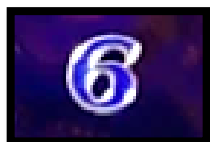

The Phoenix Police Department now has a mobile app, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place. WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

"Call if you can. Text if you can't." was the key message rolled out during a press conference on April 2nd as text to 9-1-1 service capability becomes available for the first time in the greater Phoenix region. If you are in imminent danger and unable to talk to a 9-1-1 operator, you now have the ability to text to 9-1-1. The service goes live following months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community.

- **What** - is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- **What** - happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- **When** - did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- **Was** - anyone hurt?
- **Weapons** - are there weapons involved?
- **What** - manner did they leave or arrive - foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- **Who** - did it? -Suspect description
- **Where** - did the suspect go? - What direction
- **What** - did the suspect obtain? - type and amount
- **Who** - is calling? - Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

KIA CHALLENGE

In July 2022, videos began to surface on the social media site TikTok explaining design flaws in certain Kia and Hyundai vehicles, and how to steal the vehicles using a USB charging cord. The videos went viral and a new "TikTok challenge" was born. The challenge is to steal a vehicle using a USB charging cord, which is commonly found inside the vehicle. In recent years, there have been numerous challenges that have evolved from videos shared on the social media site. The social media site is generally used by individuals in their late teens or early twenties. While some of the challenges are relatively harmless and many young individuals may view the videos and challenges as pure fun, stealing a car is a serious offense in Arizona and could have long-term effects that may not be considered. Stealing a vehicle in Arizona can fall under one of two Arizona Revised Statutes:

13-1803. Unlawful use of means of transportation

A. A person commits unlawful use of means of transportation if, without the intent to permanently to deprive, the person either:

1. Knowingly takes unauthorized control over another person's means of transportation.
2. Knowingly is transported or physically located in a vehicle that the person knows or has reason to know is in the unlawful possession of another person pursuant to paragraph 1 or section 13-1814.

B. A violation of subsection A, paragraph 1 of this section is a class 5 felony.

C. A violation of subsection A, paragraph 2 of this section is a class 6 felony.

13-1814. Theft of means of transportation

A. A person commits theft of means of transportation if, without lawful authority, the person knowingly does one of the following:

1. Controls another person's means of transportation with the intent to permanently deprive the person of the means of transportation.
2. Converts for an unauthorized term or use another person's means of transportation that is entrusted to or placed in the defendant's possession for a limited, authorized term or use.
3. Obtains another person's means of transportation by means of any material misrepresentation with intent to permanently deprive the person of the means of transportation.
4. Comes into control of another person's means of transportation that is lost or misdelivered under circumstances providing means of inquiry as to the true owner and appropriates the means of transportation to the person's own or another's use without reasonable efforts to notify the true owner.
5. Controls another person's means of transportation knowing or having reason to know that the property is stolen.

Theft of means of transportation is a class 3 felony.

Recently, officers from the Black Mountain Precinct responded to approximately 12 related calls for service regarding stolen vehicles, attempted stolen vehicles, and recovered stolen vehicles. All the vehicles involved were either Kia's or Hyundai's and the method of theft was consistent with the social media challenge. Later that day, officers responded to a suspicious person call which resulted in officers locating and detaining four juvenile subjects who matched the suspect descriptions from the earlier stolen vehicle calls. Detectives from the Property Crimes Bureau responded to assist with the investigation. During the investigation, it was determined the juveniles were related to the stolen vehicles from earlier in the day. Information was also obtained on others that may possibly be participating in the challenge.

It is important for individuals to understand the seriousness of their actions and consequences that could have lasting effects. The fact that individuals participate in social media challenges provides insight into the amount of influence social media can have on individuals. It is also important to highlight the reason these individuals were apprehended. This is a prime example of "see something, say something". Had the caller not called the police about individuals that appeared out of place, they may not have been apprehended and other vehicles most likely would have been stolen. As a reminder, park in a well-lit area if possible, always lock your vehicle with the windows rolled up, and do not leave valuables inside your vehicle, especially in plain view.

