

PHOENIX PD APP

The Phoenix Police Department now has a mobile APP, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place. Users can use the app to access online reporting, crime statistics, precinct locations, phone numbers, career opportunities, virtual block watch, victims' rights information, and more. Users can also turn on notifications from the precinct they live in to receive news updates and information on events in their area.

The APP is now available both in the Apple Store for iOS and in the Google Play Store for Android.

Report graffiti on the Phoenix PD app! Graffiti can now be reported on the Police Department APP released in January 2021. Studies show that if graffiti is removed within 24 hours, there is a 90% likelihood that the graffiti will not use the app to have it removed! #GraffitiFreePHX

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anyone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? –Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- Who is calling? Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

TEXT 9-1-1 "Call if you can. Text if you can't." After months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community (or advocates for the disabled) if you are in imminent danger and are unable to talk to a 911 operator, you now have for the first time in Phoenix the ability to text to 9-1-1.

VACATION AND TRAVEL SECURITY TIPS

Summer is here in Phoenix and that means it's hot. As the mercury rises, many Valley residents head for cooler climates. Getting back to summer vacations this year are definitely needed to escape the heat, recharge from work and raising kids, and relax. However, vacation time is a busy time for burglars who take advantage of your absence and know it is a good time to strike. Here are some basic vacation security tips to make your home less tempting to burglars as you enjoy your vacation and also some travel security tips for those of you traveling out of state or internationally:

- Ask a neighbor to watch the house while you are away. It is a good idea to leave your vacation address and telephone number with a trusted neighbor so you can be reached in case of an emergency.
- Never leave your house key hidden outside your home.
- Stop all deliveries and arrange for a neighbor to pick up your mail, newspapers and packages that may get delivered.
- Arrange for someone to maintain your yard to give the home a lived in look.
- Plug in timers to turn on lights and a radio / television on and off at appropriate times.
- Turn the phone ringer off and do not announce your absence on voicemail.
- Try not to post on social media sites like Twitter and Facebook your vacationing status. You never know who could be viewing your activities, such as friends of friends you have allowed in to see your site.
- Leave your blinds, curtains or shades in a normal position. Do not close them unless that is what you normally do.
- Close and lock garage doors (including door entering house from garage), all doors leading to the exterior of the house and windows. Secure the attic entrance if it is open to a carport. Ask a neighbor to park a car on occasion in your driveway or if you leave a car at home park it as you normally would. Vehicles parked outside should be moved occasionally to appear that they are being used. Do not leave any valuables in plain view in cars.
- Lock and secure all gates, storage sheds, and even electrical boxes.
- Contact the Black Mountain Precinct at 602-495-5002 and request a vacation watch to cover the time period you are gone.

It is natural for everyone to be concerned for their homes and valuables when they leave on vacation, and there is no guarantee that your home will not be burglarized while you are gone. By taking these simple precautions you can lower your chances of becoming a burglary victim and give you some peace of mind while you are away. With certain areas of the world in turmoil and the constant threat of terrorism at home and abroad it is important to maintain a security mindset when traveling. The best and easiest way to enjoy your vacation travel, whether by car, boat, train or plane, is to follow some basic tips.

- If you see something suspicious, say something to the police or security personnel.
- Plan before you go. Research the current state of affairs in the country you are visiting. Find out if there is a civil war, political issues or other potential dangers. The State Dept. can provide this information. Their website is https://travel.state.gov/content/passports/en/alertswarnings.html
- Be familiar with local laws and customs of your destination countries. Learn at least a few words of the local language. Don't advertise that you are a tourist. Standing out as a tourist can be dangerous in countries where kidnappings and terrorist attacks are common. Wearing a fanny pack, carrying a camera around your neck, or walking around with a big map can mark you as a tourist.
- Make sure you have all the paperwork you need before you go, including your <u>passport</u>, visas and other travel papers. Make sure you also leave a color copy of these documents with a friend or relative at home.
- Familiarize yourself with illnesses that are common in the country you are traveling to. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) keeps an updated list of <u>health information</u> for countries around the world, and the World Health Organization (WHO) keeps track of Covid and <u>disease outbreaks</u>.
- Take note of conditions such as high altitudes or humidity, which might impact your health. Consider getting a checkup to ensure you're healthy enough to travel and check to see if you need any vaccines for that country.
- Don't carry more than small amounts of cash, use traveler's checks or a credit card, both are traceable and replaceable if you lose them.
- Don't bring anything with you that you'd hate to lose. If you do bring any valuables with you, leave them in the hotel safe when you go out.
- Don't travel alone. Never share your personal information (including your hotel room number) with anyone you don't know.
- Limit your outings at night, both on foot and by car. If you do travel at night, stick to well-lit and well-traveled areas.
- Never get into a vehicle that isn't clearly marked as a licensed taxi.
- If you are a victim of a crime abroad, contact the local police, as well as the nearest U.S. embassy, consulate or consular agency for help. They can help you replace a stolen <u>passport</u>, get medical care and navigate your way through the local justice system.
- Exercise caution around crowded places, such as tourist attractions, marketplaces and packed subways or train stations. Stay away from desolate, remote areas or alleys where you'll be alone.

