

PHOENIX PD APP

The Phoenix Police Department has a mobile APP, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place. Users can use the app to access online reporting, crime statistics, precinct locations, phone numbers, career opportunities, virtual block watch, victims' rights information, and more. Users can also turn on notifications from the precinct they live in to receive news updates and information on events in their area.

The APP is now available both in the Apple Store for iOS and in the Google Play Store for Android.

Report graffiti on the Phoenix PD app! Graffiti can now be reported on the Police Department APP released in January 2021. Studies show that if graffiti is removed within 24 hours, there is a 90% likelihood that the graffiti reporter will not have to use the app to have it removed! #GraffitiFreePHX

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anvone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? -Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- **Who -** is calling? Give your name, location, and phone number. (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

TEXT 9-1-1 "Call if you can. Text if you can't." After months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disabled community (or advocates for the disabled) if you are in imminent danger and are unable to talk to a 911 operator, you now have for the first time in Phoenix the ability to text to 9-1-1.





The City of Phoenix and the Phoenix Public Works Department are excited to announce the city's acceptance into the prestigious <u>European Union Cities Gateway North America Program</u>. This program connects cities in the U.S., Canada, and Europe to work together on challenges like reducing waste and protecting the environment.

Phoenix will be part of a group focused on the circular economy—a way of reusing, recycling and re-purposing materials instead of throwing them away. This helps reduce waste, save resources, and support local businesses that turn waste into useful products.

The Cities Gateway Program is a European Union funded program running from 2025-2028, designed to strengthen cooperation between cities and regions in the EU, the U.S., and Canada. Building on the Global Covenant of Mayors in North America and the International Urban and Regional Cooperation (IURC) in North America, the program enhances transatlantic collaboration by bringing local entities together to co-develop practical solutions to shared urban and regional challenges and promote forward-looking urban transformation.

"Phoenix is home to creative entrepreneurs, academics, and businesses who are turning waste into resources by creating new products from materials that were once destined for the landfill," Mayor Kate Gallego said. "I'm proud that Phoenix's circular economy expertise is recognized among some of the world's most innovative communities in the EU Cities Gateway Program. Through this collaborative initiative, we're excited to share strategies to reduce waste, strengthen local economies, and make our cities more sustainable."

Within the circular economy cluster, Phoenix will be participating in peer-topeer exchanges and working sessions, co-designing pilot projects that address local and global urban challenges, joining site visits and international events to share experiences and showcase results, and benefiting from a network of experts and resources to support the city's Zero Waste and Circular Economy initiatives.

"We are honored to be a part of the EU Cities Gateway – North America Program," said Felipe Moreno, director of Public Works. "The City of Phoenix has long been a leader in waste diversion and circular economy efforts through our innovative programs and partnerships, and we look forward to collaborating with the other program participants."

Other selected cities for this cluster include Boulder, Colorado; Guelph, Ontario, Canada; Greater Porto Region, Portugal; Albacete, Spain; and Riga, Latvia.

Message from Vice Mayor Ann O'Brien

Ready, set...done! I was honored to help kick off the Phoenix Marathon! Until Saturday, we were the largest city in the U.S. without a signature marathon. There are other races that run through Phoenix, but the Phoenix Marathon is the first route to stay completely within City limits. The historic event, which included a full marathon (26.2 miles), half-marathon, and 5K, began at Deer Valley Towne Center and finished near Papago Park. With thousands of mostly out-of-state attendees, the economic impact is estimated to be between \$1.5 and \$2 million. Brooksee, the company that organized the event, paid for police staffing and clean-up along the route.

Speaking of runs, I want to thank everyone involved in last weekend's Metro District Fun Run and Walk. Every step supports Arizona Law Enforcement Officers Shop with a Cop, a program that brings holiday magic to local children. The 5K run and 1-mile fun run/walk also champions the important work of the Metro District Community Collaboration, a nonprofit dedicated to revitalizing the former Metrocenter Mall area. It's inspiring to see our businesses, community organizations, and police officers working together so well!

