at an affordable cost, but we are working this issue.

Policy for Projects

Members have given plenty of moral support for proposed improvements to the Park, but we need their participation for those that require ongoing efforts. Therefore, we have a policy that proposed projects will require an active DLPSA member to demonstrate that there is an adequate community interest, and chair an improvement committee.

We are always interested in your improvement ideas, especially for projects you are willing to sponsor. As you consider ideas, keep in mind that any improvement could add to ordinary maintenance expense. That expense would continue indefinitely, and must be included in planning.

Invitation for Park Reservations

If you are an active member, you may reserve the DLPSA Park for your private party for up to a full day. Since we started doing this a few years ago, several members have arranged parties, and have been happy with the outcome. Weekend dates are limited during the summer, so it's not too early to start thinking about organizing your party during this winter.

You may request a Park reservation from any DLPSA Director, but for quickest action you should directly contact the Treasurer, who can verify your active status and grant the use of the Park, provided that there are no conflicts with prior arrangements for Park use. The grantee shall then make a refundable deposit of \$25 (either cash or check made out to DLPSA) to the Treasurer. The Treasurer shall then issue three hang-tags stating "Private Party Today" to be hung from the signs at each of the three Park entrances. When the

party is over, the grantee shall return the hang-tags to the Treasurer. The deposit shall be returned to the grantee as soon as a Director confirms that the Park is restored to its pre-party condition, which means that we would want to see no significant trace of the event.

Reminder - Dues & Key Policy

Our official policy on payment of dues and issuance of Peninsula Keys was described comprehensively in the Fall 2012 Newsletter, available on the DLPSA website.

Assorted Issues Over the Summer

We have had blessed relief from annoyances, but there were a few:

1) Perennial Pavilion Challenge: We had yet another assault mounted on our Pavilion roof. This time, our climbers managed to crack one of our cheap plastic lawn chairs. In case you were not aware, the roof damage is going to cost us much more out of our budget than the price of a plastic lawn chair, any color!

2) Illegal Mooring and our DNR: Someone moored a watercraft away from the shoreline off Lakeside Park #1. We have notified the DNR, identifying the license of the craft, and following up several times. Our reward was that the DNR did not respond. Over the winter, we hope to clarify what recourse is available to the DLPSA Board or any waterfront owner who is confronted with overnight mooring off his shoreline.

3) Speeding and Passing on East Shore Drive: Well, why not, especially when you are late for work after sleeping those precious extra 7 minutes? Seriously, you might want to tone it down a bit, now that you have the attention of several residents.

Neighbors Helping Neighbors

At our September meeting, Lowell Spence presented the idea of organizing a group on the Duck Lake Peninsula to help residents when the need arises. We all know how we assist each other when boats and docks go in during the spring and are removed during the fall. The idea is to expand this concept to other activities on the Peninsula.

It seems best to send the mailing in the spring when all our snowbirds have returned.

The next step would be to provide a main contact to clear resident requests.

Guest Article: Water Quality & Invasives

You may have heard that Eurasian Watermilfoil has been spotted on Duck Lake this year for the first time. The article below provides some in-depth information about this important finding. It comes to us from John Novak, Peninsula owner/resident and board member of the Green Lake & Duck Lake Association (GLDLA).

Green Lake & Duck Lake Association News

It has been a busy summer for the GLDLA. As in past summers, our members have been busy taking water clarity readings, water quality samples and surveying the lake for aquatic plants. This time, we had some interesting results from the water quality samples. We also found and initiated a treatment program for invasive Phragmites. Finally, we found Eurasian Watermilfoil, and developed a plan to address and treat it

Water quality sampling

As in past years, we took water samples at twelve lake locations chosen to concentrate on areas where people come in contact with the lake, such as the state park beach and the southwest sand bar. Other areas included stream inlets where water comes into the lake. Initial samples were taken on July 8 and no samples taken at swim areas showed high E-coli levels. However, samples taken at four stream inlets did indicate high enough E-coli contamination to warrant retesting. These were resampled on July 22. At three of the four sites, E-coli levels were significantly reduced to the point that they were no longer considered of concern. The fourth site, the Mason Creek Inlet, showed elevated levels of E-coli. The E-coli count was high enough to warn creek residents not to come in contact with the creek water. Additional testing strongly indicated that the E-coli source was of animal and not

human origin. A creek resident later found an apple tree upstream hanging over the creek where deer had been feeding. The creek bed and bank had a lot of deer feces, which was the likely source of the contamination. A return trip with a chain saw cleaned up the area.

Phragmites

Phragmites [a plant genus, pronounced frag-MITE-eez] is a common reed native to North America. *Phragmites Australis* or Invasive *Phragmites* is an invasive species that can grow to 16 feet creating dense stands which degrade wetlands by crowding out native plants, blocking shoreline views, and reducing access for swimming and fishing.

