PHOENIX C.A.R.E.S.

It's been about three years now since the City of Phoenix implemented the Phoenix C.A.R.E.S. program. Let's take a closer look at the program, what it means, and evaluate how it works, so the community can better utilize the program.

A little background on the program, starts with what it means. C.A.R.E.S. stands for Community Action Response Engagement Services. The idea is, if a citizen or city employee observes an active homeless camp (more than one person utilizing an area to sleep or live) they make a report either via phone call or email, to notify the City of Phoenix. Keep in mind that being homeless is not a crime and this system is not a crime reporting system; rather a community resource to assist homeless as well as the citizens.

This reporting system is also useful if a citizen is concerned about a large area of blight. Once the report is made, it goes into a database and is assigned a case number. The person who made the initial report will get notified of this case number, if they opted to be. Once in the database, a representative with community outreach is notified and will respond to the area to determine if the people in the camp need of any type of services. Some of the services available are shelter, rehab, food stamps, obtaining an ID, Veteran services, etc.

The city works closely with Phoenix Human Services as well as Community Bridges and sometimes other services such as South West Behavioral Health, to determine available resources. The goal of the outreach teams is to respond within 3-5 days of the initial report. Once they have attempted outreach, the database is updated and, the issue then proceeds to the next step.

Next, Phoenix Police will often follow up on the report, unless a call for service comes in sooner than the C.A.R.E.S. report does. Phoenix Police head out to determine if there is a crime or any activity that requires police intervention. Trespassing, littering, public urination, and warrants are all possible issues that may arise when police make contact. Officer's (Community Action Officers and Patrol) will look at the situation and determine if there is something more that can be done to help find a resolution.

Sometimes the property owners may not know this is occurring on their property. They are notified of ways to possibly improve their property and prevent reoccurring concerns. Property owners are also notified about the Authority to Arrest, which gives the police permission to arrest people who are trespassing on their property. Police can only do that with the property owner's permission. Once the Authority to Arrest is received from the property owner, the database is updated, and the issue moves to the next stage, which often involves various city departments.

During one of the last stages of a C.A.R.E.S report, the issue is sent to another department to ensure the area is cleaned up and is not a blight issue. This step involves NSD (Neighborhood Services Division). NSD will contact either the property owner to discuss cleaning this up or notify the correct city department (or outside department), to ensure that anything left behind is cleaned up. Other departments that may get involved at this stage include, the Library, Public Works, Solid Waste, Streets, Parks, and sometimes even State Trust Land or Arizona Department of Transportation.

Once the area is cleaned, the individual that made the initial report is notified of the completion of the project. Community Action Officers will often continue to follow up in the area, to ensure that this will not become an issue again.

This program is designed to address the issue of homelessness, and offer resources, while ensuring the community stays clean and blight free. This helps our Phoenix neighborhoods maintain property values and clean access to public spaces.

Block Watches come in all sizes. They can be a few houses in a cul-de-sac to a whole square mile neighborhood organization. They help to develop a "sense of community" and strengthen and sustain neighborhoods by bringing residents/neighbors together with a common interest.

Every Block Watch starts with one person and their concern for the safety and well-being of themselves and their families. Their motivation may be to meet or get to know their neighbors to protect the children, to keep property values up by eliminating blight and graffiti, to stop speeding on the streets by installing speed humps to protect the children, to have peace of mind by discouraging barking dogs and loud parties, and to be safe from crimes like burglary, theft and assault.

We all want to live in a safe and secure environment. Our homes should be a safe haven. By rights there should be several "Layers of Protection" around our homes starting with National and State Governments controlling our Borders, then State and City Police Departments with local precincts and City Governments that provide education and resources, then Community Member Groups providing Phoenix Neighborhood Patrollers and PNP signs posted on neighborhood streets and then a Block Watch on our own street with neighbors watching out for neighbors and then our own home security alarms and lighting from burglary prevention education.

CRIME TIPS

DO ILLEGAL ROBOCALLS HAVE YOUR PHONE RINGING OFF THE HOOK?

You're in the middle of dinner and your phone rings. Maybe the number looks familiar. Perhaps the first few digits are the same as your number ... you may even be looking at your entire number.

You answer the call, and on the other end is not a live person but instead ... a robotic voice

You are the recipient of a robocall. And while many robocalls are made by legitimate entities looking to conduct legitimate business, it is estimated that 40% of all robocalls are fraudulent.

HOW IT WORKS:

Illegal robocalls made by scammers often use "spoofing" technology to mask their true origin, and may change the caller ID to look similar to your own phone number. A recent AARP study showed that 59% of us are more likely to answer if the caller ID shows a local area code.

The robotic voice on the other end might claim to represent a utility, a name-brand company or a government agency, or it may offer you a free trip, cheap health insurance or a low-interest loan.