The Phoenix Police Department will do everything we can in our neighborhoods to protect your homes and at the airport to ensure that you travel safely. 

Message from Councilwoman Ann O'Brien

For those who missed it, today we had our June community meeting. We had a short presentation on the Department of Justice's findings report. The District 1 community voiced clear support for our police department and its officers. It's important to note, the report is filled with allegations, not proven facts. As a city, we are still combing through the DOJ's report to identify the cases they reference, and we continue to ask them to provide us with the data and evidence they used to come to their conclusions. I support the men and women of the Phoenix PD! If some of these allegations are true, then we as your representatives and PD leadership will make the reforms necessary to ensure our families, businesses and visitors receive the highest level of service. Ultimately, we can do the necessary work without the DOJ's "help.

This morning, the US Supreme Court ruled 6-3 to reverse the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals decision in Grants Pass. The ruling states that it is not considered "cruel and unusual punishment" to enforce laws to regulate encampments on public property. This means the City of Phoenix has the authority to enforce local decisions surrounding the issue of homeless encampments, including a ban on the practice. The city's legal department issued some guidance shortly after the ruling was announced that confirmed we could begin enforcing our existing anti-camping ordinances.

The city is well-prepared to handle the encampment issue thanks to the many steps we took as Council to prepare. The City and our officers will always lead with services and education first. If you want services, then we will get you into a shelter or into care. If you are violating the law and refuse services, then you will be cited for breaking the law. Importantly, our Community Courts serve as a valuable tool to help those individuals who are experiencing homelessness and continue to refuse services and find themselves issued a citation or are detained. This Court allows them to receive navigation services and work towards an individualized solution to help get them out of homelessness.

To be clear, homelessness is not a crime; it is an issue that requires compassion and complex solutions. The Community Courts offer longterm support to individuals and allow them to choose for themselves whether they want services or consequences. The city must be able to uphold the law. Obstructing the right of way, littering in public parks, and ingesting drugs in public are crimes. Today's Supreme Court decision will go a long way in helping us work better to fix these problems in our community.

APPOINTMENT-BASED BULK TRASH COLLECTION

Phoenix's bulk trash collection program is changing to an appointment-based system starting September 30, 2024. With the new program, customers will be able to select collection dates available for their address. Each household is allowed up to 4 pickups per year. The new program will provide solid waste fee-paying customers a convenient way to get bulk trash removed. It will help reduce blight in neighborhoods and prevent trash from piling up during Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's holidays. Appointment-based collection will replace quarterly collection beginning on September 30, 2024. Read more about the change.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens, and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

CRIME TIPS:

SHADY CONTRACTORS CAN HAMMER AWAY AT YOUR WALLET

Even the most well-cared-for homes may require professional maintenance due to normal wear and tear or unforeseen disasters. Finding a trustworthy contractor is an important first step.

Scammers often swoop in with promises to fulfill your needs, only to leave you and your home in worse shape than before. They may do shoddy work, damage your home, overcharge you or take your money without performing the agreed-upon services.

A recent episode of AARP's <u>The Perfect Scam podcast</u> sheds light on the experience of one Wisconsin homeowner whose contractor disappeared with a large deposit after many headaches and delays. In 2023, the Federal Trade Commission received nearly 83,000 reports of home repair, improvement and product scams.

Here's what to know to help protect you or a loved one from a home improvement scam.

HOW IT WORKS

Uninvited contractors show up at your door after a bad storm causes damage.

Or they may say they were working in the area and noticed a problem with your home that they can fix.

They may offer you a deal on leftover materials to redo your driveway.

And they may claim that today's rate will not be the same as tomorrow's, urging you to act quickly and pay up front.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

Be wary of any contractor who shows up uninvited and can start work immediately. The good ones are usually too busy to search for work.

It's a red flag if a contractor pressures you to make immediate commitments or demands cash payment up front.

If weather damaged your house, shady contractors and scammers may try to persuade you to sign over the insurance payment directly to them.