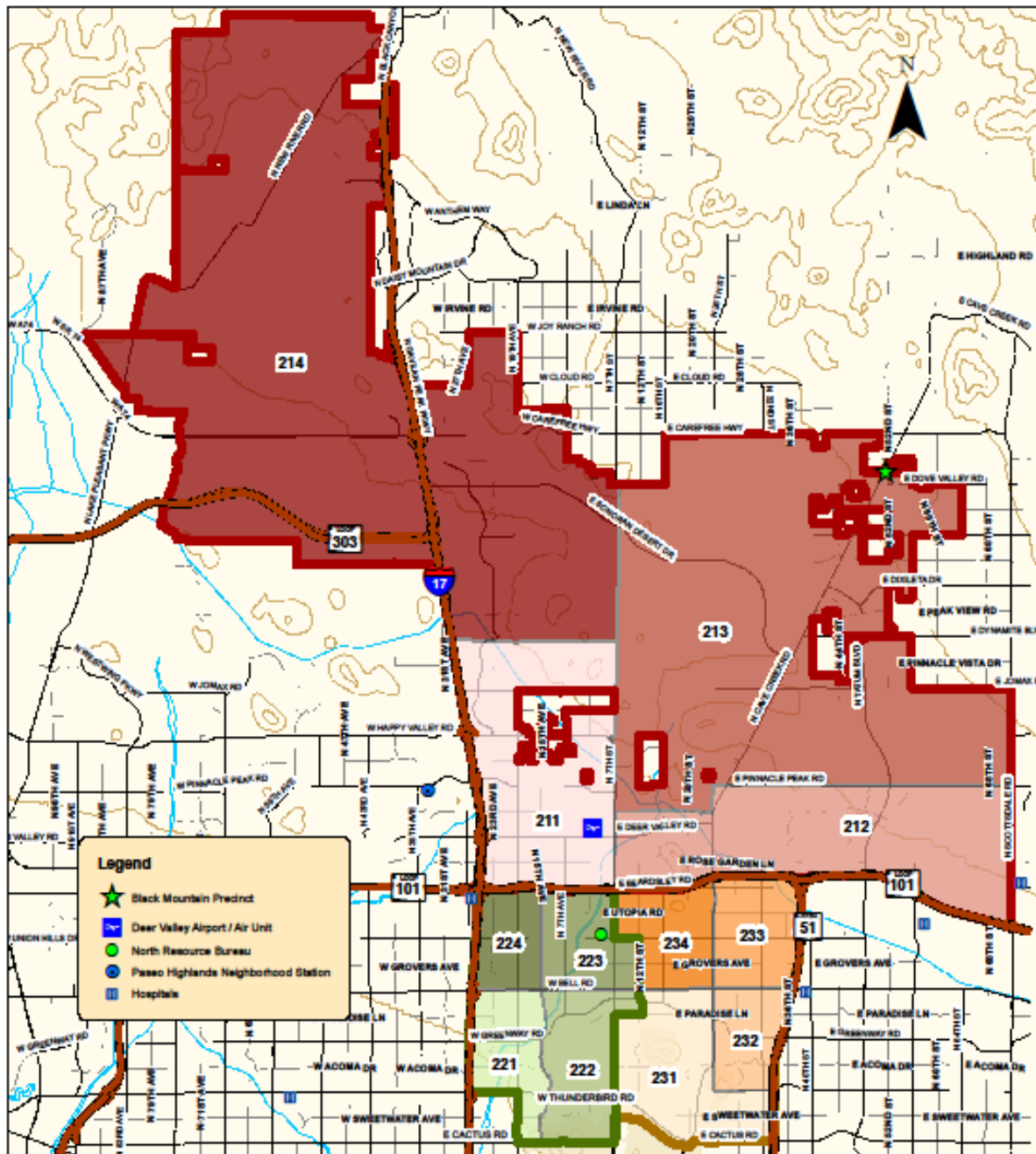

The rate effective January 1, 2022 is 58.5 cents a mile.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. **FOR HELP** call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be 1/4 - 3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Domestic violence and emotional abuse are behaviors used by one person in a relationship to control another person. Partners may be married or not married; heterosexual, gay, or lesbian; living together, separated or dating. Although emotional, psychological and financial abuse are not always criminal behaviors, they are forms of abuse and can lead to criminal violence.

