PHOENIX PD APP

The Phoenix Police Department has a mobile APP, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place. Users can use the app to access online reporting, crime statistics, precinct locations, phone numbers, career opportunities, virtual block watch, victims' rights information, and more. Users can also turn on notifications from the precinct they live in to receive news updates and information on events in their area.

The APP is now available both in the Apple Store for iOS and in the Google Play Store for Android.

Report graffiti on the Phoenix PD app! Graffiti can now be reported on the Police Department APP released in January 2021. Studies show that if graffiti is removed within 24 hours, there is a 90% likelihood that the graffiti will not use the app to have it removed! #GraffitiFreePHX

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anvone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? -Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- Who is calling? Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

TEXT 9-1-1 "Call if you can. Text if you can't." After months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community (or advocates for the disabled) if you are in imminent danger and are unable to talk to a 911 operator, you now have for the first time in Phoenix the ability to text to 9-1-1.

BACK TO SCHOOL worth repeating!

Well, it is that time of year again. The long days of a carefree summer are ending. Most parents are excited to have some free time to do some adulting and the kiddos are bummed to be back at the grind of school life. The heat is definitely still with us for a bit as vacations are winding down. The time for school shopping has begun and our children are heading back to the classroom. Soon, our morning rush to get out the door just to make it on time will start once again. All of us as a community should take some time to reflect on what this year will bring, and what we can all do to make this year healthy, safe and memorable.

Safety should always be a priority when it comes to our children. Most schools have unique ways to deal with drop-off and pick-up of students. Although this period of time is only 15 minutes twice a day, it can be very disruptive to some communities. Complaints range from illegal parking to aggressive driving and everything in between. Those of us who will be utilizing the drop-off and pick-up lines, please follow the school instructions on their required protocol. Many of the schools work with the City of Phoenix Streets Department to come up with a plan that is safe for our children. They design the traffic lines, so the children do not have to cross busy traffic, or risk getting hurt by cars. Parents, please follow your school's guidelines.


In addition, all citizens need to be cognizant of the speed limit, especially when school is in session. Most schools have signs posted and some have flashing lights to warn drivers about the school zone. If someone is caught speeding in a school zone, it is a criminal ticket, not just your standard speeding ticket. The slower speed allows more reaction time in the event you need to stop quickly. Please keep in mind there are crosswalks in these areas. If a car is stopped at the crosswalk, whether there is a red light, stop sign or anything else, another driver cannot pass that stopped vehicle. This is a safety precaution in the event someone is crossing the street and is not yet visible by the other driver. This same rule applies to school buses as well. If bus lights are flashing and the stop sign is out it is your responsibility to stop. We want our children to get to school safely.

It has been said that children are one third of our population and all our future. Our children are precious and should be protected at all costs in all aspects of life. Give

them the tools to take care of themselves properly and do your part to ensure they have a safe place to live, learn and love.





DATA CENTERS, DONE RIGHT



As Phoenix continues to grow as a national hub for tech and innovation, we're seeing more interest in large-scale data centers. These facilities power everything from cloud

storage to artificial intelligence, but if not planned carefully, they can create serious challenges for nearby neighborhoods.

That's why the City Council and I voted to update our zoning ordinance. Our goal was simple: protect public safety while continuing to attract cutting-edge industries.

Here's what's changing:

- Data centers must now apply for a special permit.
- Each proposal will be reviewed for impacts like:
 - Strain on the power grid.
 - o Fire safety risks.
 - Noise levels.
 - Emergency vehicle access.
- Developers must engage early with City staff, utility providers, and first responders.

Phoenix will continue to lead on thoughtful, sustainable planning. Whether it's protecting our water supply or helping residents stay safe in extreme heat, we're making thoughtful choices today to support our community for years to come.

Message from Vice Mayor Ann O'Brien

Hello from chilly, windy San Francisco! I'm attending a board meeting for WestEd, a nonpartisan research, development, and service agency that works to promote excellence, improve learning, and increase opportunities for children, youth, and adults. I've been a WestEd board member since 2018 and I began serving as Board Chair on Thursday. I'm excited to continue advocating for innovative programs and data-driven solutions to support students and educators. A key WestEd project in Arizona is the "Supervisors of Principals Academy". It provides in-depth professional development and mentoring for new and experienced supervisors of school principals. So far, the academy has worked with more than 60 central office administrators who support more than 250 principals statewide.