You may be prompted to press "1" to be removed from the list.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Illegal robocalls make up a fast-growing share of phone traffic, making it all the more important to be on guard for automated scams.

Even just pressing a key or answering a question alerts scammers that they've hit on a "live" number, and your number will be added to even more lists that are bought and sold among criminals.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Let calls go to voicemail or your answering machine if you aren't 100% sure who is calling you. Listen to the message and if it's a threat from a government agency, a utility company or some other entity, know that it is a scam.

If you do pick up on a suspicious robocall, once you realize it's suspicious, hang up without engaging. If the caller claims to be from a legitimate-sounding entity, hang up and call that entity on a number you know to belong to them.

Explore free and low-cost call-blocking options, such as apps and services that screen calls and weed out spam and scams. Ask your phone service provider if it offers any such tools.

Report scam calls to the proper authorities. Every report helps authorities piece together a fuller picture of what scammers are doing.

TECH SUPPORT SCAMMERS ARE STILL CALLING!

Technology is constantly changing, and with each new platform or device comes a new worry about security. Tech support scammers aim to exploit this fear, claiming your computer or mobile device is dangerously ill and needs an immediate, costly cure. These fake technicians are out to steal your money or your identity, not save your machine.

HOW IT WORKS:

You get an unsolicited phone call or email from a big tech company like Microsoft or Apple, or you see a pop-up message on your screen warning that a virus or other malicious program has infected your device, and you need to call the number on the screen right away.

A "technician" asks for remote access to your device, and once in, shows you some files that "prove" you have a major problem.

The "technician" says they can fix your problem for a fee, and then may offer you a monthly subscription to keep your device safe.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Big tech companies like Microsoft or Apple say they don't call customers out of the blue to warn them of problems on their devices.

The concerning files the "technician" may show you on your device are completely benign.

The scammer may ask you to pay by purchasing a gift card and providing the account number and PIN — a sure sign that it's a scam, as is a request for payment by wire transfer.

The scammer may call back months later and offer you a refund for some phony reason, asking for your bank account information to deposit the money; this is a ruse.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Screen incoming calls with an answering machine or voice mail, and once you listen to the message, decide if it warrants a call back.

If the caller claims you have a problem with your computer or the software on your computer, it is a scam, so don't engage or return the call.

If you get a pop-up that freezes your screen, shut down your computer and restart it.

Keep your security software, browser and operating system up to date.

If you think your device is infected, get it checked out by a reputable source; most big box electronics retailers offer tech support services.

If you realize you've fallen victim to this scam, and you've paid by credit card, contact your financial institution to dispute the charge and to cancel any monthly fees you may have agreed to.

Report scams to the Federal Trade Commission at ftc.gov/complaint.

SOME SCAMMERS MAKE THINGS PERSONAL

Some of the most heartless scammers will tug at your heartstrings as a way to get into your wallet. Two examples of this are romance scams or the grandparent scam. In romance scams, scammers will target potential victims on dating sites, through social media or on chat boards. They'll be smart, attractive and personable. After they've earned your trust, comes an urgent request for money. Usually it comes with a promise to repay, but more often than not, your match disappears — with your money — for good.

In the case of the grandparent scam, criminals try to tap into your love and concern for a close family member, typically a grandchild. They will claim that your grandchild is in distress and needs you to send money to help. They hope that you will act swiftly in your concern, and before you are able to look into the claim of distress.

HOW IT WORKS:

In each of these scams, scammers are working to gain your trust and then tap into your emotions.

They will often create a sense of urgency, whether they are asking for money for themselves or on behalf of your grandchild. They want you to act before you can give that thought or confirm if the story is true.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

In both of these scam types, requests for payment will typically come in difficult-to-trace forms. This could be in the form of prepaid cards or by having money sent to a specific Western Union office.

To make their stories sound more credible, scammers will use information gathered from your social or public profiles. They may also gather small details during conversation or messaging.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Look for the red flags you just read about, and if anything seems off, take a pause. Hang up the phone. Talk to a trusted friend. And trust your instincts. If something doesn't feel right, it probably isn't.

Make your social networks private. It makes it harder for potential romance scammers to find you, and it also makes it harder for grandparent scammers to get the personal info needed to convince you of the scam.

ADOR: Taxpayers, be on Look Out for Identity Theft Thieves During Tax Season

The Arizona Department of Revenue (ADOR) treats detecting and stopping fraud with paramount importance and reminds taxpayers that tax filing season is a time to be aware of identity thieves looking for ways to commit tax fraud.

The department points to phishing schemes, card-skimming devices, unsecure Wi-Fi networks, data breaches, computer viruses, unsafe smartphone apps, and hacking email accounts as ways identities are stolen.

