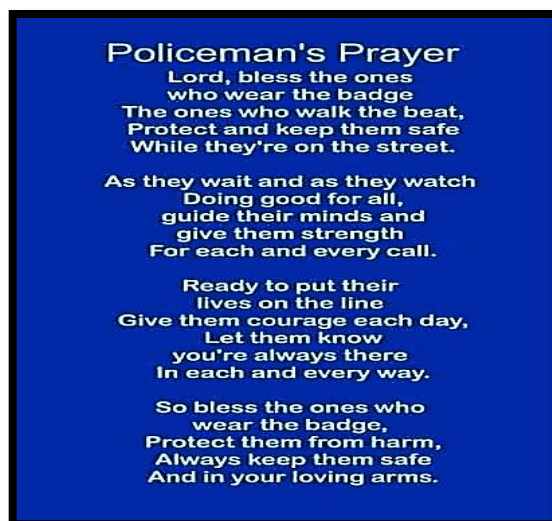

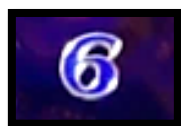

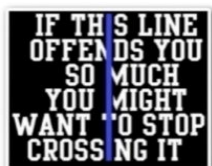

PHOENIX PD APP

The Phoenix Police Department has a mobile APP, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place. Users can use the app to access online reporting, crime statistics, precinct locations, phone numbers, career opportunities, virtual block watch, victims' rights information, and more. Users can also turn on notifications from the precinct they live in to receive news updates and information on events in their area. The APP is now available both in the Apple Store for iOS and in the Google Play Store for Android.

Report graffiti on the Phoenix PD app! Graffiti can now be reported on the Police Department APP released in January 2021. Studies show that if graffiti is removed within 24 hours, there is a 90% likelihood that the graffiti reporter will not have to use the app to have it removed! #GraffitiFreePHX

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

- **What** - is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- **What** - happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- **When** - did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- **Was** - anyone hurt?
- **Weapons** - are there weapons involved?
- **What** - manner did they leave or arrive – foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- **Who** - did it? –Suspect description
- **Where** - did the suspect go? – What direction
- **What** - did the suspect obtain? – type and amount
- **Who** - is calling? – Give your name, location, and phone number. (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

TEXT 9-1-1 "Call if you can. Text if you can't." After months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disabled, if you are in imminent danger and are unable to talk to a 911 operator, you now have for the first time in Phoenix the ability to text to 9-1-1.

PHOENIX POLICE VEHICLE REMOVAL NOTIFICATION

We frequently see complaints and calls for service reference abandon and illegally parked vehicles and parking concerns. Most common issue is the unsightly appearance and nuisance it brings to the neighborhoods when it appears people use streets as there parking lot. When you observe a vehicle unattended for an extended period of time you can call the non-emergency number to report the unattended vehicle. A Police Officer or Police Assistant will respond to the call for service and investigate the unattended vehicle. If no contact can be made with the owner of the vehicle the Police should red-tag the vehicle giving proper notification. Per Statue any operable vehicle left unattended on a public street or public right-of-way for 48 hours may be considered abandon and is subject to seizure under Arizona Revised Statute 28-4801 and 28-4834.

When Police respond and are unable to contact owner of the vehicle, Police will verify a few things. When Police conduct records check of the vehicle, they will verify the vehicle is not listed as a stolen vehicle, currently registered and verify to the best of their ability the vehicle is operable. If everything checks out there will be a bright orange tag placed on the window of the vehicle, referred to as a red-tag. Per statue this gives owner notice the vehicle will be towed if it does not move within 48 Hours. If you see this red-tag on a vehicle you can call back after 48 hours referring to the listed incident number on top right corner of red-tag. Doing this will generate another call for service for an officer to respond and tow the vehicle if it has not moved.

One thing to take away from this is to remember to always park your vehicle in a manner that follows Phoenix City Codes and all laws related to parking. Remember the street is not your parking lot and like most things parking properly and not leaving vehicles unattended on the roadway is all part of being a good neighbor.

