WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

- **What** - is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- **What** - happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- **When** - did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- **Was** - anyone hurt?
- **Weapons** - are there weapons involved?
- **What** - manner did they leave or arrive – foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- **Who** - did it? –Suspect description
- **Where** - did the suspect go? – What direction
- **What** - did the suspect obtain? – type and amount
- **Who** - is calling? – Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

TEXT 9-1-1 "Call if you can. Text if you can't." After months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community (or advocates for the disabled) if you are in imminent danger and are unable to talk to a 911 operator, you now have for the first time in Phoenix the ability to text to 9-1-1.

We would like to give you a few safety reminders so that everyone can have a good Halloween Holiday.

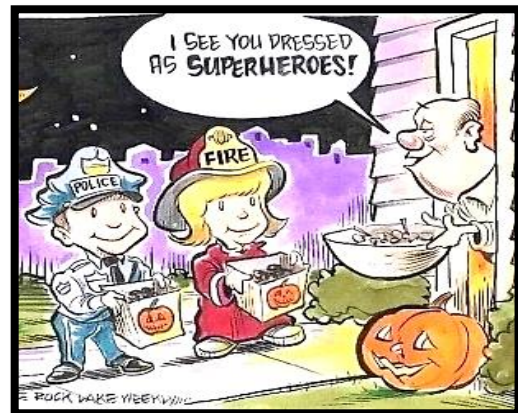
We have no idea what the weather may be like this coming Halloween. Living in Phoenix, Arizona, it could be anywhere from low 70's to the 100's. Please check the weather prior to going out and make sure the kids are wearing weather appropriate clothing for them to enjoy the evening and to be comfortable.

As you prepare to go out, if you cannot join the younger children, send a responsible adult with them to avoid going out by themselves. Try to wear bright light colors, carry a flashlight, glow sticks or put reflective tape on your clothes/costumes and theirs. Avoid masks that make visibility difficult or are too big causing children to frequently adjust them. Make sure to stay on sidewalks and use crosswalks. Most importantly make sure to look both ways before you cross the street and remind the kids to do the same. When going to the various Halloween locations i.e. businesses, homes or events, do not allow children to go into strangers' homes or vehicles. Only go to houses that have lights on and have clear indications they are participating in trick or treating. Please designate a sober driver if you are attending any parties. After you are done with all the fun, please check and double check all candy before allowing anyone to enjoy it.