Thanks to our Parks and Recreation Department, Ability 360, and Integrity Foundation volunteers, we held a grand reopening for the playground at Telephone Pioneer Park. When the park at 19th Avenue and Morningside Drive opened in 1988, it was the first barrier-free park in the United States. This week, it became even better! Our Parks Department worked closely with Ability360 and accessibility experts to design upgrades that meet the widest range of abilities, sizes, and needs. We now have a smooth playground surface, new swings, signs with Braille, and wonderful communication boards in English and Spanish that educate people on sign language. My granddaughter Rylee and I enjoyed learning how to sign "play" and "friend." Parks should be places where everyone feels welcome and Telephone Pioneer Park continues to lead the way!

I attended a groundbreaking for ReDiscover Logistics Park just off Interstate 17 and Loop 101. ReDiscover is an easy name for me to remember because it's the site of the former Discover Financial Services campus. The project will offer 800,000 square feet of industrial space starting in early 2027. ReDiscover arrives at a critical time. Thanks to the presence of TSMC's semiconductor campus, North Phoenix—and Deer Valley especially—has become one of the fastest-growing industrial and technology hubs in the country. This is smart development—transforming an underutilized property into a Class A industrial park with the kind of specifications that attract premier tenants and support long-term employment. What this means for our city is real and tangible. The construction jobs created here will provide stability and career pathways for local residents. Once complete, ReDiscover will attract employers offering long-term jobs with a workforce that will strengthen our logistics and manufacturing infrastructure, as well as support a supply-chain ecosystem that extends well beyond Phoenix.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens, and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the dates you can request four times a year for Bulk Trash pickup.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust-free parking surface. The stone must be 1/4 - 3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. ¼ minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 50% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

CRIME TIPS:

SCAMMERS FOLLOW THE HEADLINES

When major political events dominate the news—such as the recent federal government shutdown or rumored changes to benefits—criminals use that uncertainty to their advantage. They may pose as trusted agencies like the Social Security Administration, Medicare, the Internal Revenue Service, or the Department of Veterans Affairs in their schemes

According to the <u>Federal Trade Commission</u>, victims of government impostor scams reported over \$577 million stolen from them in 2024—but because of underreporting, the actual number is likely significantly higher. As this trend has continued to rise in 2025, here's what you need to know to help spot and avoid government impostor scams.

HOW IT WORKS

You receive an unexpected call, text, or email from someone claiming to be from a government agency.

They reference real news events and pressure you to act quickly—whether to secure benefits (such as <u>Social Security's cost-of-living</u> adjustment) or to resolve an urgent problem with your account.

They may demand a "processing fee" or request personal or financial information to release benefits or resolve the issue.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

These communications can sound professional, may spoof legitimate phone numbers, and might include some of your personal details. The goal, however, is to steal your money or sensitive information.

Government agencies do not contact people out of the blue with promises of money or threats that require immediate action. Treat any such outreach as a fraud attempt.

Legitimate agencies also never demand payment by gift card, cryptocurrency, cash, or wire transfer.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

Avoid engaging with anyone who unexpectedly contacts you and claims to be a local, state, or federal agency official.

If the message seems like it could be legitimate, contact the agency directly using a verified phone number from its official website or a prior statement.

If you shared personal information and feel it was part of a scam, go to IdentityTheft.gov for step-by-step guidance on protecting yourself—or recovering—from identity fraud.

TRENDING SCAMS OF 2025

The <u>AARP Fraud Watch Network Helpline</u> is a free service where you can report suspected fraud, get help determining if something is legitimate, or seek support if you or someone you care about has become a victim. Each year, we receive around 100,000 calls. Here's a look back at some of the trends we saw in 2025.

If you learn something new in this alert, please share it with your friends and loved ones. Awareness plays a significant role in staying safe from these crimes.

ID THEFT

<u>Identity theft</u> remains widespread, as criminals use stolen personal information for their own gain.

Criminals obtain personal information in many ways—from large-scale data breaches to phishing links and malware-infected sites that collect your data, as well as low-tech tactics like stealing mail or searching through trash.

Identity theft becomes identity fraud when someone uses your information for financial gain—opening new accounts, filing for government benefits, submitting false tax returns, or taking over existing accounts. This can be done by the criminal who originally stole your data or by someone who purchased it.