On Aug. 6, Bill Hutchison, Claire Stevenson and myself, accompanied Maureen Pfaller of the Watershed Council and her intern, using Claire's boat to survey the Duck Lake shoreline. We were able to identify fifteen *Phragmites* stands along the lakeshore. All fifteen property owners have been notified, requesting their permission to treat the plants with an herbicide if needed. Close examination of the plants is needed to determine if they are the invasive strain. This will be done at the time of treatment, and only the invasive plants will be treated with the herbicide.

Treatment will be done in the fall of 2016. Follow-up inspection and treatments may be needed in future years. GLDLA will pay the cost of this treatment except on those properties owned by the state. The state will pay for treatment on state owned property.

Eurasian Watermilfoil

Roughly 20 acres of Eurasian Watermilfoil (EWM) was found in the south cove of Duck Lake during the GLDLA annual plant survey. This is an aggressive non-native plant related to our common Northern Milfoil. EWM will form very dense mats of vegetation on the lake surface and interfere with recreational activities such as swimming, fishing, water skiing and boating. It will also drastically alter the lake's biosystem by robbing oxygen from the water and shading out native plants. It is fast growing and very difficult to control.

In response this finding, the GLDLA contracted with the PLM Lake and Land Management Corporation to survey both lakes. The surveys will consist of an Aquatic Vegetation Assessment to determine plant types and a Bathymetric survey will also be conducted. Together these surveys will give an accurate picture of what will be needed to address the EWM problem. Treatment of the EWM will be conducted next spring when the extent of the issue is better understood.

The cost of the surveys for both lakes will be evenly divided between the lakes. GLDLA hopes to be able to start treatment of the EWM in the summer of 2016. However, it is currently unlikely that the Duck Lake

budget will support full treatment of the lake. Please consider adding your donation for "invasive species fund" in the spring GLDLA newsletter.

In the long run, Green Lake Twp. will need to establish a Special Assessment District or Lake Board to provide future monitoring and treatment of the EWM. This process may take several years. Green Lake Twp. Supervisor Paul Biondo has been informed of the issue and understands the township will need to be involved.

Credits

We note that Oral Carper of both DLPSA and GLDLA participates in the surveys cited here.

We also thank Andrew Dyke, Peninsula resident and student at Michigan Technical University, Houghton, MI for collecting water samples, and also for assisting with the plant survey. Here he is working the lake periphery:



What you can do?

- Maintain your septic or waste collection system, and don't dispose of any pet waste in the lake.
- Use only "lake friendly" yard care products near the lakeshore.
- Give your permission for *Phragmites* treatment if notified by the Watershed Council.
- Avoid boating along the shore of the south cove of Duck Lake. Cutting the EWM plants by your boat propeller can cause spreading to other parts of the lake.
- Support the Township in its efforts to form a Lake board or Special Assessment District for future needed treatments.
- Support the GLDLA to pay the cost of EWM treatment until something better can be established. Remember, only Duck Lake resident's donations can be used for Duck Lake treatments.

New On-Line DLPSA Directory

"When will the next DLPSA Directory be published?" We heard this provocative question at this year's Annual Meeting.

Yes, folks, there once was an actual printed DLPSA Directory of owners and addresses. The latest one in our archives was published in 1995, complete with telephone numbers (e-mail was just getting started, believe it or not!) and other supplemental material.

Can we revive this tradition? We say, "Yes, it's worth a try." Besides, we passed a motion to do it. We don't have the funds to publish a printed version for everyone, but that won't stop us. **Our first directory edition will be on-line only at the DLPSA website, with names and addresses only, to be published no earlier than January 1, 2016. The directory will be organized in alphabetical order by both surname and address. Should you not want your name included, notify our Treasurer prior to the end of this year.**

Now, a caveat: Listings of names and addresses for the Peninsula are public information. However, "public" does not mean "convenient". Our Treasurer regularly obtains this information from the Green Lake Township Assessor, but only on a personal request, and for a \$13.50 fee. In contrast, when such a list is present on the web, a marketer might pick it up with little effort and no cost to spam every owner. Also, consider that your e-mail address is often your "username" for Internet accounts.

Therefore, we must respect any decision to opt out of the *On-Line DLPSA Directory*.

On the other hand, maybe you want to make the *On-Line DLPSA Directory* the best we have ever had. In that case, supply us with a preferred contact phone number, and/or a preferred e-mail address to include. This will show up in a later directory edition, but only if the Board is sure it has your approval.

For those of you who want the directory in printed form, but can't print it out, our Treasurer will be happy to provide you with a printed copy on request. (We thank Wayne & Shirley Lanckton, who have generously donated a ream of paper to defray the expense of printing.)
