PHOENIX PD APP

The Phoenix Police Department now has a mobile APP, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place. Users can use the app to access online reporting, crime statistics, precinct locations, phone numbers, career opportunities, virtual block watch, victims' rights information, and more. Users can also turn on notifications from the precinct they live in to receive news updates and information on events in their area.

The APP is now available both in the Apple Store for iOS and in the Google Play Store for Android.

Report graffiti on the Phoenix PD app! Graffiti can now be reported on the Police Department APP released in January 2021. Studies show that if graffiti is removed within 24 hours, there is a 90% likelihood that the graffiti will not return to the same area. If you see graffiti in progress, call 911 immediately, or use the app to have it removed! #GraffitiFreePHX

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anyone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? -Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- Who is calling? Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

TEXT 9-1-1 "Call if you can. Text if you can't." After months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community (or advocates for the disabled) if you are in imminent danger and are unable to talk to a 911 operator, you now have for the first time in Phoenix the ability to text to 9-1-1.

NEW YEAR'S EVE SAFETY TIPS




City of Phoenix Police Department Black Mountain Precinct (200) Squad and Beat Boundaries

Mileage Reimbursement Rate for 2023

The rate effective January 1, 2023 is 58.5 cents a mile. Remember the PNP mileage reimbursement is only available to groups that successfully applied for mileage reimbursement funds in a BW grant for their neighborhood and are subject to the NBWGP guidelines and requirements.

Message from Councilwoman Ann O'Brien

Thank you to everyone who came to our last community meeting of 2022! For those who missed it, unfortunately City Manager Jeff Barton was unable to make it due to being ill. We will plan to have him at a future meeting and look



forward to hosting him when he's feeling better! Instead, we talked about the GO Bond Executive Committee's recommendation – and yes, a brand-new building for Cactus Park Precinct is included in the Executive Committee's proposal! Additionally, the Committee suggested spending over \$83 million on adding new fire stations throughout Phoenix. This is the largest investment in any one department throughout the entire bond package. I am thankful to the Executive Committee for crafting a well-thought-out bond package and for understanding the need for public safety investments in our community. Council will be voting to approve the Executive Committee's proposal during the Council Policy meeting at 12:30pm on the 13th. Be sure to call in or come

down to City Hall to vocalize your support for Cactus Park Precinct!



We didn't JUST talk about the proposed GO Bond program, we also celebrated Frank and Joyce Steinmetz! Frank and Joyce will be leaving us for North Carolina so they can be closer to family. For those of you unfamiliar with Frank and Joyce's advocacy, it is the stuff of legends! Frank has served on several boards and commissions – having been appointed by former Councilwoman Williams, as well as me. Frank and Joyce have been strong advocates for their neighborhood and community. They can regularly be found at cleanups, advocating for their block watch, and supporting our men and

women in blue at the Cactus Park Precinct. At the Community Meeting, I presented an official City of Phoenix Proclamation from Mayor Kate Gallego declaring December 2nd, 2022, Frank and Joyce Steinmetz Day! Frank and Joyce will certainly be missed, but we all wish them well in North Carolina – and we might be a bit jealous of North Carolina for stealing such wonderful people from us!

On Tuesday, I helped welcome the President of the United States to District 1 here in Phoenix as we celebrated the First Tool In Event at the Taiwanese Semiconductor Manufacturing Company (TSMC) site. Joined by Mayor Gallego, Governor Ducey, Governor-elect Hobbs, and many more elected officials, we listened to leadership of TSMC as they announced their plans to build a second fabrication sight at their location which will more than triple their initial \$12 billon investment to a total of \$40 billon! I always knew having TSMC in our backyard was a big deal, but it never really hit me until Apple CEO Tim Cook took the stage to address the crowd. Apple uses 25 to 35% of the total volume produced by TSMC. This isn't just another manufacturing building in our backyard, this has global implications — and I, for one, think that's awesome!

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens, and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be 1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

CRIME TIPS:

CRIMINALS BREAK HEARTS AND WALLETS WITH PET ADOPTION SCAMS

The holidays may prompt a desire to create a cherished memory by adopting a pet; unfortunately, that desire may lead many to a scam you won't soon forget.

HOW IT WORKS:

Adorable photos and heart-tugging tales of critters in need of forever homes are enough to make a pet lover act quickly to adopt a new family member, be it a puppy, a kitten, or even a horse or an exotic pet.

Slick websites boast steep discounts for popular breeds, or ads on social media will offer free adoption (with fees) to rehome a beloved pet.

After filling out forms to verify the adopter's fitness for adopting, the seller typically asks for payment by wire transfer, gift cards or via a cryptocurrency ATM.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Once engaged with this scam, the adopter is sent to a bogus website to track the pet's progress, which is invariably delayed by contrived problems that add cost to the purchase, like insurance or a special pet carrier.

Made-up costs will continue to be added for veterinary or other expenses, and delays will continue to come up, such as "Covid exposure," which one crime ring insisted was the cause (they were busted by authorities).

The criminals are betting that your emotional investment in the anticipated pet will keep the payments coming, into the hundreds or even thousands of dollars.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Do your research to understand typical costs for adoption, whether through breeders or rescues. Don't trust offers for deep discounts on the going rate.

Shop local with a reputable breeder, rescue or shelter. If you can meet the seller in person or tour the facility, you know it's legitimate. Be wary of a seller who invents reasons why you can't pick the pet up in person.

Do a reverse image search for the photos of the adoptive pet; it is a good way to find out if the photos have been copied from another website.