I'm thrilled to share an update on my fight to get Phoenix our fair share of federal resources. You may recall, I traveled to Washington, D.C. in May for a meeting at the White House with Christine Glassner, the Deputy Director of Intergovernmental Affairs. The meeting was a result of me contacting the White House to express my concerns about federal cuts to critical city projects, especially the North Gateway Advanced Water Purification Facility. This facility, along with two others in the city, will help reduce our reliance on Colorado River water and create a sustainable solution to Phoenix's water needs. The city had received preliminary approval for a federal grant to help with construction of the new water purification facility, but then we heard nothing for months. With more families and businesses calling Phoenix home, I had to take action. I'm pleased to share the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation notified us this week that it's ready to finalize an agreement with Phoenix for the North Gateway Advanced Water Purification Facility. It will include a \$179 million federal investment to help design and construct water purification infrastructure that will treat up to 8 million gallons of water

Finally, in honor of Parks and Recreation Month, I want to express my gratitude to our employees who support a vibrant, healthy community—from maintaining our parks to offering programs that bring neighbors together. Their work touches livers in so many ways, and their work deserves our recognition.

Vice Chair Kate Brophy McGee Calls for an End to the Melendres Orders

"On Wednesday night I attended a community meeting in District 5 about the Melendres orders. It was clear that residents expect a high level of professionalism and transparency from deputies policing their streets, as they should.

We are applying unprecedented financial and personnel resources to achieve full and effective compliance with Court requirements in policy and practice by the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office's (MCSO).

The class action lawsuit was filed over 18 years and four sheriffs ago. The Sheriff's Office has implemented and enforces policies that prohibit racial and other bias-based profiling. MSCO provides access to all policies and practices on MCSO.org.

Recently the Board adopted our 2026 budget, investing nearly 50 percent of the County's total budget in public safety. That investment provides the resources to retain our deputies and attract new recruits. My thanks to Maricopa County taxpayers for making this investment possible.

Maricopa County will spend more than \$350 million dollars by the end of next fiscal year to appease the demands of an out-of-state court-appointed monitor who continues to move the compliance goal posts. This is a shameful waste of County taxpayer dollars! Shouldn't every taxpayer dollar we spend go to funding actual public safety? It is time to put an end to the Melendres orders for good."

Maricopa County Department of Emergency Management



I recently toured Maricopa County's new Department of Emergency Management (MCDEM) state of the art facility. We witnessed a tabletop exercise - a simulated emergency response scenario where MCDEM officials coordinated with partners from across the County. These trainings are vital to our preparedness,

and build communications and strong partnerships with cities and towns across Maricopa County so they can be put into action in the event of an actual emergency.

HEAT RELIEF EFFORTS

Because we continue to face days of extreme heat, I urge residents and visitors to exercise caution when spending time on the City's more than 200 miles of desert and mountain hiking trails.

Millions of people safely take advantage of our scenic parks and preserves each year, including during the summer by following a few simple steps:

- Pay attention to signs noting when trails are closed.
- Hike when it's cool outside, like early mornings and evenings when there's more shade.
- Wear proper shoes and clothing, a hat, and sunscreen.
- Hydrate before your hike and bring more water with you than you think you'll need.
- Carry a mobile phone.
- Hike with others. If you're hiking alone, tell someone where you'll be.
- Don't push yourself.
- Stay on designated trails.

Finding respite from the heat

Creating cool, safe spaces for residents who are unsheltered, who are experiencing power outages, or who are having problems with their air conditioners or cooling systems is a priority for me and the City Council. That's why we've made cooling centers and hydration stations available across the city.

In fact, we are the only Valley city offering a heat respite center that is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. We also have extended operating hours at three City of Phoenix libraries: Cholla, Harmon, and Yucca.

These city libraries are open with full library services from Monday-Saturday until 10 p.m., and on Sunday and holidays from 12 to 10 p.m.

All other Phoenix Public Libraries also serve as cooling centers during regular business hours.

Our 24/7 respite center at 20 W. Jackson St., which opened May 1, has seen nearly 7,000 visits as of July 4. Our libraries with extended hours have also had hundreds of visits from individuals seeking heat relief.

YARD SIGN PILOT PROGRAM





The Yard Sign Pilot Program aims to influence safer driver behavior on neighborhood streets where children and other pedestrians are likely to be walking, jogging or bicycling. Residents and businesses are encouraged to plant a free sign on their property.

You can pick up your sign in person at any one of five designated Parks and Recreation Department community centers:

- Cesar Chavez 7858 S. 35th Ave.
- Residents can also pick up a sign in person at Phoenix City Hall, 200 W. Washington St, 5th Floor.

