

PNP merchandise order forms and cost updates:

As you are writing your grants, you might be budgeting for PNP equipment, like clothing, street signs and/or vehicle signs and are curious about expected prices for 2022. If any of you have bought groceries or filled up your gas tank you know there has been an increase in the cost of just about everything recently. I have reached out to our suppliers asking for their expected prices for 2022. So far, we have only received 2022 prices from the supplier of our magnetic vehicle signs. Our clothing supplier will not be able to give us a price list until later in November. Predicting the future is always difficult.

Vehicle Signs:

I have made a 2022 vehicle sign order form with the new prices, it is attached to this email, and it has been uploaded to PNPmembers.com. Please use this new form for budgeting purposes only right now and continue to use the 2021 form for purchasing vehicle signs until the end of this year. The new prices will take effect January 1, 2022.

PNP Clothing:

We do not have the 2022 prices from our supplier yet and likely will not until near the end of the grant application time. I have included the 2021 order form on this email as well to assist with estimating your budget. Please consider the overall inflation we are experiencing in all other goods when planning your 2022 budget.

Metal PNP Signs:

The prices for metal PNP signs (these are NOT the Block Watch signs that the Block Watch Advisory Board sells) will remain the same this upcoming year, we have a good supply on hand. We hope to keep the cost the same through 2022. That order form is also attached.

On a side note we do have a few "test" signs out in the community from a different supplier, using different materials, to see if they last longer than the current supplier's signs do. If they pass the test; we will discuss switching to the new sign at one of our monthly meetings before making any changes.

Grants Web Page PNP Forms:

Be aware the Neighborhood Block Watch Grant Program page has links to the <u>OLD</u> PNP order forms, 2020 to be exact. I have provided them with the most current forms (the ones I attached to this email) but as of the writing of this email their web page has not been updated with the current forms. I hope that is done before the

grant applications open next week. Please use the attached form for budgeting purposes since they are the most current prices.

PNP Mileage Reimbursement:

Don't forget about PNP Mileage reimbursement, the grant normally allows a neighborhood with a PNP patrol group to request funds for mileage reimbursement. In the last 2 years we have worked with the grant staff to make the reimbursement documentation process easier (go to www.pnpmembers.com/video/ for videos of the new process). Check the grant application documents for dollar limits and other restrictions.

Message from Councilwoman Ann O'Brien

Over this last weekend. I attended Fall-o-ween at the Deer Valley Community Center and was excited to see all the kids and community members. Shout out to the Deer Valley Park Neighborhood Block Watch, the Moon Valley Gardens Neighborhood Block Watch and the Black Mountain Community Alliance for organizing such a great G.A.I.N. event with our police officers. Although I didn't catch them while I was there, I know Councilwoman Stark and Mayor Gallego stopped by to visit as well. I also want to thank Shan Smith-Whitley for hosting a G.A.I.N. event for the Willow Creek Block Watch at her home. It's comforting to know so many of our residents support our police force. You can show your support as well by calling into my Public Safety and Justice Subcommittee to voice your support. On Monday, I stopped by my alma mater, Greenway High School, to drop off some school supplies which had been collected from around the community. I want to give a huge THANK YOU to My Gal Sal Bakery and Elevate Coffee for helping us collect all these school supplies. It was great being back at my old stomping grounds and my, have things changed since I was last there! Many of the buildings I used to attend class in were torn down and rebuilt. The campus was unrecognizable!

I wanted to take a moment to explain my vote during Wednesday's council meeting. There was an item which had a lot of discussion surrounding the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) dollars provided by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) as rent relief to our struggling airport concessions. I ultimately voted against this measure, but not because I believe our concessionaires don't deserve the funds--on the contrary. I believe it's imperative that our small businesses get the money being provided to them by the FAA. However, there were stipulations added to the funds that are simply unattainable in today's current job markets. These funds are not ours to stipulate; they come from the federal government and the FAA. They should go directly to our small businesses the way our federal government intended them to.

In other news, our parks are back open to out of state sports tournaments! Thank you to everyone who called in the past two meetings and wrote to the council members to voice your support for this measure. We did it!

