PHOENIX PD APP

The Phoenix Police Department now has a mobile APP, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place. Users can use the app to access online reporting, crime statistics, precinct locations, phone numbers, career opportunities, virtual block watch, victims' rights information, and more. Users can also turn on notifications from the precinct they live in to receive news updates and information on events in their area.

The APP is now available both in the Apple Store for iOS and in the Google Play Store for Android.

Report graffiti on the Phoenix PD app! Graffiti can now be reported on the Police Department APP released in January 2021. Studies show that if graffiti is removed within 24 hours, there is a 90% likelihood that the graffiti will not use the app to have it removed! #GraffitiFreePHX

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anyone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? –Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- Who is calling? Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

TEXT 9-1-1 "Call if you can. Text if you can't." After months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community (or advocates for the disabled) if you are in imminent danger and are unable to talk to a 911 operator, you now have for the first time in Phoenix the ability to text to 9-1-1.

BACK TO SCHOOL

Well, it is that time of year again. The long days of a carefree summer are ending. Most parents are excited to have some free time to do some adulting and the kiddos are bummed to be back at the grind of school life. The heat is definitely still with us for a bit as vacations are winding down. The time for school shopping has begun and our children are heading back to the classroom. Soon, our morning rush to get out the door just to make it on time will start once again. All of us as a community should take some time to reflect on what this year will bring, and what we can all do to make this year healthy, safe and memorable.

Safety should always be a priority when it comes to our children. Most schools have unique ways they deal with drop off and pick up of students. Although this period of time is only 15 minutes twice a day, it can be very disruptive to some communities. Complaints range from illegal parking to aggressive driving and everything in between. Those of us who will be utilizing the drop off and pick up lines, please follow the school instructions on their required protocol. Many of the school's work with the City of Phoenix Streets Department to come up with a plan that is safe for our children. They design the traffic lines, so the children do not have to cross busy traffic, or risk getting hurt by cars. Parents, please follow your school's guidelines.


In addition, all citizens need to be cognizant of the speed limit, especially when school is in session. Most schools have signs posted and some have flashing lights to warn drivers about the school zone. If someone is caught speeding in a school zone, it is a criminal ticket, not just your standard speeding ticket. The slower speed allows more reaction time in the event you need to stop quickly. Please keep in mind there are crosswalks in these areas. If a car is stopped at the crosswalk, whether there is a red light, stop sign or anything else, another driver cannot pass that stopped vehicle. This is a safety precaution in the event

someone is crossing the street and is not yet visible by the other driver. This same rule applies to school buses as well. If bus lights are flashing and the stop sign is out it is your responsibility to stop. We want our children to get to school safely.

It has been said that children are one third of our population and all our future. Our children are precious and should be protected at all costs in all aspects of life. Give them the tools to take care of themselves properly and do your part to ensure they have a safe place to live, learn and love.



The presentation was with Detective Brian Kornegay who specializes in CPTED.

What is CPTED you ask? Great question!

CPTED stands for Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design. It has a complicated name but is an amazingly simple and effective concept around how businesses can physically be "arranged" to deter and prevent crime. It can be as simple as not having posters covering the windows or the interior layout of the store being set up to make most areas visible.

Ever notice when you go into a QuikTrip store that the cashiers are on risers behind the counter and stand much higher than you? That's CPTED.

Another example is when the owners and property managers of the vacant building at 2340 West Bell Road replaced the (soft and comfortable) grass with (jagged and uncomfortable) rock all along the front landscaping.



BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens, and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

The Transit PD has a new dedicated email address for complaints specific to bus stops and light rail platforms. Please email ppd.comm.eng@phoenix.gov describing the location, issue and criminal activity observed. The on-duty Transit Unit Sergeant will be responsible for looking into the complaint, addressing concerns, and following up with the reporting party to explain the action was taken. Please feel free to share and pass the information along.

2025 GENERAL PLAN SURVEY

Dear Neighborhood Leaders and Members,

This message has been shared by the Planning and Development Department.

The City of Phoenix Planning and Development Department is seeking the community's input on the 2025 General Plan! The General Plan serves as a comprehensive roadmap for the future physical development of Phoenix, based on the vision of its citizens. To help with this, Planning and Development has created two surveys. CRIME TIPS:

PROTECT YOUR MOVE: HOW TO AVOID MOVING SCAMS

Summer is the prime season for moving. Whether you're relocating across the country for work, downsizing to a new home or sending a kid off to college, choosing the right moving company should be at the top of your to-do list.

Placing your trust in a company to transport your belongings safely and securely at the agreed-upon price is a significant commitment, and unfortunately, scammers often exploit the stress and anxiety of moving.

Here's what to know to protect you and your possessions from a costly moving scam.

