



We are quickly approaching the end of 2021 (where did it go) please to a few minutes finish entering your December logs and make sure all of your hours are in for the year. I want everyone to get credit for the time they have worked.

Mileage Reimbursement Rate Change for 2022

The IRS has announced that the mileage reimbursement rate will change effective January 1, 2022 to 58.5 cents a mile. All PNP patrols prior to January 1, 2022 will still be reimbursed at the IRS rate at the time of the patrol, for all of 2021 it was 56 cents a mile.

Remember the PNP mileage reimbursement is only available to groups that successfully applied for mileage reimbursement funds in a BW grant for their neighborhood and are subject to the NBWGP guidelines and requirements.

PNP merchandise order forms and cost updates:

As you are writing your grants, you might be budgeting for PNP equipment, like clothing, street signs and/or vehicle signs and are curious about expected prices for 2022. If any of you have bought groceries or filled up your gas tank you know there has been an increase in the cost of just about everything recently. I have reached out to our suppliers asking for their expected prices for 2022. So far, we have only received 2022 prices from the supplier of our magnetic vehicle signs. Our clothing supplier will not be able to give us a price list until later in November. Predicting the future is always difficult.

FIRE BAN IN DESERT PARKS AND PRESERVES BEGINS

The Parks and Recreation Department is putting into effect their annual ban of open fires in the city's desert parks and mountain preserves starting May 1. Smoking and charcoal fires are included in the ban due to the extreme fire danger. The ban applies to Camelback Mountain, Deem Hills Recreation Area, Lookout Mountain, Papago Park, Phoenix Mountains Park and Recreation Area, Phoenix Mountains Preserve, Phoenix Sonoran Preserve, North Mountain Park, Rio Salado Habitat Restoration Area, and South Mountain Park/Preserve. The ban does not apply to the city's flatland parks. For those using city's desert parks and preserve land, the fire ban stipulates:

• Open wood and charcoal fires are prohibited

Propane or gas grills may be used, but only in established picnic areas

- Smoking outside enclosed vehicles is always prohibited
- Fireworks are always prohibited. More info: phoenix.gov/parks



Lt. Ben Sywarungsymun is the new Resource Lt. for Black Mountain Precinct. Happy to have 4 CAOs for the precinct! 2022 Crime Stat changes from Feb. to Mar.: 16.9% increase in person offenses, 6.6% increase in property offenses and 80% in weapons offenses (from 15 up to 27). 27.1% increase in drug & alcohol offenses and 46% decrease in fraud offenses. Still working on Bell Road and 17th Avenue with Ocotillo and Quik Trip and making arrests.

Candice & Monte presented the Fire Chief with a thin Red Line Glass Sculpture. He was happy to be invited to a community meeting. He introduced his Operations Asst. Chief Tim Price, North District Commander Tony Benites and Internal Investigator Mike Perry. They have been working on the expansion of the Community Assistance Program which is a valuable resource for services after house fires, grief support and for substance use, behavioral and mental health issues that the Fire Dept. deals with. Last year the Phoenix Fire Dept. had 240,000 dispatches for service. The aerosol fire extinguishers were discussed and will work well on small home fires, if the fire grows, call 911. There are expiration dates on all fire extinguishers. The Knox Box Access Program was discussed.



SWIMMING POOL SAFETY TIPS

Pool season is in here, so take these steps to keep your park visitors safe this summer:

- 1. Remove toys and floats from the pool immediately after use; they can attract children.
- 2. Always assign a designated watcher for children in and around the pool.
- 3. Make sure there is a self-closing gate around your pool, and always keep it maintained.
- 4. Gates and fences around the pool area should be at least 4 feet high.
- 5. All pools should have regulation drain covers; discuss local regulations with your pool maintenance provider.
- 6. Keep a fully stocked first aid kit and rescue equipment near your pool area.
- 7. Never swim alone.
- 8. Learn to perform CPR on both adults and children.
- 9. Post pool signs in prominent locations and make sure they are easily seen and read.
- 10. Inspect pool areas for slipping hazards and install safety tape as a precaution.

Arizonans are first in the nation to add driver licenses to Apple Wallet

ADOT MVD gives Arizona residents ability to add IDs to Apple Wallet and present their identity at TSA airport security checkpoints



The Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division embraces the motto, "Out of the line and safely on the road." This is a nod to MVD's commitment to putting Arizonans first by reducing in-office wait times and offering customers a growing number of digital options.