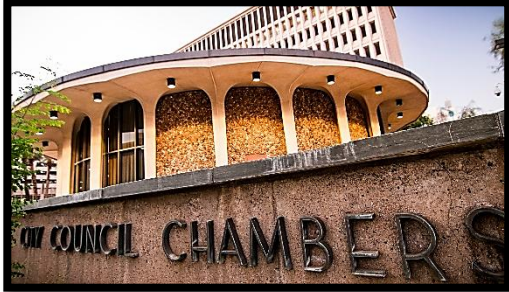

MAYOR GALLEGO NAMES COUNCILWOMAN O'BRIEN TO LEAD COMMEMORATION OF 9/11



PHOENIX—As the 25th anniversary of the September 11 attacks approaches, Mayor Kate Gallego announced today that Councilwoman Ann O'Brien (District 1) will lead the City of Phoenix's commemoration efforts.

"Phoenix honors those we lost and recognizes the courage of the first responders, including those in our very own Arizona Task Force 1," Mayor Gallego said. "As we mark this milestone, shared with America's 250th anniversary, we celebrate our commitment to one another, our community, and our country. Councilwoman O'Brien will lead this effort with a thoughtful approach to how Phoenix can come together in reflection."

The City's commemoration will be shaped by the voices of our residents, from Phoenix emergency personnel who responded to Ground Zero to young people who were not yet born on September 11, 2001. Arizona Task Force 1, 62 firefighters, police officers, doctors, and dog handlers traveled across the country to Ground Zero, where they worked near the smoldering toxic site digging out debris.

"I am honored to lead Phoenix's efforts, and I approach this work with deep respect," Councilwoman O'Brien said. "This is sacred work—rooted in remembrance and our shared commitment to one another." Mayor Gallego and Councilwoman O'Brien have initiated conversations to develop a meaningful and inclusive commemoration to mark this milestone anniversary. Additional details will be announced in the coming months.

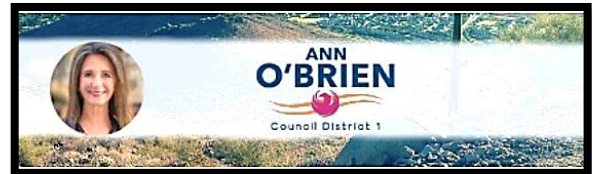

Message from Councilwoman Ann O'Brien

Mark your calendar for an important meeting on the future of Phoenix Parks and Recreation. City staff will provide an update on the Master Plan, presenting key findings gathered through surveys, community meetings, and online engagement. You'll be able to look at maps highlighting amenities, maintenance, and other issues identified as most important to the community. The Parks Department will present information on Wednesday, September 16 at 6pm at Beuf Community Center, [3435 W. Pinnacle Peak Road](http://3435.W.PinnaclePeakRoad). After meeting with the community, the Parks and Recreation Board will consider adoption of the Parks Master Plan, and the City Council is expected to vote on it in December.

You may recall that Mayor Kate Gallego appointed me to lead the City's 9/11 commemoration, and one of my top priorities has been bringing youth to the table. One thing I've learned is that our young people genuinely want to understand what happened on September 11. Through the City's Office of Youth and Education, young people across Phoenix spent weeks participating in focus groups, sharing ideas, and designing events to ensure the lessons of that day continue to inspire future generations. One of the first youth-led events was a Citywide art contest, and this week, I participated in judging hand-drawn images representing service and unity. It was inspiring! The winning submissions will be displayed at a special event honoring Phoenix Firefighters and members of Arizona Task Force 1 who deployed to Ground Zero. I hope you'll join me on September 10 from 6 to 7:30 p.m. at Memorial Hall at Steele Indian School Park as we recognize their service and sacrifice. 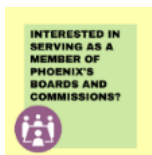

