PHOENIX PD APP

The Phoenix Police Department has a mobile APP, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place. Users can use the app to access online reporting, crime statistics, precinct locations, phone numbers, career opportunities, virtual block watch, victims' rights information, and more. Users can also turn on notifications from the precinct they live in to receive news updates and information on events in their area.

The APP is now available both in the Apple Store for iOS and in the Google Play Store for Android.

Report graffiti on the Phoenix PD app! Graffiti can now be reported on the Police Department APP released in January 2021. Studies show that if graffiti is removed within 24 hours, there is a 90% likelihood that the graffiti reporter will not have to use the app to have it removed! #GraffitiFreePHX

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anvone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? -Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- **Who -** is calling? Give your name, location, and phone number. (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

TEXT 9-1-1 "Call if you can. Text if you can't." After months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disabled community (or advocates for the disabled) if you are in imminent danger and are unable to talk to a 911 operator, you now have for the first time in Phoenix the ability to text to 9-1-1.

HOLIDAY SEASON CRIME PREVENTION

Another year has gone by, and the holidays are approaching fast. The holiday season is a time for reflection, celebration, and renewal and as we do these things let us all remember the less fortunate or those having difficulties, temporary or permanent. There are many ways we can assist, from the donation of time, money, or gifts to even the small things like being courteous or polite during this hectic season. Here are some tips to have a safe holiday season.

This past year has been another active one for law enforcement and Phoenix PD in many ways. There are always too many tragic events across this country or in this community to mention but the officers of the Phoenix Police Department will continue to serve the citizens of Phoenix in a respectful and professional manner. We appreciate and are very thankful for the continued gestures and words of support that we get from everyone, it means a lot to the officers to know that they are supported in their jobs.

This time of year, also brings many events to attend, family to visit, traveling, shopping and much more. Many of you will not think of crime prevention during these festive times but a few simple reminders will help reduce the opportunities for you and your family to be a victim.

- 1. When walking to and from stores keep your head up and be aware of your surroundings. Walk with a purpose, do not divert your attention by texting or talking on the phone, digging for car keys, or be burdened with too many bags.
- 2. Park in a well-lit area, do not park in dark or faraway places. I know it is difficult to find good parking but do the best you can. If you go in during daylight hours and think you might be inside until it is dark, park as if it were dark.
- 3. Roll the windows on your car all the way up and LOCK your car. Do not leave valuables, packages, or even gym bags, in plain view inside the car; put them all in the trunk. Gym bags or other bags in view may not have but a few items of clothes in them but the thieves do not know that and will try anyways.
- 4. When parking your cars at home, get them in the garage if you can. If you must park in the driveway or street, remove all valuables, garage door openers, and lock the car. Many thieves will break into a car just to take the garage opener and then use it to take items from the garage or enter the house at a later time.
- 5. Do not keep large amounts of cash with you or display cash when shopping. Take with you only what you need for the day. Be on guard while at ATM's.
- 6. Keep a constant eye on your children and ALWAYS know where they are. Children are easily distracted by the decorations and excitement of the holidays and may wander off in only a couple seconds.
- 7. Do not drink and drive, please use a designated driver, call a taxi or uber. This time of the year many people have holiday functions

from work or family and drink when they usually don't and make a bad decision to drive which could end up having tragic consequences. Please enjoy the season but drive responsibly and patiently.

- 8. Make sure the doors and windows to your home are locked, the front lights are on all night and keep a watchful eye for suspicious activity. If you are expecting deliveries and you will not be home, ask a trusted neighbor to pick them up when they arrive. Please call Crime Stop at 602-262-6151 if you see suspicious activity.
- 9. Please drive carefully, schools will be out on winter break and many kids will be out in the neighborhoods trying out new bikes, toys, and you need to be aware of their presence.
- 10. If you are going to be out of town for a winter vacation, tell a trusted neighbor to watch over your house, do not post on social media that you will be gone and call the Black Mountain Precinct at 602-495-5002 and ask for a Vacation Watch. Officers can check on your house while you are gone if the radio calls allow them to.
- 11. Lastly, be patient. The crowds are larger, people are rushed and stressed. Some people do not like the holidays and can act out so please exercise patience and we all can enjoy the holidays in our own way.



If you have Mileage Reimbursement funds in your current BW Grant this is important info for you. The mileage reimbursement rate increased as of January 1, 2025. It is now 70 cents a mile.

