#### PHOENIX PD APP

The Phoenix Police Department now has a mobile APP, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place. Users can use the app to access online reporting, crime statistics, precinct locations, phone numbers, career opportunities, virtual block watch, victims' rights information, and more. Users can also turn on notifications from the precinct they live in to receive news updates and information on events in their area.

The APP is now available both in the Apple Store for iOS and in the Google Play Store for Android.

**Report graffiti on the Phoenix PD app!** Graffiti can now be reported on the Police Department APP released in January 2021. Studies show that if graffiti is removed within 24 hours, there is a 90% likelihood that the graffiti will not use the app to have it removed! #GraffitiFreePHX

#### WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anyone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? –Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- Who is calling? Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

**TEXT 9-1-1** "Call if you can. Text if you can't." After months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community (or advocates for the disabled) if you are in imminent danger and are unable to talk to a 911 operator, you now have for the first time in Phoenix the ability to text to 9-1-1.



#### 2024 Price Increases on PNP Clothing

If you have Mileage Reimbursement funds in your current BW Grant this is important info for you. The mileage reimbursement rate was increased as of January 1, 2023. It is now 65.5 cents a mile.

My office attended the Bell Road Business Alliance Meeting where they heard from representatives from the planning department on the Transit Oriented Development (TOD) study for the Metrocenter

area. The City of Phoenix, in partnership with project collaborators, community stakeholders, and the Mayor and Council, is embarking on the development of a Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) policy plan specifically designed for the NWEII Study Area. This comprehensive plan aims to attract, guide, and prioritize strategic investments in infrastructure, housing, economic development, transportation, and various other areas, aligning with the community's collective vision for the future. The NWEII study area, with a focus on the Metrocenter area, presents unique amenities and opportunities for additional enhancements within existing spaces, complementing the TOD implementation. The policy plan will unfold through three distinct planning phases, made possible by a federal grant. This initiative empowers the City and surrounding communities to proactively plan for the future, anticipating the operationalization of the light rail and the anticipated growth of the area. #### Vacant Property Registry

In December 2023, the Phoenix City Council approved the Neighborhood Services Department's Vacant Property Registry (VPR). The VPR is an online portal that maintains contact information for owners of vacant properties that meet specific criteria outlined in the Phoenix City Code. The City of Phoenix uses the registry to notify property owners of code violations and propertyrelated issues.

The VPR alleviates barriers by providing a free, online portal that is virtually available anytime and from anywhere. Owners can register, provide contact information, and gain access to educational resources at their convenience. Proactive Education for Property Owners

- Owner responsibilities
- Available resources

The VPR also addresses the community's need for an efficient response to crime, blight, and other related code violations.

Increases penalties for non-compliance

Fireworks has been a problem over the holiday season. Unfortunately, it's not the city laws, it's the state laws that need to be looked at. The low numbers of officers in our precinct continues.

Great information on what happened after the Zone was dissolved. Out of 700 people, 83% took services. An emergency shelter needed to be set up at La Quinta at I-17 and Greenway to help with placing people already in services and allow for room. It is only temporary and will be closing in April. Those people will be placed in different housing and will not be going out on the streets. Scott talked about his own journey homelessness. out of Accountability is at the forefront of

helping the homeless. The Community Court will be a great help for these people. There are several properties being renovated into housing for those in need. All the shelters have issues, but those who are looking for help will stay. 



#### **BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS**

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens, and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant

**OUTDOOR STORAGE:** All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backvards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

**ELIMINATE GRAFFITI:** Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

# CRIME TIPS:

#### "HOME-BASED JOB?" OR "HOME-BASED SCAM?"

If your New Year's resolutions include finding a new job, you may be looking for ways to make money working from home. However, not all work-from-home opportunities are what they seem. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) received more than 95,000 consumer complaints about consumer sham job and business opportunities in 2022, making them one of the Top 10 frauds reported.

#### HOW IT WORKS

You see an online or print ad that offers a work-from-home opportunity doing something like processing paperwork, stuffing envelopes or data entry work.

The ad may promise high pay and require little or no special skills or experience.

You may be asked to pay up front for training and other materials or you may receive a check to "cover" these expenses.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

Criminals advertise jobs the same way honest employers do on trusted websites and newspapers—and often pretend to be both well-known and smaller companies.

The listings can include fake testimonials and bogus personal stories of people making thousands or more through this opportunity.

They promise you a job, but what they want is your money and your personal information.

Honest employers, including the federal government, will never ask you to pay to get a job.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

Do an online search using the company's name plus the words "scam," "review" or "complaint" to see what other people are saying.

Check out the company with your <u>state consumer protection</u> <u>agency</u>, the Better Business Bureau in your community and the area where the company is located.

Don't provide any personal details until you're certain a job offer is legitimate.

Ask lots of questions before accepting any work-from-home job offer—including how and when you'll be paid, whether it's a salary or commission-based payment and if there are up-front costs.

If you have experienced financial loss or identity fraud through a work-at-home job scam, report it to law enforcement. You can also share the information with the FTC <u>online</u> or by calling 877-382-4357.

#### UTILITY SCAMS HEAT UP DURING COLDER MONTHS

Criminal impostors take on many faces, including those of utility companies. While utility scams happen year-round, criminals are especially active when customers rely on these services to stay safe and warm during colder months.

Anyone who pays a utility bill can be a target, so here are some things to look for.