HOW IT WORKS

You see enticing ads for cheap moving options online or in print.

The "affordable" mover offers you an estimate by phone without coming to assess the work effort.

They might demand a hefty deposit, or even full payment, in advance.

The mover may ask you to sign a blank or incomplete form, saying they'll fill it in later.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

Moving scams are committed by rogue operators that exist primarily online.

With your deposit in hand, the "movers" may simply not show up at the appointed time and place.

Or they'll try to change the deal at the last minute, jacking up the price or adding fees, which can double the cost of your move.

In the worst case, the movers might disappear with your stuff, abandon it in a storage facility or refuse to deliver unless you fork over more money, a scenario known as a "hostage load."

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

Get referrals from relatives, friends or neighbors who have moved recently or from real estate agents.

Research companies you are considering. Look up their <u>Better Business</u> <u>Bureau</u> profiles, and use the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration's <u>database</u> to review an interstate mover's registration status and complaint history.

Get everything in writing — including estimates. If there are any changes, insist on a revised estimate before any packing or loading begins.

Use a credit card when paying so you have its protection in the event of a dispute.

HOW FRAUD CRIMINALS SEEK PAYMENT

Today's fraud criminal takes great advantage of faster and newer ways to move money. Knowing about the financial tools they employ can help you recognize a scam attempt in process and disengage before the criminal's payday.

HOW IT WORKS

Every fraud criminal is out to steal money (or sensitive information, which leads to money).

A common scenario starts with an unexpected and urgent communication that yields a heightened emotional response in the target. The criminals' playbook tells them it's hard for the target to employ logic when their brain is emotionally hijacked.

After this opening, the criminal seeks their payday, often taking advantage of payment methods that are quick or that their target may not fully understand.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

Based on federal data from the first three months of 2024, the majority of theft happened through <u>cryptocurrency</u> and **bank transfers** (\$830 million, and we know that's a vast undercount).

Criminals employ crypto in bogus investment schemes and as a means of payment to address a fake issue — directing the target to withdraw large amounts of cash from their bank and deposit it into crypto ATM machines, which are popping up everywhere.

Theft through bank transfer occurs when an account holder is fraudulently induced to initiate a funds transfer (for a bogus investment or to "protect" money from a hacked account) or when the account holder's bank credentials have been stolen and used to access and drain the account.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

If you receive a communication out of the blue that causes a strong emotional reaction, take a pause, knowing this is the way most fraud attempts begin.

Disengage and connect with the entity in a way you know to be legitimate: Sign in to an account via app or website, or call using a number on a paper statement. If the communication is purportedly from a loved one, disengage and contact them directly.

Refuse to use the methods criminals use to steal: cryptocurrency, bank money transfers, gift cards and peer-to-peer apps.

TECH SUPPORT SCAMS REMAIN RAMPANT

Imagine you're browsing the internet when out of nowhere, a message pops up accompanied by a blaring sound warning you that your device is infected with a virus. This happened to Helen, a retiree in her 80s. Panicked by the warning, she followed on-screen instructions and phoned the tech support number provided. The criminals pretending to be tech support inevitably stole nearly all of her life savings.

HOW IT WORKS

A pop-up notice, often accompanied by a blaring siren-like sound, claims there's something wrong with your device.

The maddening sound doesn't stop, and the page won't close.

The pop-up includes a toll-free number, which it claims will connect you to tech support associated with a big name such as Microsoft or Norton.

Tech support impostors say they require remote access to the device to detect the problems. That's where things can go very wrong.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

A version of this fraud attack convinces the target to pay to fix the problem and pay more to enroll in a nonexistent support plan.

In a newer twist, criminals use remote access to plant login-stealing malware designed to expose your usernames and passwords to all of your accounts, including financial ones.

More complex fraud attacks begin with tech support, then evolve into bank and government impersonation schemes that end with criminals wiping out the victim's financial accounts.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

If this happens to you or a loved one, contact your financial institution immediately to see if it can stop the flow of funds, then report the crime to the police so you have a record of it in case there is restitution.

If you get a pop-up that won't close, shut down your device (on a laptop, hold the power button down until the computer shuts off).

When prompted to update your operating systems and antivirus software, do it right away, or better yet, set them to automatically update. These updates may address vulnerabilities.

If you suspect an issue with your device, take it to a big-box store that offers tech support or to a trusted technician.

COMMUNITY CATS

Helpful Information and Tips for the Community

A Community Cat is a catch-all term often used to describe any outdoor cat that may appear to not have an owner. Feral cats, which are underor not socialized, fall under this umbrella, as do free-roaming, friendly

In Maricopa County, cats are not subject to the same licensing and leash laws as dogs. Because of this, Maricopa County Animal Care and Control (MCACC) cannot pick up stray or feral cats or take action against those feeding cats in their neighborhoods.