Message from Vice Mayor Ann O'Brien

DVUSD Override & Land Sale Ballot Measures November 4, 2025, Election day

This upcoming November 4, election, the Deer Valley Unified School District (DVUSD) will ask voters to decide on two measures: the renewal of a 15% Maintenance and



Operations (M&O) Override and the approval of a district land sale. Both items will appear on a mail-in ballot for all residents living within DVUSD boundaries.

This marks the district's third attempt to pass the override after unsuccessful efforts in 2023 and 2024. The failed votes forced DVUSD to cut \$11 million from its current 2025-26 budget in the first year of a three-year phase-out of the existing override. If voters do not approve the measure this year, the district projects an additional \$22 million reduction in funding over the next two years.

The override would cost homeowners an average of \$20.67 per month—or about \$248 annually—based on a \$500,000 assessed home value. The M&O Override directly supports students through:

Full-Day Kindergarten

Continue FREE, full-day Kindergarten currently covered by the override. The state of Arizona only funds half day Kindergarten programs. The remaining half day is funded by the Override funding.

Teacher Retention

Retaining and recruiting qualified educators with 8% of 0 all current DVUSD employee salaries covered by the override.

Support Staff

Continue funding for essential student support positions, including counselors, reading specialists, and other support staff.

Class Sizes

Maintain small class sizes which allows for more 0 individualized students support. Without funding, classroom sizes may increase by an average of 3 students.

Specialized Programs

Continue to offer sought-after programs for gifted students, language immersion programs, and online education.

Extracurricular

Ensure ongoing support for state and national championship athletics, fine arts, band, choir, PE, theater, and dance, ROTC programs.

The District land sale must also be voter-approved. This land sale involves approximately 19 acres of land northwest of Happy Valley Road and 83rd Avenue in Peoria. The land was originally donated by a developer and is currently unusable for DVUSD due to a lack of road access to the land

Proceeds from the sale have limited uses, but can be applied toward items such as facilities, technology, transportation, and other infrastructure needs that benefit students.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens, and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the dates you can request four times a year for Bulk Trash pickup.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. ¼ minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 50% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

CRIME TIPS:

FAMOUS FACES, FAKE MESSAGES

Social media can make it feel like we're closer than ever to our favorite celebrities. But if you suddenly get a private message from a musician, actor, or athlete you admire, don't get starstruck – get skeptical. It's almost certainly a scam.

Criminals are using artificial intelligence (AI) to impersonate celebrities – from Brad Pitt to Elon Musk – and steal fans' savings. Here's how these scams work and how you can protect yourself.

HOW IT WORKS

You follow your favorite celebrity on social media and regularly like or comment on their posts.

One day, you get a private message claiming to be from the celebrity or a member of their team, like their manager, offering exclusive access, an invitation to a special event, or to ask for help supporting a charity.

Over time, the "celebrity" claims a financial need and asks for your help.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

That personal attention isn't from the celebrity. It's from a criminal impersonating them or someone close to them. Scammers tailor the scam tactic based on the target's responses to lean

Scammers tailor the scam tactic based on the target's responses to lean into a romance scam or perhaps a charity scam. The story may change, but the goal is always the same – to steal money and personal information. They often urge targets to move the conversation off social media to a platform like WhatsApp, Telegram, or Signal; they may steal the target's funds by coaching them on how to use gift cards or cryptocurrency to send money on false pretenses.

With AI, criminals can now clone voices, create fake videos and livestreams, and post convincing ads, making impostor scams even harder to spot.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

Enjoy following celebrities online, but know that engaging with their posts could make you more visible to scammers.

Anytime an unexpected communication puts you into a state of high emotion (like excitement) and involves urgency, let that be your signal to disengage because it's likely a scam.

Report fake celebrity accounts or impostors directly to the social media platform; victims should report to law enforcement and insist on a record in the event of possible future restitution.

MAKE CYBERSECURITY A YEAR-ROUND PRIORITY

October was National Cybersecurity Awareness Month — a timely reminder of how much of our lives happen online and the risks that come with it. Any device that stores information or connects to the internet could become a target for cybercriminals seeking to steal from you.

In past alerts, we've shared tips to stay safe, like creating strong passwords, enabling multi-factor authentication, and turning on automatic updates. Now we're highlighting three more steps you can take to help protect your personal information.