Orders of Protection

An Order of Protection (sometimes referred to as a restraining order) is a court order signed by a judge which prohibits or restricts an offender from contacting you if you are a victim. The order may limit the offender's communication with you or require that the offender stay away from you. Orders of Protection are valid for 12 months. If you are involved in court proceedings for a divorce or a custody matter, you can obtain an Order of Protection from Superior Court. Other types of orders are issued by city courts or Justice Courts.

All orders must be delivered in person, or "served," to the offender. This can be done by a private process server for a fee, or by a local police department or sheriff's office free of charge. After an order has been served, the server files an affidavit of service with the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office. This verifies that the offender has been notified of the order, and allows law enforcement agencies to determine if the offender does anything to violate the order.

Keep a copy of the Order of Protection with you at all times. Provide copies of the order to your employer, landlord, schools and childcare providers. It is essential that you immediately report any violations of the order to the police so that the criminal justice system can provide you and your family with the protection you need.

Safety Planning

Abuse comes in many forms – physical, emotional, sexual and financial. It is important that you make plans now to keep you and your children safe in the event you find yourself in an abusive situation. The following information can help you develop a safety plan of action.

AT HOME

- Do not allow yourself to become trapped in rooms with weapons or only one exit (i.e. a kitchen, bathroom, etc.).
- Talk with your children about safe places to hide or where to go for help. Consider teaching them a code word that you can use that signals them to call 911 in situations where an abuser may be present.
- Set up an emergency signal with trusted friends and neighbors that will alert them to call for help.
- Place important papers (such as birth certificates, custody papers, bank account information, identification/citizenship information, insurance cards, social security cards and school records) in a safe location.
- Pack a bag with items you will need if you need to leave quickly, such as clothes, medicines, toys, cash, etc. Keep the bag in a safe, easily accessible place.
- Make copies of all important keys. • Notify your employer of the situation.

AT WORK

- Provide building security personnel with a photograph of the abuser and a copy of your Order of Protection.
- Screen your calls.
- Request an escort to your car or public transportation.
- Vary the route you take home.
- Consider purchasing an extra cell phone for your car.
- Carry a whistle/noise maker or personal alarm. **AT CHILDREN'S SCHOOL**
- Notify the school of the situation.

- Let school administration know to whom your children can be released.
- Provide the school with a photograph of the abuser.
- Tell school personnel not to divulge your address or phone number to anyone without your approval.
- **At Children's School** • Notify the school of the situation.
- Let school administration know to whom your children can be released.
- Provide the school with a photograph of the abuser.
- Tell school personnel not to divulge your address or phone number to anyone without your approval.

Domestic Violence Early Lease Termination

Arizona law allows tenants who are the victims of domestic violence to terminate a rental agreement without incurring penalties. In order to do this, the tenant must:

- Provide a copy of a protective order that has been issued to the tenant. The landlord may also request a receipt of a signed statement that the order has been submitted to an authorized officer of the court for service.
- Provide a copy of a written departmental report from a law enforcement agency stating that the tenant notified the agency that he or she is a victim of domestic violence.

A tenant who is a victim of domestic violence may also require that a landlord install new locks, rekey existing locks or replace the entire mechanism to the tenant's dwelling if the tenant pays for the cost of installing, changing or replacing the locks.