Or contractors may offer financing, encouraging you to take out a home equity loan or <u>reverse mortgage</u> and arrange for the lender to pay them directly. This leaves little incentive for them to finish or do the job properly.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

Take time to consider your options.

Always get multiple bids (typically at least three) and insist on recent references.

Check contractor reviews on social media sites and the <u>Better</u> <u>Business Bureau</u> (BBB), and make sure businesses are licensed by your <u>state's licensing agency</u>.

Get a written contract, and read it carefully before signing.

Don't pay the full amount for the project up front. Though a deposit may be required, it typically should not exceed a third of the total estimate.

COMBAT THE SCOURGE OF ELDER FINANCIAL EXPLOITATION

Each year, World Elder Abuse Awareness Day on June 15 brings international attention to elder abuse, including financial exploitation. The latter includes fraud by known perpetrators (crooked lawyers, the long-lost nephew, etc.) and via scams (what we often call stranger danger).

U.S. financial institutions are required to file Suspicious Activity Reports (SARs) to the federal government when they suspect elder financial exploitation. Typically, analyses of these reports have shown the known perpetrator form of exploitation to be more common than scams. That is, until a few months ago.

DO SCAMS OUTNUMBER KNOWN PERPETRATORS?

According to recent analysis by the federal Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN), 80 percent of SARs reviewed over a one-year period involved scams, with 20 percent involving known perpetrators.

It is uncertain whether stranger danger scams are that much more prevalent than known-perpetrator fraud today, or whether financial institutions are now better at identifying and reporting scams. Either way, it aligns with how people are feeling about scams these days. A recent AARP survey shows that 91 percent of U.S. adults worry about scams. Their top concern? Becoming a victim themselves.

WAYS TO HARDEN THE TARGET

The growing recognition that fraud can (and does) happen to anyone, regardless of age or other characteristics, is actually a good thing. Recognizing our potential susceptibility reduces victim shaming and likely increases the desire to find ways to better protect ourselves.

Here are steps we can all take to harden the target against scams. **Create strong and unique passwords** for all online accounts, and enable multifactor authentication where offered (this is a code that adds a second layer of protection as you log in to your accounts).

Avoid clicking on links in emails and text messages. If you get an email or text from a company you do business with that suggests a problem with your account, don't click a link to look into it. Rather, go to the website or app and log in to see if there's a problem.

Only use public Wi-Fi if you have a virtual private network, or VPN, installed on your device. Otherwise, use your cell service if available.

Update your device's operating system and antivirus protections when prompted — better yet, set them to automatically update. These are often used to patch known vulnerabilities.

Monitor your credit and consider a credit freeze. The latter helps protect against someone opening an account in your name. (Visit <u>annualcreditreport.com</u> to learn more about both.)

Knowledge gives you power over scams. The <u>AARP Fraud Watch</u> <u>Network™</u> equips you with reliable, up-to-date insights and connects you to our free fraud helpline so you can better protect yourself and loved ones. We also advocate at the state, federal and local levels to enact policy changes that protect consumers and enforce laws.

K9 Victim Support Program (VSP) About the Program

The Maricopa County Attorney's Office has two four-legged cuddly team members working in the Victim Services Division. Elle and Morgan, both Golden Retrievers, are facility dogs trained to work with victims of crime.

Young victims in particular are often traumatized by heinous crimes and intimidated by the criminal justice system. As members of the K9 Victim Support Program (VSP), Elle and Morgan provide calming, comforting support for these victims throughout the often-stressful criminal justice process. Their special training allows them to perform this important function in a variety of behavioral situations and to remain focused when working with outside noises including sirens, emergency workers and even gavels.

In addition to attending court hearings, the K9 VSP team accompanies victims during interviews and meetings related to their case. They offer a reassuring presence for victims as they prepare testimony, give depositions and, in some instances, confront perpetrators. Elle and Morgan spend many hours each week in the County Attorney's Office and happily interact with MCAO employees. They also represent the office at select community events.

The Beginning

Starting in May of 2010, Sam became the first member of the MCAO K9 VSP. Throughout his six-year career with MCAO, Sam helped more than 750 children and adult witnesses and victims by calming their anxieties before what many consider a very stressful situation; testifying in court. Although officially retired from the Office in July of 2016, he led the way for additional facility dogs to be adopted into the Program.

COMMUNITY CATS Helpful Information and Tips for the Community

A Community Cat is a catch-all term often used to describe any outdoor cat that may appear to not have an owner. Feral cats, which are underor not socialized, fall under this umbrella, as do free-roaming, friendly cats.