District 3 | Chair Kate Brophy McGee



As Chair of the Board, one of my main priorities is to ensure Maricopa County residents and families living paycheck to paycheck can remain in their homes. In many instances these individuals are one accident or emergency away from falling behind on rent and potentially becoming homeless. In January, I joined my colleague, Supervisor Steve Gallardo and we launched an Eviction Diversion Pilot Program, funded by one-time county dollars. We partnered with the Arizona Multihousing Association with the goal of providing residents with case management and rental assistance, avoiding the inevitable late fees and court costs that almost always results in eviction. The City of Phoenix is working with us to provide utility assistance and the case management support. We will be evaluating results to measure the long-term success of this pilot and what that means for future iterations of this program. [Eviction Prevention Pilot Program](#)

WASTE TRANSFER STATION UPDATE

As many of you know, the future of the County's six waste transfer stations is under review. When the possibility of closure was raised, I heard clearly from residents in our community how important the Cave Creek Waste Transfer Station is and how heavily it is used.

I want to help. My priority is to keep the Cave Creek Transfer Station open and this service available to the residents who rely on it. I am committed to exploring reasonable options to accomplish that.

Throughout this process, I have received hundreds of comments from concerned residents who regularly use this waste transfer station, and there was a commonly shared sentiment: keep it open, even if it means increasing costs. I want to emphasize that if the waste transfer stations are to remain open, which is my priority, the cost to use the stations will increase.

Your continued input is important as the county works through these options to determine the best path forward.

The message from our community has been clear: the Cave Creek Waste Transfer Station is a highly valued and well-used service. I share the community's desire to keep it open, and I will continue working toward a solution that does just that. [Waste Transfer Station Website](#)

After more than 50 years of service, city leaders, staff, and current and former police officers gathered to formally close the Phoenix Police Department's longtime headquarters at 620 West Washington Street.

The building originally opened in 1975 under the leadership of Police Chief Lawrence Wetzel, the first in a line of chiefs who would shape the department from within its concrete walls. Over the decades that followed, 11 additional police chiefs — including acting and interim leaders — worked from the

building, guiding Phoenix policing through periods of rapid growth, shifting demands and significant change.

CITY OF PHOENIX Cooling Ordinance

from Phoenix City Code, Chapter 39-5

Did you know there is a city ordinance that requires landlords to provide reasonable cooling to rental housing units?

- All AC units must cool to 82 degrees or below
- All EVAP coolers must cool to 86 degrees or below
- Cooling systems need to be maintained in good working order

To speak with a Landlord/Tenant counselor about your rights or to report an AC violation, call 602-262-7210

39-5 Electrical, plumbing, and mechanical systems; health and safety conditions.

B.1. Heating, cooling and ventilation systems.

Heating, cooling and ventilation systems in any building or structure are to be maintained hazard-free, operational and in a state of good repair. Heating and cooling systems shall be free from hazards associated with ventilation, equipment status, mounting, electrical connections and other potential defects.

B.1.b. Cooling requirements: Every rental housing unit where such systems are installed shall have cooling capable of safely cooling all habitable rooms, bathrooms and flushing toilet rooms to a temperature no greater than 86 degrees Fahrenheit, if cooled by evaporative cooling, or 82 degrees Fahrenheit, if cooled by air conditioning. Temperature measurements shall be taken at a distance three feet above the floor in the center of the room. Required cooling shall be provided by permanently installed cooling facilities.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

VEGETATION: Property owners are responsible for their properties and the adjacent rights-of-way free of dead or dried vegetation (weeds, tall grass, tumbleweeds, shrubs, trees, palm fronds, etc.) All dead or dried vegetation must be removed and disposed of properly. Property owners also are responsible for assuring that grass and weeds on their property and in the adjacent rights-of-way do not exceed six inches in height and that the lawn grass is maintained at six inches or shorter.

GRAFFITI: Graffiti must immediately be removed from all sidewalks, walls, fences, signs, and other structures or surfaces visible from beyond the property line. This is the responsibility of the property owner. Free paint and graffiti removal supplies are available. Assistance is available for those unable to physically remove graffiti themselves. Remember, graffiti is a crime. Call 911 if you witness graffiti in progress.

NON-DUSTPROOF PARKING: Designated parking and maneuvering areas must be dust-proofed according to specifications. Parking or maneuvering vehicles anywhere other than these designated areas may be a violation. No more than **50 percent** of the required front yard of a single family or duplex residential property may be used for parking or maneuvering.