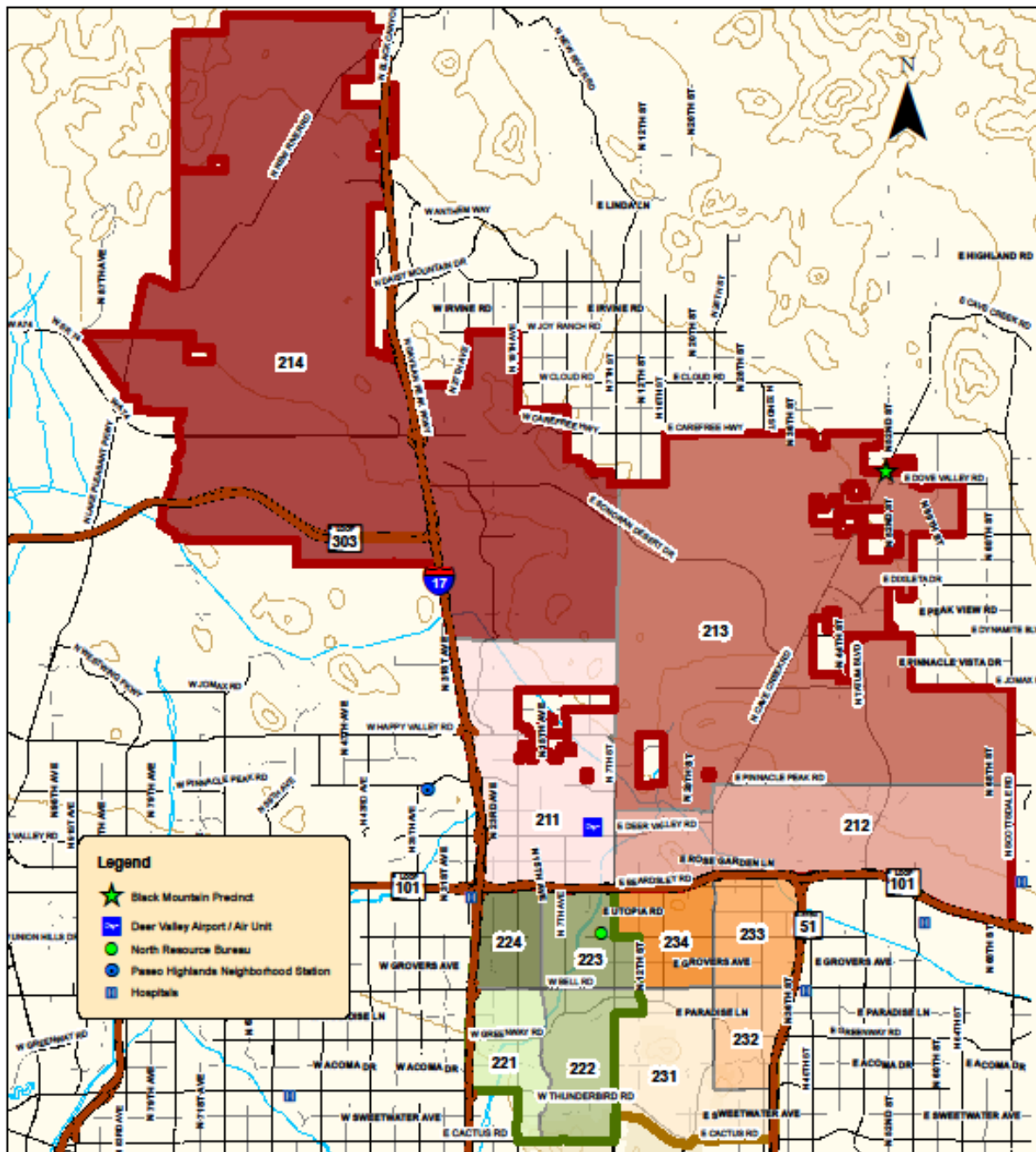

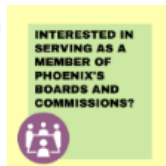

APPOINTMENT BASED BULK TRASH SCHEDULING

What are the benefits of Bulk Trash by Appointment?

Convenience - The scheduling model will allow residents flexibility and convenience according to their own needs. For example, a customer could avoid placing bulk items out during the heat of summer months and schedule appointments only in the winter. Or someone who is slowly cleaning out their garage could schedule all four collections in the same month if they wanted to.

Reduced blight - Because customers may begin putting items on the edge of their property no earlier than seven days before their selected collection day, trash will be left out for a significantly shorter amount of time.

Blockout dates -- The new model will not allow customers to schedule collection on dates surrounding Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Day each year. This will help eliminate unsightly trash piles during times when visitors and trick-or-treaters are out and about.

Streamlined process -- Because Public Works will be able to build collection routes according to scheduled appointments, items won't be sitting outside as long, staff workloads will be more equitable, and equipment operators will spend less time outside during the hottest parts of the day.

Monday, September 30, 2024 – First day of Bulk Trash by Appointment. All collections from this point on must be scheduled online.

District 3 Vice Mayor Deb Stark introduced her new Chief of Staff Haleigh Owens. She said that City Council will not be signing a consent decree with the DOJ. She talked about the traffic concerns in her district such as speeding and the red light running. District 3 has the most G.A.I.N. Events coming up!

NSD:



Johnny Mendoza said that he is the Neighborhood Specialist for District 1. He brought some information that will be on the table.



Black Mountain Precinct Updates



Cmdr. Matt Siekmann said it is good to see everyone after the summer break. He talked about the DOJ report and how he disagrees with several items in it. He is happy we have such good leadership in our City Council and with Chiefs Williams and Sullivan who have implemented many positive changes over the past several years. Our staffing in Black Mountain Precinct continues to be challenging as we slowly receive new officers. Our CAOs have become one of our most valuable resources in the precinct. Thank you. The crime stats in our precinct are: violent crime is down 14%, property crime down 21%, and arrests are up 10%. Over the summer our CAOs found a pattern in burglaries and car theft and arrested 4 individuals who were responsible for 30 burglaries. The whole department is mourning the loss of Officer Zane Coolidge. He has left behind a wife and four-month-old daughter, Emma. The department is overwhelmed by the community support for this officer and for Officer Matt Haney who is recovering at home from a gun shop wound and a bullet in his chest that they hope will work its way out. There is a scam going around about running red lights, so beware. There is a fundraiser tomorrow at a car wash at 37th Street and Bell Road. The upcoming Coffee with Cops is on Thursday, September 26th at Biscuits Café.