Fire Prevention Public Information

Vacant and Abandoned Buildings

Fires in vacant and abandoned structures can pose serious risks for our first responders and community. While nationally fires in vacant buildings represent 6% of structure fires, they account for 16% of Firefighter injuries and deaths (1). They also have a 33% greater chance of spreading to other structures in the neighborhood. It's estimated that in the United States 16% of urban structures sit vacant or abandoned. A few Phoenix Fire Code requirements have been provided below to assist property owners with implementing a process to prevent or reduce the effects of fires in their vacant properties.

- Secure all exterior openings to prevent unauthorized access to the building.
- Ensure all the fire protections systems (fire sprinkler system, fire alarm, standpipes and fire hydrants) are kept in operational service and inspected every year by a licensed contractor.
- Remove any unnecessary combustible material like office equipment and household goods. Never allow trash or combustible debris to be stored in vacant/abandoned buildings.
- Ensure exposed sprinkler pipe is protected from freezing conditions.

A proper swimming pool barrier is a key component in pool safety. In Arizona, drowning is the leading cause of death in and around the home for children under 5 years old. Many of these deaths result when young children gain unsupervised access to swimming pools due to inadequate pool fencing. The City of Phoenix requires pools to have an approved fence around them to prevent a child from drowning. People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S. They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-8.

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit [988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline](#) is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States. The Biden administration has invested more than \$400 million in beefing up crisis centers and other mental health services to support the 988 system.

Suicide Warning Signs

These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

♦ Talking about wanting to die or to kill oneself.	♦ Increasing the use of alcohol or drugs.
♦ Looking for a way to kill oneself, such as searching online or buying a gun.	♦ Acting anxious or agitated; behaving recklessly.

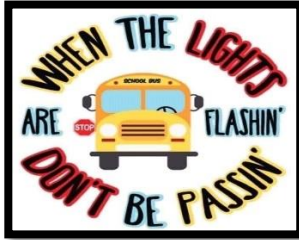

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School is back, and so are the buses

Stop when children are boarding, exiting the school bus



Football practices have resumed and shopping for new clothes is done, which must mean school is back. That also means school buses will be driving through the neighborhood picking up, and dropping off, students of all ages. Drivers should expect to wait when the bus's stop sign arm is extended so children can safely board and exit the bus. However, about 13,000 motorists each year are reported by Arizona school bus drivers for not stopping as required.

Since 2021, an online process allows the Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division to send warning letters more quickly to owners of vehicles that were reported as not stopping for the school bus stop sign.

Bus drivers can send a complaint of a stop sign violator directly to ADOT's Motor Vehicle Division. They can fill out the form and click 'Submit' and it goes to MVD. MVD then sends a notification letter, which is not a citation, to the vehicle owner as an effort to call attention to the seriousness of running the stop sign, which allows students getting on and off the bus a safe space to cross the street.

Previously, school bus drivers would fax forms to the Arizona Department of Public Safety, which then emailed or faxed the reports to MVD.

" Oftentimes, the reports were difficult to read, and it put DPS in the middle," said MVD Senior Division Administrator Susan Trask. "We created an online form for the bus drivers to easily complete and submit directly to the MVD electronically, saving a step and allowing the notices to go out more quickly."

Motorists, who are issued citations by law enforcement officers for passing a school bus when a stop arm is extended, could face a civil penalty and possibly a suspended driver license under state law.

Attorney General's Office Warns AZ Homeowners About Deed Fraud

AGTV Video Available for Broadcast - Scammers Forge Signatures to Steal Home Titles

PHOENIX -- Arizona Attorney General Mark Brnovich warns Arizonans about a disturbing trend over the past couple of years involving deed fraud. Since January of 2021, the Attorney General's Office (AGO) has received 65 complaints from homeowners, claiming their home was no longer in their name after someone fraudulently forged their signature on a warranty deed and filed it with the county recorder. In many cases, the criminal quickly sold the home and took off with the money.

Criminal investigators with the AGO say homeowners who live in their homes and carry a mortgage are less likely to experience deed fraud. The crime is most common with houses that are empty, rentals owned by corporations or people who live out of state, or with homes where someone has recently passed away.

