CHILD SAFETY SEATS

I know everyone has heard the saying "children are the future of our country." The safety of our children is paramount for creating a great future. As our population grows the days of bouncing around in the back seat of the car while dad drives to church are long gone. It is not a surprise as our community grows so does the number of vehicles on the road. Statistics show that vehicle collisions are the number one killer of children ages 1-12. This is an alarming statistic that can be greatly reduced by knowing how to properly place a car seat and laws regarding age requirements for child safety restraints.

The placement of a car seat can be quite a challenge. According to studies approximately 80% of child seats and restraints are installed incorrectly. Car seats should never be placed in the front seat with an airbag, as the airbag can cause additional injury to a child during a crash. The safest placement for a car seat is the middle position in the back seat if possible, as the majority of collisions are front impact in nature. Most of the newer vehicles and car seats are equipped with posts and latches to helps secure the restraint. My recommendation would be to purchase a car seat which can be latched into the posts and tethered with a seatbelt. The more levels of safety there are, the better. All seats will have some sort of angle indicator like a sticker with a line or a bubble with a specific range. Some seats have different levels to choose from depending on the age of the child. There are two mustreads when installing your car seat. First, read your vehicle owner's manual and second, read your child restraint manual regarding seat placement. This will help with properly installing the seat in your vehicle. Properly installed child restraints reduce the risk of injury during a collision by 54% if installed correctly. The Traffic Bureau with the Phoenix Police Department has Officers who are trained to install car seats. They can be reached at Northern Command Station, located at 302 E. Union Hills Dr., (602)495-5001.

As our children grow they are given more responsibility and they want to be treated like "big kids." Studies show that 40% of children who should be in some type of child restraint are not. Arizona State law requires all children under 8 years old and under 4'9" tall be properly secured in a child safety seat. Child safety seats include infant seats, forward facing seats, boosters, and any federally approved safety device for children. It is also recommended anyone under the age of 13 should be

properly seated in the back seat of the vehicle. Anyone 16 years old or younger must be properly seat belted while in a vehicle. The Arizona State law for child safety restraints can be found in Arizona Revised Statue 28-907.

The safety of our children is a huge responsibility. Protecting them while in a vehicle can greatly help with this responsibility. Education on seat placement and child restraint laws can help to protect our future.



Mileage Reimbursement Rate change

The IRS updated the mileage reimbursement rate beginning January 1, 2021, to 56 cents a mile. I spoke with the BW grant staff and we will be adjusting the mileage reimbursement rate on the report to reflect this change for all patrol time from 1-1-2021 forward. Any reimbursement reports for patrol time done from January 1, 2020 to December 31, 2020 will still use the old rate of 57.5 Cents a mile.

Also, a reminder that the grant staff will no longer accept the old handwritten Mileage Reimbursement logs, all PNP patrols for mileage reimbursement must be recorded using the online program. I was told that they have received a few of the handwritten forms recently.

Clothing Orders

Our clothing supplier has informed me of a slight change they will need to make in order to keep our costs down. They no longer have a "garment printer" (think giant ink jet printer for clothing) they use to have where they could easily print one or 2 shirts at a time, they have had to change to "screen printing." This means that each time they start a PNP order they must "set up" new screens, one for each color to print the order. Many places that do screen printing have a minimum order because of this. Our supplier plans on grouping "smaller" PNP orders together to save on the "set up" cost and time. They say they will still be able to fill most orders within 7 to 10 days depending on delivery of blank shirts from their supplier. They said much of their wait time is waiting to get the blank shirts from their supplier (several are on back order as I write this). I am looking into the possibility of maintaining a small supply of the screen printed PNP clothing on hand in the more common sizes. That way I can fill small orders from this supply quickly and replenish as they are sold. The challenge is storage space and funds for upfront costs. (a topic for the monthly meeting) One last update on PNP clothing, our supplier said PNP's 2021 costs will stay the same, reserving the right to change prices later if they have significant price increase from their suppliers. The 2021 PNP clothing order form has been updated on the web page. Both the clothing and vehicle sign order forms are attached.

PNP log Sheets

The city Manager's Office has asked me to provide them our final 2020 PNP numbers by January 11th. I would normally ask you all to get your hours in now, but as of yesterday and still this morning the program in not working right again.