Many times, members of the community act as colony managers to ensure that a feral cat colony is a managed colony. Cats in these communities are usually fed, watered, vaccinated, spayed, or neutered, and monitored for overall health. Other times, the cats are self-reliant and can survive in the neighborhood on their own, without any direct assistance.

TNR (Trap-Neuter-Return) is a long-proven and effective method for humanely addressing community cat populations across the world.

Trap: The cats are humanely trapped and brought to a clinic. Neuter: The cats are fixed, vaccinated, and their left ear is "tipped" to indicate they have been fixed.

Return: The fixed cats are safely returned to their colony.

Benefits of TNR

- · Cats become better neighbors as it reduces or eliminates unwanted mating behaviors (e.g., yowling, fighting, spraying).
- · Cats will be healthier when treated with this humane solution and typically are less likely to wander from their food source.
- · Halts the breeding cycle which allows community cat populations to stabilize and eventually decline.
- Protects and respects cats' lives.

How to Help Keep Community Cats Away from Your Property

- Remove or secure all potential food and water sources from your property, including dog food.
- Spray concentrated orange juice or hang orange or lemon peels in areas where cats are spraying — cats do not like the citrus scent.
- · Keep all trash and recycle bins tightly closed as cats are considered opportunistic feeders/hunters.
- Use a motion-detecting device that turns on a sprinkler or bright light in response to motion on your property, such as ScareCrow™.
- Remove or secure potential shelter areas secure access under houses, sheds, decks, porches, and buildings with wire fencing.
- Use plastic carpet runners spike-side up and covered lightly in soil to prevent cats from digging in your garden.
- · Keep landscaping trimmed to avoid creating hiding/nesting spots.
- · Spread dried wild animal manure in the areas you notice feral cats in your yard; wild animal urine also may work to deter the cats.
- · There are also many commercial cat repellants (chemical and nonchemical options) available in garden stores, pet shops, and online.

People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S. They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States. The Biden administration has invested more than \$400 million in beefing up crisis centers and other mental health services to support the 988 system.

Suicide Warning Signs

These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

Public Works Announces Switch to Appointment-Based Bulk Trash Collection on September 30th

The City of Phoenix is changing the way bulk trash is collected. At City Council's Transportation, Infrastructure, and Planning (TIP) Subcommittee meeting on May 15, the Appointment-Based Bulk Trash system was presented. The new program will offer residents the ability to schedule their own bulk trash collection, rather than waiting for quarterly bulk trash pickup during the dates assigned to their area. Appointment-based bulk trash collection begins on September 30, 2024.

What's different?

Under the current bulk trash program, Public Works lays out a collection schedule for the entire year for 13 different regions across the city, giving each region four designated collection periods annually. *The appointment-based system will be replacing the quarterly collection beginning on September 30.* All bulk trash collection on or after that date must be scheduled online.

Customers will have the freedom to schedule bulk trash pickup based on when they need it, rather than according to a citywide calendar. Residents will schedule a pickup date online. The portal will offer available collection dates based on the customer's address. Upon selecting a date, customers will get an email confirmation and can then begin to place their large items at the edge of their property no more than 7 days ahead of their pickup appointment. The new program will eliminate the collection of bulk trash in alleys. Customers will be allowed up to 10 cubic yards of trash per collection (approximately 17 ft. X 4 ft.).

What's the same?

Customers are still allowed up to four bulk trash collections each year. General guidelines on permitted/prohibited items for bulk trash will remain the same.

What are the benefits of Bulk Trash by Appointment?

Convenience - The scheduling model will also allow residents flexibility and convenience according to their own needs. For example, a customer could avoid placing bulk items out during the heat of summer months and schedule appointments only in the winter. Or someone who is slowly cleaning out their garage could schedule all four collections in the same month if they wanted to. Reduced blight – Because customers may begin putting items on the edge of their property no earlier than seven days before their selected collection day, trash will be left out for a significantly shorter amount of time.

Blockout dates -- The new model will not allow customers to schedule collection on dates surrounding Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Day each year. This will help eliminate unsightly trash piles during times when visitors and trick-or-treaters are out and about.

Streamlined process -- Because Public Works will be able to build collection routes according to scheduled appointments, items won't be sitting outside as long, staff workloads will be more equitable,

and equipment operators will spend less time outside during the hottest parts of the day.

Important Dates

Friday, August 30, 2024 – Residents can begin scheduling bulk trash appointments online

Monday, September 30, 2024 – First day of Bulk Trash by Appointment. All collections from this point on must be scheduled online.