Tips to help prevent being the victim of identity theft:

- Do not carry identification with your Social Security Number (SSN) on it.
- If someone wants your SSN, always ask why because it is not always required.
- Keep personal and confidential information in a secure place.
- Take extra precautions when discarding personal or confidential information.
- Protect personal computers, smartphones, and other devices by using anti-virus software.
- Use strong passwords and never share your passwords.
- Never give personal information through unencrypted email, social media, or text messaging.

One scam that targets companies and continues to be reported is the W-2 scam, which is when a phishing email is sent to someone in a company's human resources or payroll office that appears to be from an executive of that business and asks for payroll information containing confidential information, be emailed immediately. The Arizona Department of Revenue advises staff to never respond to the email, and instead, connect with the person whose name is on the email by phone or in person to confirm its authenticity. ADOR recommends companies establish specific internal policies to address these requests and take steps to protect employee information.

Neighborhood Notification: Traffic Lane Striping Improvements 19th Avenue from Union Hills Drive to Beardsley Road

As part of the Street Transportation Department's core mission, we strive to improve the City's roadways to create a safe and efficient transportation network.

Our ongoing pavement maintenance program provides opportunities to change the existing traffic lane striping and add new bike lanes on some streets to improve safety for people who walk, drive, ride bicycles and use transit.

19th Ave. from Union Hills Dr. to Beardsley Rd. is scheduled for pavement maintenance (new asphalt) in spring/summer 2020 and will be ready for traffic lane striping improvements.



These improvements will include the slight narrowing of vehicle travel lanes to accommodate the addition of a bicycle lane. The slight narrowing of the lane widths to accommodate the buffers will help to guide and slow traffic. Parking restrictions and the number of travel lanes will remain the same. The proposed future traffic lane striping is depicted below, looking northbound:



Pavement maintenance work is scheduled to begin in spring/summer 2020 but is subject to change. Before the pavement work begins, we will notify the properties located directly next to the roadway where the work will be taking place.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. *FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!*

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be 1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

WHEN YOU CALL 911 KNOW THE 10 W'S

What - is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION

What - happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?

When - did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

Was - anyone hurt?

Weapons - are there weapons involved?

What - manner did they leave or arrive - foot, vehicle, bicycle...?

Who - did it? -Suspect description

Where - did the suspect go? - What direction

What - did the suspect obtain? - type and amount

Who - is calling? - Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

SIGN UP FOR REVERSE 911 *IN CASE OF EMERGENCY*

Getting an emergency message out to those living near a catastrophe can be difficult. In Arizona, there is a reverse 911 system.

The Community Emergency Notification System helps those managing a disaster send a message to potential victims, alerting them to stay away and stay safe.

The Community Emergency Notification System is a robo-voice message alert going straight to your phone.

The system automatically dials the landlines in the area of the active scene, but with landline phones nearly extinct, you must register your cell phone if you want to get the message.

The system will be able to send text messages out and not only to those who are registered but also to anyone who is near a cell tower where the situation is ongoing.

VISIBLE HOUSE NUMBERS

Please take a moment to step out in front of your home and look for your address. Seriously, if you were an emergency responder is your address visible? Have bushes grown and now obscure or is there an RV parked in such a way that the house numbers are not easily seen? DO NOT rely on the painted curb because a parked vehicle can cover it up. If you have an alley, please take the time to be sure your address is visible on your fence also. Also, make sure the address numbers are visible after dark! Solar LED Spotlights work great!

BULK TRASH PICKUP

The next date for our neighborhood (Area 12) to start putting out bulk trash will be on **Saturday, MAY 2nd**. Pick up begins on **Monday, MAY 14th**.

Remember, there is a **ONE WEEK RULE**, so don't put the trash out too early.

Bulk trash consists mainly of materials that cannot be placed in your green/black garbage container or recycled in your blue Phoenix Recycles container.

Unacceptable Materials

Our Bulk Trash crews will not pick up the following:

- More than 20 cubic yards per residence, or a pile the size of a SUV
- Loose debris and litter
- Loose grass, leaves, weeds, twigs and hedge clippings
- Household hazardous waste (HHW), such as antifreeze, pool chemicals, oil, batteries and paint
- Community piles
- Materials placed in the Bagster bags
- Materials such as bricks, concrete, dirt, rocks, asphalt and roofing shingles/tiles
- Construction materials in excess of 25 pounds or over four feet long
- Metal or car parts in excess of 20 pounds or over four feet long
- Tires, any shape or size
- Glass such as windows, shower doors, patio doors, mirrors, fluorescent tubes, etc.
- Tree trunks or stumps larger than 12" in diameter
- Appliances that use refrigerants such as freezers, refrigerators and air conditioners

(Remember that the trash needs to be 5 feet away from any object, behind the curb, and no larger than a pile 10 feet long, 9 feet wide and 6 feet high. If the pile runs up into your driveway expect to clean the area above the sidewalk yourself.)