Today, ADOT MVD is aiming higher – literally – and that motto could easily be revised to "out of the line and safely in the sky."

That's because Arizona is the first state in the nation whose residents, beginning today, can add their MVD-issued driver license or state ID card to Apple Wallet on an iPhone or Apple Watch and securely present it as a valid ID at select TSA airport security checkpoints at Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport.

"With this technology, Arizonans are at the front of the line for experiencing a streamlined airport security process," Governor Doug Ducey said. "This puts our state at the leading edge of a new technology that offers choice, convenience, privacy and security."

After adding a driver license or state ID to Apple Wallet, upon arriving at <u>Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport</u>, travelers can use Apple Wallet to present their ID at designated <u>TSA</u> airport security checkpoints.

"Arizona is proud to be the first state to give our residents the choice to add their ID to Apple Wallet," Arizona MVD Director Eric Jorgensen said. "We will continue to seek out opportunities for products and services that provide Arizonans security, privacy and ease of use."

At this time, an Arizona driver license or state ID in Apple Wallet can be used to present a resident's ID only at select TSA airport security checkpoints. This is a new technology and its use case will grow over time. Arizona residents should continue to carry their physical, plastic driver license or state ID card to use in other situations, including with law enforcement.

How to add a driver license or state ID to Apple Wallet

Adding a driver license or state ID to Apple Wallet can be done in just a few simple steps. Arizona residents can tap the + button at the top of the screen in Apple Wallet on their iPhone, select "Driver's License or State ID" and follow the on-screen instructions to start the set-up and verification process. You will need your physical MVD-issued driver license or ID card to add it to Apple Wallet.

Driver's license and state ID in Apple Wallet is available on iPhone 8 or later running iOS 15.4, and Apple Watch Series 4 or later running watchOS 8.4 or later.

How to use your Arizona ID in Apple Wallet at the airport

Arizona residents can present their driver license or state ID at participating TSA airport security checkpoints by simply tapping their iPhone or Apple Watch at the identity reader. Upon tapping their iPhone or Apple Watch, customers will see a prompt on their device displaying which specific information is being requested by the TSA. Only after authorizing with Face ID or Touch ID is the requested identity information released from their device. Information is all shared digitally, so residents do not need to show or hand over their device to present their ID.

Your Arizona driver license or state ID in Apple Wallet is secure State IDs and driver licenses in Wallet are private and secure. If a resident loses their iPhone or Apple Watch, they can use the "Find My" app to easily lock their device and help locate it, or remotely erase their device. Identity data is encrypted and protected against tampering and theft. The MVD and Apple do not know when or where residents present their IDs. Biometric authentication using Face ID and Touch ID ensures that only the person who added the ID to the device can view or present their ID or license in Apple Wallet.

ADOT detectives bust dealer salesman committing theft against employers and customers

Buyers should always ask questions, do research before purchasing

PHOENIX – Detectives with ADOT's Office of Inspector General have arrested a car dealer employee for allegedly committing numerous thefts against his Phoenix-based car dealership and its customers. Eduardo Rodriguez was employed at a few used car



dealerships in Phoenix. He sold dealership cars to customers and after collecting cash payments, the allegations include that Rodriguez kept payments instead of turning them into his employer. Additionally, Rodriguez would sell the same car to more than one customer and pocket the cash payments. He would also sell customers bogus warranty policies.

All three dealerships eventually discovered the numerous thefts he had committed and contacted ADOT's Office of Inspector General. ADOT detectives learned Rodriguez purchased a vehicle from one of the dealers he worked for and financed it. A few days after buying the vehicle with the provided financing, Rodriguez sold the vehicle privately to an unsuspecting victim. Because Rodriguez defaulted on the loan, his former employer was required to buy it back.

ADOT detectives also discovered the other instances of theft against the dealerships and customers. Rodriguez was arrested and charged with fraud schemes, theft and forgery.

Generally speaking, when it comes to buying a used vehicle either from a used car dealer or in a private sale, ADOT recommends taking time and asking lots of questions and doing your research. There are no dumb questions in a big purchase like this. If the seller is acting suspiciously, being evasive or uncooperative, walk away. Take the time to find the right purchase.

ADOT's work zone safety message: Slow down, pay attention

More than 70 deaths in Arizona work zone-related crashes in past 5 years

Arizona drivers could significantly reduce tragic deaths in roadway work zone crashes by doing two things: Slowing down and paying attention.

