PHOENIX PD APP

The Phoenix Police Department has a mobile APP, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place. Users can use the app to access online reporting, crime statistics, precinct locations, phone numbers, career opportunities, virtual block watch, victims' rights information, and more. Users can also turn on notifications from the precinct they live in to receive news updates and information on events in their area.

The APP is now available both in the Apple Store for iOS and in the Google Play Store for Android.

Report graffiti on the Phoenix PD app! Graffiti can now be reported on the Police Department APP released in January 2021. Studies show that if graffiti is removed within 24 hours, there is a 90% likelihood that the graffiti reporter will not have to use the app to have it removed! #GraffitiFreePHX

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anvone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? -Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- **Who -** is calling? Give your name, location, and phone number. (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

TEXT 9-1-1 "Call if you can. Text if you can't." After months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disabled community (or advocates for the disabled) if you are in imminent danger and are unable to talk to a 911 operator, you now have for the first time in Phoenix the ability to text to 9-1-1.

HAPPY HOLIDAYS!



Well...whether you're ready for it or not we are entering that time of the year again. It is that time of year where we enter the "happiest" season for many folks. Soon enough there will be the smell of pumpkin spice in the air. You will be hearing Christmas music playing on every radio station. Some will be taking on the legendary cheese log at the office holiday party right before the white elephant gift exchange. And who can forget the always epic decoration contests? With this festive time of the year also comes crimes of opportunity. Taking a few easy steps to safeguarding yourself from burglaries, theft and crimes of opportunity will ensure you do indeed have a happy holiday season.

At the Black Mountain Precinct, we want to help reduce unwanted stress during the holiday season and help you reduce your likelihood of victimization. This reduction is best understood if you are aware of the burglary trends in our community. The vast majority of burglaries in our precinct involve open garages and unlocked car doors. The solution is as easy as it sounds. Keep your garage door shut and lock the door leading into the house. Lock your car doors and do not leave anything of value visible in the vehicle. If you happen to see a neighbor's garage door open, kindly remind them to close the door. As always if you happen to see something suspicious in the neighborhood, please call police. For those who may be traveling for the holidays we have a patrol watch program. You can contact the Black Mountain Precinct at (602) 495-5002 and request a patrol watch for the time you will be gone. This information is then given to all the Sergeants to notify the patrol officers working in the area of your home.

My girls at home have become quite the experts at the shopping online craze but there are still some who prefer to go to shopping centers and malls to get gifts for loved ones. Whichever way you prefer to shop there are ways to protect yourself from theft. Most criminals are looking for easy opportunities with low risk or confrontation. When you are shopping at a public place taking some time to gather your surroundings can be instrumental in keeping yourself and your property safe. While entering the parking lot, going to or from a store, put your phone down and look around you and be aware of your surroundings. Being vigilant with the people in the area can help you avoid being an easy target. Park your car in well

lit and very visible areas. Have your keys ready to go when approaching your vehicle and try not to carry a purse unless completely necessary. Do not keep large amounts of cash with you or display cash when shopping.



Online shopping can be a very convenient way of getting everything needed for the working family. While shopping online, only use well known and proven websites. Giving things like credit card numbers and account information to unproven websites can open the door for things like fraud and theft. When you are having packages shipped to the house try to schedule the package to arrive at the time when you will be home. If this is not possible, consider collaborating with available, trusted neighbors or loved ones who can receive your packages while you are away. I would also consider renting a P.O. box at a FedEx or UPS store for the season to keep packages safe. Surveillance cameras can also be a good deterrent to keep packages on your front porch safe. It is said when you leave the house for over an hour you are caught on video an average of 75 times. Many of the cameras sold on the market today have the capability of notifying you when there is movement at the front door and will allow you to speak through the camera to whomever may be outside your door.

During these special times of year, take advantage of the opportunity you have to spend time with loved ones, have real conversations and enjoy authentic moments with friends and family. Taking a couple extra steps to protect yourself this season can ensure you have the happiest of holiday seasons this year.