Emergency Rental Assistance Program Hours Expand

The city of Phoenix continues to disburse funds through the Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA) Program to help residents pay their rent and/or utilities. The city's three Family Services Centers are now extending hours of operation for residents to apply for ERA funds. Hours are now Monday through Saturday, 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. (Previously, hours were Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.) These expanded hours will increase access to appointment opportunities for residents. As part of an ongoing commitment to expedite getting ERA funding out the door, the city also began hiring 50 additional positions in August to assist the program. To date, the city has disbursed more than \$35 million of the \$51.1 million allocated in March of this year. The city is disbursing an average \$2 million per week through the program, which is up from \$1 million per week back in April and May. Funds for this program come from the U.S. Department of Treasury—the entity responsible for deciding who is eligible for these funds. The ERA Program is available to households regardless of citizenship or immigration status and does not require a Social Security Number be provided. Learn more about who qualifies. There are two methods for applying for ERA funds. The city's Human Services Department offers a phone appointment system at 602-534-AIDE (2433). The second method of application is through an online portal with Wildfire. Learn more about the application process by watching these instruction videos in English or Spanish.

There are many expensive machines for analyzing specimens from crime scenes. Special lighting is used to detect bodily fluids. Evidence storage is vast and well maintained which helps with cold cases. The Phoenix Crime Lab is the largest in the state of Arizona, one of the best in the country and is the most complete.



The civilian forensic scientists assist with crime scene investigations, firearms, latent prints, DNA, controlled substances, toxicology, medical examiner, digital forensics and trace & arson. Tours of the Crime Lab are still on hold due to Covid.

Maricopa County Announces Settlement with Manufacturers and Distributors of Prescription Opioids

Wednesday, October 20, 2021 (Phoenix, AZ) – Earlier today, Maricopa County Attorney Allister Adel stood with families and announced a historic agreement to settle with manufacturers and distributors of opioids for their role in unlawfully marketing, promoting, and dispensing prescription opioids.

Maricopa County is the first county government in Arizona to sign this agreement, which is expected to bring approximately \$580 million dollars to the state of Arizona and \$80 million to the residents of Maricopa County. The Maricopa County Attorney's Office, in collaboration with 14 County Attorneys and the Arizona Attorney General's Office, are at the forefront of a resolution many years in the making.

"The impact of this epidemic staggering. It is cruel and it is deadly, and it doesn't care about your race or gender or socio-economic standing," stated County Attorney Adel. "And while throwing money at an issue does not solve it, it will get us closer to healing this community, which has been ravaged by this epidemic. It will also hold accountable those who distributed this very dangerous narcotic to our loved ones and provide resources for a full spectrum of services to our community."

Since 2017, the Arizona Department of Health Services reports nearly 11,000 Arizonans have died of an opioid overdose. It is the leading cause of death of Americans under the age of 50. From 2002 to 2016, fatal overdoses of heroin increased 533% as a result of this epidemic. Prescriptions tripled from 1991 to 2011. Sales increased ten times what they were in early 90s.

"This money will be used to treat, prevent, and help people recover from opioid use disorder and support both government and non-profit organizations working to address this issue," Adel went on to say. "I am especially proud that unlike the tobacco settlements in the 1990's, which allowed government agencies to spend funding without restrictions, this agreement locks the funding in place. And, while today is just the first step of many, it is the beginning of a journey that will bring much needed relief and resources."

Parents of Addicted Loved Ones (PAL) Director Kim Humphrey attended the news conference with his family, including two sons who are both in recovery from opioid use disorder. At the conference, Kim shared his family's story. As a retired law enforcement commander, he was shocked when learned his 15 year old son tested positive opioids. This began a multi-year journey towards recovery for his sons. The hardship brought on by addiction connected Kim and his wife to PAL, an organization dedicated to educating and supporting family members of those with substance abuse issues. Kim's two sons and wife were at the news conference to celebrate this announcement.

Get Kids Involved! Teach Them to be Safe Online



As parents or guardians, it can be challenging to know when to allow kids to go online, much less how to talk to them about it. One thing is certain, the internet isn't going away anytime soon. Any child who uses a device to go online needs guidance from a trusted adult on doing so safely. In the same way you wouldn't let your kid wander alone through an unknown neighborhood, you shouldn't let your kid use the internet without any support or supervision. While you can't change the internet, you can provide your kids with tools and resources to engage with it safely. Doing so ensures that kids will always put their safety first online, regardless of the content or platform.

October is Cybersecurity Awareness Month, and while many think that only applies to adults, cybersecurity is vital for kids as well. Some of the most common issues kids face online are cyberbullying, identity theft, and cyber predators. However, these can all be avoided by practicing five easy safety steps:

- Keep personal information private this includes your name, address, phone number, birthday, passwords, and even the name of your school.
- Always use strong passwords with a combination of at least eight letters, numbers, and symbols
- 3. Stop and think before you post or click on anything online. Once something is posted, it is on the internet forever, and clicking on an unknown link can expose your device to malware.
- Show respect to others online and stand up to bullying, online or off
- 5. Speak up if you see something inappropriate or a stranger tries to contact you online, report it and tell a trusted adult.