INOPERABLE VEHICLES: Inoperable vehicles must not be visible from beyond the property line. An inoperable vehicle is one that is not equipped with all parts that are required to legally and safely operate on public streets and/or cannot be driven under its own power. Tarps, shade screens, and other similar materials are not acceptable screening.

FENCES IN DISREPAIR: Fencing and screening walls must be structurally sound and made from the same materials. They also must be maintained so that they are free from deterioration and blight. Fences in residential zones cannot be higher than 40 inches in the required front yard and 6 feet in the required rear yard.

VACANT & ACCESSIBLE STRUCTURES: Property owners are responsible for maintaining structures and grounds of a property. All vacant structures must be kept secure, so they cannot be opened from the outside. A property owner may be required to board up a structure to City specifications if it becomes vacant and is not secure. Accessory structures on the property, such as storage sheds and garages, also must be secured to City specifications. Boarding up a structure is a one-time, temporary securement option. Rehabilitation or demolition of a structure may be required under certain conditions.

JUNK, LITTER & DEBRIS: Junk, litter and debris cannot be left on the property. It must be disposed of properly. This includes discarded or broken auto parts, furniture, building and/or landscaping material and tires, litter such as discarded paper, cardboard, plastics, etc., debris such as tree trimmings and fallen tree limbs or any other items that have been discarded.

OUTSIDE STORAGE: Outside storage on residentially zoned properties that can be seen from beyond the property line is not allowed. Generally, any equipment, building or landscaping materials, parts/auto parts, appliances or any scrap items may not be visible. Boats, campers and other similar personal items may be stored in a limited area of the rear yard of residentially zoned properties. There are specific regulations that apply to outdoor storage and use on properties zoned for other than residential use.

ABANDONED SHOPPING CART RETRIEVAL PROGRAM

The City of Phoenix Abandoned Shopping Cart Retrieval Program strives to remove empty, abandoned shopping carts found off-premises city-wide, from public right of way, sidewalks, and City streets within 2 business days of the complaint.

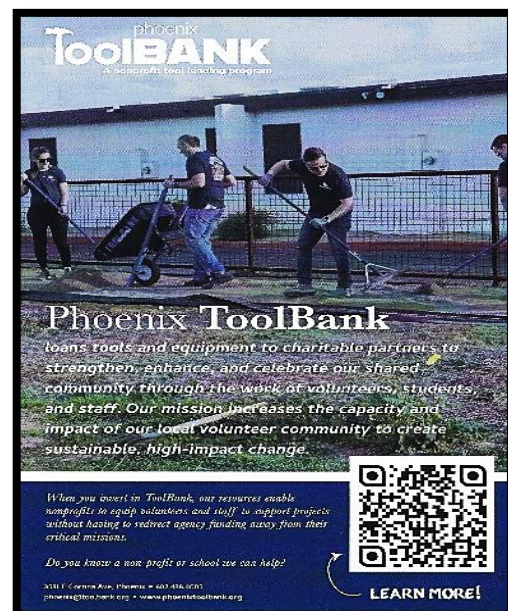

CRIME TIPS:

BEFORE YOU RSVP, MAKE SURE THE INVITATION ISN'T A SCAM

Beware of "You're invited" texts and emails from friends or family; the only ones having a party are the scammers who send them.

The [Federal Trade Commission](#) (FTC) is seeing a rise in reports of consumers receiving fake invitations. But the invitations are only inviting trouble if you engage with them.

HOW IT WORKS

You receive an unexpected text or email that looks like it's from a well-known invitation platform like Evite or Paperless Post.

The message might list someone you know as the host, but it asks you to enter your email username and password to view the event details. Other versions direct you to enter your phone number and share a special passcode to RSVP.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

If you provide this information, the scammer can take over your email account and send the exact same scam to your contact list.

Real online invitations do not require you to log into your email account or share a temporary security code just to see the details.

Scammers are trying to steal your email account login credentials or trigger an unauthorized password reset to break into your account.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

Set your computer and phone software to update automatically so your devices can defend against the latest security threats.

Enable two-factor authentication where it's offered. It adds an extra layer of security, making it harder for criminals to log into your email account even if they steal your username and password.