Great information about this new victim's notification system which started in August 2024. 911 callers and reporting parties will be texted updates. You will receive an incident number by text within five minutes of your call. If you are on hold for a while when you call, you will receive a text about the delay. Once the call is closed, you will automatically get a text asking for feedback on the interaction. In order to get a copy of a police report you need to request it through public records. As your case progresses, you can go to a portal and receive updates. If an arrest is made emails or text messages are sent to the victims to ensure they are notified of court proceedings immediately.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens, and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. *FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!*

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be 1/4 - 3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

The Transit PD has a new dedicated email address for complaints specific to bus stops and light rail platforms. Please email ppd.comm.eng@phoenix.gov describing the location, issue and criminal activity observed. The on-duty Transit Unit Sergeant will be responsible for looking into the complaint, addressing concerns, and following up with the reporting party to explain the action was taken. Please feel free to share and pass the information along.

National and state governments provide control of our borders; state and city governments provide police and fire protection, education, and other resources, community member groups provide Phoenix Neighborhood Patrollers and the posting of PNP signs on neighborhood streets; Block Watch provides neighbors watching out for neighbors; and we provide our own home security alarms, lighting, and burglary prevention measures.

CRIME TIPS:

NATURAL DISASTER SEASON IS HERE AND SO ARE SCAMMERS

From tornadoes and floods to wildfires and hurricanes, natural disasters often bring out the best in people, with neighbors and strangers coming together to lend a hand and offer financial support to those in need. Unfortunately, they also bring out the worst in criminals, who see others' misfortune as an opportunity to make a quick buck.

In the aftermath of extreme weather, dubious contractors and outright scammers flood affected areas, offering quick, cheap fixes. While some reputable contractors may go door-to-door, many of these unsolicited offers are scams. Here's how to protect your wallet from these criminals.

HOW IT WORKS

Someone claiming to be a contractor arrives at your door, saying they have just completed storm damage repairs for a neighbor.

They offer to fix your property at a steep discount since they're already in the area.

They'll likely ask for payment up front or try to convince you to sign over payment from your insurance company.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

Some of these "storm chasers" take your money and run. Others overcharge for shoddy work. And since they lack local licensing, your homeowner's insurance might not cover it.

They often target older homeowners who they perceive as more trusting, more likely to have savings, and — they think — more likely to be experiencing cognitive decline.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

Resist the urge to hire a contractor on the spot. Instead, take the time to research and choose reputable professionals.

Get written estimates and compare bids from multiple contractors before beginning any work.

Always ask for and verify references.

Never pay more than one-third of the total cost up front, and only when materials have been delivered.

HOW CRIMINALS USE ELECTIONS TO STEAL MONEY AND INFO

The election process is integral to our nation's democracy and at the forefront of many Americans' minds. Unfortunately, criminals are trying to take advantage of this year's election to target your data and cash.

Here are three common election-related scams and ways to protect yourself.

VOTER REGISTRATION SCAMS

Scammers may pose as election officials or volunteers, reaching out by phone, email or in person, offering to help you register or update your voter registration.

These criminals often aim to steal your personal information or get you to download malware through phishing links, fake websites or malicious apps.

Voter registration cannot be completed by phone, email or text. And most importantly, there are never fees involved. The safest way to register is at an official government location, including on your election division's website, or by mail.

POLITICAL DONATION SCAMS

Criminals may claim to represent a specific cause, political action committee or candidate, using high-pressure sales tactics to convince you to "donate."

In addition to stealing your hard-earned cash, scammers might try to obtain your personal information to commit identity theft.

Always donate through the official website of a candidate or cause you support. Avoid clicking on links sent to you, and don't trust caller ID, as it can be spoofed to mimic the phone number of a legitimate cause.

FAKE SURVEYS, PETITIONS AND POLLS

You might be asked to sign a petition or answer questions for a political opinion poll or survey.

Some scammers may offer a gift card or prize as an incentive to participate, but this is often a ploy to steal your personal information — including your credit card number to cover "taxes and shipping."