What to look for? If you enter a log sheet and type a number into either the Patrol Hours or Admin Hours fields and the other field also populates, the program is still not working right.

I have a tech request in, hopefully we get this fixed soon.

I am told all of our old log entries are still there, I can actually pull up old log sheets. One of the glitches right now is when you log in the new dashboard shows you have Zero hours entered (if you select "View Service History" your log sheets are listed so we know the data is there). Don't let this worry you it is being fixed.

I tried an email blast last night to let everyone know but that apparently did not go out (another glitch?) I never got my confirmation message that the email blast was successful and after checking with a few of you if seems it did not go out. I am trying this again today since they have made strides in fixing the glitches, fingers crossed this one works.




The PD is preparing for the upcoming Inaugural Week. The FBI is coordinating with local Police. Violent Crimes in our Precinct in 2020 were up 19.2% and Property Crimes were down 8.45% because so many more people were home due to Covid 19, Total Misdemeanor Arrests in Black Mountain were 1,721 and Felony Arrests were 1,623. The Bell Road Corridor has been a main focus along with the Walmart on Happy Valley and I-17. The Precinct Thanksgiving Food Drive served 46 families and our Christmas Gift Drive served 5 families. The Bus Stops on the 2300 block and 1900 block of Bell Road have removed the benches and replaced them with two chairs and have also added trash cans.

Changes will have to be addressed by the State Legislature. There was once a program to help residents on converting wood-burning fireplaces to gas or propane, hopefully it will come back.

Online Exploitation and Human Trafficking



When the COVID pandemic halted almost every aspect of our life last year, human trafficking became even more prevalent. The disruption in anti-trafficking resources and awareness gave traffickers an advantage during the many months the COVID pandemic was at the forefront of our news feeds last year.

Traffickers adapted to the quarantine by shifting their focus to target potential victims online. This shift created an increase in illicit online activity, particularly human trafficking that targeted children. The Polaris Project reported a 40% increase in calls to the National Trafficking Hotline the month after stay at home orders were put in place. According to the U.N. Rights committee, the use of online traps to recruit victims, particularly women and girls, continued to increase over the last year.

As children spend more time online to complete schoolwork or stay occupied while parents work from home, they are at a greater risk of exploitation. Those who spend several hours a day online without supervision are particularly vulnerable, especially if they have no parental controls set up on their devices and can access any content online. Social media platforms and messaging apps provide easy access to potential victims and hide perpetrators' identities, so children may not realize who they are in contact with. Contact is not limited to social media sites. As many as one in five kids online are sexually propositioned through gaming platforms as well. Parents, educators, and caregivers must warn and educate children about online risks and use parental controls and device monitoring when possible.

The pandemic has also made it challenging to locate and identify victims of trafficking. As we learn more about the effects of the pandemic on human trafficking, it is of utmost importance that we look out for those most vulnerable in our communities. Everyone can play a part in helping stop human trafficking, be on the lookout for the following:

- Children traveling with adults who are not their parents
- Unable to speak to a child or individual alone
- The individual appears to be coached on what to say and looks for approval before answering questions

- Individuals who have their passport, I.D., or money held by someone else
- People with bruises and wounds in various stages of healing Neighbors, teachers, and first responders can report suspected human trafficking activity to their local law enforcement or federal law enforcement at 1-866-347-2423.

Be Smart, Be Aware and Avoid Health Scams!



The start of the year is a great time to start working on new goals and create healthy habits. A common goal found in many new year's resolutions is to become healthier by exercising more, losing weight, eating better, or even quit smoking. While this is an essential part of one's wellbeing, getting there shouldn't put your personal or financial information at risk. Almost 10% of all gym membership sales are made in January every year, and while most of these are legitimate businesses, some are looking to take advantage and make a quick profit. Likewise, online searches for health supplements, weight-loss products, smoking cessation programs, and exercise equipment skyrocket during the first two weeks of the year. Scammers are well prepared to take advantage of this excitement and motivation for their benefit. It's essential to take time to do research and make sure the product or services we are looking to purchase are legitimate to avoid financial loss or, worse, detrimental effects on our health.