On November 21, Mayor Gallego, Councilman Robinson — Chair of the Public Safety and Justice Subcommittee — and key City officials spoke about 2025 heat relief efforts.

Speaking from the site of this summer's 24-hour cooling center at 20 West Jackson, Mayor Gallego praised City officials and community partners for year-over-year improvement of heat relief efforts. Preliminary Maricopa County Department of Public Health data demonstrate a reduction in heat-related deaths for the second year in a row, demonstrating the impact of City interventions.

"Even one death is too many, but the hard work and dedication of our City staff and community partners are making a difference and saving lives," Mayor Gallego said. "No city, no community, does more to mitigate extreme heat as a public health threat than Phoenix"

Joined by Councilman Kevin Robinson, the Mayor spoke about the shared commitment of the members of the Phoenix City Council: to save more lives.

Also present were top City officials with specific expertise on heat relief. Tim Kreis, the Executive Assistant Phoenix Fire Chief, David Hondula, the Director of the Office of Heat Response and Mitigation, and Rachel Milne, the Director of the Office of Homeless Solutions explained actions taken this summer and lessons learned that will inform 2026 heat relief efforts.

Mayor Gallego also called for additional support from other municipalities and levels of government. "As we plan for next summer, I am once again calling on the county, the state, and the federal government to provide the funding, facilities, and services necessary to save more lives," Mayor Gallego said.

Phoenix utilizes an innovative approach to tackle urgent heat-related issues facing our community, including those experiencing homelessness. The City is proud to report that at the 24/7 cooling center and the three extended-hour cooling centers, more than 44,000 visits occurred across those sites. Citywide, there were 111 hydration stations, cooling centers and respite centers available for anyone in need. In addition, nearly 2,600 people were transported to cooling centers via the Phoenix Fire Department's Community Assistance Program and its partners. Finally, 751 people, including families with children, were connected to services to help end their homelessness through the Office of Homeless Solutions in concert with their parter, Community Bridges, Inc.

Message from Vice Mayor Ann O'Brien

The Emergency Lockbox Program I created that launched citywide this year has been a huge success! So successful, in fact, that the Fire Department received more requests than it had lockboxes on hand, resulting in a backlog of 200. When I learned of the backlog, I stepped in and donated 500 lockboxes to ensure the program's continued success. It's critical that our older residents and those with mobility issues have this life-saving resource available. The Fire Department installs lockboxes near front doors and codes are registered with the Department to be provided during emergencies so responders can quickly access house keys and reach residents without causing damage. The Emergency Lockbox Program is free to Phoenix residents who are over 55 years old or have mobility challenges or disabilities that may prevent them from reaching the door during an emergency. Residents can apply online using forms in Spanish and English. The program also allows any Phoenix resident to register an existing lockbox, garage door code, or digital smart lock codes to participate. Since January 2025, firefighters have responded to 700 service calls at homes enrolled in the program.

Construction on The Metropolitan, the site of the former Metrocenter Mall, is set to begin in April for three of the five planned residential communities. They include apartments and two townhome projects aimed at various household incomes. In addition to diverse price points, I'm happy to share that the townhomes, to be built by Oakwood Homes, will reflect a blend of architectural styles. As I said during a panel discussion this week on redevelopment efforts, the community deserves a high-quality project that will make the area shine once again. The City is fully behind the efforts. The Council voted to buy the land where Cholla Library is located to secure the library's role in the neighborhood's renaissance and we recently approved acquiring land for a new fire station nearby to address the need for new resources and reduce response times.



The Arizona Law Enforcement Canine Association offers seminars and supports training programs to Law Enforcement K-9 trainers and handlers as part of an arsenal of less-than-lethal aids used by law enforcement in crime control. The canines' keen sense of smell enables them to sniff out drugs, explosives, and track the scent of human activity whether it be criminal or to assist in search and rescue of lost individuals.