That's the message from the Arizona Department of Transportation during this



year's National Work Zone Awareness Week, which is being marked across the country.

Law enforcement reports show that 73 people were killed in work zone-related crashes on local streets and highways across Arizona since 2017. That includes 11 deaths in 2020. More than 850 people were killed nationwide in work zone incidents in 2020 (the most recent year for available national data).

"Have you ever had a twinge of guilt or nervousness while breaking the speed limit in a highway work zone?," asks ADOT Director John Halikowski. "Worried that you might hit something or, even worse, someone? Well, be assured that bad things can happen when you speed through work zones."

The theme of this year's Work Zone Awareness Week (April 11-15) is "Work Zones are a Sign to Slow Down."

"We care deeply about drivers, passengers, highway workers and families who could be impacted by work zone crashes," added Halikowski. "Many tragedies can be averted if drivers slow down and stay alert. Yes, slowing down for something might annoy you, but please take these dangers seriously and don't listen to that little voice that urges the 'need for speed!"

ADOT staff today (Wednesday) provided media members with a chance to tour a work zone for the ongoing I-10 Broadway Curve Improvement Project, where crews often work behind temporary concrete barrier walls just feet away from nearby speeding freeway traffic. The speed limit within the work zone is 55 mph. The project's team has produced this I-10 work zone safety public service announcement.

National statistics over time have shown that 4 out of 5 victims of work zone crashes were drivers or their passengers. Arizona work zone crash statistics from law enforcement reports over the past five years include the following:

- 2017: 18 fatalities, 31 serious injuries
- 2018: 17 fatalities, 23 serious injuries
- 2019: 15 fatalities, 22 serious injuries
- 2020: 11 fatalities, 23 serious injuries
- 2021: 12 fatalities, 23 serious injuries **
- ** preliminary all 2021 crash reports not yet analyzed.

It's important for drivers to slow down and pay attention when approaching and traveling through all work zones, but especially so in areas where workers aren't able to work behind barrier walls.

"Roadway maintenance crews are often exposed to open traffic conditions, including during nighttime hours, when they are working to improve your highways," said ADOT Central District Administrator Randy Everett. "We have flashing lights, signs and other safety equipment, but often the biggest factor is whether a driver is impaired, speeding or distracted in some way. If you're entering a work zone, your first instinct should be to slow down."

ADOT has posted a safety message on a number of its electronic signs along state highways that reads: "Work Zone Safety Week: Give 'Em a Brake."



ADOR Continues Use of State Tax Refund to Pay Outstanding Debts

Phoenix, AZ—The Arizona Department of Revenue (ADOR) administers several offset programs that use an individual's tax refund and applies it to outstanding tax liabilities and other state agency or municipality debts. ADOR offsets (holds back) as much of the refund needed to pay off overdue taxes owed by taxpayers and notifies them when this occurs.

ADOR may apply the tax refund to pay debts from:

- IRS,
- Child support,
- Arizona courts, or
- state and municipality fines/fees.

How the Process Works

- ADOR sends taxpayers an offset notice if any part of their refund is applied to non-tax debts. Taxpayers should contact the agency identified on the notice when the offset occurs if they wish to dispute the non-tax debt, or have questions about the offset.
- 2. If the agency determines they are offsetting the refund, the amount will be taken from the ADOR tax refund and the remaining funds will be delivered through a paper check or direct deposit.

Taxpayers who receive a letter from ADOR, informing them that some or all of their refund was adjusted to pay outstanding liabilities should note that, by law, we must offset any refunds or overpayments to certain authorized agencies that have a claim against them.

Refund offsets will delay the issuance of the remaining refund (if any) after offset.

Payment Installment Plan

ADOR may offset any state or federal refunds due to you while you are on a <u>payment plan</u>.

Refund offsets are not a substitute for scheduled monthly payments, which remain due each month until your liability balance is paid in full.

Applying your refund to your unpaid balance may:

- lower your balance due,
- shorten the term of your payment installment agreement,
- lower the amount of your final payment, or
- pay your balance in full.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

 <u>Rental Rehabilitation Program</u> – This program repairs structural systems, completes exterior facades, landscaping, and safety enhancement projects, and improves the energy efficiency of singleand multi-family homes.

 Weatherization Assistance Program – This program reduces monthly and annual utility bill costs by making homes more energy efficient.