One habit you need to incorporate into your daily routine this year is safety. The Maricopa County Attorney's Office wants to help you make smart decisions. We encourage you to use these tips to help guide your decision making:

- Practice patience while doing research and looking at gym contracts. Always read the fine print and ask about cancellation procedures before signing any documents.
- Beware of products or services offering free trials. You may be signing on to a yearlong membership without knowing it!
- Do your research on products with too-good-to-be-true claims, including those that boost quick health improvements or weightloss, help with a wide range of issues, or are not approved by the FDA.
- Avoid products or services that ask for upfront payment or cash, gift cards, or wire transfers. For a safer method of payment, use a credit card. It will allow you to contest the charge if the product or service is not what it claims to be.

Everyone is vulnerable to scams and fraudulent products, but we can all take easy steps in avoiding them. Help prevent scams or fraud by sharing this information with your friends and family.

ADOT looks to cut down on dealer plate fraud, unauthorized sales

Will verify operations of used vehicle dealers to protect consumers

approximately 3,000 used and wholesale dealer license holders in an effort to discover potential activity such as dealers that have very little to no recent vehicle sales or have sales they are not licensed to make.

ADOT detectives are contacting license holders to ensure they are not misusing dealer plates or selling vehicles outside of the limits of their licenses, an illegal practice known as curbstoning.

State law allows an individual to sell no more than six vehicles in twelve consecutive months without a dealer's license. Dealers who attempt to sell vehicles in excess of what is permitted on their license are also in violation of the law.

"We are asking used and wholesale dealers to please contact us if they receive a letter from the ADOT Office of Inspector General," said Lt. James Warriner. "This is an effort to verify that they still want and intend to use their dealer license for the purpose of selling vehicles."

ADOT's Office of Inspector General heads up the Arizona Curbstone Enforcement Joint Task Force that focuses on curbstoning, which includes identifying unlicensed automobile dealers and used and wholesale dealer license holders operating outside their approved dealer license.

"Curbstoning vehicles has been a huge problem in Arizona and throughout the United States," Warriner said. "Our task force has helped to cut down on this practice through a few large cases."

ADOT, the Arizona Department of Revenue and the Arizona Independent Automobile Dealers Association comprise the Arizona Curbstone Enforcement Joint Task Force, established by state law to ferret out operations illegally selling vehicles.

Little to no activity on a dealer license can be a sign for possible fraudulent behavior including misuse of dealer license plates. These are special plates that, by law, can only be used on certain dealer-owned vehicles.

In past cases where dealers were investigated for different types of fraud, ADOT detectives have found dealer owners misusing their assigned dealer plates by putting them on their personal vehicles and the vehicles of their close family members. This way, they can avoid paying the registration and vehicle license tax on those vehicles.

Dealer license plates are governed by state law. Any changes to dealer license plates and how they operate will need to come through the state legislature.

In 2014, ADOT introduced a redesigned, bright blue dealer license plate with white lettering that shows "Vehicle Dealer" on the bottom in accordance with House Bill 2372 passed during the 2013 Arizona legislative session. The redesign helps the plate stand out from the

previous dealer plate design of the desert background, which is common on standard Arizona license plates.

"If a dealer license holder has found that they no longer want or need their license, they are always welcome to contact ADOT anytime to arrange to have their license canceled and all materials, including dealer license plates, turned in," added Warriner. "We are here to help protect the citizens of Arizona by ensuring they have the protections afforded them when purchasing a vehicle."

Detectives with ADOT's Office of Inspector General investigate fraud involving vehicle title and registration, licensed and unlicensed dealers, identity theft, and support investigations by state, local, tribal and federal law enforcement.

ADOT reminds drivers to 'Know Snow' before heading north

Wait out storms before traveling, don't park along highways to play

With snow falling in Arizona's high country and more snow in the forecast, the Arizona Department of Transportati on wants to remind drivers to be

prepared before heading up north to play in the snow.

One of the best things drivers can do is check weather and road conditions before leaving. Waiting out a storm before traveling is the safest and most efficient option because it allows ADOT's snowplows to clear the highways more quickly. A highway takes much longer to plow when it's jammed with vehicles that shouldn't be traveling on a roadway that's slick with snow and ice.