In addition, Law Enforcement K-9s are used as therapy service dogs for mitigation of stress withstood by law enforcement and first responders in the line of duty or for individuals in the community in crisis situations. https://www.facebook.com/MCAOK9/





The Phoenix Police Department participated, among many other law enforcement agencies, in the K-9 Trials and Public Safety Event. BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens, and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the dates you can request four times a year for Bulk Trash pickup.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust-free parking surface. The stone must be 1/4 - 3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. ¼ minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 50% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

CRIME TIPS:

GIVE SAFELY IN THE SEASON OF GIVING

As the year winds down, many Americans embrace the 'Season of Giving' and contribute to causes close to their hearts. In 2024, individuals donated more than \$392 billion to charity, according to the Giving USA Foundation's annual report on U.S. philanthropy. A large share of those donations happens in the year's final months. While this outpouring of generosity supports many worthy causes, it also creates opportunities for scammers to steal from well-meaning donors.

Here's how to help ensure your contributions reach the people and organizations that truly need them — not criminals.

HOW IT WORKS

You receive a phone call, email, piece of mail, or even an inperson visit from someone asking for donations to support veterans, animals, children in need, victims of natural disasters, or other charitable causes.

You might get a "thank you" message by email, letter, or phone, suggesting you've donated to a particular cause in the past. You feel pressured to contribute on the spot.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

Charities need our support more than ever, which makes it more important than ever to ensure our donations are going toward a cause – not to line the pockets of outright fake charities or those that are not good stewards of those donations.

Legitimate charities will not request gift cards, wire transfers, or cryptocurrency as a form of payment, and while they may use pressure tactics, real charities will welcome your donation at any time.

When considering supporting <u>crowdfunding campaigns</u>, it is safest to donate to those organized by people you know and trust. Fake charities also surge when major crises dominate the news – such as wars, natural disasters, or humanitarian emergencies.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

Research before donating. Check organizations on sites such as give.org, CharityNavigator.org or CharityWatch.org to confirm legitimacy and find out how much of the funds are used to serve its stated mission versus overhead and fundraising.

Pay attention to the charity's name and web address. Criminals often mimic the names of familiar, trusted organizations to deceive donors.

Be wary of links in unsolicited email, text, and social media fundraising messages. They can unleash malware on your device.

Use a credit card for donations. It's easier to keep track of your contribution, and if your card is misused, you have protection against loss.

To avoid that feeling of pressure when a solicitation comes your way, communicate that you have a set list of charities you support (and then create a list of charities you've researched!).

FRAUD PERSISTS IN THE SEASON OF GIVING

Criminals don't take a holiday break. During the season of giving, they're especially active with online shopping, package delivery, and other seasonal scams.

An AARP survey found that nearly nine in ten U.S. adults have faced some form of fraud, yet many of us are still unaware of the tactics criminals use—especially in online shopping. With almost a quarter of us planning to shop online even more this year, here's what to know to spot scams.

ONLINE SHOPPING SCAMS

Criminals create professional-looking <u>websites and social media</u> <u>ads</u> promoting popular items at steep discounts. When you place an order, what you receive is not what was advertised, or you get nothing at all.

Be cautious of prices that seem unusually low, and avoid clicking on ads in emails, texts, or social media, as these can lead to fake sites.

The safest way to shop online is to go directly to a trusted retailer's official website or app. And whenever possible, use a credit card, which offers stronger consumer protections than other payment methods.

PACKAGE SCAMS

Scammers continue to bombard us with fake texts about <u>package</u> <u>deliveries</u>, often claiming to be from the U.S. Postal Service, UPS, or FedEx

These messages say there's a problem with your delivery—such as a wrong address, insufficient postage, or nobody being home to receive it—and urge you to click a link to resolve the issue. In many cases, the links and websites closely mimic the legitimate businesses.

That's why it's best to avoid clicking links in unsolicited texts, even if the sender appears familiar. Instead, go directly to the shipping company's official website or app, or contact them using a verified phone number found on their site.