Just as crimes happen in real life, they also occur on the internet, so kids need to know that their actions online have consequences that can affect them and others. The earlier we implement healthy and safe habits for our kids, the better prepared they will be when they're older to keep themselves and their information safe.



Peer-to-Peer Car Sharing Platforms Required to Pay Transaction Privilege Tax

Due to the passage of Senate Bill 1720 by the Arizona Legislature, peer-to-peer (P2P) car sharing businesses are now required to pay transaction privilege tax (TPT) on all rentals conducted through their platform. This legislation went into effect on September 29, 2021.

With "peer-to-peer car sharing," a privately-owned vehicle is rented to another individual through a peer-to-peer business that provides a platform for others to rent vehicles for a fee. It does not include (1) car rental agents, (2) short-term car rentals as a business, or (3) vehicle rentals that include a driver.

The P2P business platform owner is responsible to pay TPT, however, private vehicle owners do not need a TPT license or to pay TPT to offer their vehicles for rent through a P2P platform.

However, to avoid additional surcharges, private vehicle owners can certify to the Department that their vehicle is an individual-owned shared vehicle and that either:

(1) TPT or Arizona's use tax was paid on the vehicle when it was purchased; or (2) an out-of-state sales or use tax was paid on the vehicle if the vehicle was purchased out-of-state and subsequently brought into Arizona.

Application for certification may be made to the Department using ptpautoshare.AZTaxes.gov. A private vehicle owner may also represent to the P2P platform (through adequate documentation) that the vehicle is a certified individual-owned shared vehicle.

ADOR Seeking Unclaimed Property Owners Owed Over \$1,000

The Arizona Department of Revenue's (ADOR) Unclaimed Property program has identified approximately \$65 million in unclaimed bank accounts that belongs to 5,000 Arizona residents.

The agency is sending out notices to these potential property owners and their families in an attempt to return the funds. Some of the properties date back 30 years. The largest individual property owing to a single individual is \$1,542,624.

Unclaimed property generally consists of money due to an individual from sources like old bank accounts, uncashed payroll checks, tax refunds, credit balances, rebates, returned deposits and dormant safe deposit boxes. Often property becomes unclaimed because the company that holds the funds has an outdated or the wrong forwarding address for its customer and in some cases, a person passes away with no family members aware of the assets.

ADOR returns property to owners who provide documentation showing their right to claim the assets. Claimants must include with their claim form a valid photo ID, such as a driver's license or other applicable

identification, and documentation linking them to the owner's last known address. Claimants must also provide documentation demonstrating a legal right to claim any property listed in another name.

ADOR's Unclaimed Property program returned \$48 million to rightful owners in fiscal year 2021 (July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021)

Be Wary of Ghost Tax Preparers

The Arizona Department of Revenue cautions taxpayers to be aware and don't get haunted by past "ghost" prepared returns this Halloween season or any time of the year.

A ghost preparer is someone who is paid to prepare a tax return, but does not sign it or include other necessary information to identify themselves. ADOR warns taxpayers that if a preparer won't state their name on the tax return, it could be a possible scam.

By not providing the required information, it will appear that the return was self-prepared, which benefits the ghost tax preparer by staying under the radar. A ghost preparer may promise a larger refund and charge fees based on a percentage of the refund, which is prohibited. It is also a red flag potentially indicating a frightening array of problems.

The preparer may ask the client to pay them in cash or not provide a receipt for services. They may file the return without your consent or alter the return after providing a completed copy. Often, they will use incorrect information to generate a larger refund, claiming false dependents, false expenses, deductions, credits, etc. Even worse, the ghost preparer may divert your funds into their bank account and then disappear.

By law, anyone who prepares or assists in preparing federal and state tax returns for compensation must have a valid 2021 Preparer Tax Identification Number (PTIN). Paid tax preparers are required to sign and include their PTIN on the paper tax returns they prepare. For electronically filed returns, the preparer must list their name and PTIN and sign electronically.

The Department of Revenue advises taxpayers that it is important to ask questions and carefully review their tax returns. Ultimately, the taxpayer is responsible for what is filed, regardless of who prepared the return.