If you're heading north to play in the snow, remember to use designated parking areas and never stop along highways to play in the snow. Highway shoulders are for emergencies, and stopping there can put you, your passengers and other drivers at risk. First responders often need to use highway shoulders, and a snowplow can hurl snow and ice far off the highway.

Research where you plan to play in the snow and what designated parking is available there. If your destination is the Flagstaff area, the Flagstaff Convention & Visitors Bureau lists snow-play locations at FlagstaffArizona.org (follow the Winter Recreation Map link) and offers a hotline at 844.256.SNOW.

Also remember to expect plenty of company, especially during the weekend, and pack patience as lots of folks from the Phoenix area travel north to play in the snow. Expect to spend extended time in your vehicle getting to and from snow play areas.

Other safety tips that ADOT offers at <u>azdot.gov/KnowSnow</u> include slowing down, leaving extra room behind the vehicle ahead, having a fully charged cell phone, taking along warm clothing, blankets, food and water, and packing an emergency kit. Check your vehicle before heading out in winter weather, making sure – at a minimum – that the tires, heater and windshield wipers are in good shape.



ADOR Continues to Fight Evolving Tax Fraud Schemes Three Tax Return Schemes

Identity thieves are always looking for new ways to scam or steal taxpayers' identities, including phishing schemes, card-skimming devices, unsecure Wi-Fi networks, data breaches, computer viruses, unsafe smartphone apps, and hacking email accounts.

The Arizona Department of Revenue (ADOR) treats detecting and stopping fraud with paramount importance. ADOR continues to fight and shut down fraudulent tax preparers and tax fraud through enhanced staff training and by adopting new countermeasures like advanced analytics with machine learning and artificial intelligence.

The following three schemes are a few examples ADOR has found that attempted to steal from Arizona taxpayers:

<u>Watson Scheme:</u> ADOR identified this scheme when multiple returns were received with the same last name of "Watson." This scheme evolved over the tax year, but all of the returns used stolen identities. In many cases, the identities were verified to individuals who lived outside of Arizona. ADOR received over 1,900 returns requesting over \$500,000 in fraudulent refunds.

<u>Tucson</u> <u>College</u> <u>Scheme:</u> Criminals electronically submitted returns with W-2s from Tucson College. ADOR received a total of 14 returns requesting over \$21,000 in fraudulent refunds. All returns were requesting similar refund amounts to prepaid debit cards.

<u>1099-R Scheme:</u> Fraudsters sent over 480 electronic returns requesting over \$1,200,000 in fraudulent refunds. All of the returns, which included a fictitious 1099-R, used stolen identities.

Tips to help prevent being the victim of identity theft:

- Do not carry identification with your Social Security Number (SSN) on it.
- If someone asks for an SSN, always ask why because it is not always required.
- Keep personal and confidential information in a secure place.
- Secure your devices using anti-virus software.
- Monitor your bill cycles and examine unfamiliar debit and credit card charges.
- Use strong passwords and never share your passwords.
- Never give personal information through unencrypted email, social media, or text messaging. Unless you initiated the call, never provide personal information over the phone.

Watch Out for Identity Theft Thieves during Tax Season

The Arizona Department of Revenue (ADOR) takes identity theft seriously and reminds taxpayers that tax filing season is a time to be aware of identity thieves looking for ways to commit tax fraud.

The department points to phishing schemes, card-skimming devices, unsecure Wi-Fi networks, data breaches, computer viruses, unsafe smartphone apps, and hacking email accounts as ways identities are stolen.

Thieves steal Social Security Numbers (SSN) and use them to file a fraudulent tax return. Often taxpayers are unaware this has occurred until they attempt to file a tax return and learn one has already been filed using the SSN. This is not limited to adults, and the deceased and children with an SSN may be affected as well.

Ten tips to help prevent being the victim of identity theft:

- Do not carry identification with your SSN on it.
- If someone wants your SSN, always ask why because it is not always required.
- Keep personal and confidential information in a secure place.
- Take extra precautions when discarding personal or confidential information.
- Protect personal computers, smartphones, and other devices by using anti-virus software.
- Do not click on unexpected links, images or attachments in emails. Check links before clicking by hovering over the link and look at the bottom left corner of the browser to verify the exact URL.
- Use strong passwords and never share your passwords.
 Along with changing your passwords at least every 90 days.
- Never give personal information through unencrypted email, social media, or text messaging.
- Check your credit report annually.
- Monitor and examine your bank and Social Security Administration statements.