Use a VPN for Public Wi-Fi

A <u>virtual private network (VPN)</u> secures your internet connection by encrypting your data, making it unreadable to anyone who tries to access it

VPNs also mask your online identity, providing added protection when connected to public Wi-Fi.

Some well-known VPN options include ExpressVPN, NordVPN and ProtonVPN, or you can find VPNs bundled in cybersecurity suites like McAfee and Norton.

Change the Password on Your Wi-Fi Router

Your home router is the hub that connects all your devices — from TVs and thermostats to video doorbells, smart speakers, and appliances — to the internet

Most routers come with default passwords that are easy to hack and can leave your home network vulnerable.

Think of your router password as the master key to your digital life. Updating it with a strong, unique password helps keep bad actors out.

Secure Your Social Media Accounts

Criminals leverage social media to gather personal information that they can use to deceive you into believing something that isn't true. It's likely where most information is gleaned for the grandparent scam, for example.

Review your <u>privacy settings</u> and limit who can see your posts and which apps have access to your account.

Be mindful of what you share. For example, posting vacation photos while you're away signals that your home is empty.

MEDICARE SEASON IS SCAM SEASON

October marked the start of Medicare open enrollment, and unfortunately, the peak season for Medicare fraud. From October 15 to December 7, eligible beneficiaries can review options and make changes to their Medicare health and Part D prescription drug plans.

It's always a good idea to compare your options, especially if your health needs have changed. However, be cautious. Not every offer is what it seems as criminals often take advantage of this heightened public attention to target beneficiaries.

If you or a loved one is on Medicare, here are some tips to help avoid scams during this open enrollment season.

HOW IT WORKS

You receive a call, text, email or in-person visit from someone claiming to be a Medicare agent or insurance provider.

You may be urged to act quickly to avoid losing your benefits, pressured to purchase a limited-time offer that promises to save you thousands of dollars or enticed with a free gift.

They may request sensitive information, such as your Medicare and Social Security numbers or bank and credit card information.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

Criminals often use caller ID spoofing to make a call appear as if it's coming from Medicare or a trusted source.

The scammers may sound professional, claim to represent Medicare and have some of your personal information. But in reality, they're trying to steal your money, Medicare information or identity.

Legitimate government agencies won't contact you by phone unless you've called 800-MEDICARE (800-633-4227) first.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

Protect sensitive information by not sharing it with anyone who contacts you out of the blue.

Be suspicious of unsolicited offers for a new Medicare plan and don't be rushed into making a decision. You have until December 7 to enroll, and Medicare doesn't offer extra benefits for signing up early.

Safely compare plans and change enrollment by going

to medicare.gov or calling 800-633-4227.

Each state also has a <u>State Health Insurance Assistance Program</u> (<u>SHIP</u>) that offers unbiased, one-on-one counseling to help you navigate the complexities of Medicare.

Contact <u>Senior Medicare Patrol</u> in your area to report Medicare fraud or to seek assistance.

The Phoenix Fire Department appreciates your assistance in helping to get this vital information out to your neighbors and encouraging them to do their part in helping us protect their homes from brush or wildland fires. Every year, the Sonoran Desert and preserve areas, which are an integral part of our community, provide us with real potential for significant wildfire. Often, the welcome winter and spring rains

bring with them the potential for substantial vegetation growth. Most years, a lack of moisture will result in all our vegetation having lower than normal core moisture content, quickly drying out in the hot summer sun, and creating additional intensity for a wildland fire. We need everyone's assistance to help minimize the risk of these types of incidents. Please take the opportunity to establish defensible space that will help us protect your property from a brush fire. Below are some guidelines you can use in your newsletters to help manage the vegetation and plant/fuel loads. The Fire Department asks for your help and recommends Phoenix residents: • Remove dry and dead vegetation around your home and property to establish a "defensible safety zone." • Trim up your tree canopies and remove any dead branches or accumulations of flash/grass fuels and leaves from underneath, especially in the defensible space areas near the structures. • Do not keep flammable items or foliage under patio roofs or overhangs. • Keep any gutters, eaves, and the roof clear of tree branches, leaves, or debris. To get more wildland safety tips from the Fire Department, please visit the Phoenix Fire Department website at phoenix.gov/fire, or you can use the QR code below to request a free wildland community safety inspection through a partnership of the Department of Fire and Forestry Management (DFFM) and the Phoenix Fire Department to become recognized as a Firewise/USA Community. Firewise USA is a program to assist communities and HOAs in getting organized, finding direction, and taking action to reduce wildfire risks locally.