It's a massive and growing problem, but there are steps to reduce risk, including creating stronger passwords, using multi-factor authentication, and reviewing and freezing your credit reports.

BUSINESS IMPOSTOR

<u>Business impostor</u> scams continue to thrive and are becoming more sophisticated over time.

These schemes frequently start with an unexpected call, email, text or social media message that appears to come from a business you rely on—your bank, utility provider, shipping company or other familiar entity.

Criminals seek to get us into a state of fear or excitement, claiming there's a problem with your account, or that you've just won a big prize. They know that if they can get us into a heightened state of emotion, our brains go right to addressing the issue at hand, casting logic aside. Today, unsolicited messages of any kind deserve extra caution. If you're concerned there may be a real issue, contact the business directly at a number or site you know to be legitimate.

ROMANCE SCAMS

Romance scams once again come in among the most common scams this year.

They often begin online through dating sites, social media, or even a "wrong number" text.

A conversation begins, and trust develops over time. Then come the requests for money to help resolve some type of problem. Or in a newer twist, your love interest encourages you to invest in cryptocurrency—often a tactic to steer people toward fake platforms.

Be cautious of fast-moving relationships, especially if they urge secrecy. If something feels off, talk it through with a trusted friend or family member.

Knowledge gives you power over scams. THE CITY OF PHOENIX CITYWIDE LOCKBOX PROGRAM

This program allows firefighters to gain entry to your home in case of emergency without causing any damage to your residence. This is done by utilizing a key that you provide in a secure lockbox attached to your entryway. This program not only provides free lockboxes to those vulnerable Phoenix residents, it also allows those who already have their own lockbox in place to register their lockbox code with the fire department.

Free lockboxes are donated by the Phoenix Area Association of Realtors and are distributed on a first come, first served basis to vulnerable Phoenix residents who are 55+, have special needs or mobility issues.

Your information and the code to the lockbox is provided only to firefighters in the event there is an emergency call to your home. You will need to provide the appropriate key or keys to put in the lockbox at the time of the delivery. CYBER PREDATORS, REAL RISKS

Whenever your kid is online, a predator is waiting. In 2024, the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children received more than 546,000 reports of children being groomed online for sex acts. That's an alarming increase of 192% from 2023 and 578% from 2022.

This site gives you the tools you need to:

- Understand predator tactics
- Spot red flags
- Act fast to protect your child.

Report, Don't Repost: Cyber Predators, Real Risks is an ongoing project. MCAO will update this space regularly with new information to help you protect your children from the risks lurking online and on social apps.

The relationship between a predator and your child can develop alarmingly fast – sometimes in a matter of hours. How do predators do target your kids?

- Pretend to have shared interests
- "Love bomb" or compliment the child excessively
- Try to make the child feel guilty if they don't do what the predator wants
- Gradually make the conversation and content more sexual
- · Push boundaries to see how far the child will go
- Ask to move the conversation to another platform with video chat or private messaging
- Tell the child to keep the relationship a secret
- Promise gifts such as gift cards, game credits, food, alcohol or drugs
- Isolate the child from friends and family
- Try to meet the child in real life

BOARD APPROVES MODERNIZED ZONING ORDINANCE

Changes address housing needs, eliminate unnecessary regulations PHOENIX (Dec. 10, 2025)—Maricopa County has adopted a simplified zoning ordinance that provides more flexibility for housing projects along with detailed guidance for emerging technologies such as data centers. The Board of Supervisors voted unanimously today to approve significant updates to the decades-old ordinance.

"Zoning decisions at the county level can have a significant impact on quality of life—from individual homeowners or renters to major companies looking to bring their business here," said Board Chairman Thomas Galvin, District 2. "The changes we've made will facilitate greater housing options, provide clarity for projects of all types, and protect the integrity of our communities. I am grateful to the task force members who guided this process, the stakeholders who provided input, and the Planning and Development staff who put their time, energy, and expertise into getting the details right."