The Arizona Department of Revenue advises taxpayers to file early and take steps to protect their information.

In fiscal year 2020, the Arizona Department of Revenue's fraud prevention system has stopped more than \$19 million from fraudulent tax returns, which is three times the amount compared to last year.

CRIME TIPS:

THE RED FLAGS OF ELDER FINANCIAL ABUSE

Elder abuse sadly takes many forms. It can be physical, sexual or emotional abuse, neglect, or financial exploitation. The latter is when someone – who is often well known by the victim – illegally or improperly uses an elder's funds, property or assets. Here are several examples, some signs that abuse may be occurring and steps you can take if you suspect elder financial exploitation.

HOW IT WORKS:

A family member cashes the victim's checks, uses their credit cards, steals cash or valuables from the home, or convinces them to transfer property.

A crooked financial consultant drains a victim's financial accounts.

A new "friend" enters the picture and appears to have undue influence.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Unusual changes in bank accounts or how they are managing their money.

Unpaid bills.

Fraudulent signatures on financial documents.

Unusual changes in a will or other financial document.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

If someone is in immediate danger, dial 911.

Report concerns to Adult Protective Services; you can find your local agency at Eldercare Locator or call 1-800-677-1116.

If you suspect abuse of a person living in a nursing home, assisted living facility, or other adult care home, contact the local Long-Term Care Ombudsman.

Financial exploitation and fraud come at a huge cost to victims – not only financially. These scourges also have negative social, emotional and health impacts. If you suspect something, do something. For guidance, call the AARP Fraud Watch Helpline at 1-877-908-3360.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be 1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

Weatherization Assistance Program Fact Sheet

What is the Weatherization Assistance Program?

The Weatherization Assistance Program offers financial assistance to eligible low to moderate income households to help reduce heating and cooling costs by improving the energy efficiency

Weatherization improvement may include, but are not limited to:

- . Tuning, repairing or replacing heating and cooling systems
- Sealing ducts and air leaks around the property

 Health and safety lests for carbon monoxide and gas leaks
- . Ensuring proper levels of insulation and much m

To qualify, the following minimal conditions must be met. The lotal annual gross household ne must meet low to moderate income quidelines which vary by household size as published annually by federal and state regulations.

- The property must be located within the city of Phoenix limits.
- . For rental units, the landlords must sign a written agreement permitting the improvements to be done and certify no monthly rental increases will occur for a period of 12 months from the date of improvement completion.
- · For homeowners, the property title must be clear from all extraordinary liens and encumbrances including, but not limited to:
 - Past due property tax liens and property mortgage payments
 - Past due special assessment liens and judgments against the property
- . The rehabilitation of the property must be feasible under the time and funding constraints of the program.

What are the homeowner's responsibilities?

- Maintain the property in compliance with local city codes and ordinances, for more information visit: www.phoenix.gov/nsd/grograms/compliance;
- . Assure property is accessible (interior and exterior) to staff and contractors for rehabilitation work and inspections:
- Complete any training andler other stigulations of the financial assistance.

Phoenix Graffiti Awareness





February 2021 will mark the 7th annual Graffiti Free Phoenix Awareness Month campaign, Mayor Kate Gallego will issue a Proclamation encouraging residents to actively participate in efforts to keep Phoenix neighborhoods free of graffiti. The campaign focuses on awareness, education, and calls the community to action.

Graffiti is a form of blight that can decrease property values in neighborhoods and attract other forms of criminal activity if it is not promptly removed. A citywide collaborative effort that includes the Neighborhood Services Department (NSD), Police, the Prosecutor's Office, and various other departments and stakeholders, was established to combat graffiti and prosecute graffiti vandals.

While anti-graffiti education occurs year-round, the City highlights the issue in February to raise awareness about the negative impacts of graffiti, and to encourage residents and communities to take action.