THE CITY OF PHOENIX CITYWIDE LOCKBOX PROGRAM

This program allows firefighters to gain entry to your home in case of emergency without causing any damage to your residence. This is done by utilizing a key that you provide in a secure lockbox attached to your entryway. This program not only provides free lockboxes to those vulnerable Phoenix residents, it also allows those who already have their own lockbox in place to register their lockbox code with the fire department.

Free lockboxes are donated by the Phoenix Area Association of Realtors and are distributed on a first come, first served basis to vulnerable Phoenix residents who are 55+, have special needs or mobility issues.

Your information and the code to the lockbox is provided only to firefighters in the event there is an emergency call to your home. You will need to provide the appropriate key or keys to put in the lockbox at the time of the delivery. NEW LAWS YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT

- Mandatory Reporting: Expands the list of who must report child abuse, neglect, and sexual abuse, and makes sure those reports go to the right agency.

Why it matters: These changes give prosecutors stronger tools to protect children, animals, and the entire community.

RAVE ALERTS: EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION



The Maricopa County Sheriff's Office has implemented a new emergency alert system, RAVE Alerts, a system procured for the 81 public safety answering points (PSAPs) in Arizona. RAVE Alerts will be used by 9-1-1 centers to notify the public during emergencies including:

- incidents of public safety concerns,
- traffic accidents.
- missing persons,
- wildfire evacuations,
- flooding, etc.

RAVE Alerts are a free service that allows users to sign up online to receive customized alerts via text message, email, and voice message and are available to anyone who lives, works, travels through, or visits Maricopa County. 

CONTACTING ADOT FRAUD HOTLINE SOLVES OUT-OF-STATE REGISTRATION ISSUE

ADOT detectives trained to investigate vehicle and driver license fraud

Contacting ADOT's Fraud Hotline helped a California resident renew his vehicle registration after learning that the vehicle was also registered in Arizona.

ADOT received the complaint on Sept. 2, after attempting to renew the vehicle registration in California, but he was told that the vehicle was now titled in Arizona. The owner provided ADOT detectives with several documents to show current ownership and use of the vehicle in that state, including the previous registration and California title in his name.

After the constituent contacted the <u>ADOT Fraud Hotline</u>, detectives with ADOT's Office of Inspector General looked into the complaint and discovered a vehicle with the same VIN was registered in Arizona on Feb. 21, 2024. Additional research revealed the vehicle was reported stolen by the San Diego Police Department on July 3, 2022.

A duplicate California title with the victim's name and signature had been used to title the stolen vehicle in Arizona. The victim stated he had never sold the vehicle, never accepted money for it, and did not sign a title or request a duplicate title and he was unaware how someone would have obtained it. He also confirmed the address used on the duplicate title was not his and he had no knowledge of that address.

On Sept. 10, 2025, ADOT detectives canceled the Arizona title, which allowed the victim to obtain registration for the true vehicle in California. The stolen vehicle was seized and turned over to DPS so the rightful owner could be notified and the vehicle returned to them.

"We are very pleased to hear that the victim was happy with our efforts to help get his vehicle properly registered in his home state," said Lieutenant Jason Henderson with ADOT's Office of Inspector General. "It is also a great feeling to help get a stolen vehicle off Arizona streets and back to the rightful owner. We encourage anyone who suspects fraudulent activity against their driver license or ID card, vehicle registration or title to report it immediately."

ADOT's 24-hour Fraud Hotline is available to those who suspect fraud or criminal activity involving driver licenses, title and registration. Please call 877.712.2370, email fraud@azdot.gov or file a report at azdot.gov/incident-report.

Detectives with ADOT's Office of Inspector General, which is part of the Enforcement and Compliance Division, also investigate fraud involving driver licenses, VIN inspections, as well as licensed and unlicensed vehicle dealerships. They also support investigations by state, local and federal law enforcement.

People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S.

They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-8.

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States. The Biden administration has invested more than \$400 million in beefing up crisis centers and other mental health services to support the 988 system.

These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.