In his Chairman's Speech in January, Galvin called for the overhaul of Maricopa County's zoning ordinance as part of a series of reforms to make housing more available and affordable. More than 160 people participated in stakeholder meetings during the transparent, nearly sixmonth-long process. Hundreds of community members provided feedback at public meetings or via an online survey. Among the key changes to the Maricopa County Zoning Ordinance:

- Allows for multiple accessory dwelling units to a single-family residence, in accordance with state law.
- Allows for short-term rentals in accordance with state law, but with limits that protect neighborhood quality of life.
- Removes the "plan of development" requirement for smaller multi-family residential projects, which may now proceed directly to the building permit process.
- Adjusts the approval process for Temporary Use Permits to enable more timely processing.
- Clarifies and expands definitions, including for emerging technologies such as Battery Energy Storage Systems and Data Centers.
- Eliminates various restrictions in single-family residential zoning, Rural-43 zoning, and industrial zoning districts.
- Updates drainage, violation, and compliance sections to align with current best practices.
- Consolidates 201 land use categories into 137 for all zoning districts.

Delivering on Chairman Galvin's promise to "eliminate red tape that doesn't serve a public safety purpose," the new ordinance removes 53 pages and nearly 15,000 words from the original document. New tables and charts provide quick and easy-to-read reference points for developers. The updated Maricopa County Zoning Ordinance is posted on the Planning and Development Department website for reference. Background on the project can be found at Maricopa.gov/ZoningUpdate.

MARICOPA COUNTY TO EXPLORE CREATION OF NEW NON-PROFIT TO SUPPORT SHELTER PETS



Phoenix, AZ (Dec.10, 2025)— Maricopa County is leading the effort to create a new nonprofit that will benefit pets throughout the region. The Friends of Animal Care and Control will raise funds to enhance the resources available to pets in the community, while easing the pressure on public resources.

"I want to build a community where every dog has a home," said Thomas Galvin Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, District 2. "Providing a funding source for county animal shelters beyond what's allocated in the general fund not only enables better care for animals in need, but it also saves taxpayer money. It's a win-win for both our two-and four-legged residents."

On Wednesday, the Board of Supervisors voted to increase the expenditure authority for Maricopa County Animal Care and Control's (MCACC) Donation Fund up to \$350,000, which will allow MCACC to explore the formation of the Friends of Animal Care and Control.

"While we are able to accept donations currently, The Friends of Animal Care and Control will allow MCACC to work more closely with donors, and it will provide opportunities for grants that are only available to non-profits," said MCACC Director Debbie McKnight. "This new non-profit will have a singular goal: funding programs and services that directly or indirectly serve the homeless pet population."

The Friends of Animal Care and Control is one of several ways MCACC is working to improve care for animals in the community.

This year, MCACC also launched their <u>Evaluation & Enrichment Team</u>, which plays a crucial role in ensuring dogs receive both in-kennel and out-of-kennel enrichment—everything from stuffed Kongs to playgroups. In March, MCACC opened the <u>Everyday Adoption Center</u> (EAC) inside the PetSmart in Old Town Scottsdale. The EAC can house more than 40 dogs, and its' convenient location has helped more animals find homes. By November, the center hit 1,000 adoptions!

In July, MCACC expanded adoption hours by two hours every day of the week, giving customers more time during their busy schedules to come find their forever friend.

In August, MCACC had a record-breaking day with 202 adoptions—including nearly emptying the Everyday Adoption Center.

In November, MCACC held its largest <u>Care on the Go event</u> in the State Farm Stadium parking lot, where more than 800 pets received free vaccines, microchips, and licensing services at no cost.

MCACC finds good outcomes and forever homes for the vast majority of animals in its care, maintaining a save rate above 90% for the past eight years.





People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S.

They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-8.

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States. The Biden administration has invested more than \$400 million in beefing up crisis centers and other mental health services to support the 988 system.

Suicide Warning Signs

These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

- kill oneself. Looking for a way to kill oneself.
- such as searching online or buying a gun.
- Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live
- Talking about feeling trapped or in . Showing rage or talking about unbearable pain.
- Talking about being a burden to others.
- Talking about wanting to die or to . Increasing the use of alcohol or drugs.
 - . Acting anxious or agitated; behaving recklessly.
 - Sleeping too little or too much.
 - . Withdrawing or feeling isolated.
 - seeking revenge.
 - Displaying extreme mood swings.