If you receive an unexpected invite, resist the urge to click. Instead, check with the host directly through a separate call or text to make sure it's real.

Act quickly if compromised: If you think a scammer has your email information, change your password as soon as possible – and let your email contacts know an invitation from you is a scam.

FAKE RECALL ALERTS, REAL RISKS

As recalls of lettuce, cars, and even wet wipes explode across the country, criminals frequently exploit safety fears to steal your personal information or money. The AARP Fraud Watch Network Helpline (877-908-3360) and federal authorities have seen a rise in reports of [fraudulent recall notices](#) targeting consumers.

HOW IT WORKS

You receive an urgent text or email warning you that a product you bought or a vehicle you drive has a critical safety recall.

The message includes official-looking logos or appears to be from major retailers or auto dealerships.

It presses for immediate action, instructing you to click a link to "claim a full refund," "review your order," or schedule an urgent repair before your account or warranty is compromised.

The provided link may take you to a website that prompts you to enter your login credentials, credit card information, or other personal data.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

Legitimate safety recall repairs are free by law. Manufacturers and dealers will never request payment, shipping fees, or processing charges to complete a safety recall.

Real recall notices usually ask you to stop using the item or contact an authorized dealer, rather than urging you to sign in immediately via a text link to collect money.

Scammers count on panic and speed. They want you to react to the safety warning without double-checking where the message actually came from.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

Do not click links or scan QR codes inside unsolicited texts or emails claiming a product or vehicle has been recalled.

Check official sources directly. Search the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission at [cpsc.gov/Recalls](#), or sign in to your retailer's official app manually.

Contact the company or dealer independently. Use a trusted phone number or web address from an official invoice, statement, or owner's manual – never the number or link provided in the message.

If your smartphone has a "Report Spam" option, use it to flag the message for your carrier.

THE PHOENIX CITYWIDE LOCKBOX PROGRAM

This program allows firefighters to gain entry to your home in case of emergency without causing any damage to your residence. This is done by utilizing a key that you provide in a secure lockbox attached to your entryway. This program not only provides free lockboxes to those vulnerable Phoenix residents, it also allows those who already have their own lockbox in place to register their lockbox code with the fire department.

Free lockboxes are donated by the Phoenix Area Association of Realtors and are distributed on a first come, first served basis to vulnerable Phoenix residents who are 55+, have special needs or mobility issues.

Your information and the code to the lockbox is provided only to firefighters in the event there is an emergency call to your home. You will need to provide the appropriate key or keys to put in the lockbox at the time of the delivery.

SCHOOL THREATS



The start of the school year brings plenty for parents and teachers to navigate as kids settle back in. But two challenges that are increasingly landing on our prosecutor's desk are cases of minors sharing inappropriate photos and posting school threats.

Here is what parents need to know:

Inappropriate Photos

- It's illegal for a minor to create and send, possess or distribute inappropriate photos of another minor.
- Tied to bullying. The sharing of inappropriate photos is often used to humiliate or target peers.

School Threats

- Every threat is treated as real and triggers a full-scale emergency response.
- Even if posted as a joke, disrupting or interfering with the normal operations of a school or educational institution is against the law.

These behaviors strain school and law enforcement resources and pull their attention from other priorities.

Why it Matters: For teens, digital behavior often feels separate from real-world consequences. That's exactly why these conversations matter now, before a moment of poor judgment turns into a life-altering one.

- Don't assume "my child wouldn't do this"
- Talk to your kids early and often
- Check their devices frequently
- Emphasize that they need to report school threats or the sharing of inappropriate photos, not repost them

Bottom Line: Inappropriate photos and school threats can spread like wildfire and have a lasting presence online. Don't wait until it's too late, use the PSAs below to talk to your kids today.

MONSOON



August has brought widespread storms and much-needed rainfall across Maricopa County, putting washes, basins, and other flood control structures to work. But the work doesn't stop when the rain does.

After significant storms, Flood Control teams inspect dams, basins, channels, and other infrastructure for erosion, debris, or damage. Crews make repairs and clear debris as needed, helping ensure structures are ready for the next storm.