As with other election scams, avoid clicking on survey links from unsolicited emails and texts, and never share sensitive information such as your name, birth date, address, email, Social Security number or driver's license number.

All of us can help preserve and protect democracy by spotting and reporting election-related scams to our local election office.

Knowledge gives you power over scams. The AARP Fraud Watch Network™ equips you with reliable, up-to-date insights and connects you to our free fraud helpline so you can better protect yourself and loved ones. We also advocate at the state, federal and local levels to enact policy changes that protect consumers and enforce laws.

COMMUNITY CATS

Helpful Information and Tips for the Community

A Community Cat is a catch-all term often used to describe any outdoor cat that may appear to not have an owner. Feral cats, which are under- or not socialized, fall under this umbrella, as do free-roaming, friendly cats.

In Maricopa County, cats are not subject to the same licensing and leash laws as dogs. Because of this, Maricopa County Animal Care and Control (MCACC) cannot pick up stray or feral cats or take action against those feeding cats in their neighborhoods.

Many times, members of the community act as colony managers to ensure that a feral cat colony is a managed colony. Cats in these communities are usually fed, watered, vaccinated, spayed, or neutered, and monitored for overall health. Other times, the cats are self-reliant and can survive in the neighborhood on their own, without any direct assistance.

TNR (Trap-Neuter-Return) is a long-proven and effective method for humanely addressing community cat populations across the world.

Trap: The cats are humanely trapped and brought to a clinic.

Neuter: The cats are fixed, vaccinated, and their left ear is "tipped" to indicate they have been fixed.

Return: The fixed cats are safely returned to their colony.

Benefits of TNR

- Cats become better neighbors as it reduces or eliminates unwanted mating behaviors (e.g., yowling, fighting, spraying).
- Cats will be healthier when treated with this humane solution and typically are less likely to wander from their food source.
- Halts the breeding cycle which allows community cat populations to stabilize and eventually decline.
- Protects and respects cats' lives.

How to Help Keep Community Cats Away from Your Property

- Remove or secure all potential food and water sources from your property, including dog food.
- Spray concentrated orange juice or hang orange or lemon peels in areas where cats are spraying — cats do not like the citrus scent.
- Keep all trash and recycle bins tightly closed as cats are considered opportunistic feeders/hunters.
- Use a motion-detecting device that turns on a sprinkler or bright light in response to motion on your property, such as ScareCrow™.
- Remove or secure potential shelter areas — secure access under houses, sheds, decks, porches, and buildings with wire fencing.
- Use plastic carpet runners spike-side up and covered lightly in soil to prevent cats from digging in your garden.
- Keep landscaping trimmed to avoid creating hiding/nesting spots.
- Spread dried wild animal manure in the areas you notice feral cats in your yard; wild animal urine also may work to deter the cats.
- There are also many commercial cat repellants (chemical and non-chemical options) available in garden stores, pet shops, and online.

MVD's Keys to Change station aids over 8,300 people in first year

Partnership with Homeless ID Project helps campus clients get state-issued IDs

A partnership between the Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division and the Homeless ID Project has helped more than 8,300 people get state-issued IDs in its first year at the [Keys To Change](#) campus near downtown Phoenix.

Nearly 6,600 clients experiencing instability or homelessness have been able to get replacement driver licenses or state IDs at the campus, while an additional 1,800 people were connected with help available beyond the location. Getting a state-issued ID is essential for obtaining housing, services and employment.

MVD's presence began with an on-site representative and has transitioned to a TeleMVD location connecting clients with live assistance.

"The TeleMVD setup inside the Homeless ID Project offices is an exciting opportunity for MVD to use technology to provide services at places they are needed at the moment our customers need them," said Eric Jorgensen, ADOT Motor Vehicle Division Director. "With TeleMVD directly on site, we are excited to assist the Homeless ID Project with their community efforts helping those individuals experiencing homelessness."

The MVD presence complements the efforts of the Homeless ID Project, which helps provide documents, including replacement copies of birth certificates from all 50 states, on the Keys to Change campus.

"After one full year, our appreciation for this service remains high," said Homeless ID Project Executive Director Rick Mitchell. "We are truly grateful to the Department. The partnership with ADOT/MVD has been a game changer in our efforts to help so many of our clients."

This location is set up with the computer equipment, printer, scanner and camera necessary to help fulfill requests as a TeleMVD office in which customers can conduct many transactions with MVD representatives located elsewhere. TeleMVD allows a customer to complete dozens of vehicle and driver license services without having to travel to an MVD office.