"For many Arizonans, stealing their house is the same as their life savings," said Attorney General Mark Brnovich. "Homeowners should regularly monitor the status of their property with the county to quickly detect any fraudulent or unlawful activity."

AGTV spoke with Don Carroll, a Special Investigator at the Arizona Attorney General's Office about the kinds of cases he's working on.



Establish a Payment Plan Today for Unpaid Individual Tax

Phoenix, AZ—The 2022 tax season bill notices for unpaid individual income tax liability are being sent to taxpayers. By making a payment as soon as possible, taxpayers can avoid further penalties and interest. Taxpayers who did not submit for an extension by the due date should file their tax return by October 17 even if they cannot pay the balance in full.

For taxpayers unable to pay their individual income tax liability in full, the Arizona Department of Revenue (ADOR) offers a convenient way to request a payment plan and manage their liability through the [AZTaxes.gov](https://aztaxes.gov) website. Under the Individual menu, simply select Request a Payment Plan.

A payment plan is an arrangement with ADOR to pay tax debt within an agreed upon timeframe. Through AZTaxes, taxpayers can quickly and easily set up a payment plan. It also reduces the number of calls and paper submissions to be processed.

What you should know if considering a payment plan:

- If a bill has been received for the tax period in question, then the process to establish a payment plan request in ADOR's system will take up to 4 weeks.
- If you have not received a bill for the tax period in question, then the process to establish a payment plan request in ADOR's system will take up to 8 weeks.
- While on a payment plan, taxpayers must not incur any new liabilities, but will continue to incur interest until the outstanding liability is paid in full.
- Payments must be made on time through [AZTaxes.gov](https://aztaxes.gov).
- If the payment plan defaults, ADOR can and will enforce without notice through a levy and/or lien action.

Out-of-State Planes, Boats, and Automobiles

Phoenix, AZ—As the weather heats up, taxpayers may be interested in buying recreational vehicles. The Arizona Department of Revenue (ADOR) reminds purchasers and sellers of their licensing and tax liability.

Businesses or individuals who purchase a plane, boat, or automobile from an out-of-state vendor may be subject to use tax, which is a tax on purchases made out-of-state for taxable items stored, used, or consumed in Arizona when the sale was not subject to transaction privilege tax (TPT).

Aircraft

Aircraft must be registered with the [Arizona Department of Transportation \(ADOT\)](#); the agency will then send the information to ADOR which will conduct research to determine if the out-of-state seller charged tax. If more information is needed, ADOR will notify the purchaser via a questionnaire, and the business or individual will need to provide all necessary supporting documentation. If a use tax is due, ADOR will notify the purchaser of an amount due. While the state use tax rate is equal across all counties, the [cities/towns](#) may impose an additional use tax.

Watercraft

Watercraft and trailers that are purchased from an out-of-state seller must [email the sales agreement to ADOR](#) to calculate all tax due. Once taxes are paid, the purchasers will need to register the watercraft with [Game and Fish](#) and trailer with ADOT.

Vehicles

When registering a vehicle purchased from out-of-state with ADOT, both state and city taxes are calculated and paid. ADOT will collect all city and state taxes, however, if they cannot, the information is referred to ADOR for review and to collect the proper taxes. The [vehicle use tax calculator](#) is available to taxpayers to determine the amount of tax they will be required to pay based on the vehicle's registered address.

To assist Arizona motor vehicle sellers making sales to nonresident purchasers from states that have lower state tax rates than Arizona's 5.6% state transaction privilege tax rate, ADOR has two versions of a tax computation worksheet that helps determine the reduced amount of state TPT and county excise tax that will apply to the sale and also compute the correct deduction amounts to be taken on the [Transaction Privilege, Use and Severance Tax Return \(Form TPT-2\)](#).

[Worksheet A/B](#) is a blank worksheet taxpayers can print and complete manually. [Worksheet C](#) is an automatic computational worksheet available for print (must download and open with Acrobat through the computer folder, not internet browser).