The signs are free to the public and include a yard stake. Funding for the signs comes from money the Mayor and Council specifically set aside for road safety education and infrastructure improvements.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens, and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the dates you can request four times a year for Bulk Trash pickup.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. ¼ minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 50% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

CRIME TIPS:

MORE WAYS TO HELP PROTECT YOURSELF FROM FRAUD

According to the Federal Trade Commission, theft through fraud may have been as high as \$158.3 billion in 2023 alone. That's \$434 million every day, or about \$300,000 every minute, stolen from Americans by fraud criminals. To put this into perspective, if fraud were a U.S. company, it would rank in the top 40 by revenue.

Every one of us is a potential fraud target. But the good news is you can make yourself a harder one to reach.

In previous alerts, we shared tips like using strong passwords, enabling multi-factor authentication, checking your credit report, turning on auto-updates, ignoring unsolicited messages and shredding sensitive documents. Now, here are three more ways to safeguard your personal information.

Avoid Postal Theft

Criminals are <u>stealing mail</u> in search of checks, which they can alter or "wash" to steal money out of your account. Collect your mail promptly after delivery and bring outgoing mail directly to the post office.

Bank Online

Though it may feel counterintuitive, online banking is actually safer in many ways.

You get 24/7 access to monitor your accounts and can set real-time alerts for activity.

Setting up online access yourself also helps block criminals from doing it with stolen identifying information.

Use Peer-to-Peer (P2P) Apps Safely

<u>P2P apps</u> like Venmo, Zelle and Cash App are convenient, but unlike credit cards, payments are instant and often irreversible.

Two common P2P-related scams are impersonation (relative in trouble and needs money quickly) and fake sellers on online marketplaces.

It's safest to use them to transact with people you know

MEDICARE SCAMS RISE ON RECYCLED LIES

Criminals follow the headlines and prey on what's top of mind, and for millions of Americans, this includes Medicare. The AARP Fraud Watch Network Helpline has seen an increase in reports of Medicare scams that recycle old tactics designed to steal money and sensitive information.

These schemes are part of a growing trend: government impostor scams. In 2024 alone, consumers reported having more than \$577 million stolen from criminals posing as officials from agencies like Medicare, according to the Federal Trade Commission. And because many incidents go unreported, the real number is likely much higher.

Here is what you, or a loved one, need to know to help spot and avoid **Medicare scams**.

HOW IT WORKS

You get unexpected and urgent communications from someone claiming to be from Medicare.

They may say you need a new card or that your birth date doesn't match their records.

They may warn that you're about to lose benefits if you don't act immediately.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

Criminals often use caller ID spoofing to make a call appear as if it's coming from Medicare or another trusted source.

They may sound legitimate and even reference some of your personal details, but their goal is to steal your personal information or your money.

Medicare will not call you unless you first receive a letter that you will be contacted or if you called and left a message.

Medicare does not issue plastic cards or call to offer new ones.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

If you're concerned there might be a problem, contact Medicare directly at Medicare.gov or 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227).

You can also reach out to the <u>Senior Medicare Patrol</u> in your area to report Medicare fraud or abuse and to seek assistance.

The <u>AARP Fraud Watch Network™</u> equips you with reliable, up-to-date insights and connects you to our free fraud helpline so you can better protect yourself and loved ones. We also advocate at the state, federal and local levels to enact policy changes that protect consumers and enforce laws.

ACCESSIBILITY COMPLIANCE **ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM**

The Accessibility Compliance Enforcement aide is a volunteer who has committed to serve a minimum of four hours each week to assist the community and the Phoenix Police Department. Volunteers patrol the city of Phoenix, writing disabled parking citations. The mission of the ACE Program is to provide safe and accessible parking spaces for the disabled community through enforcement and education. Directed patrol is accomplished by responding to locations identified through the disabled parking violation hotline, 602-534-SPACE.

The City of Phoenix has created the Save Our Space Campaign to educate the public about the importance of saving disabled parking spaces for those people who really need them. Recently, the City of Phoenix has more than doubled the fine for illegal use of designated accessible parking spaces. The fine for this violation is \$296/\$565.

The authority granted to the Accessibility Compliance Volunteers is limited to non-law- enforcement functions. ACE volunteers will not engage in any activities that would place them in the role of a sworn law enforcement officer, and/or subject them to unreasonable and unnecessary hazards.