About ADOT MVD:

The Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division processes more than 14.5 million transactions each fiscal year, approximately half of those are online through [azmvdnow.gov](#), getting you out of the line and safely on the road.

About Homeless ID Project:

Homeless ID Project is a privately funded nonprofit whose mission is to empower homeless individuals and families to rebuild their lives by providing the critical first step of identification replacement services. The agency was founded in 1988 by Reverend Gerald Roseberry following a month of self-imposed homelessness during which he discovered that many individuals experiencing homelessness wanting to get a job or find housing had no access to replacement documents that had been lost, stolen, or left behind.

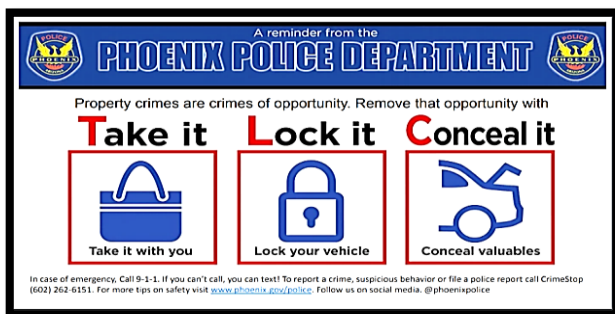

PHOENIX PARKS AND RECREATION LAUNCHES 24/7 PARKS CODE OF CONDUCT ANSWERING SERVICE

Phoenix, AZ - The Phoenix Parks and Recreation Department is excited to announce the launch of the new 24/7 Parks Code of Conduct Answering Service. This new feature, available at 602-534-9919, is designed to capture residents' concerns regarding code of conduct violations and provide a mechanism to contact Park Rangers who can respond.

The service is available 24 hours a day, providing residents with a direct line to report any concerns they may have while visiting Phoenix parks. The answering service can be used to report any violations that occur within park boundaries.

When calling the answering service, residents will speak to an operator who will log their concerns and forward them to the Park Ranger team. Rangers will then review the details of the call and respond as available, balancing other priority calls.

"We understand that our parks are a valuable resource for our community, and we want to ensure that they are safe and enjoyable for everyone," said Cynthia Aguilar, Director of the Parks and Recreation Department. "This hotline will provide residents with an instant opportunity to report information that we can then be aware of and respond to, helping us provide a better experience for all park visitors."

Callers can provide their name, phone number and email address. Park Rangers will only reach out if further information about the reported issue is needed.

If there is a life-threatening emergency or crime taking place, residents should dial 911.

People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S. They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-8.

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit [988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline](#) is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States. The Biden administration has invested more than \$400 million in beefing up crisis centers and other mental health services to support the 988 system.

Suicide Warning Signs

These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

♦ Talking about wanting to die or to kill oneself.	♦ Increasing the use of alcohol or drugs.
♦ Looking for a way to kill oneself, such as searching online or buying a gun.	♦ Acting anxious or agitated; behaving recklessly.
♦ Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live.	♦ Sleeping too little or too much.
♦ Talking about feeling trapped or in unbearable pain.	♦ Withdrawing or feeling isolated.
♦ Talking about being a burden to others.	♦ Showing rage or talking about seeking revenge.
	♦ Displaying extreme mood swings.

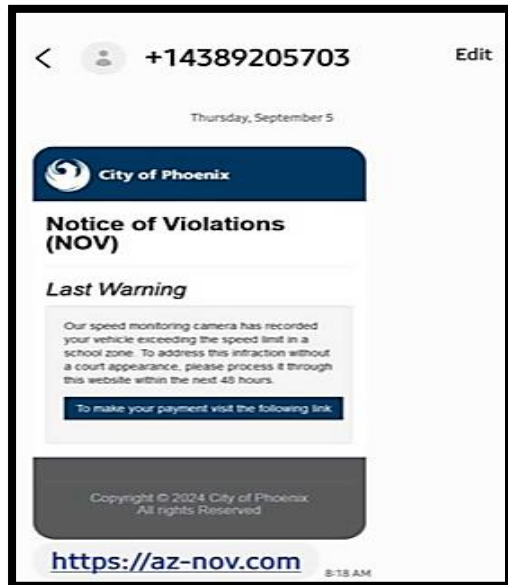