Tips for taxpayers:

- Verify that the preparer has signed the return and include their PTIN before you sign it.
- Check if the preparer is available year-round to explain how the return was prepared in the event of an examination.
- Confirm any additional costs for service prior to preparation.
- Ask any questions before signing and filing. Ask the preparer to explain deductions, credits, and wages claimed.
- Ensure the tax preparer provides you with a copy of the entire return, including schedules, if there are itemized deductions or credits.
- Carefully review the tax return before submitting, ensure numbers are correct, and schedules add up to source documents.

Litter Hotline offers options for Arizonans helping to 'Keep Arizona Grand'

ADOT issues reminder about website for

reporting litter incidents



The state's Litter Hotline program offers even more convenient ways for

travelers to reach out when they see motorists trashing state highways.

The Arizona Department of Transportation's Litter Hotline website <u>Litter.AZ.gov</u> makes it possible for witnesses to input a litter report. People also can call 511, the Arizona Traveler Information phone line, and provide a report via the "Litter Complaint Line" option.

ADOT processed 1,306 Litter Hotline reports of littering over the past year, slightly down from the 1,714 processed in the same period of 2020..

"State highways provide a first-glance impression to residents and visitors to Arizona," said Mary Currie, who manages ADOT's Adopt a Highway programs. "We appreciate that travelers are sending a strong message that littering is not okay. It is a sign that Arizonans want to help Keep Arizona Grand."

Litter Hotline reports require the license plate number of the vehicle from which someone was spotted littering. ADOT then sends the registered owner a reminder that littering is illegal and costly to clean up, as well as unsightly. It can result in a \$500 fine if an incident is spotted by law enforcement. The reminder letter sent out following a Litter Hotline report is accompanied by a small litter bag suitable for use in a vehicle.

ADOT spent more than \$7 million over the past year removing trash and dangerous debris from along state highways.

Complementing the efforts of those making Litter Hotline reports, ADOT's nearly 5,000 Adopt a Highway volunteers last year cleaned up tons of litter on 1,700 miles of state highway — more than 7,800 bags in all. Volunteer participation plummeted 49% in 2020, yet volunteers saved the agency \$236,000 that can be put to other uses.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

BLOCK WATCH IMPROVES THE QUALITY OF LIFE WITHIN NEIGHBORHOODS

Block Watches come in all sizes. They can be a few houses in a cul-de-sac to a whole square mile neighborhood. They help to develop a "sense of community" and strengthen and sustain neighborhoods by bringing residents/neighbors together with a common interest.

Every Block Watch starts with one person and their concern for the safety and well-being of themselves and their families. Their motivation may be to meet or get to know their neighbors to protect the children, to keep property values up by eliminating blight and graffiti, to stop speeding on the streets by installing speed humps to protect the children, to have peace of mind by discouraging barking dogs and loud parties, and to be safe from crimes like burglary, theft and assault.

We all want to live in a safe and secure environment. Our homes should be safe havens. By rights there should be several layers of protection from the national level to our own neighborhoods. National and state governments provide control of our borders; state and city governments provide police and fire protection, education, and other resources, community member groups provide Phoenix Neighborhood Patrollers and the posting of PNP signs on neighborhood streets; Block Watch provides neighbors watching out for neighbors; and we provide our own home security alarms, lighting and burglary prevention measures.

ANGELS ON PATROL

Provides police officers a direct means of helping families in crisis with immediate assistance before they move on to their next urgent call. The most common situation officers request Angels on Patrol assistance are for families involved in domestic violence. SROs are also helped with Youth Enrichment. Angels on Patrol support all Police Departments, Troopers and Deputies in the Phoenix Metropolitan Area and hope to go statewide. Over 17,000 individuals have been served since 2009. The assistance can range from providing a new pair of shoes to sex trafficking victims and domestic violence survivors. This is the only non-profit offering support to on-duty officers going above and beyond the call.



WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S


"Call if you can. Text if you can't." was the key message rolled out during a press conference on April 2nd as text to 9-1-1 service capability becomes available for the first time in the greater Phoenix region. If you are in imminent danger and unable to talk to a 9-1-1 operator, you now have the ability to text to 9-1-1. The service goes live following months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community.

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anyone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? -Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- Who is calling? Give your name location and

phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

CRIME TIPS:

DON'T BE FOOLED BY A FAKE

There's a **fake letter** being circulated by fraudsters that impersonates **JPMorgan Chase** and asks our clients or their business partners to change remittance instructions for ACH and wire transactions. It's a **fraud attempt** that will redirect payments to criminals—and this one in particular, looks very real.