CRIME TIPS:

OFFERS FOR "FREE" MEDICAL EQUIPMENT MAY PROVE COSTLY

Medicare provides millions of beneficiaries with access to needed durable medical equipment at no cost. But when Medicare reaches out to offer something for free, it is not Medicare reaching out at all. Enter the scammers.

HOW IT WORKS:

You receive an unsolicited communication from a Medicare representative with an offer for a free medical device, such as a back brace or custom orthotics.

Even if you say you don't need the device, the "representative" will strongly encourage you to accept it, since, after all, it's "free."

The caller will ask you for your Medicare number to process the benefit.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Providing your Medicare number for a "free" Medicare product, test or service supports the multibillion-dollar Medicare fraud industry, wherein Medicare pays fraudulent claims or someone pretending to be you gets health care.

Any equipment you receive — if you receive it — is likely a cheap version of the product, such as an ankle wrap instead of custom shoe inserts.

Someone impersonating you for medical visits and procedures can taint your Medicare health records — a potentially dangerous outcome to your well-being.

Medicare or a Medicare representative will never call you unless you've called first and left a message for them to return your call.

A Medicare health or drug plan may call you if you are already a member of that plan.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Do not engage with any out-of-the-blue communication seeking your Medicare number.

Protect your Medicare number, and only provide it to your own personal health providers when needed.

Carefully review your Medicare Summary Notice or Explanation of Benefits to identify any surprise services, tests or equipment.

Contact your provider if you see unexpected charges, and if you suspect fraud, contact 1-800-MEDICARE (633-4227).

If you find your Medicare number has been used fraudulently, create an identity recovery plan at www.identitytheft.gov.

FOR THE LOVE OF GRANDCHILDREN

Grandparents love their grandchildren, and criminals love to take advantage of that for their insidious financial gain. Indeed, scammers continue to find ways to put new spins on an old scam to target grandparents' hearts and wallets.

HOW IT WORKS:

The Grandparent Scam starts with a call, text, email or message on social media claiming to be your grandchild or someone reaching out on behalf of your grandchild who needs your help urgently.

They will say that your grandchild was in an accident or may be in the hospital — they may even tell you that your grandchild hurt someone and is now in jail.

They'll ask you to send money right away — often through a money transfer or by purchasing gift cards and sharing the activation information on the back of the cards.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Criminals have relied on this scam for many years, refreshing the details over time, in hopes a grandparent's love and concern will drive them to act quickly.

The contact may come late at night — scammers hope their targets will be more likely to believe their story if they aren't fully awake.

The criminal may have scoured the target's social media profile to arm themselves with family information that may lend credence to their ploy.

The scammers will typically offer just enough detail to make the story seem convincing — they may even give the phone to another scammer who will claim to be a doctor, police officer or lawyer.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Disengage immediately. Call your grandchild or other family members to confirm they are safe.

Know that sharing activation information off gift cards is not a legitimate form of payment — anytime this request comes your way, disengage.

Make sure social media privacy settings are set so that only friends and family can see your posts and photos.

If you've experienced a phone scam or other fraud, file a police report. This could help with possible restitution opportunities.

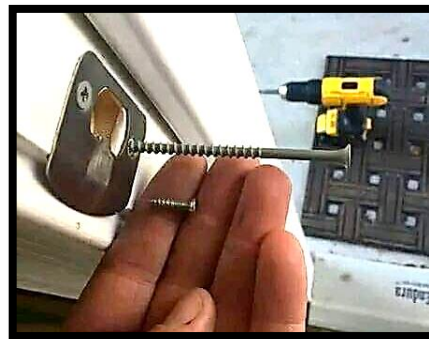

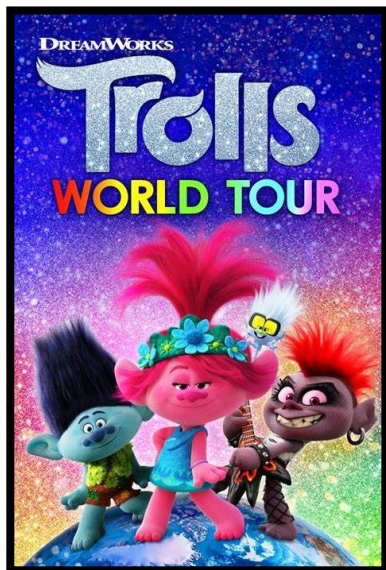
- ✓ Clean out your wallet and remove extra credit or debit cards.

The Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) is a new federal benefit to help households pay for high-speed internet and devices.

You qualify if someone in your household participates in at least one of these programs:

- Free and reduced school lunch
- WIC (Women, Infants, and Children) or SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program)
- Medicaid, SSI (Supplemental Security Income), Federal Public Housing Assistance
- Lifeline and more

You also qualify if your household's annual income is below:

- \$36,620 for a family of two
- \$46,060 for a family of three
- \$55,500 for a family of four

You do not need to be a citizen or have a Social Security number to qualify.

EIGHT EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS TIPS YOU NEED TO KNOW !

If the events over the last two years have taught us anything, it is that we need to be prepared for the unexpected. Staff and leadership in the Retirement Office have worked diligently to ensure we are able to respond in the event the unexpected happens. A major part of that is having emergency processes and procedures in place. These processes and procedures cover everything from notifying staff of emergencies, to ensuring we are able to retire individuals and to pay expected benefits without interruption, and that our data is accessible and secure. Whether you are an active member with the City of Phoenix or retired, being prepared for an emergency or disaster is important. Below are eight tips you can implement in your everyday life.

1. Know what type of disaster to expect.

Find out which disasters your town, state and region are most at risk for and plan accordingly. Also check your home insurance policy to make sure you're protected. While most standard plans cover events like tornados, lightning and winter storms, you'll probably need a separate policy for flooding, windstorms and earthquakes.

2. Sign up for emergency alerts.

Get notifications sent to your phone from your service provider or via a free app from FEMA or the Red Cross.

3. Pack a "Go" or "Bug-Out" bag.

If you have to leave your home in a hurry, you'll want to have some essentials packed and ready to go. Here's an abbreviated list of supplies that you can keep in a portable container or in the area of your house where you'll take shelter.

- Three days' worth of food and water (at least a gallon per family member per day)
- Battery-powered (or hand crank) flashlights and radio (extra batteries)
- First aid kit
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Manual can opener for food
- Regional maps
- Cell phone with chargers, inverter or solar charger
- Moist towelettes and any personal sanitation or specific family needs, like pet supplies

4. Make an action plan.

When things get chaotic, you want to make sure that every family member knows what to do. We suggest designating two meeting places (one close by and one a little further away in your neighborhood) and hanging a map with the spots marked near your emergency kit.

5. Prep your home.

Keep important documents and papers that would be hard to replace sealed in a fireproof safe or waterproof container.

- Passports
- Birth and adoption certificates
- Shot records
- Social security cards
- Leases
- Titles
- Deeds
- Wills
- Rental agreements

6. Prep your pantry.

If you'll be inside for a while, be sure to stock your pantry with nutrient-dense, shelf-stable items.

Sample Food Shopping List

- Canned tuna/salmon
- Dry-roasted vegetables, fruits and mixed nuts
- Whole-grain instant rice
- Boxed grains like quinoa, buckwheat or sorghum
- Cooking oils
- Low-sodium broths
- Canned vegetables and other healthy canned foods
- Assorted spices and seasonings
- Assorted condiments and sauces

7. Store everything properly.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture Food Safety and Information Service (FSIS), how you store food can make a difference when it comes to salvaging items afterward. If there's a chance of flooding, be sure to store dry goods in waterproof containers high enough that they will be safely out of the way of contaminated water.

8. Return safely.

Coming home after a major disaster can be daunting. Don't let your family rush back into your home without taking these precautions.

- Look for damage outside
- Note sounds and odors
- Check inside
- Inspect appliances
- Document the damage