• <u>Utility Repair/Replace Deposit</u> – This program repairs or replaces non-functioning appliances, and units or systems that help provide heating and cooling, or water and sewer services to homes.



IT'S TAX SEASON. IT'S ALSO IRS IMPOSTOR SEASON.

While IRS impostor scams happen year-round, they are particularly common during tax season, making one of the more stressful times of the year that much worse. These impostors will stop at nothing in trying to steal our hard-earned money, and they have lots of ways to make their scam look convincing.

HOW IT WORKS:

You receive a phone call, text, or email that claims to be from the IRS. The message: You owe back taxes, and must make immediate payment or face arrest.

The communication will include a request to pay your supposed obligation by wire transfer, or by purchasing gift cards and supplying the number and PIN on the card.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Most IRS impostor scams begin as a robocall, with the message either directing you to press a number on your keypad to be connected with a live agent, or to call back using the number provided.

Scammers can change the number that shows up on your caller ID, making it appear that they are calling from the IRS.

The real IRS initiates communication by mail, including in cases of delinquent taxes. The agency may contact you by phone only after you have received and not responded to multiple written notices.

No federal agency accepts payment for any obligation by wire transfer or gift card. In 100% of these scenarios, it is a scam.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

If you get a call like this, do not press a number to be connected to a live agent or call back on the number provided — either option puts you in direct contact with a criminal scammer.

If you think you may owe taxes, call the IRS at 1-800-829-1040 or visit irs.gov/balancedue.

Know that beyond IRS impostors, ID tax fraud is still a big problem. Consider obtaining an <u>IRS Identity Protection PIN</u>. It prevents someone else from filing a tax return in your name. The IP PIN is known only to you and the IRS.

GIFT CARDS ARE POPULAR AND CONVENIENT ... AND NOT JUST FOR GIFTS

Gift cards are popular and convenient ... and not just for gifts. Con artists have latched onto gift cards as a convenient form of payment in their scams.

Why Gift Cards?

First, they are readily available. You see them at your grocery store, department store, hardware store — really almost everywhere you shop these days.

Second, it's a way that criminals can steal a target's money instantly. Once the target shares the numbers off the back of the cards, the criminal can drain them almost instantaneously.

Common Scams With Gift Cards as Payment

Asking for gift card payments is common in impostor scams a call from Social Security warns of a problem with your account; a utility company call warns of an imminent shutoff; you've won big in a lottery and just need to pay some fees upfront; your grandchild faces a financial emergency. All you need to do to solve the problem or claim your prize is go to the closest store and buy hundreds or thousands of dollars' worth of gift cards, and share the numbers off the back.

The Red Flags

A key part of being able to spot a scam is knowing those signs that suggest that just maybe what you're confronting isn't legitimate.

One of the biggest red flags these days is when someone tries to convince you that you owe some debt or other obligation, and the quickest way to pay it is to purchase gift cards and share the information off the back. In every instance, the person is lying to you as part of a scam attempt.

If you are confronted by someone directing you to buy gift cards for some obligation, disengage immediately. Report it to the Federal Trade Commission at <u>www.reportfraud.ftc.gov</u> The data are used to identify trends and build cases against criminals.

If you've lost money to this scam, contact your local police, tell them you are a victim of a financial crime, and that you want to file a report. Push back if you're told not to bother — you will want a record of reporting the crime in the slim chance you could be eligible for restitution.

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

"Call if you can. Text if you can't." was the key message rolled out during a press conference on April 2nd as text to 9-1-1 service capability becomes available for the first time in the greater Phoenix region. If you are in imminent danger and unable to talk to a 9-1-1 operator, you now have the ability to text to 9-1-1. The service goes live following months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community.

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anyone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? –Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- Who is calling? Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

Their motivation may be to meet or get to know their neighbors to protect the children, to keep property values up by eliminating blight and graffiti, to stop speeding on the streets by installing speed humps to protect the children, to have peace of mind by discouraging barking dogs and loud parties, and to be safe from crimes like burglary, theft and assault.

We all want to live in a safe and secure environment. Our homes should be safe havens. By rights there should be several layers of protection from the national level to our own neighborhoods. National and state governments provide control of our borders; state and city governments provide police and fire protection, education, and other resources, community member groups provide Phoenix Neighborhood Patrollers and the posting of PNP signs on neighborhood streets; Block Watch provides neighbors watching out for neighbors; and we provide our own home security alarms, lighting and burglary prevention measures.