MOTORIST ASSIST PROGRAM

The Motorist Assist aide is a volunteer who has committed to serve a minimum of four hours each week to assist members of the community and the Phoenix Police Department. Serving as a uniformed civilian, the volunteer assists motorists who have encountered vehicular problems while using city streets. Assistance provided may include, but is not limited to, pushing vehicles; starting vehicles; opening vehicle doors; providing fuel, air, or water; assisting with changing a tire/s; arranging transportation; or other assistance reasonably required to aid the temporarily stranded motorist.

Volunteers also work closely with sworn police personnel and may be called upon to assist at vehicular accident scenes for traffic control or other duties. In addition, the volunteer may be requested to assist at special events. The philosophy of the Motorist Assist Program is service as opposed to enforcement. The authority granted to Motorist Assist aides is limited to non-law-enforcement functions. Motorist assist aides will not engage in any activities that would place them in the role of a sworn law enforcement officer, and/or subject them to unreasonable hazards.

SWIMMING POOL SAFETY TIPS

Pool season is here, so take these steps to keep your park visitors safe this summer:

- 1. Remove toys and floats from the pool immediately after use; they can attract children.
- Always assign a designated watcher for children in and around the pool.
- Make sure there is a self-closing gate around your pool, and always keep it maintained.
- Gates and fences around the pool area should be at least 4 feet high.
- All pools should have regulation drain covers; discuss local regulations with your pool maintenance provider.
- Keep a fully stocked first aid kit and rescue equipment near your pool area.
- 7. Never swim alone.
- Learn to perform CPR on both adults and children.
- Post pool signs in prominent locations and make sure they are easily seen and read.
- 10. Inspect pool areas for slipping hazards and install safety tape as a precaution.

It's hotter than ever. No one can survive for long in a hot car. If you're tempted to leave a kid or a dog in a car, just don't do it. Not even for a minute.



Heatstroke can happen fast, but prevention is simple. Here's how you can protect the ones you love:

- Don't Leave Them Behind: No matter how quick the errand, NEVER leave a child or pet alone in a car.
- Set Reminders: If your routine changes, set a reminder or place a personal item in the back seat, next to your child. That way, you'll look before you lock.
- Lock Your Car: Keep your doors locked so curious kids don't climb in and get stuck.
- Take Action: Spot a child or pet alone in a car? Call 9-1-1 and get them out safely. And don't worry - the Good Samaritan Law protects you if you step in to help.

THE CITY OF PHOENIX CITYWIDE LOCKBOX PROGRAM



This program allows firefighters to gain entry to your home in case of emergency without causing any damage to your residence. This is done by utilizing a key that you provide in a secure lockbox attached to your entryway. This program not only provides free lockboxes to those vulnerable Phoenix residents; it also allows those who already have their own

lockbox in place to register their lockbox code with the fire department.

Free lockboxes are donated by the Phoenix Area Association of Realtors and are distributed on a first come, first served basis to vulnerable Phoenix residents who are 55+, have special needs or mobility issues.

Your information and the code to the lockbox is provided only to firefighters in the event there is an emergency call to your home. You will need to provide the appropriate key or keys to put in the lockbox at the time of the delivery.



The Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division has now issued more than 3 million Arizona Travel ID cards.

The federal requirement for domestic airline travelers to have a federally compliant ID is now in effect, meaning you will need an Arizona Travel ID, passport or other acceptable form of identification to more easily get past TSA checkpoints for domestic flights.



Join the 3 million – and counting – Arizonans who have upgraded to the Arizona Travel ID and consider upgrading your credential at least two weeks before your next flight. The new card may take up to 14 days to arrive in the mail.

Without the Arizona Travel ID or other form of compliant identification, fliers risk missing an airline flight because the standard driver license may not be accepted or additional screening time may be required.

This federally compliant credential is distinguished by a star in the upper right corner and is available to Arizona residents as a driver license or identification card.

To get an Arizona Travel ID, federal standards require the following:

- Proof of identity: a birth certificate or valid passport
- Social Security number: just the number, not the card
- Two documents proving Arizona residency, such as rental or bank statements, credit card or cellphone bills in your name with your current Arizona address

You can walk into an office for this service, but we suggest scheduling an appointment at azmvdnow.gov. Even if you haven't activated your AZ MVD NOW account, you can still schedule an appointment. You can also go to any authorized third party location, which may have extended hours, including Saturdays.

People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S. They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States. The Biden administration has invested more than \$400 million in beefing up crisis centers and other mental health services to support the 988 system.

Suicide Warning Signs

These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

- such as searching online or buying a gun.
- Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live
- Talking about feeling trapped or in . Showing rage or talking about unbearable pain.
- Talking about being a burden to others.

 - Sleeping too little or too much.