#### HOW IT WORKS

You get an unexpected visit, call, text, or email from someone claiming to be your power or water company.

They may offer a free energy audit or assistance signing up for government programs to reduce energy bills.

Or they threaten to cut off service unless you pay an overdue bill or maintenance cost immediately.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

Utility impostors aim to convince you to make a payment to them or to supply personal or financial data that they can use to steal or sell your identity. They may open new accounts and run up charges in your name.

Legitimate utility companies don't request personal information by email or phone, and they provide advance warning before disconnecting services.

If anyone ever tells you to pay a bill by purchasing gift cards and sharing the numbers off the back, or to go to a bitcoin ATM to send payment that way, it is a scam.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

It is a sad state of affairs to say not to answer your door when someone unexpectedly knocks and not to trust email messages, text messages, or phone calls, but this is the world we are in.

If a message by any channel immediately puts you into a heightened emotional state, say fear or panic, let that be your sign to disengage.

Contact your utility company at a number you know to be correct from a paper bill, through an online portal you have login credentials for, or by going directly to the utility's website. (Don't do a web search; the results often contain ads bought by criminals to direct customer service calls to them.)

If you or a loved one have experienced a utility scam, report it to your actual utility company and to law enforcement. You can also share the information with the Federal Trade Commission <u>online</u> or by calling 877-382-4357.

Knowledge gives you power over scams. The <u>AARP Fraud</u> <u>Watch Network</u> equips you with reliable, up-to-date insights and connects you to our free fraud helpline so you can better protect yourself and your loved ones. We also advocate at the state, federal and local levels to enact policy changes that protect consumers and enforce laws.

Your information and the code to the lockbox is provided only to firefighters in the event there is an emergency call to your home. You will need to provide the appropriate key or keys to put in the lockbox at the time of the delivery.

# 988 <mark>988</mark> 988

People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S. They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-8.

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit <u>988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline</u> is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States. The Biden administration has invested more than \$400 million in beefing up crisis centers and other mental health services to support the 988 system.

# Beware of flood damage when buying a used vehicle

Vehicles in floods or severe weather may not be properly identified



As winter weather patterns start to bring much-needed rain and snow, a possible side effect could be troublesome for those looking to purchase a vehicle. Cars damaged by floodwaters, such as those resulting from the recent 20-25 foot waves or heavy rain storms in California, can sometimes be sold by unscrupulous individuals.

When looking for a new-to-you vehicle, it is important to know its history. Pay close attention to a vehicle's condition and title status, especially in private sales. If a vehicle is flooddamaged, the title should say "salvage" or "flood damage." But occasionally people fraudulently remove flood history from vehicle titles, making it more difficult to title or insure the vehicle after the sale is completed.

Potential buyers should remain vigilant when looking at used vehicles, closely inspect the vehicle, don't sign anything until the vehicle has been checked over bumper to bumper and be prepared to walk away if things don't smell right – quite literally in some cases.

#### ADOT recommends buyers follow these guidelines:

 Check out all of the vehicle's nooks and crannies. Look under the carpet and floor mats and examine the trunk for dirt, silt and mold. Check under the dashboard and other hard-to-reach places as well. Scammers usually don't clean all of those places. Finally, take a good whiff in those areas. Water damage leaves a distinctive smell.

Check the electrical and mechanical components. Water wreaks havoc on electrical systems, so check to see if any of those systems aren't working quite right. Also check the engine for signs of rust or even random new parts. If possible, ask an auto mechanic you trust to check the suspension for water damage. Any of those things could be a sign that you're in danger of buying a flood-damaged vehicl

## Don't lose your hard-earned money; walk away if you see any of these red flags.

A buyer can use the vehicle identification number (VIN) to obtain the vehicle history through an online service that may charge a fee. This check can uncover a vehicle's status as "salvage" or "nonrepairable," as well as maintenance problems, collisions, insurance claims and titles issued in other states.

# ADOT seeks bids to construct 21 electric vehicle charging stations

## Facilities planned along interstates are step toward statewide network

PHOENIX – Advancing plans to support adoption of electric vehicles, the Arizona Department of Transportation is seeking bids for private entities to build or upgrade electric vehicle charging stations along interstate highways.

The stations are the first major step in establishing a statewide network of rapid charging stations, with 21 facilities expected to be operating by the end of 2025. These stations are intended to reduce range anxiety and encourage use of electric vehicles as a viable alternative to gasoline-powered vehicles.

All stations will be privately owned and operated, with federal funds covering 80% of construction costs and the private developer paying 20%. No state funds will be involved in the construction of these stations. Bids are due April 19, with ADOT awarding contracts this summer. Construction of the privately owned facilities is anticipated to take about a year.

The charging stations are funded through the National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure program, or NEVI, which is allocating \$5 billion in funds nationwide through the U.S. Departments of Transportation and Energy and \$76.5 million for Arizona.

The charging stations generally will be spaced no more than 50 miles apart, and must be constructed beyond the freeway within a mile of an interchange. The bidding process outlines general areas where stations eligible for funding can be located, with specific locations to be determined through the selection process. Each station must include at least four chargers that can charge a typical electric vehicle within 20-30 minutes.

While the first round of electric vehicle charging stations will focus on interstates, ADOT plans to expand onto other highways starting with an additional round of bids in 2025. The plans will evolve based on developments within the electric vehicle industry and by studying the usage patterns of the first set of stations that come online.