Staff also review data from more than 400 rainfall and stream gages to understand where rain fell, how waterways responded and where impacts occurred.



It's important work that often happens behind the scenes – keeping Maricopa County's flood control system ready throughout the monsoon.

MVD ENHANCES COMMUNICATION ACCOMMODATIONS

Rollout of enhancements include emergency contact option

The Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division is enhancing features to [communication accommodations](#), which allow people to voluntarily indicate through their driver or vehicle record that they, or someone in the vehicle, may require accommodations to better communicate with first responders during traffic stops or incidents.

Currently, when law enforcement runs a driver license number, license plate or VIN of those that have signed up for this voluntary option, the phrase 'Communication Accommodation' appears on the first responder's computer screen. This helps law enforcement understand that someone may respond differently during traffic stops or other interactions.

Starting today, a new digital text box is available for both the driver and vehicle records. Each text box allows for up to 500 characters to describe pertinent details that may impact the ability to communicate during these stressful situations.

A slider or toggle switch is at the bottom of each alert option to indicate when an alert has been selected or deactivated.

Additionally, a separate emergency contact box is now available for anyone to list their emergency contact that only first responders are able to see in the computer system when responding to an incident.

These additional communication accommodation features are conveniently available in the MVD online portal [AZMVDNow.gov](#) or you can visit any MVD office statewide to update your record.

These new features were developed through a collaboration with [Preston's Pursuit](#) to enhance upon [A.R.S. 28-459](#) and ensure each individual was able to provide specific information unique to them and further improve the interaction between first responders and individuals in distress.

The [Blue Envelope Program](#) remains available to help drivers communicate with law enforcement during traffic stops. Drivers can use one or both programs, depending on their needs.

- Recruit friends, family, classmates and coworkers to join a few planned cleanups per year. It's a great way to catch up and be involved in a meaningful outdoor activity.
- Gather volunteers to clean your adopted mile for a few hours in cooler morning hours. Volunteers may begin cleaning adopted miles at sunrise.
- Earn your bragging rights: Discuss your cleanup results together and then submit your total hours, number of volunteers and trash bags filled to ADOT.

National Clean Up Day is recognized on the third Saturday in September as the largest single-day cleanup event in the United States. We've got lots of miles available and participating is a great way to help keep Arizona grand.

The Yard Sign Pilot Program aims to influence safer driver behavior on neighborhood streets where children and other pedestrians are likely to be walking, jogging or bicycling. Residents and businesses are encouraged to plant a free sign on their property. You can pick up your sign in person at any one of five designated Parks and Recreation Department community centers:

- Goelet A.C. Beuf - 3435 W. Pinnacle Peak Rd.
- Maryvale - 4420 N. 51st Ave.
- Longview - 4040 N. 14th St.
- Pecos - 17010 S. 48th St.
- Cesar Chavez - 7858 S. 35th Ave.
- Residents can also pick up a sign in person at Phoenix City Hall, 200 W. Washington St, 5th Floor.

The signs are free to the public and include a yard stake. Funding for the signs comes from money the Mayor and Council specifically set aside for road safety education and infrastructure improvements.

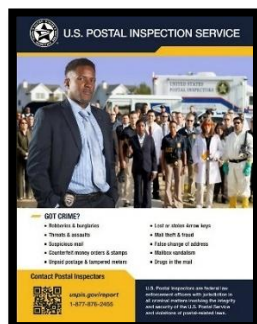
Trauma Bleeding Control Training

People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S.

They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-8.

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit [988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline](#) is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States.

Suicide Warning Signs

These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

♦ Talking about wanting to die or to kill oneself. ♦ Looking for a way to kill oneself, such as searching online or buying a gun. ♦ Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live. ♦ Talking about feeling trapped or in unbearable pain. ♦ Talking about being a burden to others.	♦ Increasing the use of alcohol or drugs. ♦ Acting anxious or agitated; behaving recklessly. ♦ Sleeping too little or too much. ♦ Withdrawing or feeling isolated. ♦ Showing rage or talking about seeking revenge. ♦ Displaying extreme mood swings.