GIFT CARD SCAMS

A whopping one-third of consumers report either giving or receiving a <u>gift card</u> that has no value. Some criminals tamper with cards on store racks, while others use electronic tools to detect newly activated cards online and drain the funds.

When possible, consider purchasing gift cards directly from the retailer's website, hold onto the receipt, and register the card if that option is available. Using gift cards soon after purchasing them can also improve odds that you'll get to spend the balance before a criminal can.

Free lockboxes are donated by the Phoenix Area Association of Realtors and are distributed on a first come, first served basis to vulnerable Phoenix residents who are 55+, have special needs or mobility issues.

Your information and the code to the lockbox is provided only to firefighters in the event there is an emergency call to your home. You will need to provide the appropriate key or keys to put in the lockbox at the time of the delivery. MARICOPA COUNTY CONFIRMS MEASLES EXPOSURES AT 2 PUBLIC PLACES



The Maricopa County Department of Public Health (MCDPH) has confirmed that a visitor from outside the county has been confirmed with measles and may have exposed people at two public locations. "We are working closely with partners at the city and state levels, as well as at venues where the exposures occurred, to ensure that

people are aware and protected," said Dr. Nick Staab, chief medical officer at MCDPH. "This is a good reminder that any of us can face an exposure, and being vaccinated is our best defense." Measles is a highly infectious virus that can linger in the air for up to two hours, and approximately 90% of unvaccinated individuals who are exposed to measles will become infected. It is preventable with two doses of the measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine, typically given during childhood. Adults need at least one dose of MMR vaccine given after the age of one. Individuals born before 1957 or who had measles as a child are considered immune. Exposures occurred at the following venues:

- O Home2 Suites by Hilton Phoenix Downtown
 - o 125 E Jackson St, Phoenix, AZ 85004
 - November 5th at 3:00 pm through November 6th at 1:00 pm
 - Watch for symptoms through November 27
- Concert at Mortgage Matchup Center
 - 201 E Jefferson St, Phoenix, AZ 85004
 - November 5th, 6:00 pm through November 6 at 12:30 am
 - Watch for symptoms through November 27

Anyone who may have been exposed should watch for symptoms, which appear typically seven to 12 days after exposure but may take up to 21 days. Symptoms include:

- o Fever (101 F or higher)
- Red, watery eyes
- Cough
- Runny nose
- A rash that is red, raised, and blotchy. The rash begins after other symptoms, usually on the face at the hairline, and moves down the body. The rash may last five to six days.

Individuals who develop symptoms are encouraged to seek medical care and testing. They should call the provider ahead to let them know about symptoms and potential exposure before going in. The provider or facility will provide instructions on how to be seen without exposing others in the waiting area.

If you do not have a health care provider: You may need to be seen at your local hospital emergency room or urgent care center. Please call before going to let them know you may have measles.

MCDPH is encouraging healthcare providers to be alert for unvaccinated patients with fever and rash, especially if they have a known exposure. Healthcare providers are required to report suspected cases of measles to their local health department. "Measles is highly contagious and can have severe complications, but the good news is that it is preventable," said Dr. Staab. "We strongly encourage anyone who has not been vaccinated to get vaccinated to prevent further spread from this or other potential exposures."



988

People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S.

They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-8.

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States. The Biden administration has invested more than \$400 million in beefing up crisis centers and other mental health services to support the 988 system.

Suicide Warning Signs

These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

- such as searching online or buying a gun.
- Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live
- Talking about feeling trapped or in . Showing rage or talking about unbearable pain.
- Talking about being a burden to others.
- Talking about wanting to die or to . Increasing the use of alcohol or drugs.
 - . Acting anxious or agitated; behaving recklessly.
 - Sleeping too little or too much.
 - . Withdrawing or feeling isolated.
 - seeking revenge.
 - Displaying extreme mood swings.