It happens; fraudsters fake a bank's letterhead (ours and other financial institutions) to trick clients and their business partners into changing payment instructions. This tactic—often used in business email compromise scams—impersonates banks, vendors, even the client company itself. When a company employee is fooled by the fake communication, it can be **very expensive** if payments staff don't follow proper controls, especially callback procedures.

Remember, you're liable for payments released by your authorized persons. Protect yourself and your organization; always use strong callback validation procedures, and make sure your vendors and business partners do as well. Learn more about callback procedures in our <u>Guide to Business Email Compromise Prevention</u> or contact your relationship team for more information.

THAT "AMAZING" INVESTMENT OPPORTUNITY SOUNDS TOO GOOD TO BE TRUE. IS IT?

We've all received the pitch — that one investment opportunity that sounds just too good to pass up. But 99.99% of the time, passing it up is exactly the right thing to do. Investment fraud siphons billions of dollars from investors every year. Here's how to spot a phony investment opportunity coming your way..

HOW IT WORKS:

You get an offer for a "once-in-a-lifetime" investment opportunity.

There's always a catch — you have to act quickly or lose the amazing opportunity.

You may see the investment pay off at the beginning, giving you confidence to stick with it.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

A pitch that uses phrases such as "incredible gains," "breakout stock pick" or "huge upside and almost no risk" suggests high risk and possible fraud, according to the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission.

The pressure to act now is the key: If the scammer can convince you to engage before you take the time to do any research or think more critically about the offer, they get your "investment" money.

Early dividends in investment scams are a ploy to make you believe the investment is legitimate; often the money you receive is simply the scammer paying existing "investors" with money from new "investors."

Investment scammers often target older adults, believing they may be more trusting or have more available assets — but anyone of any age can be a target.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Be proactive: If you're interested in investing, do your research rather than react to a pitch from an ad, a phone call or other source.

Investigate investment opportunities by learning as much as you can about the offering (whether stock in a company, gold coins, real estate or any other investment). The SEC offers a <u>database</u> to research publicly traded companies, and FINRA provides one to check the background of brokers.

Have an exit strategy: Come up with a line that makes it easy to end unwanted contact. Simply "No, thank you" and ending the conversation works!

WE'RE ONLINE MORE THAN EVER ... AND SCAMMERS ARE, TOO

October is Cybersecurity Awareness Month, but being safe online is important year-round. It's easier to be safe when you know what cyber-scam attempts to look for.

HOW IT WORKS:

Phony websites: Fake websites and bogus mobile apps have long been the territory of online shopping scams. More people than ever are shopping online since the start of the pandemic, and scammers have created more fake shopping destinations to keep up with demand.

Phishing: Emails, texts and instant messages abound, impersonating legitimate senders (like a bank, shipping company, retailer, charity, or friend, among others). The typical goal is to get you to click on a link to address a problem or learn about a free federal grant, or some other ruse. Increasingly, we are seeing fake emails from Amazon, claiming they need you to click on a link to verify a purchase made on your account.

Spear-phishing: When criminals have obtained someone's personal information (from social media, data breaches — even public records), they use it to make a targeted attack. Whereas scammers cast a wide net with phishing, spear-phishing targets an individual or organization.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Fake websites and apps seek to lure us in, get us to pay for a product that never comes, or load malicious software on our devices to steal logins and passwords.

Phishing relies on the criminal's ability to impersonate a trusted entity. Clicking on the provided link could lead to loading dangerous malware onto our device that can steal logins and passwords. It can also lead to identity fraud.

Spear-phishing is often focused on businesses to obtain access to systems and confidential information, but it isn't limited to this. We also see it used in what we call, "Can you do me a favor?" scams. It might involve a scammer impersonating a leader of a faith community, for example, sending a quick email or text to you as an active congregant and asking you to buy hundreds of dollars in gift cards for a family in need. He directs you to snap a pic of the front and back of the card and share it, with a commitment to reimburse you later. Only the criminal impersonator drains the cards as soon as you send the pictures (and the faith leader didn't know a thing about it).

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Engage your inner skeptic when looking at emails, texts and social media messages. Scammers are banking on getting us to act without first thinking things through.

Set your device's operating systems and protective software to update automatically, so you don't miss out on changes that are intended to address vulnerabilities.

Enable two-factor authentication everywhere it's offered; it confirms that you are indeed the person seeking to access a password-protected site. With this, the site will require you to prove it's you by sending you a code by text, email or automated phone message, and having you enter that code before being able to access the site. This is intended to stop a criminal from accessing your account.