No Burn Days

Check Before You Light



Relaxing in front of a crackling fire is one of the most enjoyable ways to spend a cold winter day. All our senses become absorbed in the experience and the result can be truly calming.

Unfortunately, it's a more complex decision to light that fire. Fall and winter's cooler temperatures can trap air pollution near the ground, which is why Maricopa County may issue no-burn days to help avoid high levels of air pollution. Burning wood can produce fine particulate matter that can be harmful to your lungs. It can also produce carbon monoxide and other toxins that can harm your health.

When state forecasters issue a high pollution advisory [HPA], the Maricopa County Air Quality Department will issue a mandatory No Burn Day restriction, prohibiting all fireplace, woodstove and outdoor burning device use. This includes the use of manufactured logs. Restrictions last for a 24-hour period. Violators may be subject to fines.

Natural gas or other clean-burning fire appliances are allowed on no-burn days. If you choose to burn wood, use only dry, seasoned wood because it is more efficient at heating your home. Proposed Water & Sewer Rates

Phoenix Water Services is proposing a 6.5% water rate increase spread out over a two-year period. The proposed rate increase for the average single family residential customer will equal to approximately \$2.40 a month or 0.08 cents per day, which is still among the lowest in the nation.

The rate increase would provide funding for resources needed to invest in rehabilitation and replacement of water pipes, treatment plants, pumps, reservoirs, and wells that ensure reliable delivery of the city's drinking water. Water Use Calculator: A New Water Conservation Tool Phoenix Water Services Department's new water usage calculator is a tool to help residents get a better understanding of day-to-day water consumption. Showers, dishwashing, laundry, toilet flushes, outdoor landscaping, and pools contribute to the resident's daily water use. "Water conservation has always played a critical role in Phoenix's water resource planning. As we prepare for a hotter, drier future, water conservation will be even more important for our city's resiliency and sustainability. The water calculator is an excellent resource to add to our water conservation efforts," said Vice Mayor Thelda Williams, chair of the Transportation, Infrastructure and Innovation Subcommittee.

To get started, residents can visit Phoenix.gov/WaterCloud and click on the Home Water Usage Calculator. That calculator makes it easy to enter information about the household, such as family size, type of landscaping, age of the home, length of the average shower, and more. The calculator compiles a resident's optimal monthly water usage into a detailed report tailored to the household. In the report, residents can view monthly and annual water usage breakdown (in gallons), as well as graphs that highlight indoor versus outdoor water usage. Residents are encouraged to use a recent City Services bill to input actual usage for a more accurate comparison. The calculator produces an estimate, and actual usage may vary. Phoenix Water's water usage calculator is one of the 14 water conservation measures recommended by the Water Conservation Ad Hoc Committee (Committee) and adopted by the Phoenix City Council to maintain Phoenix's legacy as a water conservation leader.

The Committee convened from May 2019 to December 2019 to identify water conservation measures around three focus areas, including landscape requirements and guidelines, codes and enforcement, and education and outreach. The Committee was cochaired by Councilwoman Williams and Councilwoman Pastor and comprised of citizens from the community with water expertise in the non-profit, private, and public sectors.

PARKS & RECREATION UPDATE

Following a vote during the December 2nd Phoenix City Council meeting, all athletic field reservations and tournaments at facilities managed by the city's Parks and Recreation Department will be canceled effective December 3 and be paused until the COVID-19 community spread metric returns to the moderate level in Maricopa County.

Additionally, due to the City Council vote, the following city park amenities closed effective December 3 and remain closed based on that same community spread metric criteria that is provided by the Arizona Department of Health Services.

- Ramadas
- Picnic tables
- Fitness equipment
- Basketball and volleyball courts
- Sports complexes

All other amenities in Phoenix's public parks will remain open, as will city hiking trails and golf courses.


Community members using the city's outdoor recreational amenities should continue to follow these guidelines related to responsible physical distancing.

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

"Call if you can. Text if you can't." was the key message rolled out during a press conference on April 2nd as text to 9-1-1 service capability becomes available for the first time in the greater Phoenix region. If you are in imminent danger and unable to talk to a 9-1-1 operator, you now have the ability to text to 9-1-1. The service goes live following months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community.

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anyone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? -Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- Who is calling? Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)