In Maricopa County, cats are not subject to the same licensing and leash laws as dogs. Because of this, Maricopa County Animal Care and Control (MCACC) cannot pick up stray or feral cats or take action against those feeding cats in their neighborhoods.

Many times, members of the community act as colony managers to ensure that a feral cat colony is a managed colony. Cats in these communities are usually fed, watered, vaccinated, spayed, or neutered, and monitored for overall health. Other times, the cats are self-reliant and can survive in the neighborhood on their own, without any direct assistance.

TNR (Trap-Neuter-Return) is a long-proven and effective method for humanely addressing community cat populations across the world.

Trap: The cats are humanely trapped and brought to a clinic.

Neuter: The cats are fixed, vaccinated, and their left ear is "tipped" to indicate they have been fixed.

Return: The fixed cats are safely returned to their colony. Benefits of TNR

• Cats become better neighbors as it reduces or eliminates unwanted mating behaviors (e.g., yowling, fighting, spraying).

Cats will be healthier when treated with this humane solution and

typically are less likely to wander from their food source.Halts the breeding cycle which allows community cat populations to stabilize and eventually decline.

Protects and respects cats' lives.

How to Help Keep Community Cats Away from Your Property • Remove or secure all potential food and water sources from your property, including dog food.

Spray concentrated orange juice or hang orange or lemon peels in areas where cats are spraying — cats do not like the citrus scent.
Keep all trash and recycle bins tightly closed as cats are considered opportunistic feeders/hunters.

• Use a motion-detecting device that turns on a sprinkler or bright light in response to motion on your property, such as ScareCrow™.

Remove or secure potential shelter areas — secure access under houses, sheds, decks, porches, and buildings with wire fencing.
Use plastic carpet runners spike-side up and covered lightly in soil to

prevent cats from digging in your garden.Keep landscaping trimmed to avoid creating hiding/nesting spots.

• Spread dried wild animal manure in the areas you notice feral cats in

your yard; wild animal urine also may work to deter the cats. • There are also many commercial cat repellants (chemical and non-

chemical options) available in garden stores, pet shops, and online.

DRIVING IN RURAL AREAS? PAY ATTENTION FOR WILDLIFE NEAR HIGHWAYS

Driving in rural areas? Pay attention for wildlife near highways

Different seasons provide different reasons for wildlife to move from place to place. With warmer weather here, deer, elk and other wildlife are out and about looking for food, water and shade. And animals on the move means an increased risk of encountering wildlife on and near rural roads and highways.

The above photo shows a vehicle that struck an elk on a highway in Arizona's high country.

As you travel on Arizona's rural highways and roads, the <u>Arizona Department of Game and Fish</u> offers these tips:

- Slow down. Driving more slowly increases reaction time and reduces the chance of a collision.
- Stay alert while driving, particularly at dusk and dawn.
- Scan ahead and watch for movement along roadsides.
- Obey traffic signs and watch for wildlife warning signs.
- Typically, you should not swerve to avoid hitting the animal. Stay in your lane and firmly brake.
- However, if it is a very large animal and there is no oncoming traffic and the shoulder is safe on either side of the road, it may be safer to swerve rather than risk the impact from a large animal, like a cow, horse or adult bull elk.

According to <u>statewide crash data</u>, in 2022, there were 1,830 vehicle collisions with animals in Arizona, resulting in four human fatalities and 280 injured persons. Consider that an average male elk weighs about 900 pounds and an average female elk weighs around 500 pounds. Animals of that size can cause severe damage to vehicles, resulting in injury or death to themselves as well as vehicle occupants.

988 988 988

People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S. They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-8.

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit <u>988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline</u> is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States. The Biden administration has invested more than \$400 million in beefing up crisis centers and other mental health services to support the 988 system.

SWIMMING POOL SAFETY TIPS

Pool season is in here, so take these steps to keep your park visitors safe this summer:

- 1. Remove toys and floats from the pool immediately after use; they can attract children.
- 2. Always assign a designated watcher for children in and around the pool.
- 3. Make sure there is a self-closing gate around your pool, and always keep it maintained.
- 4. Gates and fences around the pool area should be at least 4 feet high.
- All pools should have regulation drain covers; discuss local regulations with your pool maintenance provider.
- 6. Keep a fully stocked first aid kit and rescue equipment near your pool area.
- 7. Never swim alone.
- 8. Learn to perform CPR on both adults and children.
- 9. Post pool signs in prominent locations and make sure they are easily seen and read.
- 10. Inspect pool areas for slipping hazards and install safety tape as a precaution.
