Dear Parishioners,

This Tuesday, May 26, St. Thomas will resume public Masses. In alignment with the liturgical directives issued by Archbishop Vigneron, we are committed to providing a safe and clean environment for everyone to worship our Lord. The health of our parishioners is of utmost importance to us and new procedures and protocols have been put in place to ensure this. Thank you in advance for your patience and cooperation as we work through our

new "normal" together. For those unable to attend Mass in person, we will continue to provide weekend Masses on our parish website.

Some changes you will notice:

- People must wear a mask in church. Please bring your own if possible.
- People must sanitize their hands when entering church. Please bring your own if possible.
- We will practice social distancing. Some pews will be roped off. Tape on the floor spaced 6 feet apart. Please don't sit together unless you live in the same house. Please do not use the hymnals if you see them.
- A new way of the collection will be implemented.
- You may wear gloves but not to receive Holy Communion.
- We ask that everyone receive Communion in the hand.
 - There will be no Sign of Peace before Communion.
 - We will only distribute the Host for Holy Communion.
 - The minister will purify their hands if they touch your hands or tongue.
- We will use the Fr. Prus Room if needed for social distancing.
- We may have an outside Mass in summer if weather permits.

The dispensation from the Sunday obligation to attend Mass is granted to all the faithful through Sunday, September 6, 2020. Although the faithful are dispensed from their Sunday obligation to attend Mass, they must observe the Lord's Day and are encouraged to spend time in prayer on Sunday, meditating on the Lord's passion, death, and resurrection (an excellent way to do this is through participating in a broadcast of the Sunday Mass) or participating in a spiritual or corporal act of mercy.

WHO SHOULD NOT ATTEND MASS:

- Those who are older than 65 years old (the recommended CDC age), with a compromised health condition or caring for the sick in any way, are encouraged to stay home.
- Anyone who is ill, has a temperature, cough, etc., should stay home as an act of justice to the whole community.

As every parish realizes, it will not be perfect. It will take time to adjust to a new way of attending church during this time when we need to distance ourselves and take many precautions. All of us will have to be open to changes and go with the flow.

Thank you for your understanding and cooperation.

It looks like if everything holds together that we'll have our first public weekday Mass on Tuesday, May 26 and our first set of weekend Masses on May 30 and May 31. Get ready for the new normal.

AOD guidelines modify on a routine basis, but at the time I'm writing, those attending Mass will be asked to wear face covering. There will be social distancing, although family members can sit as a group. Social distancing may lead to caps on attendance. There will be no greeting of peace and no wine at communion. There will be no Offertory procession and no Offertory collection; there will be baskets at the entrance of the church for those who care to donate to the parish. To some extent the new normal will resemble in many ways the old normal some of us grew up with.

The Archbishop has dispensed Catholics in our archdiocese from the obligation to attend mass through September 6. At the same time the archdiocese recommends those over 65 and/or experiencing some underlying medical condition stay home. This also applies to anyone caring for someone. Remember its possible to carry the virus and show no symptoms. We would hate for anyone to contract the virus while in church, so if anyone is not feeling well, please stay home out of regard for our fellow parishioners.

Our food pantry is still very much in operation and accepting food donations on Thursday between 10 A.M. and 1 P.M. The pantry is also sponsoring a bottle and can return drive. There is a wagon near the garage at the parish center where anyone can drop off empties. I had reason to drop by this past week and I was very much gratified to see the generosity of our parishioners. Thanks to all who have stepped up in this time of need. Unfortunately, the need will not go away, and the pantry will continue to seek our help. Remember. We are called to love our neighbors as ourselves.

SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION

Saturday: 3:30 P.M. or by appointment by calling the parish office.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

Infant Baptisms are held on the second Sunday of each month. Please contact the parish office to make arrangements at least one month prior to the desired date of Baptism. At least one parent must be a practicing Catholic (that is attending Mass each weekend) and must be a member of St. Thomas the Apostle Parish Community for at least 3 months prior to the request. A baptism class is required.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE

Couples seeking to be married at St. Thomas the Apostle Parish should contact the parish priest at least seven months prior to the desired date of marriage. Both members of the party must be free to marry, at least one must be baptized Catholic and a registered member of the St. Thomas the Apostle Parish Community. Only the parish priest may confirm a date for a wedding at St. Thomas the Apostle Parish.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK

Please call the Parish Office to request this Sacrament. You do not need to wait until the person is actively dying to call.

FUNERALS

Arrangements are made in conjunction with the funeral home. Eulogies must be given at the funeral home or at the funeral luncheon; no eulogies at the funeral Mass, please. Memorial Masses are scheduled Monday-Friday <u>normally.</u>


I will not reject anyone who comes to me ... John 6:37

From the Desk of... Father Larry

The marriage was on the rocks. The man loved his wife and wanted to prove his love, so he decided to swim across the ocean. She was not impressed. Undaunted, he walked across the Gobi desert. He sent her a victory picture at the Chinese border with parched, cracked lips. She was still unimpressed. He decided to climb Mount Everest. They took a photo

of him atop the 29,142 peak, holding up his black frostbitten thumb. He was sure he had won her back.

When he returned home, the divorce went through. He asked her. "Why?" She answered, "Well, you were never home!"

In today's gospel, Jesus does not expect us to swim oceans, cross deserts or climb mountains. He only asks that we keep his commandments. That alone is proof of our love for him.

As today's first reading from Acts attests, the witness of those early believers was so effective that the community soon grew beyond Jerusalem to Samaria. Luke tells his readers that this development produced great joy. No doubt the spirit of joy was contagious, and others who witnessed it wanted to discover its source so as to share in the experience. Others were impressed by their sharing what they had, their care for the needy, their gathering to pray and break bread, and their courage to live their faith in time of persecution.

Whatever may come in life, we have a living and loving reason to hope. The witness of our hope can speak louder than any evil in the world...until the One who is our hope comes again. Pray that we will always be people of joy and people of hope.

Acts of Spiritual Communion

It has long been a Catholic understanding that when circumstances prevent one from receiving Holy Communion, it is possible to make an Act of Spiritual Communion which is a source of grace. Spiritual Communion means uniting one's self in prayer with Christ's sacrifice and worshipping him in his Body and Blood. The most common reason for making an Act of Spiritual Communion is when a person cannot attend Mass. Acts of Spiritual Communion increase our desire to receive sacramental Communion and help us avoid the sins that would make us unable to receive Holy Communion worthily.

A prayer for Spiritual Communion

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love you above all things and I desire to receive you in my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive you sacramentally, Come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace you as if you were already there And unite myself wholly to you. Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.