Expanding Efforts on Cold Cases

MCAO received approximately \$3 million in grants from the Department of Justice. The first grant will support the ongoing testing of sexual assault kits, enhance law enforcement training, and hire additional detectives and crime analysts. The second grant will help further cold case investigations by paying for additional DNA testing, creating a countywide cold case database, and providing resources for law enforcement agencies and prosecutors. Since these grants were received, MCAO has hired a cold case analyst to review case information and start building a database.

Veterans Diversion Program

In March, the Maricopa County Attorney's Office launched a new pretrial diversion program designed specifically for veterans. The program identifies and treats issues unique to veterans stemming from military-related trauma with evidence-based services and treatment before conviction. Any veteran who successfully completes the program will have their charges dismissed. This ensures they have access to employment opportunities and government services.

Policy Changes to Address Gun Violence

To address the surge of violent crime in Maricopa County, County Attorney Rachel Mitchell made important changes to Prosecution Policy 3.7 to require a prison sentence in any plea offer if a firearm is used in the commission of a crime. The policy was also changed so that if the defendant has a prior felony conviction and is a prohibited possessor, a plea offer in a misconduct involving weapons case includes a stipulation for prison.

MCAO Awards Community Grants

Every year, MCAO provides grants for local non-profits that seek to improve the wellbeing of our residents. For the 2022 grant cycle, MCAO awarded a total of \$82,500 to seven local non-profit organizations. MCAO Retail Theft Task Force

In July of this year, Maricopa County Attorney Rachel Mitchell announced the start of a new organized retail theft team in response to an increase in organized retail theft. The team, consisting of multiple prosecutors and detectives, works with local businesses and law enforcement agencies to ensure these crimes are successfully prosecuted.

2022 Standard Deductions and Key Tax Changes

Phoenix, AZ—The Arizona Department of Revenue would like to inform taxpayers of the tax year 2022 annual adjustments for Arizona standard deductions, new tax credits, and the reduced tax rate for small business income tax. Tax year 2022 adjustments generally are used on tax returns filed in 2023

Due Date for Calendar Year Filers

Because April 15, 2023 falls on a federal holiday, taxpayers have until **Tuesday, April 18, 2023** to file their 2022 tax return. If filing an **extension**, the extended due date to file the income tax return is October 16, 2023 because October 15, 2023 falls on a Sunday.

2022 Arizona Standard Deduction Amounts Adjusted for Inflation:

- \$12,950 for a single taxpayer or a married taxpayer filing a separate return:
- \$25,900 for a married couple filing a joint return; and
- \$19,400 for individuals filing a head of household return.

The standard deduction can be increased by 27% of the charitable deductions the taxpayer would have claimed if they had itemized their deductions. This increased amount cannot be claimed on Form 140EZ or 140A

Updated Arizona Form A-4

Arizona's Individual Income Tax Withholding Form (Arizona Form A-4) has been updated to reflect Arizona's lower individual income tax rates. Every Arizona employer is required to make this form available to its Arizona employees by January 31, 2023. The new A-4 form has seven new withholding election rate boxes (0.5%, 1.0%, 1.5%, 2.0%, 2.5%, 3.0, 3.5%) while retaining both the zero withholding rate option and the line for additional Arizona withholding. If an employee fails to fill out the new A-4 form, the default rate will be 2.0%. Do not send these withholding forms to the Department, they should be kept by the employer and the employee with their tax records.

2022 Individual Income Tax Brackets

For 2022, the individual income tax brackets have been adjusted for inflation and reduced to two tax rates.

Arizona Small Business Income (SBI) Tax

Beginning with tax year 2021, individuals may elect to report their small business income on Arizona Form 140-SBI, Small Business Income (SBI), for the small business income included in their federal adjusted gross income. The SBI tax return must be filed timely with the regular income tax return to be accepted. The tax rate applicable to small business taxable income reported on Forms 140-SBI, 140PY-SBI, or Form 140NR-SBI was reduced from 3.5% in 2021 to 3.0% for 2022.

Repealed Individual Tax Credits

Beginning with tax year 2022, the following individual income tax credits have been repealed.

- Pollution Control Credit (Form 315)
- Employment by a Healthy Forest Enterprise Credit (Form 332)

Affordable Housing Tax Credit (Form 354)

Beginning with tax year 2022, Arizona allows an individual taxpayer to claim a nonrefundable tax credit for projects in this state that qualify for the federal low-income housing tax credit under section 42 of the Internal Revenue Code that are placed in service from and after June 30, 2022 in an amount equal to at least fifty-percent of the amount of the federal credit allowed in each taxable year during the federal credit.

The tax credit may be claimed on either the individual's personal income tax return (Form 140, 140NR, or 140PY) or the Small Business Income tax return, if filing (Form 140-SBI, 140NR-SBI, or 140PY-SBI).

Pass-Through Entity (PTE) Tax (Credit Form 355)

Beginning with tax year 2022, Arizona allows an individual partner or an individual shareholder of a partnership/S Corporation a nonrefundable tax credit for the taxes paid by the PTE on the individual's behalf for their share of the income distributed to the partner/shareholder. If the allowable credit exceeds the taxes otherwise due on the claimants income, or if there are no taxes due, the amount of the claim not used to offset taxes may be carried for not more than five consecutive taxable years as a credit against subsequent years' income tax liability.

An individual taxpayer who claims the allowable PTE tax credit must also adjust their Arizona gross income by adding the amount of the tax payment made by the PTE for which the tax credit is claimed. A taxpayer should report the add-back adjustment on page 5, "Other Additions to Arizona Gross Income" and included in the total amount reported on the income tax return. 

People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S. They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-8.

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit <u>988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline</u> is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States. The Biden administration has invested more than \$400 million in beefing up crisis centers and other mental health services to support the 988 system.
